H is two older sisters were playing jump rope on the sidewalk in front of the house. At 6 years older than him, the youngest sister had a couple of young male admirers from down the street. The other one, 8 years older, had a couple of her own. These young men were circling the block uncertain of how to approach the two girls who were using the mailbox pole as their 3rd partner. Cowboy chaps, hat, vest, scarf, boots and sheriff badge complemented his hopeful heart and open face. At 5 years old he had not experienced much heartbreak or shame. He was about to and we were to be witness to it.

As he approached the mailbox, the bike-squad noticed him. The girls kept pretending to not notice the boys who, in turn, did not know how to approach the girls. Cowboy Kyle positioned himself beside the mailbox in hopes of getting in on some action with the older boys or maybe a chance to jump with his sisters.

My reader must understand that this little guy had seen "Man From Snowy River" and made a habit of accompanying his mother to the grocery store in his outfit. He had been given lots of warm comments and affirmation from the 10 am shoppers at the local store. Standing by the mailbox that Saturday afternoon he was certainly not expecting anything but affirmation.

The bike-squad noticed him immediately and soon realized they had a ready way to engage the girls without actually engaging them. They began to make comments toward Cowboy Kyle. His face was inviting, young and excited. He wanted to connect. To be included.

My choice was clear. To spend the rest of my life in jail, or follow him to his bedroom. Gladly, I choose the latter.

"What'cha gonna change into?" I asked as I sat on the floor brokenhearted with him. "My baseball uniform" he said. I told him that I saw what happened. He nodded. I told him I felt really bad. 2018 CINCH Timed Event Championship

MARCH 2-4, 2018 • GUTHRIE, OK

ordan Ketscher is the 14th man in the 34-year history of the CINCH Timed Event Championship to claim the prestigious title.

With it, he became the first Californian in five years to win the "Ironman of Pro-Rodeo."

"I've always watched this event, and just to be here and be part of the greats – Trevor (Brazile), Cash (Myers) and Kyle (Lockett) – is a dream come true," said Ketscher, 28, of Squaw Valley, Calif.

He roped, wrestled and tied 25 animals in a cumulative time of 324.3 seconds to win the title, finishing 19.1 seconds faster than the runner-up, Clayton Hass of Stephenville, Texas; the threetime National Finals Rodeo qualifier in steer wrestling had his best run at the Timed Event after many years competing at the Lazy E Arena the opening weekend of March.

"This meant a lot, because I didn't get to come here last year because of a conflict with a Champions Challenge event," Hass said, referring to a PRCA event in which he was contractually obligated to compete. "I got a chance to come back and prove that I'm supposed to be here.

"This is a bit of redemption I've placed here a few times, and to stay solid through all 25 head means a lot."

Ketscher entered Sunday's fifth and final round as the No. 1 man, but he had just a 7.1-second lead on Myers, who moved to third after the first discipline of the day, heading. Brazile, the Timed Event's only seven-time winner, posted a 6.7-second run to move into the runner-up position.

Myers then fell all the way to sixth after suffering a 60-second penalty in tie-down

roping when his calf got up from the tie before the required 6 seconds – a 60 is equivalent to a no-time at a traditional rodeo. An event later, Brazile joined him after losing his dally in heeling.

The standings shuffle continued through the final performance of the fiveround affair. When the competition ended, the top two men took the biggest prizes.

"It always helps to have \$25,000," Hass said, referring to his substantial secondplace earnings. "The winter has been pretty good, but it could always be better. Now I'm just trying to move on throughout the year and make the NFR."

So, what brought the Texan the most pride in his performance over the weekend?

"The fact that I used my head, and I feel like I stayed focused," he said. "Even when I had hiccups, I didn't back off. I just roped my game."

Ketscher has never been to the NFR, but he performed at an optimum level through the three days of competition, where cowboys battle the mental and physical challenges that come with the "Ironman."

"This is just so awesome," he said of the event. "Everybody specializes in different events, so you've got to come here and do something you're not comfortable with. It's just a marathon."

He held the lead through much of the three-day championship and showed just why consistency is important in this game. And on the final day, when the thoughts of that big check came into his mind, he had to push them away and focus on the task at hand.

"I was trying not to overthink things, and I was just wanting to make every run like I had done the four previous rounds," Ketscher said. "I wanted to trust myself and trust my horses to make it happen."

He will return a year from now as the reigning champion.

"I'm going to go home and work on a few things," he said. "It's going to be just as tough next year. There's no need to slack off.

"Things happen here, and that's what the Timed Event is all about. Anytime, as a cowboy, that you get a chance at \$100,000, you have to love the opportunity."

Myers did pick up a nice prize. His horse, Diesel, was named the AQHA CINCH Timed Event Championship Top Horse.

66 Ve always wanted to rope since I could walk and be around horses, and it's what I've always done," says Caleb Smidt. "I watched the NFR on TV and it's what I've always wanted to do." The four-time WNFR qualifier and 2015 World Champion Tie-Down Roper is the first of his family to travel the professional rodeo trail. But the horse training and roping he learned growing up, particularly from his dad, Randy Smidt, gave him the foundation of skills that took him from Bellville, Texas, to the arena floor of the Thomas and Mack Center.

Caleb, the All-Around and Tie-Down Roping Rookie of the Year in 2013, competed at the WNFR for the third consecutive year in December and won \$60,000. Although the 2017 season didn't have gold buckle returns, he finished fifth in the world standings and split first place in Round 8 with his high school friend Cory Solomon. "I had a really good year all last year leading up to the finals, and then got to the finals and just didn't do very good," he says. "It's been really wet here all winter, so hopefully it dries up and we can be roping and practicing and back into the swing of things. Justin Maass has a covered arena and I'll go over there. He tunes me up and keeps me in line and always has good advice for me. We rodeoed together in 2013 and he's been my coach through the whole thing."

Caleb credits riding good horses just as much with his success as his motivation.



"A good horse is a big part of my success, and being able to have my family up here with me rodeoing and joining in. I don't like the driving part, but when you have a good horse and family with you, it's a lot easier. It's been successful for me the last four or five years." He continues to ride Pockets, the horse that carried him to the WNFR and the world title in 2015. The pair won \$130,000 last year, and Caleb also rode Walter Johnson's horse Iron. The latest member of his equine team is Bart Hutton's horse El Gato, who carried Caleb through his winning run at the Dixie National Rodeo in Jackson, Mississippi, in February. "He's a smaller horse, and he's got a lot of try and a big heart. He gives it everything every time you ride him, and he can run and handle big cattle. He's still a touch green at the bigger and louder rodeos, but he's getting better," says Caleb, who set the horse on his biggest stage vet at The American in February.

Between every one of Caleb's horses and his saddle is a 5 Star Equine pad, which he started using in 2015 and rode at the WNFR. He officially joined the 5 Star team in 2016 when time and hard use proved that the pads should be a staple in his tack room. "I like them. They last a really long time and seem to fit my horses good, so I've ridden them ever since 2015," says Caleb. Along with spreading the word about their products through his social media, he also signs autographs at the WNFR. They're also put to use for everyday jobs like working cattle and riding colts, which Caleb enabove: Caleb Smidt - Westfall Photography

joys doing when he's home. He also enjoys team roping, which he's done professionally in the past. Caleb tried his hand at steer wrestling, but that set him back almost a year in 2014 when he broke his leg, so tiedown roping remains his primary focus.

"I love hunting," Caleb adds. "My fatherin-law has a few places to hunt, so I do a lot of deer hunting and hunting wild pigs." Hunting will take a back seat by March and April when the PRCA Texas Circuit rodeos pick up, followed by the summer run. "Dodge City is one of my favorites and I always seem to do good there. Coming out of the head box at Salinas is always pretty exciting, and Deadwood, South Dakota, is another good one. My family has been with me (rodeoing) every year since I got married," Caleb says of his wife, Brenna, and their son, Cru. "Now that we have a 2-yearold kid, we might start seeing more stuff on the road and doing more things. He likes horses a little bit, but he likes tractors more than anything, and big machinery.

"Since I make a living doing this, I want to make the finals and try to win another gold buckle," Caleb finishes. "I've always kind of had the mindset that it's what I do for a living, so I have to make a living at it. It's what I do to support my family, and always my main goal is to be successful and rodeo."

9 Time PRCA Announcer of the Year [The best part of life is still to come: "I haven't gotten there yet."]

he rich, baritone voice is unmistakable. Step inside a rodeo arena, hear the voice, and without glancing at the announcer's stand, you know who it belongs to. Bob Tallman and his warm, personable approach to calling a rodeo has brought the action to millions of people at rodeo arenas across the U.S. and Canada.

The Nevada native, now living in Poolville, Texas, has been around cattle, ranching and rodeo all his life. He was born the first child of John and Irene Tallman in Orovada, Nevada, in 1947. His sister, Maryanne Tallman Smith is full of the same family try, and they were both raised on the family ranch. He remembers as a little boy, using a stick to sweep a patch of dirt clear, to draw pasture lines in it. His dad owned Tallman Lumber Co. in Winnemucca. Bob attended a one room school, but he'd rather be on horseback, in the middle of a thousand head of cattle, as the Tallmans ran their cattle in common with ten or fifteen other area ranches. Sometimes he and the other kids would fall asleep in the herd, with their stirrups tied together so they wouldn't get bucked off.

John and Irene moved their family to town when Bob was ten years old, the first time the family had running water, flush toilets, and television. He thought it was great, Bob remembered, but it wasn't long till the ranch called again. "I was back working for six dollars a day, as a buckaroo, driving a Farmall C tractor."

Bob's first love wasn't rodeo. He tried high school football, but it wasn't for him. At 5'1" and 105 lbs. as a freshman, he lasted for three days of practice. He excelled at golf, and could hit a ball 300 yards. But he loved rodeo cowboys, and he could rope, and that would prove to be a stepping stone towards his lifelong career of announcing. His second grade teacher and her sister, Tillie Boynton Genter and Jayne Boynton Angus, and their husbands, were the ones who got Bob started in rodeo in junior high and high school.

Another integral part of Bob's young life was 4-H. He was a 4-H state champion horsemanship winner, on the back of a 900 lb. mustang he and a friend had roped, brought home, and broke. He and John DeLong were buckarooing in the pasture when they ran into a bunch of wild mustangs. Bob roped a "little bald-faced sucker," loaded him onto the truck, took him home, and the next day put a saddle on him. The mustang became his 4-H horse, on which he won the title.


In college at Cal Poly State in San Luis Obispo, Calif., he roped collegiately, "but I wasn't good enough, and I didn't care," he said. What he did care about was spending time with the other cowboys: Ned Londo, Bobby Berger, Dennis Reiners, Larry Jordan, Tom Castleberry, and many more. "They were my roommates, my partners, my buddies."

He tried to ride bucking horses, too, attending Tuesday night practices where he'd get on eight or ten horses a night. Bob Robinson, the Canadian bull rider, who was helping with the practices, had advice for him. "Bobby, I know you want to be a cowboy, but you'd better find something else."

It was at a rodeo in Fallon, Nev., in about 1969 where he

contractor, "this announcer is pitiful. Can't you find anybody else?" The contractor told him, when you're done roping, tie up your horse and you do it. So he did, getting paid \$100 a performance, and "I thought I'd never see another poor day," he remembers.

That fall, he announced rodeos for Corky Prunty, Diamond A Rodeos in Elko. By that time, he was married to Kristen, and as they drove to the rodeos, they would program their eight-track tapes, with songs by Marty Robbins and Anne Murray, so they were keyed up at the right spot for playing at rodeos. Bob's pickup had speakers on top of the shell top camper, so he'd drive through town, announcing the rodeo was going on that day.

He was still working three other jobs: for his dad at the lumberyard, as a brake man on the Western Pacific Railroad, and driving freight truck for the Southern Pacific Railroad. Announcing came naturally to Bob. He knew the contestants well; many of them were his friends, so he told stories about them. "I started building a fan base of friends and people," he said.

In 1970, he headed to the PRCA convention in Denver,

at the Brown Palace Hotel, in a white hat he bought from Cotton Rosser's clothes store. He brushed elbows with legends in the rodeo business, contract people who were also at the convention to drum up business: Clem McSpadden, Leon and Vickie Adams, Tommy Lucia, Jay Harwood, Mel Lambert, and more.

But nobody would hire him, and money was in short supply. He and Vick Carmen, another announcer, in the mornings would cross the street to a café where coffee was a dime. At lunch, they'd order hot water and add ketchup and crackers to make soup. And in the evenings, they'd order a dinner and split it.

It was at the convention that Bob got his

first break: Bob Cook, who, with Jack Roddy and Jack Sparrowk owned Rodeo Stock Contractors, Inc., asked Bob to work for them. On February 2, 1972, Bob moved to Clements, Calif., to work for RSC. The first week, his job was to break down truck tires. He helped gather bucking horses, getting on them to try them out. They "peeled the hide off me from the top of my ankles to my cheek bones," he remembered.

He drove truck for RSC, got flank straps ready, fed livestock, packed panels, whatever he was asked to do.

All the while, he was living in his shell camper, showering and eating in the house with Canadian saddle bronc rid-

ing champion Enoch Walker and his wife Maggie who also worked for RSC.

The next year, Bob announced all of the RSC rodeos plus a few for Flying U Rodeo and Cotton Rosser, feeding livestock after the rodeo in his suitcoat. He worked the National Finals Rodeo in Oklahoma City for livestock superintendent Buster Ivory, from 5 am to midnight every day, for \$15 day.

At the time, Kristen stayed in Winnemucca. She had a good job, and they weren't certain where they would land after Bob's time with RSC. When she did go on the road with Bob, "we sold everything and bought a truck," Kristen said, "with a twenty-one foot travel trailer, and that's what we spent the first five years in, living on the road."

It wasn't easy at the beginning. Kristen believed in her husband's dream of being a rodeo announcer, but no one else did, including his parents. The only person besides his wife who urged him on was her dad.

In 1976, he was asked to announce the NFR with Jay Harwood, and "away we went," Bob said of his career.

After that, his announcing career blossomed. Mike Cervi searched him out, asking him to announce the Phoenix Jaycees Rodeo, Denver, Houston, Albuquerque, Greeley, and more. He met announcing legend Hadley Barrett, and they worked several rodeos together, which "was the most magical match in the world," Bob American Cowboy, the Wrangler Network online, and hundreds of television specials, videos, and voice overs.

He and Kristen had a daughter, Nicole, in 1974. Bob was at a rodeo in Spokane, Wash., when she was born, and he celebrated with Larry Mahan and his friends in Spokane. Gary Gist bought champagne, and Cindy Dodge wrote "it's a girl" on Winston cigarettes. "We gave away cigarettes, and we drank the whole case of champagne," Bob said.

Five days later, he and Mahan flew to Reno to see the baby. Mahan bought a dozen roses, and when they walked into the hospital, he told Bob, "you stay in the hall." He handed Kristen the roses, and told Bob, "Ok, you can come in now."



said. "I spent a few thousand days with Hadley Barrett, behind me, in front of me, beside me. He was about the first guy I worked with, side by side, he in the announcer's stand, I a-horseback."

At one point in his career, Bob worked every major rodeo in North America, from Florida to Alberta, California to the Northeast, from Houston to Calgary. In 1983, Bob worked 313 performances, keeping up the pace for years.

He had a twin engine 414 Cessna, and when he put sheets, towels and a pillow in the airplane, "that was the day it got worse," he said. "Instead of going home more often, I went harder."

When he wasn't announcing rodeos, he was doing radio and television. Bob broadcast the NFR in Oklahoma City for many years; he was on John Blair Television, CBS Sports Canada, ABC's Wide World of Sports, FOX Sports, the Great Throughout his career, he has announced the National Finals Rodeo twenty-three times, nine of them consecutively, more than any other announcer, and was voted the PRCA Announcer of the Year nine times (1982, 87, 97, 99-01, 04, 06, 17). He's appeared in several films as a rodeo announcer, was the voice of the Wrangler Network online, and is a 2004 inductee into the Pro Rodeo Hall of Fame.

Bob credits the people he's been around for his success, those who helped him get to where he is today, the committees and contract people he works with, the contestants, and the rodeo audiences as well. "It took me a long time to figure that part out," he said. "It's people God puts in your life, and you're either manipulated by them, or you learn how to deal and get along with them."

He paints pictures for the fans with his

announcing, and he knows how to handle an audience. "You gotta take them right to the edge, but don't push them over," he said. "And when they're just about full, don't give them anymore. They'll come back for more tomorrow."

He says rodeo is a lifestyle, not a sport, and when people buy a ticket to a sporting event like football or baseball, they already know something about it because they have played it. With rodeo, most of the fans have not done it, "so you have to let them taste it

through your eyes, and you have to let them feel it by your inflection," he said. "It isn't always about winning, but having a better horse in the roping, understanding what an inside spur is in the barrel racing, understanding dedication and preparation."

He also treats everyone, from the lowliest to the highest, the same. "The guy in the shoe shine stand, and the man who cleans the toi-

lets, they are important." He follows the example of his Lord in the dignity he gives people. "Jesus treated them the same." He also helps anyone who asks. "His phone never stops ringing," Kristen said. "He goes out of his way, no matter where he is, no matter who it is. He'll answer and talk to a marketing person, for heaven's sake. He'll say, 'what are you selling me today?'"

He's never worked less than four jobs at a time, and he's diversified beyond rodeo. He and Kristen run a cow/calf herd, the 3T Angus Cattle Ranch, which sells pastureto-plate beef. He founded a surveillance company, Pro View Digital Surveillance, with thirty employees and offices around the nation. He also cuts radio ads, serving as the voice for Boot Barn, Kubota tractors in north Texas, Coors, and Dodge. "I never remember not working," he said.

And he doesn't plan on retiring, which "drives a lot of young announcers to drink," he joked. "I ain't weakening."

He loves to work, he said, "and I don't hang around people who don't like work." He's optimistic about his businesses. "I do something every day, in the rodeo business, to make somebody smile and look good. I do something every day, in the surveillance business, that protects people, their families and assets. People ask Kristen, is he like this all the time? "What you see at a rodeo is what I wake up to every morning," she said. "What you see is what you get with Bob."

She's not surprised at Bob's accomplishments. "When Bob does something, he gives 200,000 percent. There's no halfway with Bob. When he decided this was what he was going to do, there was no doubt in my mind he would do it and be successful at it. And he didn't have any breaks on the way. He did it all on his own."

He and Kristen live 250 yards from their daughter and her husband, Daniel Pennell, and their twin grandkids, a boy, Canyon, and a girl, Cashly, who are ten years old. Daniel, an accomplished team roper, builds barns and fences. Nicole sells livestock insurance, and together they follow their kids through their activities: the boy as a roper, and the girl with her volleyball. Kristen often cooks dinner for the family, and they eat together two or three nights a week, and every Sunday night. "We never miss a Sunday night together," Kristen said. "We're a very close family."

Bob and Kristen have been married 49 years, and Bob calls her "the toughest woman on the planet to put up with me." He has supported her in whatever she has wanted to do, Kristen said. She used to travel with him, but doesn't anymore, and he understands that. "He's a very good man," Kristen said.

Arachnoiditis has hampered Bob's mobility in the last eight years, but like everything else in his life, he's met it head on. It is an inflammation of the arachnoid lining in the brain and spinal cord, which causes intense pain and significant disability. Bob was told when he was diagnosed that he would be in a wheelchair in two years, but he isn't. He has learned to compensate where needed, being careful with steps. He doesn't let the disease bring him down. "If you dwell on your moments of negativity, that dwell will swell, and clog the view of your future. And if you're looking for sympathy, buy a dictionary. It's in there."

In 2000, he established the Bob Tallman Charities. He raises funds through an annual golf tournament, called the Pasture Pool Classic, for the M.D. Anderson Cancer Children's Cancer Hospital in Houston. He also hosts the Bob Tallman Wrangler National Finals Rodeo Charity Bowling Tournament, which is held each year during the National Finals. Funds raised from the bowling tournament go to benefit the Speedway Children's Charities in southern Nevada and the Justin Cowboy Crisis Fund.

He is a past member of the Texas 4-H Foundation, and is involved with the Weatherford (Texas) Christian School, where his grandchildren attend. And he's optimistic. The best part of life is still to come: "I haven't gotten there yet."

NATIONAL HIGH STAKES BARREL RACE

[Owner, Shonda Boyd shares what makes her event stand out from the rest.]

Her late mom, Ethel Whitcher, was a barrel racer and Shonda set her mind to creating a format of barrel racing that fit her mom's style of chasing cans. "She had super consistent horses and since she was older; she didn't go after the speed like others. I was trying to figure out a way to allow barrel racers go against their own kind." Fondly named "the Ethel format" takes the average of two of the runs at a National High Stakes Barrel Races and that average determines which division the racer will race in for the short go, or the payout if there isn't a short go.

The payout is 80-20. Eighty percent is paid out to the cowgirls and twenty percent is kept for costs. For the consolation round, the payout is fifty-fifty. In the third round, competitors run from the slowest average time to the fastest times, making it more exciting.

Each round is paid out like a 5D barrel race, including the average, with a half second split between all the D's except between the 4-5 D. Ten percent of the payout goes towards each round and seventy percent goes for the average. Each competitor's entry fee goes towards her division, not the others, which encourages participation. "You're only running against your money. (If you're a 3, 4 or 5D competitor) you're not contributing to the 1D or 2D. That's what makes this race different.

"Once you do it, it's basic, but you have





to see it to understand it," said the 42-yearold, who came up with the format with the help of her husband, a team roper in the World Series. "I love horses that work well. My mom's heart and passion was raising, training, and placing barrel horses with great riders. Out of respect for trainers like my mom and others, I want to provide a place to go race every level of horse and make money on them. Horses that are slower are still worth something and I want to see that rewarded."

Shonda has always worked for herself and she loves being horseback and this is her next adventure. "I enjoy putting these on - I've met some great people and it's fun to work with people that believe in themselves and their horses. It will take off - I'm determined."

Her family is behind her 100%, although her oldest son, Briston, taking on the painting bug, and her youngest son, Prestin, 18, wants to be a movie director. Both her daughters (Easton is 14 and Jostin is 12) are barrel racers and they, along with Tyler, do everything needed to produce an event

from set up, to setting barrels to tearing down. "I couldn't put on these races without my family – they do everything they can the help make it a great event for the contestants."

The ultimate goal is to put on a finale in Vegas that is worth working for. She put on her first Finale this past September in Rapid City and had enough of a turnout to make her keep moving forward. She has the date set for next year and plans are to move it in 2019 to Rock Springs. "Look out five years from now!"

KK Run for Vegas

Meet the Member Lyndee Moser

he Junior NFR takes place in Lyndee Moser's hometown of Las Vegas, Nevada. The 10-yearold barrel racer qualified for the event for the second year in a row, this time at the KK Productions qualifier in Guthrie, Oklahoma. She and her mom, barrel racer and WNFR veterinarian, Dr. Leslie Schur, stopped in at the Lance Graves International Barrel Race on their way to Fort Worth, where Leslie competed in The American Semi-Finals.

Lyndee won her junior division at the KK Run For Vegas qualifier in Guthrie, made even more special given it was her first competitive run since breaking her collarbone in December. Her horse behaved very abnormally at the Junior NFR due to ear ticks - which the Mosers later discovered and treated - and Lyndee broke her collarbone just ten minutes prior to her first run. She went ahead with her run before going home to recuperate and cheer her friends on via the television. "All my friends are at my rodeos and they help me a lot," says Lyndee.

She was back in the saddle 12 days later for some easygoing riding, astride her barrel horse KG Cashin In On Beau, better known as Jersey. Jersey is the twin sister of Issy, the mare that barrel racer Kathy Grimes rode in December at her first WNFR. A friend of Leslie's, Kathy stayed with the Mosers during the WNFR. Lyndee also visited with 2017 WNFR barrel racer Amber Moore, who is another of her mom's friends. "I always watch all the people at the NFR and how they ride, and then I work out my own way to ride my horses," Lyndee explains.

She rides daily and ropes the dummy every night. She's often joined in the arena by her parents, Leslie and Darrell, and her sisters, Reese, 8, and Marquel, 13. Along with barrel racing at KK Productions, Lyndee competes across Nevada in the Wrangler Junior Rodeo Association in barrel racing, pole bending, goat tying,

breakaway roping, and team roping as a header. "Chuck is my roping and goat horse. Indy is a really good pole horse and she's a barrel horse too, and Jules is an all-around horse." Lyndee is also training a 3-year-old mare, Buddha, and a 2-yearold mare, Sheila, who is by Jersey's half brother. The family also has several more horses, cows, dogs, and a rabbit.

When she's not on the rodeo trail, Lyndee attends Doral Academy, but she also does school on the road. "My favorite subjects are math and science," says the fifthgrader. "We've been working on decimals and dividing fractions, and we're learning about the sun and planets." Cooking is another one of her interests. "Usually on Sunday mornings I wake up super early and cook a big breakfast. I usually make pancakes and omelets all from scratch. and I make muffins."

Lyndee's rodeo lineup for the 2018 season includes her WJRA rodeos and competing in the Buckles and Barrels for Bailey race held every Labor Day Weekend at the South Point Equestrian Center. "We take part in it every year. I'm the veterinarian for the event," says Leslie, who opened the Desert Pines Equine Center with Dr. Garth Lamb in 1998. "The folks that put the race together are dear friends

of ours, and for the last three years, Lyndee has taken part of her earnings through the year and been a sponsor of the race." Lyndee's sisters are working to qualify for the Junior NFR themselves in hopes that all three will run in the arena their dad set up. He is the general superintendent for Mel Clark Construction and sets up several arenas around Las Vegas between Thanksgiving and Christmas, including the Junior NFR, WNFR, an extra arena at South Point, and Mandalay Bay.

"This year I want to win the all-around at my rodeo, and I know I'll have to work really hard for that," Lyndee finishes. "I want to qualify for The American on both my (barrel) horses, and win the Junior NFR." 째

HOPE THOMPSON

ope grew up in Atlanta, Texas with horses but no rodeo. Her parents never competed, but they took her to play days, where her interest grew.

So John and Paula Thompson bought their daughter a horse and took her to the Josey clinics, where she learned horsemanship, barrels and poles, then goat tying.

She started roping when she was thirteen and competed at junior rodeos, then high school rodeos in the barrels, poles, goat tying and breakaway.


She qualified for the Texas High School Finals all four years of high school, and after graduation in 2004, headed off to college. She rodeoed for Northeast Texas Community College in Mt. Pleasant for a year, then transferred to McNeese State in Lake Charles, La., competing her freshman year in the breakaway and barrels, then in the breakaway only.

After winning the average at the College National Finals Rodeo in 2008, Hope was invited to compete in the women's Windy Ryon Memorial Roping. It was there that her life took a turn. She won the roping, and the cowgirl who came in second was renowned roper Lari Dee Guy. Hope knew who Lari Dee was; the whole roping world knew who she was. But she didn't know her personally. Hope had won both rounds and the short round, beating Lari Dee; Lari Dee congratulated Hope, telling her how well she did. Lari Dee invited her and her friends to come to her place and rope, and a week later, they did. It was then that Hope told Lari Dee how she wanted to make a living as a woman, with a rope, like Lari Dee did. "She gave me that opportunity," Hope said.

So Hope moved to Abilene, Texas, and began working alongside Lari Dee.

It's not a life of glamour, like it may seem to outsiders, Hope said. It's hard work. "I might ride fifteen horses a day, from morning till dark. Your body gets tired and sore." She travels with Lari Dee, putting on schools; they are gone from home for months at a time. "You get back home and get right back on those fifteen horses a day." But she loves it. "I get to rope every day and do what I love. They say if you do what you





love, you never work a day in your life."

Hope got her WPRA card about seven years ago, competing in the breakaway and team roping, and is the 2014 WPRA breakaway champ and the 2017 heading champ, partnering with Whitney DeSalvo. Her win last year is a wonderful story.

She and Whitney won the Wild Fire, a big girls' team roping in Salado, Texas, early in 2017, and a couple weeks later, won the Patriot, another big roping in Ft. Worth. Each cowgirl had earned \$25,000 between the two events and they were ranked first in the WPRA team roping standings. Then, in an accident tying down calves in late May, Hope shattered the small bone in her lower leg and broke her ankle vertically through the joint. It required surgery in early June, with doctors putting in two plates and fourteen screws. Hope was told she would be out for a minimum of nine months.

As the summer went on, friend and fellow roper Jackie Crawford slowly gained on Hope's lead in the standings. It was September, a month before the WPRA

finals, and Hope still held her lead but not by much. Lari Dee called Hope one day and asked: can you rope? She said, "I'll try my best." So Lari Dee had a special stirrup made for the boot she was wearing on the broken ankle, and she borrowed a horse owned by Lari Dee and Trevor Brazile (her own heading horse is rough and fast footed.) Whitney and friends came by, picked her up, and they were headed to Dodge City to rope. Jackie was at the same roping, checking on her friend after every run. Hope won first and third, and after her win, Jackie came to her, hugged her, and said, "I can't even beat you with a broken leg." At the WPRA Finals a month later, Jackie and her partner came into the short round high call; Hope and Whitney were second high. When it was over, she and Whitney won the average and the world.

Hope went to her first Josey clinic when she was about eight years old, and in all, attended a half-dozen of them. She goes back to teach at them, and has fond, fond memories and thoughts about the Joseys. It was R.E. who pushed for her to be invited to rope at the Windy Ryon, giving her a chance to pursue her dreams. "You can't do it without a start, and Martha and R.E. give you more than a start. They are great people, lifelong friends. They know the sport better than anyone else, and they teach that to you."

Hope loves the family that the Joseys have created. "The coolest part of their clinics and their reunions is it's like a big family. People wait all year long for those events to come along, and it's a huge family reunion."

She hasn't lost touch with them. "I still talk to them to this day. It brings me great pleasure to talk with them."



Back When They Bucked with HOMARD HAYTHORN

orses have been part of Howard Haythorn's life since he was a kid. Actually, they run through the genes of his family. Haythorn, a National Finals Steer Roping contestant, grew up on the back of them, rode them for rodeo, and raised and trained them.

The Maxwell, Neb. cowboy was born in 1927, the great-grandson of Harry Haythornthwaite, a stow-away on a ship from England to America in 1877. When the captain found the sixteenyear-old boy and discovered the boy was raised on a farm, he was assigned to care for the Hereford cattle on the ship. When he arrived in America, he eventually made his way to Ogallala, Neb., where he shortened his name, married, and began the family tradition.


Howard, the son of Harry Jr. and Emaline (Menter) Haythorn, was born in 1927 north of Ogallala. When the Kinglsey Dam was built in 1941, part of the Haythorn ranch was taken for the dam, and Harry Jr. split the cattle with his brother Walter and headed east to Maxwell, Neb., to begin his own ranch. Harry Jr.,'s ranch was the Haythorn Ranch Co. (not to be confused with his brother Walter's ranch, the Haythorn Land and Cattle Co., north of Ogallala, and now owned by Walter's grandson Craig Haythorn.) Before he could drive, Howard was calf roping at rodeos with his Uncle Walter. Uncle Walt, a saddle bronc rider as well as a roper, would load him up and take his nephew with him. There was no high school rodeo in those days, so they competed together at local shows. In addition to calf roping, Howard showed cutting horses and team roped.

He attended high school at St. John's Military School in Salina, Kan., ("my mother thought I needed more direction," he quipped), graduating in 1945. He had an appointment to the U.S. Military Academy in West Point, but his dad died when he was nineteen, and he was needed on the ranch.

Then Uncle Sam called; Howard went to Korea, serving for eighteen months, and "I saw all the action I wanted to see."

When he came home, his rodeo career was about to change. Waldo, Walter's son who was also a roper, told him, "You can throw away your calf rope. I found us a new sport. We're going to start tripping steers."

The two of them, fast friends, began their rodeo career together. They had the natural talent to rope, and the horse power, but they got some additional help from a world champion. Three-

time world champion steer roper Ike Rude spent several summers at the Haythorn Ranch, teaching Waldo and Howard the intricacies of steer roping, while they trained his horses. They rodeoed together, the three of them competing, with Waldo and Howard sharing a horse in the early days.


In those days, nearly every little town had a rodeo, but not all of them had steer ropings. The two of them traveled near and far, hitting the local shows but also going as far as Cheyenne Frontier Days and Pendleton, Oregon.



Howard competed at the National Final Steer Roping in 1959 and 1963, finishing fourth in the average and twelfth in the world in 1963. The prior year, he and Clark McEntire flagged the finals. Waldo qualified for the NFSR four times (1958, 1960-61, and 1963).

The two also competed in a lot of match ropings, which were common back then. Entry fees might range from \$300 to \$500, usually with no purse, and only ten to twenty competitors. The matches might be four or six head, and they paid on the rounds and the finals.

Howard raised and trained nearly all of his roping horses. The best steer roping horse he ever had was a black horse, Little Pick, who started as a tie-down horse. When he and Waldo started steer roping, he turned Little Pick into a steer roping horse. "You could do everything on him," Howard said. Howard roped right handed on him, and Craig, Waldo's son, roped left handed on him. Pick was a kind, gentle horse, and when he got some age on him, Howard gave him to three little neighbor girls to show in 4-H. A few years later, at a jackpot in North Platte, Howard's horse wasn't doing so well,



so he called the girls' dad and asked him to bring the horse to town. Howard won the rodeo on Pick, the girls lost their 4-H horse, and Pick got turned out to pasture, never to leave the ranch again.


He loved all the rodeos, but two especially stick out in his mind. Pendleton was a favorite, because of its grass arena and no chutes. But when he was roping calves, the Ak-Sar-Ben rodeo in Omaha, Neb., was the best. They provided each contestant with a twelve-foot box stall, a forty-acre polo field on which to exercise horses, a sack of oats, a bale of hay, and straw.

Howard bought his Rodeo Cowboys Association card before he went to Korea in 1951, but the ranch and his family were his first priority. at the NFSR in in 1963, he slowed down, not rodeoing full time after that. "I never intended to go to the National Finals (Steer Roping). That was not my deal. I had a ranch to run. I just went because I had the chance."

The Haythorn Ranch was known for its Herefords and its horses. Harry Haythornthwaite, the English stow-away, had gathered 500 head of horses from Burns, Ore. in the late 1800's and railed them to Nebraska. Howard continued



away in 2010, had three children: Mary Helen, Margaret, and Harry Byron. Mary Helen passed away in 2015. Margaret is married to Darrell Ruh, and they live in Kenesaw, Neb. Harry Byron and his wife Londa live just a quarter-mile east of where Howard lives. "He comes to the ranch every morning," Harry said, "to check on us, to make sure we're out of the bunkhouse and doing our job." Howard plays cribbage in Brady, a small town near the ranch, and occasionally rides. Last year, he went to ride with his eightyear-old great-grandson, Harry Edward, and Howard asked one of the ranch cowboys to saddle his horse for him. The cowboy didn't want to, saying he'd get in trouble. Why? Howard demanded. Har-

the tradition of raising, training and selling quarter horses on the approximately 20,000 acre ranch in the Nebraska Sandhills. The operation has about 1,500 cows and replacement heifers, and 20 to 30 mares that are bred to four stallions.

Waldo and Howard were best of friends, Howard said, "probably closer than if we'd have been brothers. We never had an argument. I could tell him what I wanted, and he could tell me, and it didn't bother either of us." They were cousins, but also brothers-in-law, having married sisters. The two traveled together till Waldo suffered a stroke in 1989. Howard said, "If he can't go, I quit. I didn't want to go if he couldn't go."

Howard and Sue Ann, who passed

ry and Londa don't want you to ride anymore, was the answer. Howard told him, "if you don't saddle my horse, you're going to get in trouble with me."

In 2009, Howard was honored by the AQHA for breeding American Quarter Horses for 50 consecutive years. The ranch won the AQHA's Remuda Award as well. Howard is an inductee in the Hall of Great Westerners at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City, and he was given the 1983 Trail Boss Award from Nebraska-Land Days in North Platte. He is a gold card member of the PRCA. He, his father, and his grandfather have all been inducted in the Nebraska Sandhills Cowboy Hall of Fame.

Life has been good: his rodeo friends, school friends, and ranching. "That's all I've ever wanted to do," he said. "I'd starve to death, doing anything else. I've enjoyed everything. I've enjoyed it all."

CROWNING NEW CHAMPIONS

hat started out as an effort to preserve the "true cowboy", the Cinch Timed Event Championship quickly became a staple for cowboys across the country. Dubbed the "ironman of rodeo", the CTEC has crowned multiple champions over the last 34 years. However, in the last two years, a new kind of champion has been crowned in the form of a Jr. Ironman.

Garrison Panzer, announcer for the Jr. Ironman, said three years ago during the CTEC, the National Little Britches Rodeo Association and management for the Lazy E Arena, announced a new beginning to rodeo. In an event similar to the CTEC, 10 of high school rodeo's best athletes are invited to compete against each other in three rounds of heading, heeling, calf roping and steer wrestling for a chance to win the \$10,000 prize on Sunday.

"This event puts every aspect from every event into one," said Ote Berry, fourtime PRCA World Champion Steer Wrestler, ProRodeo Hall of Famer and former CTEC competitor. "The event is so tough and physically demanding that it puts the 'cowboy' back into it."

During the second annual, three-day event, ten cowboys between the ages of 15 - 20 representing eight states, battled it out to see who would be crowned the 2018 Jr. Ironman. The NLBRA and management for the Lazy E Arena choose five contestants between both organizations, to compete in events they normally wouldn't compete in. "Contestants normally compete in one or two events but now they're having to compete in four," said Anthony Lucia, host of Live with Lucia and spokesperson for RideTV. "The Jr. Ironman puts them out of their comfort zones and brings out the toughness in them."

Megan Pirtle, marketing manager for the Lazy E Arena, said this event really showcases what one cowboy can do by them self. She said this event began as a way to provide young athletes with the op-

portunity to step out of the box and get a taste of what being a pro rodeo athlete is like. "The fun thing about this event is it [Jr. Ironman] mirrors the pros, so it comes down to the last round, the last steer," Megan said. "You almost can't call it."

Garrison said the event is less like sprint and more like a marathon. "You've got to get through the whole weekend to find your champion, you can't win it in the first round or two," said Garrison.

Ote said he knows some of the parents of the Jr. Ironman contestants and has known most of the contestants themselves since they were young. "That's what's fun, getting to watch these kids grow and progress through their lives," said Ote. cally and emotionally, but it also tests their horsemanship skills. He said most contestants bring anywhere from four to six horses and have to adjust to each horse and get mentally prepared for the next event all in a matter of minutes. His favorite part of the entire weekend is getting to watch good horses and good talent. "Anytime the youth is involved, well it makes for a good show."

During the Jr. Ironman, fans can see CTEC contestants like Cody Doescher and Clayton Hass in the boxes helping and giving the young competitors advice during each event.

"That's what makes this event unique," Megan said. "It's the pros helping the Jr.'s." Not only does the setup of the CTEC and Jr. Ironman make this event one of a kind, but the atmosphere at the Lazy E Arena during the weekend of the CTEC is incomparable to any other event. Megan described the atmosphere as a mixture between history and nostalgia. "If it [the event] was somewhere else you wouldn't have the nostalgia and you wouldn't have the feel that the Lazy E brings with its history and overall atmosphere," Megan said. "It's really a cool place." At the end of each round, the exhaustion in the faces of each competitor is apparent. Megan said the sheer grit and determination in the faces of the contestant to push through each round is the reason this event was first put into place.

"The heart and try of these contestants sets the tone for the weekend," Anthony said. "These guys take the risk of getting hurt doing something they may not always do. They risk their entire year of pro rodeo at this one event." "In the end, there are a lot of cowboys, but very few ironmen."

Junior Ironman Championships

he road to the second annual Junior Ironman Championship in Guthrie, Oklahoma, is paved with long days and even longer nights for five NLBRA cowboys. The final placings came down to the last competitor in the final event. Myles Neighbors of Bentonville, Arkansas, walked away with \$10,000 in his pocket and a new title on his resume. "This weekend I was competing for two people: Pryce Hancock and Daryl Nally. I grew up with Pryce and he loved everything about the sport of rodeo. He never did compete, but he passed away from brain cancer a few years ago. And Daryl is my dad's best friend who was diagnosed with terminal brain cancer about a month ago for the second time," said 19-year-old Myles. All the competitors said this weekend was one of their proudest moments in rodeo so far, attributing their ability to compete at this level to their time spent in the NLBRA.

MYLES NEIGHBORS

An agribusiness freshman at Northeast Texas Community College, all Myles truly wants to do in life is rodeo. "I got a scholarship to rodeo, so I'll finish these two years and then I want to go to the PRCA. Maybe in the future I will take over my dad's plumbing business, but not before I take a shot at rodeo for real," Myles said. Growing up around steer wrestlers, Myles said he is bred to take down a steer with his bare hands. "Probably the hardest part about rodeo is the mental game. I struggle with just as much as the next guy, but you have to find a way to block it out because it is such an instrumental part of being a true winner inside and out of the arena," Myles said. He is on his second PRCA permit so he can finish college.

"My proudest moment so far was this weekend for sure, it is a big accomplishment of a dream and a goal I had set for myself. Winning the Junior Ironman has set me up for coming back in the next couple of years and for all the other things

I want to do in life and rodeo," Myles said. Each time he backed into the box, all that ran through is head was to get a clean and crisp catch. "One thing I really did not want to do the whole weekend was break a barrier or get a 60. I ended up breaking two barriers, but I made good runs regardless." Each day he simply wakes up happy to spend his day with the people he loves, doing what they all love the most: rodeo. "There are too many people to thank for this accomplishment, but my parents, Jason Thomas and Justin Shaffer are some of the big names," Myles added.

RYDER LANDER

Taking fourth place was Kiln, Mississippi, native Ryder Lander. "It is hard to name just one person who inspired me to work towards this event, but if I had to it would be Trevor Brazile. I look up to him, but I also recognize that he is just a person like anybody else. He acts that way also, which makes him an even better person to look up to," said 20-year-old Ryder. A freshman majoring in business administration at Pearl River Community College, Ryder is on the rodeo team and competes in local amateur events. "Once I graduate I want to get my auctioneer license and start selling equipment. While in college I hope to make the circuit finals, so I can work towards competing in the NFR in the next couple of years," Ryder said.

His single favorite moment from the weekend was his final draw in the steer wrestling. "The first steer I wrestled I got a 54-second run on him. Then my final steer was the only steer anybody had gotten a good time on the whole weekend, it was a relief knowing I had a shot at a good time on him. The steer I drew in round one cost Wyatt Hansen the title. I defi-

nitely felt his pain on that one." Typically, a header and tie-down roper, Ryder appreciates watching his horses work well for him since he trains most them. "I only competed in the NLBRA one year, but it really got me ready for competing in high caliber events. I did not know it, but I got to see some of my competition last year in the NLBRA, it helped me prepare mentally for the weekend of some really tough rounds." Along with qualifying for the Junior Ironman, one of Ryder's proudest rodeo accomplishments is being one of only three ropers to make it to the American in both team roping and calf roping this year.

CULLEY MORGAN

As a first-generation cowboy, Culley Morgan is originally from Louisiana but lived in Montana for 10 years before settling in Checotah, Oklahoma, three years ago specifically to high school rodeo. "One of my proudest accomplishments is making it to nationals all six years I high school and junior high rodeoed. Winning state last year in the steer wrestling was definitely my biggest win so far," Culley said with pride. Though a skilled steer wrestler, Culley believes heading is his true calling in life. "Growing up I got to spend time with Clay and Travis Tryan, I always wanted to be just like them in rodeo and life. There are very few occasions that I will go somewhere without my rope, you just never know when you might need it."

Though this is his first year to compete in the junior ironman, Culley helped a Kentucky competitor in the team roping last year. "I did not have the greatest weekend as far as competition goes, but this event was still incredible. I cannot tell the Lazy E thank you enough for

starting this event and doing such an incredible job with it," said Culley, the sixth-place finisher respectively. "I was only in the NLBRA my senior year, but it elevated my level of competition exponentially." He was reserve champion in the team roping, third in the steer wrestling and rookie of the year at the NL-BRA finals this past summer. He is dedicated to competing in the IPRA, ACRA and CRRA this year, so he can be ready to start his career in the PRCA in 2019. "The hardest part about rodeo and pre-

This pertains to everything from getting up every morning to feed horses and making sure they are sound to practicing long into the night more often than not. I want to thank everyone who helped me along the way and were there on those long nights," Culley finished.

CARSON GOOD

The long trip back to Long Valley, South Dakota, gave eighth-place finisher Carson Good time to realize how large the national stage he just competed on truly was. "After I left I was a little disappointed I did not win even a dime the whole weekend. But then I realized just how fortunate I was to have even made it to the Junior Ironman. One of my highlights of the weekend was competing alongside my friends from the NLBRA and high school rodeo all on the same dirt as the pros," said the 20-year-old Chadron State College rangeland and livestock management major. With aspirations to become a rangeland specialist for the NRCS, Carson is also on the rodeo team at school. "At college rodeos I do all three timed events, but for pro and amateur rodeos I stick with my main two: steer wrestling

and team roping. Steer wrestling is by far my favorite, both my dad and his brother did it when they were younger and going to rodeos." Carson followed exactly in their footsteps in the event and then again by winning the steer wrestling at SDHSRA finals twice, just like his dad and uncle did.

Without access to calves small enough to tie, Carson thinks he might have been more competitive in the event if he could have started tying sooner than two weeks before the Ironman. "Luckily, the college got some calves, so I could practice on them. I thought I was going to be rusty, but I was surprised by how well the practice actually went. I could have probably done better in the calf roping but I also did not take a 60 in the event over the whole weekend." The first round did not go quite as planned, but Carson pushed through the mental block and proved himself in round two. "That was probably the most memorable part of the whole weekend, proving to not only everyone there but also to myself that I deserved to be there. I just want

to thank everyone for the help and support throughout my rodeo career so far, whether it was going to a little rodeo or something like the Junior Ironman. Without all the support, I don't know where I would be at today," Carson added.

LAINE MOORE

At just 17 years old, Laine Moore was the youngest competitor at the Lazy E Arena. A steer wrestler and header in the team roping, Laine put the most thought into heeling and tie-down roping. "When I first started rodeo all we did was team rope, so I decided to try out steer wrestling. I like doing something different than the rest of my family. And it is a lot more challenging than team roping," said the Asbury High

School junior. While preparing for the weekend, Laine worked on tying calves more than he did roping them. "The biggest part of my preparation was talking to Dustin Buchannan from Georgia. He helped me a lot with sharpening my heeling and working on the mental aspect." The hardest part of rodeo for Laine is the mental game. "I used to tear myself up when I messed something up in the arena. I have gotten a lot better. This weekend was proof of that. You have to stay positive even when you mess up one event because you have several more to go just in that round," Laine said.

One of his proudest moments of the weekend came in the second round of heading. "I brought a buddy of mine to

help me in the team roping and I just remember when he caught those two feet and we stretched that steer out, it was electric for both of us. I broke the barrier on that steer, but the overall run felt incredible." Though Laine placed tenth, he is the only competitor who gets the opportunity to qualify for the Junior Ironman again next year. "This weekend taught me to be smart about everything, this event is one of the toughest marathons in rodeo. You have to be smart and use your head in every run." To prepare for next year, Laine plans to work on his consistency in the practice pen. "The key to this event really is not trying to go fast, but to just get a time on everything. My plan moving forward is to keep being positive and just rope competitively like I do at home," Laine finished.

The Junior Ironman Championship was designed to attract a younger generation of cowboys to one of the toughest competitions on dirt. All five competitors could not express their gratitude enough for the opportunity to take part in this growing event and the support they received from their friends, family and all the fans who came to Guthrie.

or TaraLee Haddock, the satisfaction of a good run in the CJHSRA barrel racing and pole bending goes beyond the day of competition. The 13-year-old from Elbert, Colorado, did all the training on her barrel horse, Squaw, along with a large portion of training on her other horses, making a trip down the alleyway even more meaningful. "We've had Squaw for four years, and she has her quirks, but I like her she's like my best friend," says TaraLee. "You have to be very patient with her, and you can't get scared. I had to go to a few lessons so I could learn with her, and she was very powerful. Once she calmed down, she picked up barrels a lot better."

The patience is paying off. TaraLee, a rookie in the CJHSRA, is sitting fifth in the barrel racing, and eighth in the pole bending. She also competes with Coy Evans in the ribbon roping, where they're currently tied for second place. "When I run barrels and poles and make a mistake, I want to fix it, but I can't always do it that night, so when I get home, I usually give the horses a day off and then I practice hard that week," she explains. "I try to get better each time."

TaraLee and her family go to Latigo Trails Equestrian Center three nights a week to practice, including team roping and breakaway roping, which TaraLee plans to enter soon. She also uses the time to work with her newest horse, Bandit, who is a barrel prospect. "My mom works on him for about 20 minutes and then I hop on to work with him a bit more." Tara-Lee's parents, Shawn and Jessica Haddock, both rodeoed, and she also looks up to her older brother, Lane, who competes in the CJRA and CSHSRA in tie-down roping. "When I was in goat tying, he pushed me to do better and then he helped me in roping a lot. We're both doing the same as-



sociations. High school rodeo is a lot more competition than I'm used to, and I like it because I'm very competitive and it makes me a better rider and horseperson."

Along with her horses, including Susie Q, the pole horse TaraLee's mom trained, TaraLee and Lane take care of their other animals: goats, cats, dogs, and a snake. "Whoever gets done feeding their horses first feeds the goats," says TaraLee. Her miniature Australian Shepherd, Aubrey, travels all over Colorado with the family and knows a variety of tricks. "She knows how to beg, and if we say 'Bang' and make a gun symbol, she'll roll on her back and play dead."

When she's not spending time with her animals, TaraLee can be found at Elbert School. An eighth-grader, her favorite subject is English. "I like writing, and right now we're reading the book 'The Giver' and answering questions about it, and we're doing a lot of grammar and sentence structures." TaraLee also played volleyball at the beginning of the school year. Her team won their state championship, and she's considering doing high school volleyball this fall. drenaline has motivated Wvatt Noe since day one of his bull riding career. The 17-year-old from Larkspur, Colorado, started riding bulls two years ago, and the risks of the sport keep him close to the chutes wanting more. "I have some sort of talent for it, and knowing all those big bull riders out there can make good money at it (is motivating). As long as I still love it, it's not like I'm even working; it's not a job," says Wyatt, who's leading the bull riding in the CSHSRA. He qualified for the NHSFR last year - his rookie year of high school rodeo - and plans to represent Colorado again, this time as the state bull riding champion.

Wyatt's dad, Joe Noe, rode bulls in high school, but Wyatt's mom, Darby Noe, wasn't on board with the idea of him competing at first. "I always watched the Lane Frost videos and movie, and it's something I always wanted to do. I didn't tell her I was

getting on my first steer a while back, but I showed her the video and kind of convinced her, and she said to roll with it." That same year, Wyatt went to the Jason McClain Bull Riding School in Monte Vista, Colorado, and he's returned every year since. "They are so honest with you. If you can't ride, they'll tell you, and if you can, they tell you 'Don't stop.' Jason's taught me a lot of ways to protect myself. He's a huge help, and so are guys like J.B. Mauney. Watching hopefully I can be like them one day."

Wyatt and his dad travel together to most of his high school rodeos, and his



mom and 9-year-old sister, Taylee, go with them to the closer rodeos. Wyatt also has an older sister, Cassidy, who recently finished a college internship and is a professional barrel and cutting horse trainer. "Dad is always there. I've only been to probably a handful of rodeos without him, and I prefer to have him there pulling my rope, and he talks me up. I don't have to worry about anything when he's there," says Wyatt. 

Meet the Member **Teigen Marchant**

eigen Marchant is the 2017 WH-SRA Tie-Down Roping Champion. He's leading the event again this season and sitting third in the steer wrestling. "I pretty much like them equally," says the 18-year-old from Newcastle, Wyoming. "I like that you can really improve calf roping. There's no set way you calf rope, and there's something new you can always change with it. I like that with steer wrestling you can get a really fast run and get close to what the pros are doing. In calf roping, it's really harder to be down in that six-second area than you'd expect."

Cliff Anderson hazes for Teigen in the WHSRA, and Alan Good hazes for him in the NLBRA, where Teigen competes in the same events along with ribbon roping when someone needs a partner. He looks up to his parents, Dilly and Jace Marchant, who introduced him to rodeo. His mom and her twin sister rode bulls, while his dad team roped and steer wrestled. "My dad used to go to high school with Jason Miller, and I always grew up watching him steer wrestle, so I've always wanted to kind of be like him. In calf roping, Carv Reese has helped me out quite a bit, and I look up to Cody Ohl as well."

Practice slows down in the winter when Teigen is wrestling, but over Christmas break, he went to a rodeo camp in Van, Texas, put on by Rope Myers, and won the weekend jackpot in the steer wrestling. He often enters the Intermountain Icebreaker High School Invitational Rodeo in Ogden, Utah, held in March, and his rodeo travels have also taken him to the NHSFR and the NJHFR when it was





in New Mexico. "My motivation is mostly just for the love of it (rodeo) and knowing that I want to pass it down to my kids when I get to that age," says Teigen. "It really helps pay for colleges, and there's so many great experiences, and people you get to meet down the road."

Teigen's tie-down roping horse, Cash, has been his roping horse since eighth grade. He started out as Teigen's sister's breakaway horse, but when she focused in on goat tying, Teigen took the gelding over. "I started roping calves on him and he really turned a corner and became a good calf roping horse." He steer wrestles on Pretty Boy, a palomino the Marchants traveled to Idaho to buy. "He wasn't as good in the box as I wanted him to be, but Dean Finnerty in Wyoming helped us fix everything, and I couldn't ask for a better horse now." The Marchants also keep a handful of roping calves in the summer, and Teigen ropes the Perfect Calf dummy or practices occasionally with one of the college rodeo teams in the area. His sister, Ashten Marchant, competes on the Lamar Community College rodeo team.

Meet the Member Zach Devol

66 I love the whole aspect of being around rodeo and being a part of it, and I love fighting bulls," says Zach Devol. The 24-year-old bullfighter from Elbert, Colorado, started out as a competitor, entering both roughstock and timed events in the NLBRA. He went on to rodeo for Otero Junior College and found instead that his niche was face to face with the bovine athletes. "At our college practices, we didn't really have anyone to fight for us, so we took turns doing it. I kind of liked it more than riding bulls, and realized I was pretty good at it and decided to go that direction."

Zach went to a Miles Hare and Rob Smets bullfighting school and also practiced with Reggie Kuhn, a retired bullfighter from the area. "You either have it or you don't," Zach explains. "Riding bulls so long, I could read certain situations and know where the bull's going or the cowboy's going, so I think that made it a lot easier for me. You meet bullfighters everywhere. There's too many that have helped me to name, but even guys I fight with now, like my buddy Connor Rowley is setting the world on fire right now.



Other guys I fight with have been fighting a long time and you see how much they still love it. They always give me pointers and try to help out. Rodeo has really good people, people who are willing to do anything for anybody. I like the whole aspect of the sport — where it started and what it's become — and carrying on that."

Zach continued riding bulls for a short time after college rodeo, and he qualified for the CPRA finals in 2013. One year later, he was voted in to fight the CPRA finals and he's worked the finals consecutively the last four years. He also works youth rodeos and bull ridings, but says youth rodeos are often the most challenging since the kids are still learning how to take care of themselves in the arena. "The calmer you are the better you are," says Zach. "If you start stressing or panicking, you move too fast and accidents happen, so it's better to stay calm and relaxed."

Outside of bullfighting, Zach works full time for H&H Rodeo Company and Summit Rodeo Company. "It changes day to day, but it's feeding bulls and doctoring, and a lot of hauling bulls to rodeos and getting new bulls or hauling bulls he's sold." His latest rodeo venture is starting his own rodeo stock. "I bought a bunch of cows and I'm trying to get some good bucking bulls out of them. It's a hard game to play. It takes a lot of cows to get a couple of good bulls, but everybody gets a superstar once in a while, so I thought

it would be fun to play." Zach also helps with his family's cow/operation, and they grow and cut hay on a small scale. So far, he's the first and only member of his family to rodeo, but they are his biggest fan club. "If I go to the CPRA finals, they don't miss that, and they come to as many rodeos as they can."

Another big step in Zach's bullfighting career is working PRCA rodeos, and he's in the process of being evaluated to get his card. "Hopefully I'll get accepted for that and I can fight some bigger names for rodeos and try to make a name for myself. Every bullfighter, their end goal is to fight the NFR."

Meet the Member Cory Wilson & Ride Tough Rodeo Ministries



n the space of eight seconds, a roughstock rider might become a champion — or get hung up. A phone call might come that changes everything. A person might pass from this world into the next. These were all things on Cory Wilson's mind when he felt the persistent tug on his heart to minister in the rodeo world, but the 40-year-old husband and father of four from Hutchinson, Kansas, wasn't sure where to start.

"A few years ago, I was at the Garden City Community College rodeo, and I started caring more about what the guys' lives were like more than their scores or their rides," says Cory. "But I was really nervous about approaching people and talking about their personal lives." Then, in April of 2016, both of Cory's in-laws tragically passed away in a car accident. "I got to thinking more about that, and the thing I knew about Lane Frost and my in-laws is that they were all saved. That was the only thing that kept both situations from being a complete tragedy — we're going to see them again someday if we're saved. So that motivated me more to think about how I wanted to approach it. I had felt called to some kind of ministry for a long time."

Cory wanted to start a roughstock ministry, but knew a form of cowboy church wasn't workable for many of the riders' travel schedules. Instead, he filled a cooler on wheels — dubbed Wheelie — with water bottles, packed a first-aid kit and tool kit with tools the riders might need for

their gear, and he wheeled up to the chutes of his first rodeo in July of 2016. "I'll pray with guys, and I build relationships. That's how faith starts. I was just going to rodeos, hitting guys up, and talking to them. I go out and love on cowboys. It's been well received; I didn't know how it would go," Cory explains. "Everybody has a mind for God, I believe. I have a theory on cowboys. A lot of people talk about America and how it's gone downhill, but cowboys are heroes, and if the hearts of cowboys change, they'll affect everybody in their community."

Bareback rider Ty Pellam encouraged Cory to get his KPRA card, and in the space of two months, Cory traveled 11,000 miles, from Oklahoma City to Trinidad and Amarillo, Texas, and even into Nebraska. He also goes to CPRA and PRCA rodeos, or any other rodeo he feels he should go to, visiting with everyone from the stock contractors and rodeo committees, to the contestants' families and friends. But Cory is also available long after the rodeo ends, taking calls and messages 24 hours a day and staying in touch with "his guys" year round. He created the Ride Tough Rodeo Ministries Facebook page, where he shares devotions and other words of encouragement, and Cory was even asked to make patches that people could share with friends. Barrel racer Bailey Shumpert from Colorado and retired professional bull rider TJ Thompson from Texas codesigned the patches, and more than 300 have been given away so far.

Cory's wife, Stacie, is deeply involved as well. "It's what we've decided to do as a family. My wife's a CPA, so she supports the whole thing," Cory explains. "Last year was kind of getting it established, and this year the family will travel with me more." They have four sons, Cade (14), Zane (9), Reid (7), and Sam (4), along with a rescued off-track Thoroughbred. Cory is a stay-at-home dad and homeschools one of their boys.

"I don't know where it's going, but I'll do it as long as God's asking me to," he says. "I just love these guys. They're good guys, and anyone who has the courage to get on an animal that could hurt them or kill them, when that person turns to the Lord, what kind of a person of faith will they be? I see that aspect of it, and I just like to know in some small way I'm helping in their life. I have personal goals. These guys are young and not married, and I'm hoping ten years from now they'll bring their kids up, or I'll get invited to their weddings. I like to see people happy and thriving, and ultimately I want to see them saved. I want to get to Heaven and say, 'There's cowboys everywhere!'"



arlee Quarles lives in the very top of the 177-mile-wide Texas Panhandle near Pampa, Texas, making it an easy drive into Kansas for her KJHSRA rodeos. This is the 13-year-old's rookie year in the KJHSRA. which she learned about from her friends that she competes with in the NLBRA. "All the people go out there and try their hardest to win, and they all just work together," says Marlee. "Everyone is a good sport there, so we tried their rodeos this year and we really like them."

She competes in the barrel racing, pole bending, goat tying, breakaway roping, and team roping as a heeler with Kiley Slavin. Marlee is sitting in the top ten of all her junior high events, while she also competes in ribbon roping and trail course in the NLBRA, and recently finished the Young Gun Series in Dodge City, Kansas. "Poles are my favorite. My horse is pretty consistent and he loves to work poles, and I think it's fun weaving back and forth through them." George, Marlee's barrel and pole horse, knew barrels but had only been started on poles when she got him. She also trained her breakaway horse, Bowzer, for trail course, while her roping horse, Nellie, knew her events when the Quarles bought her. "I got her last summer, and we're getting along," says Marlee. "My dad has cattle, and then my granddad raises goats for goat tying."

Horsekeeping goes back in Marlee's family several generations to her greatgranddad, Don Knutson, who raised racehorses in Texas, while Marlee's mom rodeoed in high school. Marlee, who has been unswervingly focused on horses since she was a baby, decided to forego other sports so she could concentrate on rodeo. She



rides at least two horses every afternoon for as long as there's daylight, and her parents, Chad and Amy Quarles, help her by holding goats and running chutes. She also works each week with her family's friends Mandy Pool and Amy Dillingham. "Mandy Pool helps me almost every week with my riding and breakaway, and Amy helps me with goat tying. They tell me, 'Always keep your head up and don't give up on them.' I have great horses, and I just want to keep them going, and I want to rodeo when I grow up."

Marlee and her parents make their home several miles outside of town, where they recently built a house and arena. "It's quiet, and the sunsets are really pretty out there. I like to ride with my mom sometimes in the pasture, and I have a friend that comes and ropes with me sometimes. We team rope and breakaway rope together." Marlee also enjoys her classes at Pampa Junior High School, where's she's an eighth-grader. "I like science because it tells you about the body. We're doing animal science, and we're doing a project right now where we pick an animal and learn about its body."

She took a short break from school in February to go watch The American with her parents in Arlington, Texas. "The team Marlee Quarles at the 2017 fall rodeo in Concordia, KS - Jeff Frazell

roping was my favorite," says Marlee. "They work hard to get there." Her own accomplishments include winning the team roping saddle in the Central Oklahoma Little Britches Rodeo Association last year, and the all-around saddle at the Kim Colorado Little Britches rodeo. Marlee competed in the NLBRA finals in Guthrie, Oklahoma, the last two years, and she's excited to see how far she can go her first year of junior high rodeo. "I want to stay consistent in my pole bending," she finishes, "and end up a better roper."

Meet the Member Patterson Starcher

atterson Starcher is leading the bull riding in the KHSRA. The 18-year-old from McClouth, Kansas, found his home in the chutes six years ago, the second generation of his family to step onto the rodeo trail. "I enjoy the self-improvement, especially from two years ago to this year, I could see myself improving," says Patterson. "I'm winning more rodeos and doing better. I've had some things click for me, and I became good friends with Trey Holston, and that really changed the direction I was going towards rodeo."

While Patterson was first a team roper and plans to enter this spring when someone needs a heeler, bull riding provided the extra challenge he was craving. "I wasn't really against bull riding, because my dad was a bull rider, but it was the dangerous side of rodeo. Once I got into it, the enjoyment came from being able to conquer that challenge, and I didn't find that in roping. I still enjoy it (roping), but I like the excitement and thrill of being able to ride."

Skeeter Kingsolver, a PBR athlete from Patterson's hometown, convinced a young Patterson that he should try riding bulls after they spent a day at the lake tubing. "He couldn't throw me off a tube, and he said I should try riding bulls," explains Patterson. "I thought if Skeeter was telling me to ride bulls, I should try. I called him and went to the practice pen and got on some steers. He's definitely one of the main reasons I ride bulls, and Todd Holston, Trey's dad, is one of the reasons I really started working after this sport and really trying to improve myself. We have two quotes that are kind of jokes, but one of them is, 'Don't be a frog.' All that means is don't quit trying - keep go-

ing. I have that on a sticker on my vest."

In order to keep going, Patterson is on the practice barrel almost every night, or he visits Skeeter and works on his drop barrel. "If I need to get tuned up, like after this winter when we start rodeoing again, I'll go to David Berry's in Oklahoma and stay down there for two or three days." He's also getting his heel horse, Ace, legged up. Patterson says the black gelding has a lot of go, which he enjoys. "He used to rear in the box and never stops moving his feet, but as soon as we're set to go, he does his job. I have a new little bay horse, Crank, that I'm going to take to a couple of high school rodeos." Patterson also heads down the road with his dad, Lennie Starcher, and their blue heeler/Australian shepherd named Oakley.

A senior at Tonganoxie High School, Patterson is also attending Kansas City Kansas Community College and learning auto body and collision repair. "We got to take a front end - hood and fenders, and we sanded them down and fixed all the dents and sealed, painted, and polished." He also wrestles on his high school's team, though he's competed in the sport since he was 4 or 5, and is known for his grip strength. Riding dirt bikes and four-wheelers, along with traveling outside of rodeo, also keeps him busy. Patterson and his family visited Yellowstone National Park and Arches National Park, and he hopes to check more national parks off his list, along with spending more time in Wyoming.

Being clear-minded and more focused during his rides is one of Patterson's goals, while he plans to college rodeo in Kansas this fall after he finishes his certification from KCKCC. But first, he plans to top off his senior year by revisiting the Cowboy State with a qualification to the NHSFR.

The Byrne's keep it all in the family, Wacey ropes with both Pick and Makenzy in jackpots. "I rope with Reagan Price in the junior high rodeos, he is an amazing header. We are hoping to place at state this year." Wacey's best memories of rodeo come from last year's state finals where he finished as reserve champion in saddle bronc steer riding. "It is an intense four days, it kept me going. Everyone is cheering each other on no matter how they are doing themselves. The OKJH-SRA is a lot of fun to compete in."

odeo photography is its own breed and can only be learned through experience," said self-taught photographer Amanda Rutherford from Prvor, Oklahoma. A ten-time ACRA photographer of the year and four-time IPRA photographer of the finals, Amanda gets her passion for all things rodeo from her father. "Growing up, rodeo was the one thing my dad, Dewey, and I shared until my parents divorced my junior year of high school. I ran barrels, poles, tied goats and roped calves in junior and open rodeo associations." Amanda graduated from Southwest Baptist University with two bachelor's degrees: psychology and sports medicine in addition to a master's degree in education later.

As an administrator and educator for Osage Public Schools and a photographer, Amanda has little time for hobbies. "As an educator, my colleagues think I play in the dirt on the weekends and often many of the cowboys think I play with kids during the week," said the 2016 Osage Public School Teacher of the Year. As an athletic trainer for her college football team, Amanda started taking pictures when a knee surgery kept her off the field. "The team wanted me to travel to away games for pre- and post-game care, so the school paper sent me with a camera, the rest is history." The story of Way Out West Photography begins with Amanda's dad.

"Way Out West began as a way to rebuild a relationship with my dad, spend time together and share our love for rodeo that was so special to us when I was growing up." The name stems from Psalms 103:12, "he has removed our sins as far from us as the east is from the west." The acronym also functions to elicit "WOW"

from those who view their photos. "Capturing the memories and moments of rodeo and the people has to be my favorite part. My goal is that every picture I take tells a story, evokes an emotion or shows an indescribable component of the sport and history of the cowboy way of life."

WOW started in 2007 and has been involved with the IPRA and ACRA ever since. "Being involved in the ACRA is an honor, working with the stock contractors, contestants and committees that carry on the tradition of the rodeo cowboy lifestyle." With my dad gone, it is harder to see the vision he set for us. Although it is an honor to capture the moments and memories of the ACRA, it is difficult to continue without his presence and constant support." Armed with a cooler full of drinks, a bowl of candy and his red chair, Dewey always tried to give back to those who supported him. "He always joked that his job was to drive the truck, write the checks and be the TV star for Way Out West Photography." Amanda extends a special thanks to those who support her: Barnes & Sons Rodeo Company, Hampton Rodeo Company, Paul and Jimme Beth Hefner, Jack and JoAnne Foreman and Laura and Rod Adair. "My dad influenced my life as a rodeo photographer more than anyone. He taught me to work hard to be the best I possibly could be at everything I set my mind to and never take the easy road. It is a lot of pressure to live up to, but I hope that lesson shows in every picture I take. He always wanted our pictures to speak for themselves."

Meet the Member Junior Zambrano

ose "Junior" Zambrano III is a fivetime GCPRA finals qualifier. The Grand Canyon rodeos have helped the 19-year-old roper build his competitive edge since he joined the association in 2012, and those skills took him to the biggest stage of his career thus far at the 2017 PRCA Turquoise Circuit Finals Rodeo. The circuit finals was the first pro rodeo Junior entered with header Brady Payne, his current team roping partner, and while they didn't place in the first round, they took third in the second round and won the short-go with a solid 5.2-second run. It was enough to put them in first place in the average and send the team to their first Ram National Circuit Finals Rodeo in Kissimmee, Florida.

"Now that I've accomplished something so big so early, I'm focusing more on college this year and more of a serious education," says Junior, who's tie-down and team roping on the Central Arizona College rodeo team. He's also keeping up with the GCPRA rodeos, entering the open team roping in the heeling. "The best Grand Canyon rodeo of the year I think is the finals, not just because it's the finals where year-end champions are crowned, but the Avi Resort is always good with hospitality, and the (Mojave Crossing) arena there is really nice."

Junior started entering jackpots and USTRC ropings just a few years before joining the GCPRA. His grandpa Jose Zambrano is a well-known cowboy in the Nogales, Arizona, area, and Junior's dad, also named Jose, grew up roping and rid-

ing on the family's ranch. Junior started going by his nickname after one of the first jackpots he entered with his dad, where the announcer called him Junior to tell father and son apart. "I'm really the first one who's gone out and been competitive in the rodeo world," he says. "I started going to USTRC ropings where all the kids can rope, and I got some recognition at bigger ropings." Junior's roping abilities caught the attention of professional team roper Cesar de la Cruz at one of his clinics, and Cesar invited Junior to come rope with him. "Cesar de la Cruz and George Aros (Cesar's uncle) helped me out growing up and showed me more about rodeo than just going and competing," says Junior. "To win on a constant basis, you have to practice as much as you can and work as much as you can, and it does get overwhelming, but once you put in all those hours and once you win, it's one of the best feelings in the world no matter where you're at."

Now that he's in college, time management is even more important as he's rodeoing, training several outside horses, and studying equine science. Junior's dad runs beef cows and Corriente mix on their land outside of Tucson, Arizona, and he and Miguel Martins provide team roping cattle all over the state. Junior helps with the ranch when he's home from school, and is branching out to training performance horses. "I'm trying to get a little more into the business aspect in school. Everything is so much more technological now, and I'm just trying to keep up with the times."

His own horses were all finished when he got them. Junior's ridden Saber, a 14-year-old palomino gelding, since sixth grade. "He's my best buddy and the one I can always go to no matter how much money we're roping for or the situation. I have a sorrel horse, Rita, I got in Mexico, and she's a solid backup heel horse and one of those you can trust on anything." Junior plans to rope the most on Callie this season, since Saber is just coming back after an injury from last season. "She belonged to one of my buddies who passed away, RT Heredia, and she's the one stepping in big shoes this year."



HORNMANSHIP!

hether you are making a barrel run, galloping your horse or riding a colt using the saddle horn is more than just a tool to help you stay on your horse! Your ability to stay balanced while allowing the horse to move freely can truly be enhanced by your technique and timing in using the horn.

How you hold the horn matters. In the first photo, the rider is holding the top of the saddle horn and pushing her seat against the back of the saddle. This position assists the rider in staying on however during fast work it often results in the rider's upper body getting behind the motion by bracing on the top of the horn. The likelihood of loosing a stirrup is increased since she is anchored into her seat and there is not as much weight in the stirrups.



Holding the horn with a firm grip on the throat and focusing on pulling your weight down into your feet and seat enables you to have strength and balance in your horsemanship. In the second photo you can see the rider holding the throat of the horn with her feet, seat and core all in alignment. This powerful position allows the rider to stay balanced and help the horse drive through the turn. Additionally the rider can use her entire leg to drive and help the horse as necessary.



In the third photo the rider is pulling through the horn, using her stirrups and is shifting her balance forward with her horse as the horse finishes the turn. This helps the horse drive forward and leave straight and strong while finishing the barrel. Use of the horn helps the rider avoid balancing off of the horses mouth! And staying on the horn for at least two strides away from the barrel allows the horse to build speed. It also gives the rider a chance to stay balanced while reaching for the outside rein. Remember to stay slow with your hands for smooth and consistent performance.



There are times that it might be necessary to stay two handed during a run to help a horse that is green or when running on shifty ground. There are also riders that think they do not need to use the horn or they don't trust their horses to turn and finish barrels one handed. Often times the horse learns to lean on the bridle or the rider pulls on the reins through the finish. This can end up in stalling the horses front end or the horse throwing it's head. Training your horse and then allowing him to work takes a leap of faith! In our next article we will talk more about the timing of using the horn and drills to make taking this leap of faith muscle memory. Remember that "Practice doesn't make perfect, it makes Permanent!"

Meet the Member Macye Maben



acye Maben is leading four out of her five events in the AJRA. These include barrel racing, breakaway roping, goat tying, and ribbon roping, where Macye is tied for first with two other girls. She's also sitting second in the pole bending. The 12-yearold from Spur, Texas, is the second generation in her family to rodeo in the AJRA, and she aims to go as far as her parents did in the sport. "My mom (Kelly Maben) went to the NFR three times in barrel racing, and my dad (Tye Maben) was a national college champion in team roping as a header," says Macye. She and Bubba, the horse who carried Kelly to the NFR, ran the fastest time at the AJRA finals when Macye competed in the 8 and Under division. They stopped the clock at 15.56 and won a plaque that they shared with fellow AJRA competitor Chayni Chamberlain.

Macye enjoys all of her events, but says she likes the control she has in breakaway. She also competes in the TJHSRA Region 2 rodeos, and names the AJRA rodeo at Sweetwater as one of her favorites. "It's the main place that we rodeo, and it's familiar," she explains. "The goals that we set motivate me to rodeo, and friends and family, and just having fun doing it."

An only child, Macye enjoys having her horses all to herself. She rides Blusher in the barrel racing, and PJ is her main roping horse. Macye trained Peewee for pole bending several years ago, and Newt is her mount in the roping and goat tving. "I also have five goats and about five calves that we rope. My mom and dad take turns holding goats and pushing calves. We have three dogs that we go to rodeos with, and we used to have a cat that went with us, but now it stays home. Pepper is the oldest dog, and then Spice and Sugar."

mistad, New Mexico, cowboy Dillon Mathis is a calf roper by choice and rancher by nature. "My dad Marty is a rancher, I get to help him a lot. That is what I want to be when I grow up," said the 13-year-old. "I get to help gather and brand calves every spring. We heel them in the pen and then drag them to the fire." Dillon also helps his neighbors with branding in the spring. "My favorite job is to drag them to the fire, but I also like to flank them. Ranch work helps me practice a little bit for rodeo." The tie-down roper likes working towards beating the clock against his own time and his competitors.

Dillon also competes in breakaway roping, team roping, chute dogging and ribbon roping. "My dad and grandpa both rodeoed, I started roping when I was seven. Meet the Member **Clint Lindenfeld**

exas Bronc Rider's Association Saddle Bronc Riding Director Clint Lindenfeld is the first cowboy to hold that office in the organization. In fact, after his first year of membership, he went to TBRA President Daryl McElroy and told him he saw the organization growing and knew he needed help. For a young father of three holding down a full-time job while making a bid for the TBRA championship, that's an offer that screams dedication, love of the sport and citizenship in Bronc Riding Nation.

Last year, he and his saddle, Delilah, traveled to find the wicked, feather-footed broncs of the Pacific Northwest and enter The American Qualifier at Albany, Oregon. Hosted by Wild West Events, Lindenfeld was 88 points on a horse from Gold Buckle Rodeo to win. With that win. the cowboy from Lebanon, Oklahoma, had earned his slot at RFD-TV's The American Semi-Finals beside some of the best in the bronc riding business. They all came loaded for bucking horse bear and to ride for a shot at the \$1,000,000 side pot offered to qualifiers in addition to the \$100,000 for the round win.

"I grew up riding in that building," said Lindenfeld. "Cowtown Coliseum has alwavs been lucky for me. I'd never heard of the Dakota Rodeo Company horse I drew, Fortunate Son, and didn't know many guys in the round that night. Logan Allen knew him and told me what he could. I just tried to stay focused and in that zone beside NFR guys like Cole Elshere, Isaac Diaz, Wade Sundell, Heith DeMoss and young talent like Shorty Garrett and Taygen Schuelke.

"It wasn't the trip I'd hoped for, but just to be there was an amazing experience. I got there, and that's something," Lindenfeld said. "I'm committed to making my

way back there in 2019."

Clint Lindenfeld nodded for his first bucking horse at the tender age of 13, although to him, just doing that felt like he'd grown up. He's a native son of Texas, moved to Oklahoma to ramrod his cousin's cutting horse operation.

His daddy before him and his daddy before that both had romances with bucking horses and felt the call to find the best of the best to test themselves on.

"Ever since I was a little boy, I wanted to get on the biggest, baddest, ugliest broncs out there," said Lindenfeld. ""I worked for Bennie Beutler of Beutler &

Son Rodeo company for several years and learned a lot. I picked up, flanked, sorted, entered some," said Lindenfeld. "One day, my dream is to have my own string of bucking horses from the Commotion line over Burch's Lunatic Fringe and Sutton's Chuckulator mares. I know that's not going to be easy, but nothing that's good ever is."



Meet the Member Olin Pulham

lin Pulham is a three-time RMPRA Team Roping Heeler Champion, and he's set to defend his winning streak again this season. The 28-year-old from Nephi, Utah, is currently leading the team roping heeler standings, roping with his longtime friend Thad Ward of West Warren, Utah. They both high school rodeoed for Utah and entered US-TRC ropings, and jackpots, before deciding to enter rodeos together four years ago. Since then, they qualified for the Wilderness Circuit Finals Rodeo their first year of circuit rodeoing, then won the circuit in 2016 and won the average in the team roping last year. "Being able to go to the RM-PRA finals too has been awesome," says Olin, who joined the association when it started in 2008. "Thad's wife ropes and my wife ropes, so we can all jump in the same rig and enter the RMPRA rodeos and take our families with us."

Santaquin, Utah, is Olin's hometown RMPRA rodeo and a favorite. His rodeo career started when he was 6 or 7 and he entered junior rodeos, followed by high school rodeo, where he entered both team roping and tie-down roping. After a year on the Howard College rodeo team in Big Springs, Texas, Olin went on a mission for his church, then accepted a rodeo scholarship from Utah Valley University in Orem, where he roped with his brother, Luke Pulham. After college, Olin left off tie-down roping. "My dad said, 'If you can



rope two feet you'll be able to find partners and be able to rope a whole lot more,' and that's something I really took to heart and worked at a lot," says Olin. "I'm one that really pushes myself and I always want to do better than I did before — that's my goal every year. Be grateful for where you're at, but there's always room for improvement, and that's something that keeps me going."

Family also keeps him going, from his wife, Shelby Pulham, who is a breakaway roper in the RMPRA, to his parents, Lori and Bruce Pulham, who come from multiple-generation ranch and rodeo backgrounds, and his grandparents, Pat and Leland McNeil. "One thing my grandparents take a lot of pride in is our horses, and it's important to them that we ride really good horses, so that's where we get all of them from." Olin's main horse, Cougar, was raised on his grandparents' ranch. "Cougar took a long time to finish, but now that I've got him finished, he's probably one of my favorite heel horses I've ever ridden. He'll help vou win; he's easy to catch on. I kind of jump back and forth between him and another horse I call Diesel. He's a grandson of Freckles Playboy, and I know I'll get the same roll on him every time. My wife hauls him to jackpots and he's pretty fun for her too."

Olin and Shelby recently moved into a new house with their 19-month-old daughter, Journee, who is already sold on horses, and they are in the middle of setting up a place to practice and ride. In the meantime, they practice at Olin's parents' arena, or with Thad.

During the week, Olin works construction as a contract painter in his family's fourth-generation paint company. He worked for Equibrand making

Classic Ropes for nearly a year when he and Shelby lived in Texas just after they were married, but they moved back to Utah to be closer to family. "The paint company is really flexible for rodeos, and it's been way good for our family. My brothers work with me every day, and it works out pretty good.

"One of my main goals this summer is to get the new heel horse I bought seasoned to where I can haul him quite a bit more, and I want to win the RMPRA and the circuit again. Something I've been working on more lately is mental preparation. And on the physical side of things, one of our (Thad's and Olin's) goals this summer is to get the most out of every run and capitalize on any situation we're put in."





aklie Sanders loves shoes, tack for her horses, high school rodeo, and the mountains. The senior at Fremont High School is taking all of her classes this semester through Weber State. When she graduates from high school, she'll have twenty college credits accumulated, almost all of her general education classes, including English and math. After high school graduation, she will attend Weber State and live at home. She's unsure of her major; she has considered accounting, echocardiogram technology, interior design, things that interest her.

In high school, she is involved in FBLA and is on her school's high honor roll.

Oaklie loves to shop and find bar-



gains. "I'm all about deals," she said. It stresses her out to spend money, so she checks stores' websites and social media sites for sales.

Meet the Member **Patty Jestes**

ne of the most important people in the rodeo arena isn't on the arena floor at all, they are up in the crow's nest keeping your time. For the past thirty years, Patty Jestes from Axtell. Nebraska, has been a timer. "I bought a young horse from Randy and the late Vaughn Rhone in the 70s and they eventually taught me how to rope. I ended up doing books for some of their team roping events, along with some books for Tom and Joe Phillips, and I have not stopped timing since," said the M-SRA and NSRA timer. Patty competed in barrels and team roping in the Girls Rodeo Association, NSRA and M-SRA starting in the 70s until the mid-90s.

Kim Phillips was the first to officially ask Patty to time for an association. "I never really wanted to be a secretary, timing intrigued me more. I have to stay focused the entire rodeo as a timer." The minute details of timing are what keep Patty intrigued by the job. "I have to make sure I am are aware of where the judgers are all the time, so I can watch their flags. Not to mention I have to be precise when I start and stop the stopwatch." Breakaway roping has to be the toughest event to time for Patty. "I watch the girls come out of the chute and in a split second the run is over. As a timer, I have to be precise about starting the watch when they leave and know where the judge is in these three to five second runs."

Patty was asked to take her timing skills to the M-SRA finals a few years ago. "I have worked with some very good individuals over the years. Maureen Hollenbeck and I have timed the finals together for the

past two years." Generally,

there are two timers for every rodeo. High school rodeos usually have four timers since two events are running at the same time. "Timers stay the same throughout an entire rodeo, so everything stays consistent. It can be a lot of pressure sometimes when things are going so quickly for a prolonged period of time." Patty is partial to timing team roping, simply because it is the event that got her started in rodeo.

"The competitiveness was never my favorite part, I just did not find it to be that much fun. When it gets really competitive, I bail and that is probably why I like the timing so much." Working with the people in the M-SRA is what keeps Patty and her stopwatch coming back year after

year. "I enjoy the contestants and being around all the people. I get to work with some great judges and committees in the M-SRA." She plans to continue timing for as long as possible.

Patty grew up showing in 4-H in Lexington, Nebraska, switching to team roping in the 70s, moving to Axtell in 1981 when she married Tim. Patty's son Tyler is engaged to Brook and they have an eight-year-old son named Chase. "My grandson Chase is starting to get involved with riding. It is fun to have someone to ride with me." For the last 18 years, Patty has worked for Pioneer seed dealer Madsen Seeds in Minden. "I would not trade

it for the world. I do all the bookwork and, in the spring,, I run the bean inoculation. In the spring and fall when we are busy I do a lot of the cooking for the harvest help also, so I do a little bit of everything out here." Outside of rodeo,

Patty spends her time riding or bowling. "I bowl on a league, but our new hobby is traveling. We have been to the ERA finals, the American and the NFR in the past three years."

Meet the Member Jeff Richardson

late bloomer in the world of rodeo, Jeff Richardson from Kearney, Nebraska, did not start his career until he was in college. "We lived in Fullerton, Nebraska, a smaller town so of course I was in all the sports my school offered: football, basketball, baseball and track." Jeff traveled to a lot of rodeos with his parents, even learning how to rope and competing in some team roping jackpots. "My parents both rodeoed, so I grew up around it. I focused on sports since I was in eastern Nebraska and all the rodeos were out west." After he graduated, Jeff pursued a diversified agriculture degree at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. "I was getting back into riding and roping so I thought I would go to a few rodeos and see how it went. I did that all four years I was in Lincoln. I placed here and there but nothing major." It was his senior year of college that Jeff started his current rodeo event: steer wrestling.

"I had always thought steer wrestling looked fun. I like physical sports and I found I was more successful at it than roping." The NSRA has provided Jeff with mentors to help him excel in his event. "I traveled with Harrison Halligan for awhile. A lot of guys in the NSRA have helped me get to the next level. They are a really talented group of bull doggers." The NSRA continuously revamps their finals and are working towards even better payouts. "They have drawn a lot of people from other states. It can be tough to pro rodeo out of Nebraska, the NSRA is doing a good job of being a premier amateur association." Jeff is working towards a year-end title, something that has eluded him so far. "I have gotten hazer of the year a couple of times. There are a ton of good

hazers, so it was very humbling to have my peers vote for me." He has also had horse of the year.

Jeff owns a custom manure hauling business, working hard all fall, winter and spring. "I don't do a lot of hauling in the summer, so I can rodeo. I bought my PRCA permit in 2004 and filled it that summer, so that definitely consumes a lot of my time." Anything that can be done outside, Jeff can be found doing at one point or another. "I have fun doing just about anything: skiing, going to the lake, practicing, anything. But I do travel a lot for rodeo." Jeff competes in the KPRA, PRCA Prairie Circuit, M-SRA and NSRA. His mom is to thank for most of his rodeo success in all four associations. "My mom pro rodeoed; she taught me a lot about competing at that level. I also learned a lot of horsemanship and how to take care of horses from her.'

The National Western Stock Show and Cheyenne Frontier Days are at the top of Jeff's list every year. "Cheyenne is my top rodeo, but I really like Denver, probably because I have done well there.



Everyone always likes the rodeos where they win." His main goal for the year is to make all four rodeo finals and do well there. "Our end goals are always to win the year-end title. In the past I have focused on that too much instead of doing the best I can, taking it one rodeo and one steer at a time." He believes the mental aspect of the sport is something he will always be working on. "Rodeo is a challenge, I love the competitiveness of the sport. It is something I will be working hard to be the best at." His advice for aspiring rodeo athletes is to start with a reputable instructor and a good horse. "I think buying an older, more experienced horse helps out the most. Age doesn't matter, all you need is one that will give you a good run every time and is solid in the box. I think you can excel the fastest when you get in with a lot of positive competitors who are winners both in the arena and out." 

RESISTOL ROOKIE TACI BETTIS

ast spring, Taci Bettis — now the 2017 WPRA Barrel Racing Rookie of the Year, and 2018 RFD-TV's The American Rodeo Barrel Racing Champion — was just throwing her leg over her barrel horse Smash for the first time in seven months. The 10-year-old gelding who held her rookie of the year dreams was injured and had to have surgery in the fall of 2016. By March, the pair won their first check at a PRCA rodeo, and several months later, 26-year-old Taci from Round Top, Texas, set out for the summer run to expand on the \$20,000 she'd won so far. "I didn't have the funds to just stay out there, so when I left, I told my husband I wanted to see what it was like and go to the Fourth of July run, and if I hadn't won a dollar, I'd come home. But God had other plans for me."

Taci traveled with Tammy Fischer, her rodeo coach since high school, and finished second at the Reno Rodeo, their second stop. The first in her family to rodeo, Taci took it week by week, and when she looked up, she had \$80,000 and a throng of memories, including breaking a 34-year-old arena record at Ogden Pioneer Days with her 17.05 run. "I got to the \$80,000 mark and decided to come home at the end of the season and rodeo closer to us in Texas. It's hard, and it's a whole different ball game. I didn't realize I was such a home body." When Taci set out again, this time bound for Las Vegas and the WNFR, her family was with her, cheering for her all ten rounds. Tammy was at her side every night in the alley. "That's a girl's dream come true just to get to run down that alley, and for ten nights in a row," says Taci. "I wish I could replay that all the time. That's something that everyone who wants to should experience. I was pretty exhausted by the end, but yet it was such an experience that I wasn't tired. Half the nights I couldn't sleep. I thought, 'Wow, am I really getting to experience this?'"

After finishing her rookie season tenth in the world standings with \$162,446, Taci was invited to The American, a rodeo she's tried qualifying for in the past. "I'm a huge football fan, so to run at the Dallas Cowboys Stadium - when I first got invited, I thought that was simply amazing." Taci and Smash's first run on the arena floor of the AT&T Stadium was a 14.857, putting them in fourth place for the shootout round where they stopped the clock at 14.848 and cut a check for \$100,000. Two days later, they were up at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, Taci's hometown rodeo. "That's all I've known, so it's been a dream of mine to run there. In two davs, AT&T Stadium and then NRG Stadium — I feel so blessed to be able to have these opportunities."

Rodeo season in Texas is already in full swing for Taci. She doesn't expect the homesickness will lessen when she travels, but knows now what to expect. Her husband, Jeremy Bettis, flies out to her rodeos when work allows. "We have a zoo of animals, so it takes a village for me to be able to leave. We have some cattle, horses, dogs, barn cats, you just name it," says Taci. "I miss home, but at the same time I have to stay mentally focused because that is what I truly love. There's highs and lows to it, and you just have to be tough and do it."

Just a few weeks before The American, Taci says she was going through a slump. She reads inspirational books when her mental game needs a boost, but she took it a step further this time and got off Smash to ride a few of her and Tammy's colts. "You get so caught up in winning that you forget where it all kind of started, so to get on those colts who almost can't lope a circle without help — I love that because when I see what I've taken my horse from, I think that's so amazing." When Taci bought Smash five years ago, he had only been to two jackpots. She took several years off of rodeoing to get married and pursue other interests, but as she worked with Smash, there was a growing sense that he was the caliber of horse that could put her firmly in the rookie race. "He is quirky, but what horse that has the heart and wants to do this isn't? We had our normal stuff we dealt with, but at the end of the day, he tried everything for me.

"I'd love to make the NFR again, but right now I'm just trying to take this all in and roll with it. In my lifetime I would love to win a world title, but right now I'm just going to soak this all in and live it day by day."

Meet the Member Blake Kontz

lake Kontz of Flandreau, South Dakota, is a cowboy with many irons in the fire, but his chief interests can be narrowed down to rodeoing, and becoming the first State FFA Star Farmer from his school in 18 years. His uncle Troy Kontz was the State FFA Star Farmer in 1999, the year Blake was born, and Blake has envisioned his name next to his uncle's in their high school since he was young. "I have some stock cows and feeder cattle and crop ground that I farm," Blake explains. "I've been working on that for five to six years now, working on my records and building that up." Blake won at the district level, and out of 14 candidates, he finished in the top 4, who will interview at the state level and have their projects reviewed. The winner will be announced mid April at the FFA State Convention.

Blake is also walking in his family's footprints in the rodeo world. His mom, Kelly Kontz, competed in 4-H and high school rodeos, and Blake enters the tiedown roping, steer wrestling, and team roping in the SDHSRA. He switched from heading to heeling this season so he and his sister, Madison, can enter together. "She's riding my head horse, Rufus, who's my favorite, but I'm breaking in one of my other horses on the heeling side. You've got to work

at something, otherwise it wouldn't be fun." Ultimately, Blake's favorite event is tie-down roping, and he explains that not having a hazer or a heeler to rely on encourages him to hold his roping to a higher standard. "I have a friend, Brock Belkham, and we went to high school together. The last few years he's really worked with me and pushed me from being a calf roper who catches every now and then to last year when I went into state rodeos with one of the highest scores in the region," says Blake. "I think the main part of motivation is the competition and the family aspect with all the people. We might not like each other when we're roping, but after roping, we're good friends and always hanging out and having fun."

Along with the SDHSRA, Blake competes in 4-H rodeos and plans to enter the SDRA and some ropings this summer. He travels mostly with his mom and sister. His dad, Brad Kontz, runs their farm and feedlot, but comes to state finals, along with Blake's younger brother, Jackson. Blake ropes calves on Gypsy, a 20-year-old mare that started

out as his breakaway horse in junior high. The pair proved that green and green doesn't always make black and blue when they advanced to tie-down roping in high school, which they both were new to. "She's kind of a goofy horse with her gait — nobody else likes to rider her — but she's my second favorite, seeing how we progressed in calf roping to now winning." Blake rides Shannon and Gene Pulscher's 18-yearold mare, Maddie, in the steer wrestling, and practices at their arena since they live nearby. "I'm really grateful to them for letting me ride her. She's taught me a lot about being a steer wrestler."

A senior at Flandreau Public High School, Blake says his most challenging classes are government and British Literature. He'll be studying agricultural business at Mitchell Technical Institute this fall, while he's also active in FFA and recently finished helping with National FFA Week in February. Blake plans to be on the FFA livestock judging team this spring and continue with his farming project. He was the State FFA Star Greenhand Farmer his sophomore year. "I help my little brother hunt deer and pheasants, and I either ride horses or rope with friends. It's important to practice and work hard, but it's also important to take time with friends.

"Especially in the calf roping, last year was my breakout year, proving to myself that I'm good enough to win these events and be competitive," Blake finishes. "I've never made the short go, so my goal is to make it to the short go in calf roping, and I at least want to be qualified in all three events for state finals."







HONEST FEEDBACK

ne of the most important things a coach can provided to a student athlete is honest feedback. Some of the best coaches I know are great at providing honest evaluations and feedback to their athletes.

But providing assessment of a performance, is a two way street. If you want, and need, coaching from your coach, parents or peers it is a process.

I believe the most important aspect to the feedback process is to make sure the athlete receiving the feedback responds appropriately. Most coaches and parents know what I am talking about, we see one of two reactions. The first reaction is that the student will take the coaches feedback and work to improve at the next given practice opportunity. This is the ideal result. The second is that the student gets mad at the coach. This is not the desired outcome. The student in many cases will get angry with the coach, or even blame the coach, many times ignoring the fact that there is a problem that needs to be fixed. You may not always hear what you want to hear, but for you to improve you may need to listen and take the feedback appropriately if you want to continue to improve.

It is also important to remember that giving and receiving truly honest feedback is not comfortable. For this reason it is actually difficult to find people that will give you truly honest feedback on your performance. Many people will sugarcoat their assessment, because they don't want to hurt your feelings. Sometimes you won't get good feedback because there is no easy way to tell you that you really didn't do that well. Other times you cannot get good feedback

because people you are asking don't really have your interest in mind. For these reasons it is very important that you are able to find someone who is willing to be honest with you. Find someone who will have an uncomfortable conversation with you. Someone who wants to see you do better and will tell you the truth.

The final problem I see is that if you are winning you still need to be working to get better. I see it every year, students come in with a distinguished high school career, the won a lot. Unfortunately they only had high praise in high school and did not get the needed honest feedback to keep improving. When they get to a level where the competition is tough they usually struggle. They needed the honest feedback and assessment long before they ever received it. Many times this slows or completely stops their improvement as a student athlete.

Your coaches need to know as a student athlete you not only listen to their feedback with an open mind, but that you'll take that advice to heart, as well. For you to grow as a competitor you need to seek honest feedback. I guarantee you won't always get the best advice, but show those helping you that you value their opinion and will always do your best to use their feedback to improve, and the majority of the time you will improve.

have been addicted to rodeo since 66 I was a small child. I can remember going to rodeos and never getting enough of it," said New Castle, Colorado, cowgirl Jeanne Jolley. Her first trip around a rodeo arena was as a flag girl, showcasing the sponsors of each rodeo. "I tried cutting and reining, but I got hooked on barrels about 15 years ago and that is where my passion is." Jeanne runs barrels in the NSPRA with her mentor, Cookie Pickens, who took her to a new level of competition. "I consider her my rodeo mom, she helped facilitate my growth as a competitor and I am fortunate to have someone so special in my life."

This past year Jeanne lead her age division in points in the barrels going into the finals, winning both region two and three. Six weeks before finals her collar bone and neck were crushed when a horse fell on her. "When I ran at the finals I only rode with one hand, because the other one was strapped down. I could barely turn my neck because of the injury so I obviously didn't win the finals, but I am coming back with a vengeance this year." Jeanne is learning how to rope so she can start going for all all-around titles. "I might try breakaway or team roping. I have an addictive personality when it comes to rodeo. I can't seem to get enough of it."

The owner and operator of 4J Arena, Jeanne takes care of more than 50 horses at a time. "I used to be an ER nurse, but I always wanted to do this so one day I decided to go for it." With an indoor and outdoor arena, 14 stalls, 10 paddocks, and hay fields, Jeanne has her hands full year-

round. "We get a lot of snow up here in the mountains, we are right in the middle of ski country. I like to head south for the winter because it gets so cold." Jeanne's gypsy soul takes her to Arizona to compete as much as she can. "I have the best barn help, they hold down the fort when I am gone." Giving back to the community is a big part of the operation, Jeanne hosts 4-H gymkhanas, fundraisers, private parties and jackpot events all year long.

Traversing up and down the western region for NSPRA and BBR events allowed Jeanne to spend time with her kids, Garrett, 21, and Rebecca, 17. "Garrett is at Mesa University now, but he used to play around with roping a little bit. My daughter is in her senior year of high school. She used to do the all-around events in the AQHA, the complete opposite of the rodeo world." In her spare time, skiing, working out and baking keep Jeanne occupied. "Rodeo and horses are my favorite, I love to be surround by horses, those type of people and the world of rodeo, so that is where I spend most of my time." Her favorite thing to do is walk outside and feed horses in her flip flops, explaining why she likes to head south in the winter.

This will be Jeanne's third year in the NSPRA. "Last year was the first time I actually went down the road. I run in a lot of other associations, but the NSPRA is definitely my favorite." The people truly make the association stand apart for Jeanne, keeping her on the road and in the saddle. "My favorite part of competing is going down the alley, feeling that power under me as we run full throttle into first. I love that sensation."

2018 Team Roping Pick/Draw Format

It has been decided to use a pick one/draw one format for the team roping beginning this year. Here is some basic information, but if you have questions or comments, please contact our team roping director, Mike Brewer, at 530-519-2587, or Susi Kaufman at the National Office 928-684-9566.

- There will be separate pick one / draw one for the 40-59 age category and the 60+ age category.
- Fees will be \$100 per man (for both runs) plus the NSPRA fee and stock charges
- There will be no drop down in the team roping. A 60 team cannot drop down and rope in the 40-59 age category; however,

- Rule 12.2.1.4 is still in place – a 60+ team roper can designate his points to accrue in the 40-59 age category and could win a world championship in the lower age category, as long as his partner is age appropriate and an Event Age Category Designation for Points form is signed and received by the National Office before the first rodeo is entered. (You cannot enter both age categories at the same rodeo)

- A pick team cannot draw up together in the draw pot.
- Points will be given for the pick team only.
- You cannot draw both partners.

South Dakota Cowboys Win Big in 1988 **Cory Ferguson**


hree of the 1988 National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association champions were from South Dakota. The steer wrestling was won by Cory Ferguson, Enning, South Dakota. Western Dakota Tech Saddle Bronc Riding winner Eudell Larson, New Underwood, South Dakota was spotlighted previously. Bareback Riding and All-Around Champion, Ken Lensegrav from Meadow, South Dakota, riding for Montana State University, will be in a future NIRA Alumni story.

Ferguson's rodeo career began at the Enning, South Dakota Roping Club started by his dad and grandfather on their ranch. His first steer wrestling competition at age 14 was at Rodeo Bible Camp near Kadoka, South Dakota which had a big influence on him. His older brother, steer wrestler Faron, and hazer, uncle Milton Trask, helped him develop as a steer wrestler. He also gives credit to 1980 Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association All Around Cowboy Paul Tierney and 1983 Bill Linderman Award winner Marty "Chip" Melvin.

Ferguson competed in tie down roping, team roping, and steer wrestling at three College National Finals Rodeos. The 1988 NIRA steer wrestling winner competed for National College of Business now National American University, Rapid City, South Dakota where he majored in Paralegal and Business Administration.

After college, he worked full time as an event director for several businesses including the Professional Bull Riders as Director of Loyalty Marketing. He got his PRCA permit, filled it and pro rodeoed in the Badlands Circuit, Great Lakes Circuit, Prairie Circuit and First Frontier Cir-







cuit. In 2007, he led the steer wrestling in the PRCA First Frontier Circuit for three fourths of the season until he suffered a severe injury and could not compete until the finals rodeo. He still ended the season in third place for the year.

Cory and his wife, Julie, live just south of Rapid City, South Dakota where he is Sponsorship and Vendor Manager for the Black Hills Stock Show and Rodeo and the Central States Fair and Rodeo.

He has always had a deep caring for animals and is a board member of the Black Hills Humane Society. Cory and Julie are on national disaster response teams for animals following floods, wildfires, tornadoes, and hurricanes. After living for 25 years out of the western SD area, he is back home where he plans on getting back into team roping.

ecently I was visiting with a young man whose company I enjoy very much. This guy is excited about life and he loves to rope. We were at a roping that hadn't started yet. As we sat visiting he said, "You know, the secret of winning is to ride your horse aggressively. The arena is not very wide and if you are late on your entry you end up against the left wall quickly." At that point of the conversation, I reached in my shirt pocket, pulled out my pen and wrote down, "ride your horse aggressively."

This young man asked me, "Do you always carry a pen and paper around with you?" I told him that I did, yes. I went on to explain that life to me is a journey and on that journey we hear and see nuggets of knowledge and I write them down so I can retain them for use later. There is a book that I have read entitled "With Winning in Mind," written by Lanny Bassham. There is lots of good information in this book and one is the percentages of what we remember. The author states that we retain 25% of what we hear, 50% if we hear it and repeat it and 80% if we write it down. I have heard that the shortest pencil is better than the longest memory and that's also why I like to write things down.

He then asked me what are some of the nuggets that you have written down that you can remember? Well I can tell you one that changed my life. There's no such thing as a mistake, it's only an opportunity to learn. That one helps me not to beat myself up after I make a mistake. It also helps me to avoid the definition of insanity, doing the same thing over and over and expecting a different result. If we do the same thing we have always done then we will get what we have always got. I want to learn from my mistakes and get a better result.

This boy asked, "So what can you tell me about winning?" I replied that I could tell him the first rule of winning is don't beat yourself. If your opponent or opponents beat you that is one thing, but we should try at all costs to not beat ourselves. So he said,



"You are telling me to rope more conservatively?" "No, I'm telling you to find a speed where you have a high caching percentage and execute at that level. You can beat yourself by roping too conservative just as you can by being too aggressive."

I know this conversation helped me. I took his advice and rode my horse more aggressively on my entry and I placed in my roping. Now I'm not sure if my advice helped my young friend but he did win first and third in the open that day, so I'm going to take some of the credit for that as well. That's my story and I'm sticking to it. In fact, I might even write it down somewhere.

couple of weeks ago I asked my son, Gabe, to ride some head horses for me. My wife has a horse, Deputy, that she hasn't been riding, and Hali has one she hasn't been able to ride. I promised Gabe if he would ride these horses I would take him to some ropings. After watching videos of Gabe roping on my website, Lloyd South called and asked if Gabe would head for him in the #9 and #8 at Robertson Hill on Tuesday night. The ropings were limited to thirty teams, so it would be a short roping on a weeknight.

Gabe turned all ten of his steers. He and Lloyd caught all four steers in both the #8 and #9, winning 2nd in the #8, and 3rd in the #9. My little man was some kind of pumped up on the way home after winning money.

It was like that with Hali also. I really didn't want either of them to rope much until they were 11, 12, or 13 years old. At that age they are big enough and strong enough to ride, control their horse, and handle a rope.

When Hali caught the roping bug she was playing travel softball and going to a lot of tournaments. She went to a roping, won some money, and the very next weekend we went to a softball tournament. The temperature was in the high 20's and the wind was blowing about 20 mph. They played all day long, placed second, and won a trophy.



I will never forget the look on her face. She looked at me and said, "Daddy, I don't have a muscle in my body that's not sore from playing ball for the last two days. Can I buy a hamburger with this trophy?" I told her, "No, you can't." Her answer was, "I won money last weekend and my horse did all the running. We might need to rethink this softball." I assured her it was her decision. It wasn't long after that she was a full time team roper. Now after winning some money, I think Gabe will do the same. Only time will tell, but we are planning for him to rope at the Big Break roping in the #10, #9, and if he has the energy, maybe the #7 too.

If you want your kids to rope, it's important they have fun and enjoy it. That means they need to be on horses that give them a chance. The worst thing for them is to be on a horse they can't control. When they pull on the bridle reins, their horse needs to respond.

Accidents can always happen, as with any sport. I teach them safety by practicing fundamentals at a slow pace on the Hot Heels, using a short rope to prevent ducking, and having them mounted on a horse they can control and feel confident on.

Most parents that rope also want their kids to rope. They have to want to, you can't make them or they will quit. I have seen clients break the spirit of their kids when they sell their horses out from under them. If their child doesn't show the interest they think they should, they sell their horse, devastating their kid, and that's the last thing I want to do.

My father trained and sold a lot horses. He used to sell horses all the time that Mom and I wanted to keep. Now as a parent, in our family everyone has the prerogative to put their name on one horse that can't be sold. If someone offers to buy one, we have a board/family meeting and discuss it. Sometimes the outcome doesn't turn out the way I want, but I don't want to do my kids like my dad did us. I want my kids involved and out there helping. I want them to make decisions and understand the consequences of those decisions.

I'm beyond happy that my kids want to rope. They have always had the option to play other sports or have other activities and we have supported them in those activities. But I have also worked at making roping fun for them.

Jason is always excited to see good horses from the sale go on to be success-





conversation with Rowdy Parrott could easily whip up a person's appetite. The 24-yearold professional steer wrestler comes from Mamou, Louisiana, and has Cajun cooking in his genes, whether it's with game he's harvested or crawfish that his family raises. "We eat a lot of wild game," says Rowdy. "We get duck, squirrel, deer, all kinds of different things. You can put squirrel in rice gravy, and ducks, we breast them or bake them, or cook them in rice and gravy too."


Rowdy grew up knowing where the food on the table came from, helping his family farm until they switched to raising crawfish four or five years ago. They raise the crawfish in ponds formed by rice fields. The crawfish burrow underground when the rice fields are drained and harvested, then return to the surface when it rains and are harvested from November through July. Rowdy's family harvests as many as 400-500 sacks of crawfish a day, and he helps with loading and shipping them to restaurants and stores.

Rowdy also loves hunting with his family, especially duck hunting with his dad and brother. "We love it. We get up early in the morning and go hunting in the rush fields, and we have some pretty good dogs. I have a cousin who does the training. It's so fun; it's addicting. Duck hunting is usually fast-paced. You might sit in a blind and talk, and deer hunting is more quiet, sitting in a stand and waiting." As much as he enjoys the action of duck hunting, Rowdy likes the quiet of deer hunting even more. He hunts white-tail deer on his in-laws' ranch in West Texas, where deer season runs November to January. "They've done a lot of work out there, so it's all set up. Duck hunting is fast-paced, but I like sitting and watching all the deer and being outdoors. My wife, Lynette, likes to hunt. She doesn't do it as much now that we have our son. Pacen, but she went with me a couple times this year,

in 2011. "I used to do all the events, but I just love the rush that you get

steer wrestling, and the contact. I've always loved it since I first started," says Rowdy, who made four trips in all to the NHSFR. He and his parents, Mitch and Tammy, and brother and sister, Remey and Tobi, also traveled to the IFYR during his high school career. Rowdy won PRCA Steer Wrestling Rookie of the Year in 2014 and made his debut at the WNFR in 2017 riding his gelding George. "To go there and do it was awesome — there's not many other words for it. That topped it all, and I wanted to do better, of course, but I was satisfied with my first NFR and I'm just ready to go back."


Rowdy finished 12th in the steer wrestling world standings, and he's sitting in the top 20 this season after making the rounds at the winter stock shows and rodeos in Texas, including The American Semi-Finals. His younger brother, Remey, is steer wrestling for McNeese State University in Lake Charles, Louisiana, and entering PRCA rodeos as well. "He goes at it pretty hard, and he's doing pretty great," says Rowdy, who also rodeoed on the MSU team and majored in criminal justice. "This is my job and it's all I want to do. I love competing. The main goal is to go back to the NFR and chase that gold buckle."





and I'm ready for Pacen to start getting old enough to do it."

While Pacen isn't quite old enough to go hunting yet — he'll turn 1 in May - he is a seasoned traveler already, trekking down the road with his parents since he was 6 weeks old. Rowdy met Lynette through rodeo, competing with one of her cousins before he started pro rodeoing. She rodeoed in high school and continues to ride horses with Rowdy. "I couldn't do this without my family," says Rowdy. "They have been amazing and always supported me and helped me get up and down the road." He's the first in his family to rodeo at this level, though his grandfather fought bulls. "We showed cattle and would always go to rodeos. I just liked it and decided I was going to try to do it, and I got hooked!" Rowdy started with team roping and made it to the NHSFR in 2009, followed by winning the LHSRA state title in steer wrestling

PROFILE: BRAZOS HECK [Brazos wins all-around championship at Jr.NFR in Las Vegas]

razos Heck is quite driven and focused.

He knows exactly what he wants in his future to be. He's a cowboy in every sense of the word, and in rodeo, he competes on the backs of bucking bovines and bucking broncs.

"I want to ranch here in Oklahoma," he said. "I think I can ride all three (roughstock) events, and it would just be a dream come true to win 10 all-around world titles."

Driven. Focused. Oh, and he's only 9 years old.

"I do this because I love to do it, and I think it's my passion," said Brazos, the son of Odie Heck and Shasta Yost.

He's also pretty good at it. In early December, he competed at the Jr.NFR in Las Vegas. He finished several days of competition as the No. 2 man in mini bareback riding, where he won two rounds. He also finished third in the middle saddle bronc riding.

Because of his success, he earned the pee wee division all-around championship. No matter the age group, it is the Brazos Heck - Dale Hirschman

most cherished prize in the sport.

"This is a once-in-a-lifetime thing," he said. "I'm hoping to win more."

He stands a good chance, thanks in large part to his work ethic, his study of the game and having a couple of the best-known cowboys as friends and mentors. His father is a cowboy in Tupelo, Okla., and is close friends with Jet and Cord McCoy, two allaround champs who made their names on CBS-TV's "The Amazing Race."

The McCoys have been rodeo champs since they were youngsters, too.

"In a lot of ways, he does remind me of me," Jet McCoy said. "He's pretty special. I've been pretty impressed with him."

Brazos' list of accomplishments is long. He's been riding since age 5, and he's progressed fairly rapidly, too

"He started out wanting to get on sheep," Odie Heck said. "He'd been at a rodeo, and they had mutton busting. He was always around Cord and Jet, so he

wanted to ride. Then we were at a rodeo, and kids were riding little ponies in bareback riding. He wanted to get a rigging and enter the bareback riding."

Heck has been around rodeo all his life, but he was a timed-event cowboy. Roping and steer wrestling were good fits for the athletically built, 6-foot cowboy.

"Brazos' athletic ability is a little different than mine," he said. "He's a bucking horse guy."

In fact, Brazos craves it. When he's not riding, he's thinking about it, and he watches a ton of videos to help with those thoughts, from the bronc riding Wright family – brothers Cody, Jesse and Spencer have won world titles, as has Cody's second-oldest son, the 2017 champ, Ryder – to the McCoys, to bareback riding world champions Kaycee Feild and Bobby Mote and world champion bull riders Cody Custer, J.B. Mauney and Cody Custer.

"They just make me feel like I ride really good," said Brazos, who is sponsored by the American Hat Co. and Oklahoma Ag Transports. "I watch them over and over again, and I want to ride like them."

Those are the types of champions he looks up to and wants to emulate. Even at his young age, he understands the need for constructive criticism if he is to improve. That's why he looks to the McCoys for assistance. Both were five-time International Professional Rodeo Association world champions who competed in all three roughstock events.

"I almost make him ask me for help before I offer any," said Cord McCoy, a 2005 Wrangler National Finals Rodeo qualifier



in bull riding and a six-time competitor at the PBR World Finals. "If he wants to come to the house and train in our arena, I step back and let it be his idea. I let him show the desire.

"I think all of us have our own natural style. He's pretty natural. I know he's been watching every rodeo in the area and on TV. That's all he craves."

He knew Brazos was pretty good but ad-

"Then they had the Jr.NFR, which was all the kids who qualify from across the country, and he's the all-around champion," Cord McCoy said. "He's got raw talent. If he keeps the desire he has today, he's going to be a contender when he gets older.

"It was pretty inspirational to go to the Jr.NFR and see Billy (Etbauer), Ty (Murray) and Larry Mahan there. The superstars of rodeo got to watch the next generation compete."

Jet McCoy likened the Jr.NFR as the Little League World Series, and that young cowboys and cowgirls who compete at the pinnacle of their sport are taking the steps necessary to excel as teens and adults.

"If you want to compete at the highest level, you've got to start early," he said. "To have the opportunity to go to Vegas and spend three or four days to see what it's like, it gives them something to visualize and something to shoot for."

For now, though, those closest to him support and believe in what Brazos Heck is doing because they see his passion for the sport.

"You've got to have the want-to, and I don't think anybody's forced it on him," Cord McCoy said. "When you nod your head, you've got to have the eye of the tiger.

"He's got that winning attitude to go along with the talent." $\mathbf{\overline{N}}$

Meet the Member **Betsy Roemer**

eading is one of Betsy Roemer's favorite classes at Brookland High School, where the 16-yearold is a sophomore this year. She loves the interesting books she's assigned to read, and the way they delve into all the literary details of books like Frankenstein and To Kill a Mockingbird. Betsy also enjoys her involvement in the school's FFA program, where she shows market goats and takes part in the FFA horse judging team. Betsy not only appreciates all she has learned about judging horse performance and body condition, she delights in the fact that she has ridden horses since she was just 21/2 years old, spending much of her time since then in the rodeo arena.

Betsy lives in Jonesboro, Arkansas, with her parents Matt and Kerry Roemer, sister Anna, 17, and 12-year-old brother Clay. Rodeo and livestock have been a part of the family's life for many years, as Kerry showed cattle as a child in Illinois, and Matt roped and rode horses at playdays growing up in Nebraska. Kerry's work brought the family from Illinois to Arkansas several years ago, and now she runs the HR department for Peco Foods, in Pocahontas, Arkansas; and Matt works as a telephone box repairman for Erico. Both of Betsy's siblings have taken part in rodeo; Anna competed until three years ago, when she became more heavily involved with FFA activities. Clay has qualified for the Junior NFR the past two years; 2016 in bareback riding, and saddlebronc riding in 2017. Betsy competes in goat tying, breakaway roping and barrel racing in both the Arkansas Cowboy Association and Central Arkansas Little Britches Rodeo Association. Because of the way many ACA rodeos are co-sanctioned, it is often possible for Clay and Betsy to compete at the same rodeos even if they're not at a CALBRA rodeo.

Many teenagers lead busy lifestyles these days, but Betsy pushes that to the limits as she wakes up early each morning to start work, driving to a neighbor's farm 15-minutes down the road, to feed and clean stalls. She then comes home to feed horses, cattle, her show goats and goats she uses to practice goat tying. Once all those chores are done, she heads to school, which is most often followed by teaching riding and goat tying lessons, riding horses for clients, taking a roping lesson herself, or babysitting; finishing up the day with feeding all of the animals their supper.

In competition, Betsy is grateful to have great horses to carry her in the events she loves. Derby is a special 18vear old Ouarter Horse mare that Betsy bought from Cayla Cory, and she's been the rock of building Betsy's barrel racing skills. Cayla has been also been instrumental in helping her with Derby and keeping her tuned up and working as a team with Betsy. "She has been so helpful to me, and she is a very good person to be with, all the way around." Betsy bought a 6-year-old sorrel mare, named Fern, in October 2017, and although she hasn't had a chance to run her much yet, they won the open barrel racing at an ACA shortly after purchasing her. Tink is a little, 8-year-old bay mare Betsy has owned for about 3 years, and Betsy rides her for goat tying and breakaway roping. "She likes to be alone, she's not a real fan of people, but once you show Tink her job, she does it. If she sees a goat at the end of the arena, she's ready to turn it on and do her job."

Betsy knows having goals are extremely important in life, and she takes setting them seriously. She's not made a decision on where she wants to attend yet, but definitely plans to college rodeo, and would like to become an Occupational Therapist, utilizing horses in therapy for kids, one day. She wants to finish her rodeo season strong, making finals in both associations. "I really want to get stronger on the mental side, so that I am more consistent and better at handling pressure." Betsy is proud to represent Willard Rope Company and the 2018 Outlaw Equine Youth Rodeo Team.

van Johnson's affection for horses and riding began at a very young age and has become a passion that spurs her towards her future. Ryan's grandfather, Ray Burd of Lavaca, Arkansas, is a retired veterinarian and horseman that enjoys spending time training colts with his neighbor, Denny Flynn, who is a world champion bull rider and the father of barrel racer, Ari-Anna Flynn. When Ryan was young, Ray purchased a pony for his 6 granddaughters, and Ryan spent hours mucking stalls and cleaning at the arena, to spend all the time she could with Princess and the other horses. Ryan lived in Birmingham, Alabama, 9-hours from her grandfather's ranch, with her parents Jennifer and David Johnson, and younger sisters, Katie Reed and Maddie Kay. Her parents could not ignore the true desire their 6-year-old daughter showed for the equestrian lifestyle, and they purchased a horse named Midnight from Eddie Kilgore, just a few months after trying a horse on lease at a nearby ranch. Midnight was a black, 16-year-old Quarter Horse, and during the 5 years Ryan owned him, the talented gelding taught her invaluable lessons. Midnight was a gentleman at the gate and gave Ryan confidence and a feel for running a barrel horse. Ryan has ridden several horses over the years, and although not all were such pleasant partners, lessons were learned from each one. Ryan recalls a horse named Indy, "He was a handful, he would rear straight up at the gate, he wasn't easy to ride but he made me brave, and that has helped me to be a better barrel racer."

Ryan is a sophomore at Oak Mountain High School, in Birmingham, and competes on the school's cross-country team. She enjoys math and is in the advanced math track, currently taking trigonom-

etry, but mostly focuses on finishing her schoolwork to get to the barn after school. The barn, where Ryan boards her horse, is just a few minutes from her home and most days you will find her there teaching riding lessons to novice riders.

The 16 year old often competes at multiple rodeos each week and is a member of several rodeo associations besides the SPRA. The family is often headed different directions because of this, as David and Ryan travel to rodeos, while Jennifer hauls Ryan's sisters to competitive cheer competitions all over the south. Ryan's dad is the owner of a marketing agency, HF Direct, and her mom works as a surgical scrub nurse at Brookwood Hospital.

For the past four years, Ryan has been riding a grey Quarter Horse gelding named Cloudy. He was young when she bought him, and Ryan relied on her good friend, Sylvia Kinnebrew, to help fine tune the barrel racing duo. "He tries so hard every run. He will stand up in any ground, but if it's muddy he'll slow down Magnolia Farm

so that we're safe. He has a great heart and I just couldn't ask for a better horse." Ryan's favorite win on Cloudy was at last year's Columbiana Rodeo, put on by the Shelby County Cattleman's Association and announced by her favorite announcer, Adam Gibbs. Ryan was recently named the Senior Miss Shelby County Cattleman's Association Queen.

"I really look up to Jodi Colton, from Manchester, Tennessee. She is who I want to be! She is always on the road, I love her horse Solo, and I believe they are just unstoppable, they are on their way to making



the NFR." Ryan is excited that this year she will begin hauling with Jodi to IPRA rodeos. Another barrel racer Ryan looks up to is Kyndall Lecomte. "She is such a determined rider, always working with her horse. She is so sweet to everyone and treats riders of all levels with respect."

Ryan's future dreams are focused on running around the yellow barrels

at the Thomas & Mack Center. "I know a lot of kids say that is what they want to do. But I AM going to be there. I will do anything in the world that it takes, no matter what, it is all I want." Ask the Lord to show you where the source of those thoughts are based out of, and hold on tight, because He's liable to take vou back in time so that thorn can be found.....and removed! 📅

bought him as a diamond in the rough and he turned out to be a freak of nature," says Dusty Link about Buttons, his sorrel, Quarter Horse gelding. In 2015, Dusty spotted the horse at a rodeo, and even though he wasn't for sale, he propositioned the owner and within a week he had purchased him to be his own. "He was a finished reiner, and I saw a lot of potential in him, I loved the way he could stop." Right away, Dusty and Buttons clicked together and he trained him to be his heel and tie-down horse, with the help of friends Jim and Cody McCartney. "He is my one and only horse, and if it wasn't for him, I wouldn't have stepped up my game the way that I have, I guess you could say he is just that one special horse for me."

Dusty grew up in Montrose, Michigan with his parents Dale Link and Teresa Lingle Link, and brother, Jimmy Paquette. Although Dusty lived in a family that didn't have anything to do with rodeo, a friend down the road from his childhood home had horses and was involved in riding bulls, and Dusty was drawn to the activity and lifestyle. Dusty's mom was not so excited about the prospect of her 12-year-old son riding bulls, and instead encouraged Dusty to ride horses. When Dusty explained that he'd like to team rope, she was happy to support him in that direction, and Dusty's parents purchased a 20-year-old grey head horse for him to get started on. Dusty spent many hours watching professional ropers on television, stopping to video himself and compare his own roping to what they were instructing ropers to do. Emulating the pros as closely as possible gave him a start; but when he was 13-years-old, he attended his first roping school with instructor Steve Shattock and his roping



really took off from there.

Dusty competed as a header in the Michigan High School Rodeo Association and qualified for nationals his junior year. After graduating in 2007, his roping continued, but Dusty switched to heeling and mostly jackpotted close to home after relocating to Holly, Michigan. It was in 2009 that started Dusty down the rodeo trail, and in 2010 that he had his rookie year with Mid States Rodeo Association-East. He has since been a member of MS-RA-E, as well as the Michigan Ropers Association, and USTRC, where he is now a #6 heeler and #5 header. Dusty has competed in the USTRC finals in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma every year since 2012.

In 2012, Dusty had the opportunity to go stay with Charlie Crawford for a month, in Lipan, Texas, where Charlie was living with Chad Masters at the time. Working under Charlie, Dusty learned a lot about roping as well as having a winning mindset. "He taught me to keep my mind together when things are rough, take the bad with the good, remembering that you are not going to win them all, so just keep roping like you know how to do, Dusty Link - Emily Gethke Photography

and it will all be better in the end."

Dusty makes his living as a farrier, and when he's not shoeing horses he is riding and practicing at his neighbor's indoor arena. Dusty taught his girlfriend, Tina Popour, how to rope and is grateful that "she's a trooper," and spins steers for him at practice, works the chute, or whatever else he needs help with. He and Tina travel to many of the rodeos together, and Dusty is grateful that his parents make it to at least one or two of his rodeos each year to cheer him on as well. When Dusty is not rodeoing, he enjoys time hunting and fishing with friends, and is an avid coon-hunter, especially enjoying time with his coondog, Stubby. "Stubby is my main man, and when we're not hunting he's a 100-pound lap dog."

Dusty made the 2017 MSRA-E season finals this past October, in team roping and in tie-down roping, where he placed 3rd in the average. "I enjoy being a member of the MSRA-E, it's a well-run organization where everything seems to go smoothly."

Meet the Members Austin & Taylor Joseph

aylor and Austin Joseph from Benton, Kentucky, had a very special IFR48. "It was completely bittersweet for both of us," said the 24-year-old mother of two, who happens to be married to the 2017 IPRA World Champion Saddle Bronc Rider, Austin. The bittersweet comes from the fact that she retired her 20-year-old breakaway and barrel horse, Peppys Non Stop, Peppy, or Old Faithful. "I know that horse could go a couple more years, but I said I was going to retire him and I did." Part of the plan is to save Old Faithful as a starter horse for the kids. Taylor started Peppy when she was in the fourth grade. "I had the whole dream of being a rodeo kid and my stepdad got this horse

from his dad at a sale barn. I rode him for the first time at the house and told my stepdad that he made my butt smile." Taylor got her interest in rodeo from her aunt. "My family trail rides, they don't rodeo. We went to the little jackpots growing up. I took it upon my-

self to get the horse and train him the way I needed him and that's what we did."

Peppy took Taylor to the All Around in fifth grade, their first year competing, and then he took her to the National Junior High finals all three years, fol-

lowed by the national High School finals for three years. "I didn't rodeo my senior year because I joined the IPRA and made the finals in the barrels and breakaway. Taylor was the reserve 2012 IPRA Champion in both events and took home Rookie of the Year.

She was going to school at Murray State University, majoring in biology with a focus on Physical Therapy and met Austin. "He met my mom (Wendy) on a trail ride and two years later we were married." She plans to return to school once her children are in school themselves.

Austin works for a John Deere dealership, and Taylor is a stay-at-home mom. "We have a family farm and he works for the farm as well." They grow corn, soybeans, and wheat. With his job, he travels to the farm operations and programs their computers to autopilot the row crops. The computer will know what fertilizer to put where when Austin puts the prescription in the tractor.

The horses are kept at home, and there is an arena there, but due to the current deluge of rain, the practicing is happening at the college indoor arena. Taylor loads both kids up and they head there. Kade is two and Kora is four and they both love the horses. "Any chance we get to go out to the barn she's ready to ride." She has a new horse that she's running in the barrels, 8-year-old Shade of an Oak, Soulshine, who she got from Lone Star Rodeo Company. Kora is now riding the retired Peppy.

Austin had only been riding broncs for two years when they met, and he loved it. "I am a perfectionist, so I was determined to be good at it," he said. "It was the fall of my junior year at Murray State and I had been riding horses for a cutting trainer and the rodeo coach asked me if I'd get on a few bucking horses. I actually got on 14 horses one night during practice and over time I learned the technique and got the muscle memory built up." Austin bought his first horse when he was 16, trading his 300 Honda for him. After he started riding bucking horses in college, he started roping and at the end of college he was bulldogging some too. He's added calf roping to his abilities.His mom and dad faithfully came to all his college rodeos as well as the Finals in Casper, Wyoming. "My sister and I played the national anthem before the short round at the Finals. I played the violin since I was five years old and we played a duet at the college finals at the short round my last year, 2012." Austin graduated from Murray State with a degree in Ag Systems technology and went on to get his Masters in Ag Science with a specialty in Ag Systems Technology.

Winning the 2017 IPRA World Championship was bittersweet for Austin, who lost his father on Thanksgiving Day. "Dad went with me every year to the IFR and the College Finals. I'd never been to one without him." It was never a goal of Austin's to win the Finals. "I've always had responsibilities at home and couldn't go hard enough to win it, so this year when I had a lead in the first of June I made it a goal to win the world." His responsibilities include his fulltime job with John Deere and helping his Uncle run the 4,000 acre family farm.

The Josephs are going to make a shot at the Finals again this year. "We are going to go again this year, and I'm going to try to make it in the calf roping too this year.

For the beginning of the season getting to the rodeos will be easy. "We have a lot of winter rodeos, LoneStar rodeos, close to home," said Taylor. "We're at the point now if God keeps blessing us and we keep making money, we will keep hauling. We are leaving it in God's hands and going weekend by weekend." Meet the Committee St. Joseph County Sheriff's Posse

he St. Joseph County Sheriff's Posse in South Bend, Indiana, is accustomed to volunteer work and the annual rodeo committee is no exception. The mounted posse is commissioned by the sheriff and serves the community in search and rescue operations, crowd control and emergency situations. Rebecca Heckaman is a five-year veteran on the posse and is now chair of the rodeo committee. "I remember going to watch this rodeo as a kid, it was and still is one of the biggest events I look forward to every year. I took my daughter Michelle when she was young and now my granddaughter Arlene is going also."

Rebecca ran a local tavern for more than 19 years outside of South Bend before retiring and joining the posse. "I went to the rodeo as a kid and I remember how much I always admired the posse members and what they do. When I retired I decided to join." Around for the past 30 years, the rodeo is a fundraiser for the posse. "We [the posse] have to pay for all of our own equipment: the uniform, helmet, bullet-proof vest, gun belts, radios, tack, trailer, all of it. So that is why we put on the rodeo and then a speed show in the fall."

The rodeo used to be a standalone event but was hired as an act by the county fair eight years ago. "Now we get contributions from the fair in addition to the sponsorships we find ourselves, so we can add \$7,000 to the winner's purse." Admission into the ten-day fair allows spectators the oppor-



tunity to attend the two-day rodeo also. "The fair is usually held during the week of the fourth of July and brings thousands of spectators each night." Known as one of the biggest rodeos in the area, competitors have come from Canada and all corners of the U.S. for the IPRA-sanctioned event.

Held just south of the home of the Notre Dame Fighting Irish, this rodeo brings in all kinds. "It is such a popular rodeo that we do not have to do a whole lot to get people to come compete and watch. Competitors know that if they come here and win they are going to make good money, have a great time and move up in the standings of the IPRA." The fairground currently has an outdoor arena used for the rodeo but are looking at the possibility of expanding.

The posse has hired Three Bar J Ranch and Rodeo out of Union City, Indiana, as the stock contractor for as long as anyone can remember. They do an excellent job

for us and I believe we have done well for them also. They take excellent care of their animals and about 200 competitors." This year kids from the audience got to come into the arena and race hop ponies. "We try to have different unique events every year. I know several singers and bands have performed in years past along with a spectacular firework display after the rodeo."

The posse has also hosted a speed show each fall for the past four years at Al-Bar Ranch in Mishawaka, Indiana. "We always have a good turnout for the show. We give away highpoint buckles in the three age divisions for the one-day event." The posse uses the funds for their equipment but also invest it back into the community. "We make donations to places like Reins of Life, a therapeutic riding center, Hope Rescue Mission, the 4-H club and anybody else who needs it here." "It is because of the sponsors that the rodeo happens every year. It is important to me to keep this going every year because it is not just a rodeo it is a tradition."

High school age contestants from around the world will compete for over \$200,000 in prize money. Entries open online on April 1, 2018. You will be required to have competitor insurance. If you are competing in IPRA rodeos this season and already have an IPRA Youth Card (or even a full IPRA card) for the 2018 rodeo season, you will not be required to purchase additional insurance. You can purchase a Youth card for \$125 or a full IPRA card for \$275 prior to the IFYR. If you do not have a card, you will need to purchase the individual event insurance for \$45 (IFYR Permit) good only for the IFYR. 
