


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
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PUSHING, PULLING, POINTING AND PENDULUMS

round the ranch, here in Oklahoma we move the cattle once in a while. In the days before feed trucks, it took a fair number of riders to move the herd. Progress was slow as they pushed them to the greener grass.

In our case, it takes only a few riders on horseback to clear the pastures and follow slowly behind. The cattle get friendly to the feed truck from the first day they arrive on the ranch. All winter, spring and fall they see it, hear the diesel rumble and become fond of the siren. It signals a snack in the summer and a full meal in the winter. When we want to move them, we fire up the truck, head for the pasture, blow the siren and they follow. We pull them along. Entice them. They follow the truck because it leads to good stuff.

Humans are clearly not cattle. Yet, the illustration points to a truth that might help understand the coming generations. Pulling is better than pushing.

Consumer trends point to this as well. As we swing into the next 10 - 12 years, markets will be driven by advertising that 'pulls' rather than 'pushes'. Even now, advertising works to be drawing and inviting. Pushing, telling, convincing, and attempts to force or muscle will return around 2040. That will be the halfway point to another cultural apex. But for now, Pull.

Faith used the 'push' model of shame, guilt and pressure, in the earlier and middle part of the last century to move folks to the cross. It took a lot of resources to keep the crowds in line. Rule-keeping and a set of strong 'shoulds' and 'oughts' pushed societal forces. That is until the early 1960's. Culture pushed back.

Good things get taken too far and the cultural pendulum begins to swing back to balance the over-reach. Churches follow suit about a decade behind. Right or wrong makes little difference to the pendulum. Cultures cycle in predictable ways.

The influencers will be those who live an open and authentic life. It will be these personally honest leaders that inculcate the next generation with the Good News. Future pulpits will have less shouting and shaming and more of a simpler sharing of personal stories about ongoing failings and redemptions. Same Gospel communicated differently by those who understand pendulum dynamics.

Persuasive sermons will be an enticement to a richer, deeper more meaningful faith as modeled by the person teaching. What moves us will be less about the fear of a scornful God and more about the Prodigal who was drawn by the grace of a Good Father. His love and mercy will pull us to Him.

The next cultural wave will not be pushed or forced. They will need to be invited and called. Leaders will need to actually lead the way. To go there. Like Christ to the cross, they will live what they teach or they will not be leaders long.

We will need to risk telling them about our first heartbreak. First job. Fear of not measuring up. Loneliness. Temptations toward arrogance. How worried we were at some potential bad news. About that time when we thought we had won, but lost. How we like to be the hero of our own stories, sadly. About why we are un-nerved at self-disclosure.

This is how we pull, draw and invite relationship. Like cattle at a new gate: Push and watch them push-back, debate, argue, contradict and scatter. But pull them, by actually living our faith out in real and honest terms and....in they come. Leaders will need to lead in actions. Not push and point.

The Gospel pulls. Scripture is real and raw. Jesus said "follow me". He loved and forgave, then he asked us to do the same. He asked us to "lose our life" and then He went to the cross. He led by going there and inviting us to join Him.

If I want to affect this next season of culture, I will need to pull more and push less.

Go to where we want them to go. Blow the siren and let the hungry and thirsty know you found food and drink for the weary soul.

I would follow that leader.

ability, but still made money. Jerry has no regrets selling Streaker to Brian and Lisa. "The horse went where he needed to be and I doubt anyone in the country would have promoted that horse as good as Lisa and Brian did. I'm thrilled they spent the money to promote him and invest in him the way they did. It takes lots of guts."

Brian was dragging his feet to head to Oklahoma City to look at a stud right in the middle of fall cattle work. "I bought Brian a one-way ticket to Oklahoma City and had phoned Billy Etbauer and to see if he could pick Brian up and then also called John Rothwell whom was in Texas and headed back to Nebraska and asked him if he could call Brian and if Brian bought the stud could John come through Norman, OK to pick them up." Brian and Billy looked at the horse, and Brian dickered with Jerry. They then left for coffee and took some time to think it through. "Brian bought him with the condition that he could take him home and ride him before Jerry cashed the check."

Brian and Billy were longtime good friends, and for Billy, it was a simple act of kindness. "I was picking a friend up and looking at a horse – it was fun to see Brian and it helped him out. I could never have

BREEDING WITH BRAINS

[Race Horse Turns, Roping Horse & More]

rian and Lisa Fulton bought A Streak of Fling (Streaker) in October of 2003. "Brian retired off the (rodeo) road in 2001 when he blew his knee out," recalls Lisa. "He couldn't find the type of horse he wanted to rodeo on while he was rodeoing, so his idea was to find a stud that he thought would produce rodeo type horses and raise our own." Lisa laughs as she admits she figured she would be 100 before he found the stud because Brian was so picky. "We found him in October and we were shipping cattle - so Brian didn't have a lot of time to go look." Jerry Sipes had advertised Streaker in the back of the Speed Horse magazine in two lines and no picture. There were a lot of people that called on him but did not buy him.

Jerry Sipes bought Streaker off the race track from Jack Marley. "I had him for six months and I bought him for three reasons - He's the only sire I've seen that is colored like that - it's like looking for a movie star there's something unique about them - in Streaker's case, he was from an exceptional race horse named Streakin Six - he was a great big stout 16 H, 1,300 lb. race horse. His mother, a mare named Moon Fling, had a speed index of 102 AAAT. He's the prettiest bay roan you'll ever see." When Streaker was a long yearling, Jerry had an offer to buy him, and he turned it down. Streaker qualified for the Blue Ribbon Futurity, but cracked a tendon bone and was scratched from the Finals. The horse showed great

imagined – but I'm glad it worked out that way – that would be a guy's dream. Thankfully it all worked out – it was a tough decision for him and a lot of kicking the dirt, but it all worked out."

John Rothwell was hauling calves from that area. "I was in the truck south of Oklahoma City when Brian called me - he always knew how to get things done. He said he was trying to buy this horse and I met him in Oklahoma City. We sat there for a couple hours while Brian got the sale done. We threw the horse in the back of the trailer and we drove all the way back to Brian and Lisa's ranch." Streaker was loaded in the dark into a canvas topped stock trailer that had the last gate plyboarded off at the end of the trailer; he was sharing the ride home with calves. "He was in the back he got the cold spot," said John, who was hauling calves back to Nebraska. They drove straight through and got home and unloaded Streaker. That was the story -Streaker came home in a cattle trailer.

Brian rode him the next day and called Jerry and told him to cash the check. Brian had Streaker roping in the indoor barn less than 8 weeks after the 700-mile trip from Oklahoma to South Dakota. "To come off the track and transition so easily into roping – he can run and he has a brain," said Lisa.


"Sometimes when they come off the track they are frazzled. Streaker was easy for Brian to train." The first year Streaker stood in Ainsworth, Nebraska and bred 100 mares at \$1,000 a pop. Thirteen years later the fee has gone up to \$5,500.


The first weanlings were sold in Kearney, Nebraska, in 2005. The first riding 2-year-old was the 2007 crop which included 23 Streakers between weanings and 2-year-olds. There were a total of 66 horses on the sale that year. "We were still standing our Frenchmans Bullet stud and sold 7 head out of him," said Lisa. There was no sale in 2006, which was a good thing. "The weekend that we should have had a sale was the weekend that Brian had his first brain tumor, 9/11/2006. Fortunately we didn't have a sale." The sale continued for two more years in Kearney and then moved to Valentine, NE in 2009.

2010 was the last year Streaker stood in the north country, Ainsworth Vet Clinic with Dr Chris Finney 2004-2010, seven years. "We moved Streaker for Business reasons to Oklahoma where we thought more people could view him. We knew we had to get him in the horse mecca world," said Lisa. "The James Ranch stood A Streak Of Fling for five years and then the boys & I moved Streaker the year after Brian passed to High Point Performance Horses in Pilot Point, TX in July of 2016." 2013 A Streak Of Fling booked full for the first time. "We closely monitor the number of mares Streaker breeds each year. He is a very fertile stud and has been a plentiful producer. We will continue to breed him until he tells us it is time to retire."

"One day A Streak of Fling will come home to retire with us here at the ranch when he stops producing."

For now, he continues to prove his genetics with offspring taking contestants to the past six Wrangler National Finals Rodeos. "Breeding with brains, along with speed is obviously Streaker's game." concludes Lisa about Streaker. "I want to thank all the people that believed in us and had faith in us and Streaker when we first started standing him and all the breeders, buyers and trainers that continue to believe in Streaker. "The dream of a cowboy of finding the right type of stud to help bring more rodeo type horses into our part of the world are the reasons for Streaker's prominence in the Horse World."











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uker Carricato has spent his whole life in Saratoga, Wyoming; until last year. This sixth grader's quest for a championship in the mini bareback riding at the Junior National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas led his family all over the country – he got on 32 horses last year and won 22 of the events he entered. He and his parents (Trisha and Tony) traveled to eight states to get the job done.

His career as a mini bareback rider began by watching a video. His dad, Tony, was a bareback rider from Gunnison, Colorado, who competed in high school, National Little Britches, and college rodeoed in Cheyenne, Wyoming. "I didn't mind it because of the size of the horses, and the difference between me and Tuker is he's in shape and I learned the hard way." Tony bought Tuker his first riggin' and he started riding with his dad's advice. He got on his first mini bareback in Rock Springs, Wyoming, riding in the Winter Series put on by Casey Riggs, R and R Rodeo. His first ride was spent trying to think of everything his dad taught him. "I taught him how to hold his feet and how to lift - if they can't get that down, they will go over the front end. We started with the spur board and Tuker is a natural athlete and picked it up. He's very strong. Athletics and conditioning is a major part of this."


Tuker is used to athletics – he plays football, basketball, and wrestles. He also is very active in 4-H, showing sheep, goats, and cattle. He has five goats (boars) and still shows them. He ropes on the ranch all the time. "I don't have the horses to rope or the equipment to practice, but I would compete if I could." He also co-owner 20 Suffolk/ Hampshire cross sheep with his older brother, Chaze, that they breed for show lambs to show and sell. "I WANT TO BE A COWBOY WHEN I GROW UP, NOT MUCH ELSE. RODEO AND BE A WORLD CHAMPION BAREBACK RIDER."

His riding career took a huge leap forward when he met Kelly Timberman, World Champion Bareback Rider and 7x NFR qualifier, who now sponsors Tuker. "We pick who we sponsor based on criteria that includes a strong community involvement, grades, personality, and incentive to achieve goals," said the 2017 Mountain States Circuit Finals Bareback Champion. "When it







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comes to rodeo, they need to have the incentive to work to purchase their own equipment, travel expenses, etc. Tuker works that off himself - any kid that's willing to work to get his own equipment shows ambition." Kelly and his fiancé, Shannon Pearman, have started a program called Champions Go9-oh at their home in Casper, Wyoming. "We are teaching these kids how to be good men - never seeking mediocracy and going for their dreams. We help them go after them, setting up yearly goals and the building blocks of success." Tuker followed that to a tee – he took time on Sundays to travel to Casper – two and a half hours from his home - to practice. He sent videos to Kelly and asked for advice. "He's a young man that is very dedicated to his purpose and what he wants."

Tuker has learned a lot from Kelly. "He teaches me rodeo and stuff like that. He taught me how to respect people – being yourself and not being rude." Tuker's family owns Battle Pass Outfitting and Tuker helps spot and retrieve game with his mother. They hunt deer and elk in



the mountain range by the ranch where Tuker will spend time in the mornings and evenings looking through a spotting scope and will call his dad if he sees any. Tuker helps pack the archery elk hunters to the wilderness camp by horse back

where he helps load pack horses and takes his own string of horses in and out of camp. He can't wait until he is 18 so he can get a guides license and guide with his dad and oldest brother Chaze. Chaze graduated college from Western Dakota Tech in Rapid City, South Dakota, and Wyatt is a senior at Saratoga high school.

After his first ride in Wyoming, where he missed covering by .25 seconds, he kept getting better and progressing. "My mom researched where the rodeos were and we'd drive there." He bases his decision on where to go on payouts and entry fees and how far away they. "I have to pay for it – by my winnings." Tuker has his own checking account and he balances monthly his earnings to his expenses. "I save for entry fees and rodeos. I have two different accounts – one for rodeo








and one for fair." There were lots of long nights and when the family headed to a rodeo and they relied on family to do the chores at home. "My cousin or brother would stay home and take care of my animals." Tuker shows Maine Angus cross cattle. "They are popular and grow good." cool and dark.

As the year progressed, his riding continued to improve. "I had a goal to get there (Junior NFR); when I kept winning them all and doing good I kept going. I just practice - my mind and muscle memory." When Tuker found out the end of August he had made his way back to Vegas for the JR NFR, he checked his books and did some research where to get the best riding chaps, he had his dad call and make an appointment with Tim Bath to go pick out his colors so he would have brand new ones for Vegas. They match his new riggin that he had bought in June. He enjoyed his trip to Vegas for the Junior NFR. "It's warmer than here. There were lots of people and crowds and big." He would do it again and he plans to.

This year he is old enough to join the National Junior High Rodeo Association, competing in the bareback steer riding. He plans to continue all his sports, but admits that he would give them up for rodeo. "Rodeo makes me money and I like it better than the other sports," he said. "I want to be a cowboy when I grow up - not much else. Rodeo and be a world champion bareback rider."



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PROFILE: BRIDGER ANDERSON

ridger Anderson is getting a good start on his career rodeo resume. The Carrington, N.D. cowboy won the steer wrestling at Ote Berry's Junior Steer Wrestling World Championship, held at the Junior National Finals Rodeo (NFR) in Las Vegas in mid-December.

He's a North Dakota High School Rodeo champ, and he's secured two entries in the semifinals for the RFD-TV's The American.

Anderson, the son of Glenn and Robin Anderson, grew up riding. His dad trained horses and roped, his mom was a breakaway and team roper, and by the time he was six, he was tying goats and roping at youth rodeos.

His career progressed to junior high, then high school rodeo, winning the state steer wrestling title twice and the short go at the National High School Finals Rodeo in 2016. He also won the International Finals Youth Rodeo in Shawnee, Okla. in 2015.

Bridger graduated from Carrington (N.D.) High School in 2017 and is a freshman at Northwestern Oklahoma State University in Alva, under the guidance of rodeo coach Stockton Graves. Graves, a National Finals Rodeo qualifying bulldogger, has improved Bridger's skills. He's competed at four college rodeos last fall, placing at two of them, and he plans on being at the six spring rodeos. Alva (population 5,100) may not have a big social scene, but that's OK, Bridger says. "There's not a whole lot to do in Alva but steer wrestle so it works out pretty good." One of Bridger's classmates is another NFR qualifier, J.D. Struxness, and "it's good to have J.D. around there."

Last December was the first time steer wrestling was part of the Junior NFR, and Bridger qualified for it at two events: the Dupree (S.D.) Cinch Chute-Out last May, and the Melvin-Swanson-Halligan Memorial Steer Wrestling in Sutherland, Neb. in June. Fifty-two steer wrestlers, ages 19 and under, qualified for the Junior NFR, competing in two rounds. The top twenty made it to the short round. Anderson tied for first in the first round with a time of 4.3 seconds (along with Gabe Soileau and Clay Iselt), was 4.9 in the second round, and in the short round, had a time of 4.0 seconds. His average time of 13.2 was two-tenths of a second better than Marc Joiner of Loranger, La.

His win at the Junior NFR is an automatic qualification to the semi-finals for the American Rodeo, held Feb. 25 at AT&T Stadium in Arlington, Texas. The semi-finals for the American in the steer wrestling (each event is different) is in Alvarado, Tex-

as on February 20; the twenty fastest times from that event go on to compete at Cowtown Coliseum in Ft. Worth, Texas on Feb. 22-24 (along with other event qualifiers). From Cowtown, about five qualifiers in the steer wrestling will compete at the American, along with the invites: the top ten in the PRCA world standings from 2017.

The American allows steer wrestlers two qualifications, and Bridger earned his second qualification in Rapid City at the qualifier on December 17. Two qualifications double a cowboy's chance to make it to the American and compete for \$1 million. If he should make two qualifying runs, he would be allowed only one berth at the American.

Bridger credits a strong team in getting him where he is today. His mom and dad taught him horsemanship and roping, and another North Dakota bulldogger,

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


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Tyler Schau and his wife Jackie, helped get him going. "I'm kind of their adopted son," he said. Tyler and Jackie train horses, and every opportunity Bridger had, he was at their place at Almont, N.D., even though it was more than a two hour drive from Carrington to the Schaus.

The Schaus have known Bridger since he was twelve years old, and they love him. "He's a good kid, and fun to be around," Tyler said. As soon as he had his driver's license, Bridger would load up and spend a weekend, or during the summer, a week, at the Schaus.

He has what it takes to be a good bulldogger, Tyler said. Bridger wrestled since sixth grade, winning a state championship in 2015, and "that helps with his athletics. He has athletic ability, he's strong, and he's not afraid to get hurt. Those are three requirements for being a good steer wrestler."

He also knows how to work. "He ain't afraid to come over when it's fifteen degrees out and practice. There's not a lot of people willing to do that." The Schaus, who have an eleven year old daughter, help out other steer wrestlers. "If they call and want to practice, I do everything I can to make sure we're available."

Bridger is riding a horse purchased from the Schaus. Whiskers, a nine-year-old gelding, was raised and trained by Diamond S Performance Horses, the Schau's business. He's a bigger built horse, taller than most steer wrestling horses, which fits Bridger's style. "He's got a lot of power, and he's long strided. It looks like he's running slow, but he's covering more ground," Bridger said.

Whiskers "can power out of there," he said. "Some guys feel out of time with him and they think he's too tall. He runs hard, and I don't mind crawling off a few extra inches."

Whiskers, a former race horse, shouldn't be warmed up on a race track. "If you let him run and try to loosen him out, you might not get him stopped," Bridger said. "I've had to run him into a corner to get him to slow down. If somebody else is warming him up, I don't let them open him on the track."

Whiskers is also independent-minded. "He likes to do his own thing. He likes to irritate you. He'll step on your foot when he's cinched up or run into you." But Bridger can live with his quirks, because he's good. "I think he knows that (he's a winner) and he uses it to his advantage."

When he was three years old, as he watched the NFR on television with his parents, Bridger announced to his mom that he wanted to be a steer wrestler when he grew up. Advancing from high school, to college, the amateurs, and now professional rodeo is a big step. Bridger has had his PRCA card since the fall of 2016. "College rodeo is glorified high school (rodeo.) But pro rodeo is another level," he said. "You can go to college rodeos, make a few mistakes, and get by. At pro rodeos, they don't pay any money if you make a mistake. It's another level." In Livingston, Montana last July, Bridger made a 4.3 second run, "and they threw rocks at me," he joked. "You had to be 3.9 there to place."

His ultimate goal is to make the NFR, and he's realistic about what it takes. "You have to sacrifice everything to focus on one task at hand, and that's rodeoing and winning enough to make the NFR."

Part of pro rodeo is learning how and what rodeos to enter. Bridger rodeos with Tyler and Jackie, who have helped him sharpen his mental game and stay healthy. He's also relied on world champion Luke Branquinho and his rodeo coach Graves. Being confident is a big part of rodeo. "It's huge to move from high school to amateur to pro rodeo and not let that intimidate you. It's intimidating to bulldog against guys who have rodeoed for twenty years and have been to the NFR. But you have to surround yourself with those guys to get better."

He also has Plan B. He'll graduate in 2021 with a degree in ag business, and as of now, he plans on getting his college degree. "If I don't, I won't go back and get it. I think going to school is something I should do. You never know what will happen in this sport. Hopefully I won't need a backup plan, but if I do, it'll be good to have one."

Bridger has two younger sisters: Cedar, a senior in high school and a high school rodeo athlete, and Dawsyn, an eighth grade student.

Tom Miller

rom competing in college rodeo, to the PRCA, to becoming a judge and a coach, Tom Miller has left his mark on the rodeo world. Excelling in both ends of the arena, Tom led a rodeo team at Black Hills State University that dominated the National Intercollegiate in the 1970s, winning All Around Champion in 1970 and 1971. Tom was also the Badlands Circuit Saddle Bronc Champion in 1979 and 1980. Tom qualified for the NFR six times and shares the record for most saddle bronc average titles.

Tom was recently inducted into the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum Rodeo Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City. His friend and 1974 world champion saddle bronc rider, John McBeth nominated him. "Tom is of the quality of bronc rider that should be in there. He is world championship quality - in fact - one year he lost it by \$5.28 - 1981. Everything about Tom is outstanding, from ranching to judging - he has his principles and he holds to them."

Born in Rapid City, South Dakota, on December 27, 1948, Tom was raised 100 miles from there on a ranch in between Faith and Red Owl, that his dad (JP Miller – Bub) put together. "I was born before the blizzard of 1949 – it took two weeks for them to get me home," he said. His dad roped calves, but Tom and his older brother, John, never competed until high school. "We stayed home and worked – when we quit in the evening, we would rope. Nobody competed much in youth rodeos back then - there wasn't

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the activities going on for the youth like there is now." His mother (Patsy) didn't want him riding broncs or bulls so he rode bareback until his junior year in high school. "My folks had gone to Texas and I snuck off to ride a bronc – it was easy. I didn't get on a bull until I started college." He learned from the hired man until he met John McBeth. "I was riding broncs pretty good but I didn't think I was riding them right. So I called John and went to his school. He put me on 16 head in two days and it turned me around. It got me




doing things I didn't know I could do. John is a great teacher."

He went to Black Hills State University where he competed in every event. "My dad let me take one horse, so I had to do all the events on that horse." He studied education. "My dad gave me a choice when I got out of college – after I won the NIRA All Around

for the World – he said – 'are you going to rodeo or are you going to come home.'

He said if I was going to rodeo, he was going to sell the place. I went home for three years. I felt like I had to go try it." He made a deal with his dad. "He said:

looking like it was going to break me, so I stuck with bronc riding."

When Tom won the average at the finals the first year, his dad was in the arena and said 'You can't quit now can you?' "I'd spend falls at home and calving in March and April." He met his wife, Vivian, at a match bronc riding in Texas. He met her again in Fort Worth at a rodeo. "She had a boy's saddle from South Dakota that she thought he needed it that night. There was only two or three of us there yet – I'd flown in – and she gave me his saddle." in the chute. "I thought the screw heads were going to come through my leg," Tom said. "I was at the age — I was getting into my upper 30s — where it's hard to get it back; it took a long time to get over that injury."

He focused his attention on his ranch,

as; he built a boulevard, library and built on to the Methodist Church," explains Tom. "My grand dad took over management of that ranch at 18. When my dad got out of World War II, he went to South Dakota to find that best cow country.

"I always felt like I had so many big shoes to fill," said Tom about his family. "My dad flew over the signing of the treaty of WWII – he didn't tell me that – he flew and was the youngest one in his crew." He passed away at the age of 85. "The day before, I called him and told him we needed some more cows in Texas.



Three years later they were married.

He continued rodeoing, making the finals three more times after their marriage. He was the Badlands Circuit Saddle Bronc champion from 1977 to 1980. He qualified for the National Finals Rodeos six times, and won the average in 1975, 1979 and 1981, coming up short of winning the world title in 1981 by \$5.28. He was able to hit multiple rodeos in one weekend due to his traveling partners, Johnny Morris, a bareback rider, and Bobby Brown, a bronc rider, who also had a plane and flew Tom to many rodeos.

Tom broke his leg one fall riding a good horse – doctoring yearlings. "He rolled over me and broke my leg in 1982. I didn't get on one after that. I was in a cast for quite a while – all winter actually. The screws in my leg made it hard to ride again." Johnny Holloway, who he worked with for years putting on bronc schools, invited him to a match bronc riding the next year, and one horse laid on his leg



his family; two boys – Jeff and Ryan – and his judging, which included judging five National Finals Rodeos. "When I started judging, there weren't any judging schools. They started them shortly after that and it's a good thing. Really familiarize yourself with the rules." He served on the Rules committee, requested to do so by Shawn Davis.

His priorities shifted again the past couple years, and he has stayed close to the ranch. "My great great granddad came over as an immigrant from Germany - he kept a diary every day. He said the best cow country was in South Dakota – Western South Dakota. He put together 168,000 acres in Coleman County in TexI asked him if he could go and check out some cows for me. He said how about if I sell you my cows. And he knew exactly what they were worth. He died the next day. He was sharp as a tack."

Tom has carried on that legacy, priding himself in raising good cows and horses. He has been inducted in the Black Hills State University Rodeo Hall of Fame and the Casey Tibbs Foundation. He wants to be remembered as kind and considerate; a good horseman, and a good cowman. "The rodeo part of the deal –I'm getting honored for something I was going to do anyway. My roots are in the cow business and I'd hope to be remembered as one of the better cowboys in our country."



CHAMPION AMBERLEIGH MOORE

he state of Oregon boasts timber, agriculture, 360-plus miles of coastline - and Amberleigh Moore, a two-time WNFR qualifier who started her rodeo career just four years ago. The 49-year-old barrel racer from Keizer, Oregon, has raised and trained futurity colts all her life, but bided her time when it came to rodeo. "It takes that one special one (horse) to put you over the top to go rodeo, otherwise, I said I would never do it. It's no fun to donate,' Amber explains. "Paige was that one. She has the talent, the drive, and she's a perfectionist. The older she gets, the smarter she gets and the more she's thinking. In Vegas, she was overthinking, but at the same time, we won \$120,000 and placed in 6 rounds."

Amber won Rookie of the Year in the Columbia River Circuit in 2015, her first year rodeoing, then planned to use her second year to build up for a run at qualifying for the 2017 WNFR. Instead, she and Paige made a clean sweep that summer and landed in the number 15 spot for the 2016 WNFR. "It gets people's attention when you come out of nowhere. The rodeo world didn't know who we were." Amber's whirlwind of achievements, paired with her determination and work ethic, caught the attention of 5 Star Equine Products. Already a longtime fan of their saddle pads, Amber was invited onto the 5 Star Team. "I want to thank 5 Star and their amazing family. We do a lot of signings for them when we're down in Vegas, and last year I did an infomercial for them and advertising in magazines. I really like their saddle pads because of how well they fit and conform to the horses' backs."

Amber went into the 2017 WNFR ranked fourth in the world and held fast,



winning three rounds and placing in two others. She hauled three horses down - CP Dark Moon (Paige), Junos Royal Flush (Jen), and a horse for grand entry. "This year was good. There were a lot of ups and downs with the way the ground was very inconsistent for the horses and for me, but I was more confident and knew how to go with the flow. There's a lot more than just running every night that's the easy part. Every year is a new challenge, and my biggest goal was coming out of Vegas in the top six so I could go back to Calgary. When I won round eight, which was Canadian night, that was a very important win because it gave me enough money to make it back to Calgary. I love running with that place completely packed. It's nostalgic, and it's definitely a big thing because it's invite only."

Amber is starting out the new season in Fort Worth, Texas, like she has the last three years. "I spend close to eight weeks down there, and once I'm done there, I'm home. If I can get enough done in my two months in Texas, then I come home to rodeo, and that makes it a lot easier." Amber is also entering the Diamonds and Dirt Barrel Horse Classic in March with Jules, who is one of her 4-year-olds and her backup horse for the season. "I will do all the Northwest futurities and Idaho futurities this year. This is the first colt I've had in a few years. I have two 4-year-olds, two 3-year-olds, and a 2-year-old coming up. They're all ones I've raised. The babies go with me on the road, so they're always getting ridden or trained, and they're out Amberleigh Moore - Hubbell

there being exposed. Jules is only 4, but she's been in Houston, Calgary, and morning practice at the NFR. You can't buy that experience for a 4-year-old. That's how Paige became Paige, because she went everywhere with the older horses."

Spare time is automatically put back into her family and barrel racing. Amber used her two months of downtime before the WNFR to work on her custom tack business, AKM Originals, or she watches videos of her runs. "I'm one of those people who goes back to study things. I'll watch last year's videos of arenas to see what the setup was then, and the places I've never been, I'll YouTube them to see a setup." Amber and her husband, Paul, also own a family business, Emerald Outdoor Living, selling everything from pools and spas to patio furniture and fireplaces. Their 26-year-old daughter, Keirstin, works there and enjoys traveling with Amber, and riding or entering gymkhanas.

"We'll just see what we can get done again this year," says Amber. "My motivation is always to run one at a time. You can't let yesterday get to you - that one run does not affect your life as a whole. There's a quote, 'Barrel racing is not who we are, it's what we do,' so you can't let that run eat you up, because it doesn't matter in the bigger picture. Being 49 and having horses all my life, that's something that comes with age - you have to earn that." **\F**

lake Andis blazed new trails in his rodeo career during the 2017 season when he qualified for the NLBFR in Guthrie, Oklahoma, followed by the All American Quarter Horse Congress in Columbus, Ohio. The 16-year-old who hails from Albion, Indiana, won the youth division calf roping at Congress and placed fourth in the breakaway roping astride his horse Cowboys Reyboon 820, better known as Rambo. "That was my first time there, and I really just went out and roped and showed off my horse," says Blake, who took home a bronze trophy. Earlier in the year, he competed at the NLBFR in tie-down roping, as well as team roping with heeler Mia Miller. He also enters the dally ribbon roping, though calf roping is his favorite. "I like the challenge and the fact that you have to have teamwork with your horse, and I like the competition."

Blake picked up a rope for the first time about six years ago and rapidly built loops and confidence after he started taking lessons. He and his 10-year-old sister. Brooke, are the first in their family to rodeo, supported wholeheartedly by their parents, Mark and Julie Andis. Brooke also qualified for the 2017 NLBFR and competes in barrel racing, pole bending, breakaway roping, and goat tying. The brother and sister take turns practicing on the heading dummy and the calf dummy, while they have a small indoor arena to ride in at home. "Jim McCartney is the closest person to us that has an indoor arena and cattle, and he's two and a half hours away," Blake explains. "He's helped me with my calf horse, and Cory Griffith is a roper who helps me out as well."

Along with the NLBRA, Blake competes in the Midwest Youth Rodeo Association and the Michigan High School

Rodeo Association, though he takes a short break in the winter between seasons. "We're about an hour and a half from Michigan. Most of the rodeos are rainy, but we have a lot of IPRA rodeos here. The competition and the challenge that rodeo gives me motivates me, and the fact that I have friends I can rely on if I need anything. I'm just trying to become better and correct my mistakes and move forward."

Rambo, who took Blake to the All American Quarter Horse Congress, is a bay gelding, while Blake rides his red roan, Roaney, in team roping, and borrows his sister's Paint mare, Cowgirl, for ribbon roping. "I've worked with my bay horse some just touching him up, but he knew what he was doing when we got him," says Blake. When he's not with his horses, Blake enjoys hunting in the fall and fishing in the summer. The largest deer he's shot was a five-point buck during bow season, though shotgun season is his favorite.

Blake also stays busy as a sophomore at Smith Green Community School. He particularly likes geometry and Ag. class, then heads home to take care of animals and practice. His main goals for the year are to qualify for the NHSFR and improve his calf roping, along with returning to the roping box of the Lazy E Arena for the 2018 NLBFR.

must be on the contestant's head when crossing the plane of the in-gate. The contestant will be disqualified if hat is not on when the in-gate is crossed.

• Page 39 Article III, Section 5, Paragraph E. Stallions may be used in Little Britches competition and at Little Britches National Finals Rodeo by contestants in the Senior Division and only after being evaluated by a judge for temperament. This evaluation would occur each membership year. If a judge feels the stallion is out of line and should not be allowed in the competitive arena, i.e. if he is very aggressive or not able to be kept under control by handler or member; the member would then not be allowed to compete on the stallion; another evaluation would be performed before the stallion could be used in competition at the members next rodeo. It would be the member's responsibility to make sure this evaluation is performed or he/she would be disqualified. Mares with foal at their side would not be allowed for use

during a Little Britches competition.

• Article V, Page 75, Paragraph B-2. Each contestant may enter (two) 2 times per rodeo, 1 as a header, 1 as a healer.

• Article VI, Page 10 Section 1 Paragraph C. There shall not be more than 2 (two) Executive board members and/or Youth Board members serving at one time from any 1 (one) Rodeo and/or Rodeo Franchise, and/or Franchise Rodeo and/or Franchise. If an error is made during elections of either the Executive Board or Youth Board, which has contributed to the election of more than 2 (two) Executive Board/Youth Board members being elected, the last individual(s) elected will be removed and an alternate will be seated in their place.

• Article III, Page 39, Paragraph B. Hat must be on contestant's head when his/her horse crosses the plane of the arena. The arena is defined by the threshold where if a parent crosses this plane the contestant will be disqualified. If the hat is not on the contestant's head at this point they will be disqualified.

• Article V, Page 75, Paragraph B. Reword to: A team may consist of 1(one) boy and 1 (one) girl, 2 (two) boys or 2 (two) girls. Contestants must indicate partner or request a partner to be drawn for them on entry forms. Contestant may enter only 1 (one) time per rodeo with the partner of his or her choice. However, a team roping contestant with no partner may request a partner be supplied as a drawn partner from a list of contestants entered in the team roping. The draw partner will be drawn immediately after the stock draw by at least one judge or certified director. No points will count for the draw partner.

Meet the Member Amanda Terrell

manda Terrell has been riding horses since she could throw a leg over one-with or without the help of her parents - and at 16, that's a few years in the saddle. Growing up in La-Salle, Colorado, with her Dad and Mom (Dirt and Sherry) and her older sister (Ashley), Amanda spent her younger years competing in local youth rodeos alongside her sister, and joined the CJRA when she was about 10. "I started in the Junior Girls division and entered a couple events, and have now worked my way up to every event offered. My sister and I would share horses most of the time - and still do on occasion. We had a lot of fun and I learned at an early age the thrill of riding fast horses and the drive of competition!"

Amanda's parents have been a great support system for her. Both with agricultural backgrounds and Dirt having grown up in rodeo has helped a great deal in and out of the arena. "My folks drive me everywhere for the rodeos, help with practicing, the horses, and encourage me to do my best in everything at all times," said Amanda.

Finishing the 2017 CJRA season as 4th All-Around Senior Girl, Amanda competed in all the events and placed 1st in ribbon roping with partner Zaine Mikita; 3rd in poles, 4th in goat tying, and even managed to place a few times in mixed team roping. "It wasn't the finals I had hoped for, but it didn't disappoint". Her favorite event is breakaway. "When you're doing good you want to keep going, and when you do bad you know you can always do better! It is a quick event that doesn't give you much time for errors." said Amanda. "I just started team roping last year. I borrowed a horse from Chase Atkinson and made it to the finals. I'm still working on my consistency with that event, so we'll see how it goes this year." In poles Amanda was able to ride one

"My eighth grade year at CJHRA state finals, my horse got hurt right before the second round, and Odle's told me to get on Rooty – and I ended up winning the average that year. They also let me ride her the next year and I won the pole bending state championship for CSH-SRA as well as the Rookie of the Year. She's an awesome horse and I can't thank them enough for letting me use her."

As for other sports, Amanda played volleyball and basketball, but she opted to put more time into her rodeo events when she started High School. As a sophomore at Platte Valley High School in Kersey, Colorado, Amanda takes her academics very seriously. "I keep school a priority - I am a member in FFA and maintain a 4.0 GPA. I always find time to practice for my rodeo events, however. During the summer it's pretty easy, but the rest of the year becomes a little challenging with school and daylight hours. Managing my time and staying up on my school work helps. I ride and/or practice as soon as I get home from school and do my homework after dark."

Although college is two and a half years out, Amanda has it on her mind. "I would like to go down south for college and continue my rodeo career. I am interested in some of the new technologies in the equine therapy industry, so I'm looking towards that direction for my education."

When asked about mentors in her life, Amanda looks to her Grandpa Butch. "He had a double lung transplant a couple of years ago and still ropes in the Senior Pro rodeos. He maintains a ranch in Wheatland, spends the winters in Arizona, and overall has a great outlook on life." The CJRA has also been great to her family. "The members are so helpful and supportive of each other. I remember looking up to the older girls when I first started and all the help they had given me, and now being that older girl, I hope to make a difference in those younger kids. It is a good feeling and I am grateful to be part of that family."

As for the 2018 rodeo season, Amanda is looking forward to getting back in the arena. She will compete at CSHSRA as well as CJRA. "I have had a lot of horse changes this year so it will be a bit of trial and error, but I am hoping to be able to work on my horses and come back strong in my events," she stated. "God has blessed me abundantly and I am excited to work towards my goals for 2018."

When the Wards learned about the scholarship opportunities available in rodeo, Loralee started competing. "It's just the love of the sport and the love for the horses. Even when it's extremely cold out and you're tired and you don't want to get out of bed, you still have to do that. The horses have to be in shape. If you want to be the best, you have to train like the best."

When Loralee started barrel racing, a friend of the family knew Fallon Taylor and suggested Loralee take lessons from her. Eventually, Loralee started working in Fallon's warehouse and rode several sale horses for her. Their bond was truly formed when Fallon offered to let Loralee ride one of her horses at a barrel race in Georgia, which Loralee couldn't get her own horses to. True Identity, or True, carried Fallon to the 1995 NFR, where they were reserve world champions in the average and sixth in the world. The gelding, now 27, holds

several arena records around the country and is currently helping Loralee build her career. "Running Fallon's horse is a huge honor. He's such a cool horse, and he loves his job. At the larger events, the announcers always do an introduction for him, and he won't go into the alleyway until they're done." Loralee also rides her 19-year-old Paint gelding, Go Bar McCue, or Magic, in barrels and poles, and she used last year to season her 11-year-old barrel horse, Tequilas Gato Roho, or Tiki.

While Loralee does her best to ride through the winter and practice at her uncle's indoor arena, she's taken a few weeks off in December the last two years to promote her business during the WNFR in Las Vegas. "I was fortunate enough to have my merchandise at Fallon's booth." says Loralee, who started her business in the summer of 2016. "I was a total headband junky, and everyone in Fallon's peer group has a business, so I thought I'd start a headband business. It's a lot of work, but I enjoy it, and getting to design things is a lot of fun. The coolest part is seeing my headbands on other people. At the NFR in the Thomas and Mack, someone five rows in front of me had my headband on. It was definitely a big moment!" Loralee designs all of her nonslip headbands and works with a manufacturer. She's also branching into apparel, earrings, halters, and DVDs, and she's even designing online courses on achieving goals and attracting sponsors.

Loralee often spends one to two hours each evening working on her website shopmac10.com—emails, and orders, and does her school in the morning and after-

noon. This is her second year of homeschooling. "I wouldn't say it's easy, it's just more flexible. I'm in seventh grade, and math is probably my favorite, because there's always an answer, and I can apply math to other things outside of school." Her brother, Kody, is a freshman at Holy Family High School, and competes in team penning and ranch sorting with their dad. Loralee still enjoys the ranch sorting and team penning, along with skiing, hunting, and catching up on sleep.

"I'd like to thank my sponsors, family, and friends, because literally none of this would be possible without them," she finishes. "For junior high rodeo, I'd like to make it to Nationals, and I want to continue to go to bigger barrel races like BBR and Elite Events. I have a new horse that can do it, I just need to get with him, but further down the line I'd like to qualify for The American."

lyde Bolejack and Chase Atkinson are ranked first in the CSH-SRA team roping standings with 32 points separating them from second place. The two friends have grown up and backed into the roping box together the last five or six years, and their teamwork spoke for itself when they won state in 2016 and placed seventh in the nation at the NHSFR. "It's a big-time family oriented deal," says 16-year-old Clyde, the heeler from Elbert, Colorado. "I've always liked rodeo, and I like the people and the friends and the competition. It's a good atmosphere."

Along with team roping, Clyde enjoys tie-down roping, which he'll return to this spring after recovering from shoulder surgery. He dislocated his left shoulder playing basketball and put the surgery






off until the 2017 rodeo season finished, though it meant sitting out of basketball and tie-down roping. "The doctor says I'll be 100% by March, and we have rodeos in the middle of March," says Clyde. He also competes in the CJRA, entering the mixed team roping with Graycee Lay. "Team roping is my favorite. It's something that's always come to me kind of naturally, and it's always been fun. I look up to my mom and dad and brother, and Dale Atkinson. My dad and brother taught me how to rope. I haul to a lot of rodeos with Dale, and he's

a high-number heeler, so he knows what he's doing. If we're on the road and I fall into a slump, he fixes it. Chase and his family are like my second family."

Clyde's parents, Diamond and Paula, and his brother and sister, Caleb and Shawna, make up his immediate family. The Bolejacks make their home near Elbert and run 100 head of cattle. "That's pretty much all I do is rodeo and ranching," says

Clyde. "Whatever needs done, I fill in. Having to gather cows when it's bitter cold, I always hate that, and I don't really care for cleaning out the calving barn," he admits with a laugh. "But I lucked out of that the last few years going from the IFYR straight to Nationals. I like being gone for those rodeos, but I'm glad to be home." Clyde competed in the Best of the Best Timed Event Rodeo in Gallup, New Mexico, where he won second in the team roping in 2016, and he attributes much of his success to his 11-year-old gelding, Roanie. The horse nearly didn't get to keep his home with the Bolejacks because of his flighty temperament, but just when the family was ready to sell him, Clyde started working with the horse and training him, and the two forged a strong bond. "You name it and I've won everything on that horse. He's a pretty good one. When I was at Nationals, Shav Carroll told me he was a very nice horse, and he rides one of the best horses in the business!" Clyde also does ranch work on Roanie and enjoys riding colts, while he has a 4-year-old rope horse, Voodoo, he's working with. "He has a good mind, and I look forward to this year on him."

A junior at Elbert Junior/Senior High School, Clyde enjoys his industrial arts classes. "At the beginning of the year we made bird houses, and I just finished a blanket chest and the next project is a cutting board. We got a new school four years ago, and me and one of my classmates are making a display case for the shovels that dug the first holes." Clyde is missing basketball this year because of his shoulder, especially since he played on the Varsity team the last two years, but he's looking forward to his senior year of sports. "Since this is Chase's senior year, we would like to win state again," he finishes. "That's our goal for this year, and going to Nationals again and doing some good there." Clyde also extends his thanks to his spon-

Meet the Member Harry Ash

difference of hemispheres is no match for a cowboy's dedication to his craft, especially in the case of Harry Ash, a native of Bowral, New South Wales in Australia. The 23 year old first came to the United States three years ago on a rodeo scholarship to Odessa College in Texas, thanks to his rodeo coach, CJ Aragon. This past year was the first time Harry was able to stay and rodeo during summer break. Drawn to Colorado by his aunt and a friend, he joined the CPRA and competed on the PRCA Mountain States Circuit. "Australia doesn't have any sort of college rodeoing, and that's what's really driven me over there (to America) — more competition and trying to better myself."

Harry won 2017 CPRA Bareback Rookie of the Year and rode the highpoint ride of the weekend during the finals, where he won the second round and finished third in the average. "I really liked the rodeos up there. I'm not 100 percent sure where I'll be next summer, but I'm thinking of coming up there again and doing some of the CPRA rodeos. I really liked their finals. I thought they were put together nice, and I thought Colorado Springs was an awesome spot to have the finals. I like it up in Colorado — it's like driving around in a movie set."

Harry is the first in his family to rodeo, and he originally tried his hand at steer riding in local shows, followed by bull riding a few years later. He found his niche in rodeo about four years ago. "I always wanted to try bareback riding. One of my friends had a bareback rigging, and I went to watch him ride,"





Harry recalls. "He was getting on a practice horse, and he fell and snapped his arm. They still had a couple horses they'd brought up for him to ride, and I thought how I'd always wanted to try it, so I did." Harry's friend later sold him all his bareback riding gear, and with the help of Jason Bazant, a pickup man, Harry had the opportunity to practice and start rodeoing in Australia. "I probably wouldn't have kept going with it if I didn't have help from him. I'm not very good at sitting still and I like a bit of an adrenaline rush, and rodeo kind of checks those boxes for me. It's awesome getting over into America, the places you see and the people you meet, and I love all aspects of it, really."

His first two years of college rodeo, Harry worked through several injuries that sidelined him, but he says being smarter about what practice horses he got on finally made the difference. Presently, he's sitting tenth in the NIRA Southwest Region. "The season started off good, and

then out of five college rodeos I had four re-rides, so this spring I should hopefully put together something nice and make up for it." Harry is working on a degree in welding from Odessa College, and he's a certified retail butcher after completing a three-year apprenticeship in Australia. He went home to Australia for Christmas break, and his family flies over occasionally to watch him compete. "Rodeo was all kind of new to them, and my mom wasn't too excited with me trying to ride bulls, but they've gotten into it now and they like coming to watch."

Harry also enjoys fishing and seeing friends, but it's more likely he's at a rodeo. "My goal is to make the college finals," he finishes. "I'd like to do some CPRA rodeos again and win the bareback title in that, and make the Mountain States Circuit Finals."

He's gone to the NHSFR twice and was the state steer wrestling champion in 2015, followed by winning a pickup in 2016 for clinching the Sheridan Elk Youth Rodeo All-Around Cowboy title. "Rodeo has been in the family for years on both sides, and my dad's family used to put on rodeos (Spearfish Rodeo Co.) and they had all the stock. My family owns a ranch, so the western way of life is the way I was brought up."

Tanner, 18, lives near Alzada, Montana, 1 mile from the Wyoming state line, and 3 miles from the South Dakota state line. He practices on weekends in the winter since he plays basketball during the week. He and his team roping partner, header Weston Mills, just started roping together this season, while Tanner also competes in tie-down roping. "I like that roping is something that doesn't just come; it's something you have to practice and work for and devote your life to. I like practicing all the time and seeing that pay off. Steer wrestling is a very physical sport and it's especially what my dad's side of the family did, so I have a lot of good teachers I can learn from. It's a lot of fun and a really big adrenaline rush, and my dad hazes for me. My family has pretty much taught me everything I know."





Tanner is the youngest of five. His parents are Tim and Terri Raye, and two of his siblings, Brent and Kelsie, along with Kelsie's husband, Colt, live on the family ranch. Their sisters Mackenzie and Kayla, live close by. "They all still rodeo and rope, so we have a pretty good group to rope with," says Tanner. "We raise all our own roping and bulldogging cattle, and right now we're running about 900 head of mama cows. My dad started the ranch." Tanner is right there with his family running the ranch, and he personally runs 50 head of sheep that he sells to 4-H and FFA members. He shows sheep. cattle, and pigs in 4-H in Montana, but does livestock judging for FFA at state conventions in Wyoming. The McInerneys are also avid hunters and even guide other hunters on their ranch, and they always make a point to spend a weekend at the lake every summer.

On the horse side, Tanner rides a 9-year-old gelding, Whiskey, in the tiedown roping. The family bought him as a yearling and trained him for team roping before he became Tanner's number-one calf horse. "Snort is a gelding that I heel on, and I just bought him last year from

a guy in South Dakota. He's 17 years old and just a solid horse who's been everywhere and done everything. The bulldogging horse I'm on right now, Fancy, is one my sister bought off the track as a twoyear-old for a barrel prospect. I bought her from my sister to try steer wrestling on her, and a year and a half ago she really took a liking to it."

After he graduates from Hulett High School this spring, Tanner plans to attend college and college rodeo. He's especially enjoyed welding in Ag. shop this year, where he recently built a cattle loading chute. "I'd like to get some kind of degree in the agricultural field. I think it's every kid's dream to go to the NFR someday, and then I'd like to have my own ranch someday."

KK Run for Vegas

Meet the Member Jordan Morman

un your race" is Jordan Morman's motto, a phrase her dad often reminds her of at the alleyway, and the cowgirl from Gillette, Wyoming, did just that to clinch the 2017 Junior NFR Senior World Barrel Racing Champion title. "I just had to remember to keep my head on straight. Even though it's Vegas, it's just another barrel race," says Jordan, who just turned 13 but started rodeoing when she was 7. "The first day I ran, the nerves got the best of me, but I knew if I could compete on my lowest day and still get sixth. I could still do better." Jordan placed fifth in the second round, which put her second in the average, then worked on her mental game before advancing to the short-go, where she ran a 13.444 — the fastest time of the week — to win it. She returned home with an Exiss trailer - her first one officially in her name — a Circle Y trophy saddle, Rockstar Custom Leather breast collar and headstall, \$8,200, her shortgo and world champion buckles, a Louis Vuitton bag from Vintage Boho, and the experience of a lifetime. "I've worn my world buckle a few times, but the shortgo is the one I'll hang up. It's really special, because that's the symbol that I put my nerves behind me."

Although there was a KK Run for Vegas qualifier in Jordan's hometown of Gillette, which she competed in and won, Jordan and her parents, Buddy and Monica Morman, decided to go to an earlier qualifier six hours away in Loveland, Colorado, where she won second and qualified for the Junior NFR. "That was stressful on the horses because some of them don't travel very well. Going to Vegas, we had Polylast floors for them, Soft-Ride Boots and Back On Track blankets, and Bigeloil to draw out inflammation. I took Remi, and Friendly was my backup horse because I know him and he's pretty sturdy." Remi will also carry Jordan to The Ameri-







can Semi-Finals in February. The pair qualified for the Semi-Finals in August in Salina, Utah, just before Jordan went back to school. "We're still in pretty good shape from the Junior NFR, but I'm thinking of sending Remi to Texas to work with her trainer, and previous owner, Lauren Kelly, while I catch up on some school work."

Jordan bought Remi, or Frenchmansfancypants, her 8-year-old black mare by Frenchmans Six Dash and Canta Little Joan, just over a year ago. Hippie was her first horse after learning to ride on her dad's old rope horse, followed by Friendly. The

Mormans also have two colts, a yearling, a 2-year-old, and another on the way. "We bought a filly colt from Kenny Nichols who is an own daughter of Dash Ta Fame, and I'm hoping she'll turn into a barrel horse." Since Jordan also competes in the NLBRA, NWBRA, BBR, and junior high rodeo, she practices through the winter. "If it's cold, I have to suck it up and put warm pants on and go to the outdoor arena or rent the local barn. You have to sacrifice the little things, like being warm and cozy in your bed, for the bigger things like the Junior NFR and The American Semi-Finals. So you have to look at the bigger picture."

School is also a big part of the picture, and Jordan, a seventh-grader at Twin Spruce Junior High, rodeos so long as she can maintain her 4.0 GPA. She's especially focused on Algebra this semester, and continues to take piano lessons. "I used to dance and play baseball and soccer, but I quit those around the same time I quit hockey, because I couldn't go to rodeos and miss games or recitals. Rodeo is definitely worth it, and it's definitely my calling. I'm more connected to my horse than any other teammate — Remi is my other half."

Jordan quit playing hockey when she was 9, but her brothers, Rowdy (15) and Ryder (10), still play, and their younger brother, Raylan (4) is just learning to skate. Rowdy and Ryder have the rodeo bug too. Jordan's dad, who steer wrestled and rode broncs in college, often hauls her to rodeos, while her mom and grandma take the boys to the hockey games. Jordan has also hauled with professional barrel racer Cassidy Kruse, who took Jordan for her first ride on a barrel horse when Jordan was 4. "My parents know her parents since Cassidy used to live in the same town as us, and I love the way she rides. Just this last May, she and I hauled together to the Red Desert Classic. When she went to the NFR in 2015, we flew down to go watch her and cheer her on."

Between rodeos, Jordan enjoys reading, going to her brothers' hockey games, snowboarding, and having family dinners. Her grandma's recipe for chicken casserole is a favorite. "I like spending time with my horses, even if it doesn't revolve around rodeo or barrel racing. My goal for

The American Semi-Finals is to go there and leave a mark on the rodeo." Jordan also qualified for the NLBFR and NJHFR last year and hopes to return this summer. She's sitting first in the BBR 1D for the Mountain States and plans to run in the World Finals this spring. "My goal is to make it to The American Finals, but even if I don't, I just hope to place well."



KYLAR TERLIP

[Three-time Josey Junior World Champion]

ylar Terlip of Frontenac, Kansas, is a three-time Josey Junior World Champion. Her most recent titles came back to back in 2016 and 2017, along with the 2017 Josey Junior World Reserve Champion title won astride Guys Cashn In "Cash". The 17-year-old is aiming for her fourth title this year to tie the record of most Josey Junior World titles won, currently held by Josey Ranch instructor and decorated horseman, Ty Mitchell. "I definitely didn't go in expecting to win it, but I knew I had a shot because I'd won it the previous year," says Kylar. "It was weird, because both years I hit a barrel in the first round and came back in the third round third from the end. My horse (Guys Voodoo Bug "Jock") is really consistent, and he's always there for me when I need him. He really seems to like that pen — I've only taken him there twice, and both times we've won it!"

Kylar's parents, Kaleb Terlip and Karin Nielsen, were involved with either horses or rodeo growing up, and Kylar took to chasing cans by the time she was 7. Soon after, she went to a Martha Josey clinic, and entered her first Josev Junior World in 2008. Her first world title followed in 2012. "I really like Josey's because that's one of the only races I go to all year that's just youth," says Kylar, who junior rodeoed a handful of years before focusing solely on the barrel racing world. "It's very positive there, and they always have clinicians at the Josey Junior World, so when we run, they're always cheering for us. One of my favorite things about Josey's is the church service on Sunday before the race. Martha always talks and she has witty comments. It doesn't matter if you're in the 5D or you're winning it, they want people to have a good time."

While Kylar ran a 15.9 to win the Josey world title last summer, her personal best in a smaller pen is closer to a 13.8 or 13.9,



which she ran at the historic Fort Worth Stockyards. This is her third time qualifying for The American Semi-Finals, but her first time doing it on two horses — Guys Voodoo Bug and Wrangler Biankus. "Last year I was 31st, and they take 30, so that was heartbreaking, but we are going to try again this year."



Kylar enters very few barrel races in her home state, traveling instead to Oklahoma and Texas while still keeping up with school. A senior at Frontenac High School, she's also taking several college-level classes, and especially enjoys her reading and college English classes. "Most of the people who go as much as I do are homeschooled. I spend on average - when I have all four of my horses going — three to three-and-a-half hours at the barn every day. It takes a lot of time, but it's worth it. We don't have an indoor arena, just a dirt spot in the pasture, but since most of my horses are older, I don't have to tune on them much. When we purchase a horse, that's something we take into consideration." Kylar has four main barrel horses, including her newest addition since last May, Docs Hickory Cross. Guys Voodoo Bug and Guys Cashn In are both by Myers

Performance Horses' Frenchmans Guy, and it's Kylar's horses who motivate her the most. "Unlike other sports, if you're having a bad day, another player can pick up the slack, but it's not like that with horses. You always have to be on your game, and they give you all they have. The person gets the recognition when we win, not the horse. They're really selfless animals."

Family also plays a huge role in Kylar's barrel racing career. With six younger siblings ranging from ages 1–11, Kylar's family often has to divide and conquer. "My dad always goes with me, and most of the time my grandma, Kristy Terlip, goes with me, and so does my mom. My oldest brother is into sports and one of my sisters does competitive cheer, so my step-mom, Beth Terlip, takes them. My family has always been really supportive. It takes up so much time and a lot of money. Basically, if you're going to ride horses, the whole family has to be part of it." The family is further involved in the horse world through OE Nutraceuticals, the supplement company Kylar's dad started with the help of their vet, Josh Harvey, from Outlaw Equine in Decatur, Texas.

Any downtime Kylar has is often spent with her working cowhorse and her trainer Brad Lund, while Ron Ralls helps Kylar with her barrel horses. She's also looking at colleges and plans to attend pharmacy school. "I want to try to make it to AT&T Stadium," she finishes, "and I'd like to win Josey's at least one more time."



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Meet the Member **Trevor Olson**

revor Olson is a tie-down and team roper in the SDHSRA, with not only a qualification to the NHSFR on his mind this season, but filling his PRCA permit to boot. The 18 year old from Mud Butte, South Dakota, comes from a strong roping background. His parents, Tony and Billy Olson, both rodeoed. His dad tie-down roped on the Badlands Circuit for many years, while Trevor describes himself as religious about roping the horns every day. "We go to jackpots, and I rope the horns 200 times a day," he says of the downtime between rodeo seasons. He won second in the tie-down roping at the 2017 SDHSRA Fall Extravaganza, and Trevor heads for Jace Engesser in the team roping. They've been partners since junior high, and they also enter in SDRA and NRCA rodeos. "I like it because rodeo is all on you. There's no one else you can blame, and your success is all on you.

"My dad's inspired me quite a bit. He got in a bad wreck in '91 or '92 and was able to bounce back from that and still be able to rope calves really good. Dad still ties with me and my brother from the post, and he heads now.

I've never met Clay Smith before, but he's someone I definitely look up to. I think he's on top of everything, and he ropes so good and his horses are so good. Hopefully I get to beat him someday!" Trevor is also encouraged by his older brother, Tyus, who is a tie-down roper on the Eastern Wyoming College rodeo team finishing his junior year. He pro rodeos, and the brothers rope together as often as possible. Their younger brother, Colby, 11, plays basketball.

Trevor rides four horses, the oldest a 20-year-old gelding named Flax that he leases. "Flax is really short, but if you get a good start, he goes all the time and is super easy. I ride a horse of my brother's called Badger. He's kind of a bronc, and he's outstanding — he scores great and runs hard and does everything you ask him. Tom is 15 or 16 and we got him from Jake Nelson. He scores really good and faces good, and my black horse, Cactus, is 10. I got him my sophomore year when I needed another horse, but he was so broncy at first that I couldn't do anything with him. But I started riding him and he's my good head horse now — he's got a lot going for him."

Trevor plans to haul Cactus to pro rodeos this spring when he and Jace Engesser start on their permits, but Trevor is also focused on finishing high school. A senior at Newell High School, he prefers his carpentry class, where they recently built a calving shed, and he also played football and basketball several years before focusing solely on rodeo. "When I get home from school, I go to the barn and feed the colts we've picked up here and there, and I rope the horns until 6 o'clock. I love hunting coyotes," Trevor adds. "You can sell their furs, and this year they're about 50 dollars apiece." With an entirely free day at his fingertips, however, Trevor says he'd

spend it doctoring yearlings and roping, followed by listening to his friend Clade Schuelke play lead guitar for Kenny Feidler and The Cowboy Killers band.

While Trevor made it to the short round the last three years at state finals, he just missed qualifying for Nationals, and plans to change that this year. "I like state. I'm kind of a gamer, and I definitely rise to the occasion of high-pressure situations. My biggest goal with school right now is to graduate, and like everyone else, I'd sure like to make the NFR someday. I'm playing it by ear and taking the opportunities I'm given." ⊼

roken bones have hampered Colton Humphries' rodeo career The bull rider and team roper has suffered a broken femur and repeated fractured collarbones that have kept him out of the arena.

Colton, a member of the Utah High School Rodeo Association, broke his femur in February in the practice pen and was out until July. He came back to competition, too late for the Utah High School Finals, but in time to win Silver State. Then, in September, he fractured his collarbone at a bull riding futurity in Idaho, and was out for a month.

The day the doctor cleared him to ride, he was team roping, and when he threw his rope, it fractured again, keeping him out till December. Then, in late December, during high school wrestling practice, it fractured for a third time. While going covote hunting a week later, Colton tripped and fell on the collarbone, this time breaking it.

He and his parents consulted with a doctor, who thinks that Colton has returned to activity before the bone was fully healed. They're not planning on surgery to put a plate in, but hoping to keep Colton less active so the bone can heal. His buddies have agreed to help. When Colton and his friends went to a buck out, the friends told his mom, "we promise we won't let him do anything. We need a traveling partner."

Colton has a high pain tolerance, his

mother said, possibly being another reason he comes back from injury too soon. He won the Little Britches Rodeo world bull riding title in 2015, riding with a lacerated liver, and he finished as reserve champion the prior year. The injuries in 2017 kept him out of rodeo, but before that, he finished as the Utah High School Bull Riding champion in 2014 and 2015. At the Panguitch Invitational Rodeo, he won the series in 2014 and 2015.

Colton graduated from high school in December; he had planned on attending school until May, to compete in wrestling, but the broken collarbone changed that. He has wrestled since kindergarten and in eighth grade, finished second at state.

He also holds down a job, working construction in Salt Lake City.

His most memorable ride was 81 points and a first place finish on the bull


WSRRA **Scholarship Program**

THE BEGINNING

n 2015, the Western States Ranch Rodeo Association held a novice Scholarship Jackpot Ranch Bronc riding at the WSRRA National Finals in Winnemucca, Nevada. Six young riders were invited. They originating from Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Nevada. Each rider got on one horse during the Friday or Saturday performance. The top three scoring riders were brought back for the finals round on Sunday. The three finalists were Kent Batton, Zalin Aritolla and C.J. Wall. To add to the WSRRA Scholarship fund Mincer Silversmiths donated a custom made bit. Sponsors also donated to the jackpot to help cover added money and stock cost. A buckle was awarded to the winner Zalin Arritola with cash pay out to top two and a custom bronc halter to the 3rd place rider.

The WSRRA scholarship program goals is to assist rodeo athletes and students pursuing a college degree in an agriculture related field through the awarding of scholarships and also part of the program is the recruitment and assistance of new participants for WSRRA ranch bronc riding through an annual scholarship jackpot held at the National Finals. Funding for scholarship awards and a scholarship jackpot bronc riding will be collected through the selling of tickets on donated items during the Finals, auctions, fund raising events, event





sponsors and donations.

In 2016, the WSRRA Scholarship Jackpot ranch bronc riding consisted of three riders. These young cowboys impressed the crowd with riding ranch broncs. Justis Kelly, a freshman at TVCC from Ely NV and Cauy Pool, a senior at Fossil Oregon competed on 3 horses a piece with the highest score going to Cauy Pool. Pool was awarded a buckle and scholarship funds of \$300 to assist him with his future

education goals. Kelly was awarded \$200 to assist him with his Horse Production degree at TVCC. 2016 awards were made possible by Lee Daggett and Mountain High Broncs & Bulls, Leon Gage, Jordanne Pruitt, High Desert Rough Stock, J Bar D Canvas, Yeti and Marc Page.

The novice bronc riding jackpot is not a requirement for the WSRRA Scholarship but it's an additional portion of the program is structured to encourage novice riders to participate in the WSRRA Ranch Bronc Riding. This will be accomplished through providing a jackpot event during the WSR-RA National Finals with skill appropriate stock. The jackpot will consist of 3-6 riders and the highest accumulative score wins. There will be an entry fee charged with a portion going towards stock charges. This event will provide a great opportunity for

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participants and the winner will be given a buckle and cash payout.

In 2017, the third year of the WSRRA Scholarship ranch bronc riding. The jackpot was highly successful in bringing outstanding young men to the WSRRA finals. One of the WSRRA goal of having this event is to insure the future of ranch bronc riding. We would like to thank Lee Daggett and Mountain High Broncs and Bulls for again being a part of this great program.

The riders for the 2017 WSRRA Scholarship Jackpot were Noah Mort, Corbin Palmer and Cole Biggers. Noah Mort is a 14-year-old freshman at Burns High School from Burns, Oregon. He has been buckarooing in Eastern Oregon while growing up and he just started riding ranch broncs this past summer. He attended two separate ranch bronc schools to learn the fundamentals and get the proper instruction on how to do things right. He has have been to a few ranch bronc events in 2017. His future plans are to college rodeo while he pursues a degree in Agricultural Science. Corbin Palmer is 14 years old and attends high school at Harper Oregon. He started riding broncs this June and attended several bronc riding schools and events. His future goals

are to go to college and get a degree in automotive mechanics. Cole Biggers is 15 years old and he attends high school at Emmett, Idaho. This is his first year of riding saddle and ranch broncs. He attended multiple schools this year and competed in events in Oregon and Idaho including the ICA Finals in novice saddle bronc. 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Meet the Member Justin Palmer

ustin Palmer went from a skeptic to an avid saddle bronc competitor when he was a senior in high school, and he now has six qualifications to the RMPRA finals under his belt. The 26-year-old from South Jordan, Utah, grew up competing with his family's draft horses in pulling competitions, and he'd hang around the chutes while his older brother got on practice broncs. Justin admits he thought rodeo's classic event was crazy — until he tried it for himself. "The first bucking horse I got on was a little stud, and I bucked off in five seconds and blacked out, but I couldn't wipe the grin off my face. I wanted to get on another one quicker than anything. Once you start, it's hard to stop!"

Justin competed in a handful of high school rodeos his senior year, then joined the RMPRA. He switched from riding right handed to left handed and nearly quit the sport, but when he returned to right-handed riding, everything clicked. "The toughest thing was probably mental," Justin says of his later start in roughstock compared to other bronc riders. "It's hard and you have to stay positive and keep a good work ethic. You get bucked off a lot when you start and it's very easy to get down, but I feel like I ride better now than I did."

Last year marked Justin's seventh season in the RMPRA. "My favorite RM rodeos are either Santaquin or Riverton, but all of them are really fun. I feel like all the horses are good and the crowd's always fun. Riverton sells out like a pro rodeo, and that atmosphere gets you jacked up. My parents are my biggest supporters, and my dad and my younger brother go with me to everything if they can," Justin adds. "When I joined the RMPRA, I started going with Landon Mecham and Kendall Anderson, and it's been all fun from there."

Between rodeos, Justin plays basketball four days a week to stay fit, and he's





also a farrier. He learned the trade from his dad growing up, as well as Mike Magera, another longtime farrier in the area. Justin has a variety of clients, and he and his dad shoe all of their pulling horses. "One draft horse is equal to two saddle horses. They have big pulling shoes with cleats on their feet, so each shoe weighs five pounds. They are the best horses in the world in my opinion. A Belgian draft horse is the most gentle horse there is." Justin trains pulling horses, including his team, Cowboy and Regret, and works them daily, pulling a 1,300–1,400

pound skid three miles. "It takes a lot of work and effort to make them pull good, but there's nothing better. It's just like rodeo — I can't imagine not having pulling horses in my life. You can't find draft horses in Utah, so we buy them from the Amish in Michigan and Wisconsin. It's real big back east."

While Justin and his brother are the first in their family to rodeo, horse pulling has been in their family for several generations. Justin competed in a pulling competition in Wisconsin last September where the horses pulling the most weight, which is gradually increased, win. He's also competed several times at the National Western Stock Show in Denver, and in 2016, his team, Red and Dean, pulled 14,900 pounds over 9 feet and 7 inches to win it.

"In the bronc riding, my goal is to win an RMPRA title one time, and I want to thank everyone in the RMs and anyone who does anything in the association for what they do," Justin finishes. "Since I bought my own team, I want to go to a bunch of horse pulls this year,



The thirteen year old cowboy lives 43 miles from Cody, Neb., on the family ranch. Because of the distance to school and the road conditions, he and his mom Shannon and siblings live in Cody during the week and travel to the ranch on the weekends. His dad, Eric, stays on the ranch but comes to town to watch his kids' activities.

Tucker is an eighth grade student at Cody-Kilgore School. He loves social studies and learning about American history, including World War I and II. He's not a big fan of English class; the teacher is great, but reading and writing aren't his favorites.

He plays football (his second favorite sport after rodeo), basketball (his third favorite sport), and runs track. In band, Tucker plays the trombone, is a member of FFA, and is on his school's A-B Honor Roll. The best part of the school day is seventh period, the final class of the day, which is practice time for the students playing sports.

Tucker helps out on the ranch with chores, which include feeding pellets to the bulls, feeding big round bales of hay, and helping with the family's annual bull sale. He loves to weld and often helps with welding projects around the ranch.

Meet the Member Wade Pearson

S teer roping: once a range-land necessity is now a favorite pastime of Wade Pearson from Oconto, Nebraska. "As a kid I grew up next to Larry Tierney. I drove past his place one day with my wife and he was roping steers. I always said I wanted to do it so I turned around and Larry told me to get on. That is how it all started." Roping, both team and steer, is the only hobby Wade has ever had in his life.

"Cattle are in my blood. I have been in the cattle business for 20 years. I was born and raised here in Custer county and we had the opportunity to come back, so I did." Wade studied agricultural business at McCook Community College where his wife, Michelle, of 21 years, is from. They have two kids: Seth, 18, and Hannah, 16. "We run about 250 pairs all year and then I winter some calves for other people. I was raised on a cow/calf operation and started my own in the mid 90s." Wade spent the last few years team roping with Seth but now that he is headed to college he plans to get back to steer roping. The family is currently in the middle of a move to a new cattle ranch in Cherry county Nebraska.

Larry taught Wade how to rope calves when he was in high school and helped get him into steer roping. "I have been lucky to have Larry and then JC Jensen help me. There are a lot of guys in the county who rope steers, including Chris, my brother. We all get together and practice during the week." Steer roping is not your typical event at most rodeos, but it is slowly growing in popularity. It is a regular event for the NSRA and several PRCA rodeos. "You cannot slip up because at every steer roping some of the top 25 ropers are there. You cannot get away from them either."

In 2012, Wade ended the year in the NSRA second and won the average at the finals. He has filled his PRCA card for steer roping also. "The people I have met in the NSRA and rodeo in general is my favorite part. There is so much comradery with them. My son and I have made friends with people we would not have met without the common ground of rodeo." Wade plans to start roping more and enjoy it while he still can. He will also be attending college rodeos to watch Seth and cattle shows to watch Hannah.

"I am most proud of my family, that is what we all work for. They have all been supportive of my roping too. As my kids have gotten older, I have made them the priority over my roping." Wade's favorite part of the event is the horsemanship and skills needed to make not only clean runs but also safe ones. "It all has to do with how you prepare your cattle and handle your rope. We make sure our cattle run all the way through and we do not rope them after they have ate."

His best advice for learning how to rope steers is to get a horse that knows more than you do and someone who knows the event who can help you. "I like to watch a lot of the professional guys. I take a little bit from all of them and use what works for my style of roping. Real-time practice has been the biggest help in the last several years for me."

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Meet the Member Justin Boots

ustin Boots' first lap around the M-SRA finals arena came this year as a pickup man. "I made it to the finals once as a contestant in the bull riding, but I was injured so I never got to go. They gave me a buckle for being there this year, it was real special for me," said Cozad, Nebraska, stock contractor and pickup man. "I am starting a stock contracting company with a new business partner, Brett Poppy, this year. We are excited for the new change. This company will have more of a family-friendly atmosphere." A stock contractor since 2008 and a rodeo man for as long as he can remember, Justin dabbled in the pro rodeo circuit riding bulls but decided the other side of rodeo was for him, both as a stock contractor and pickup man.

Justin attended Northwestern Oklahoma State University in Alva, Oklahoma, graduating with a degree in agribusiness in 2001. "I was living with a friend in Oklahoma for the summer when a friend's dad offered me a job. I started picking up in the practice pen quite a bit and then I picked up at a professional rodeo in Kansas City. The rest is history." Tom Boots, Justin's cousin, was killed 15 years ago. "He was the guy I looked up to growing up. He was a pickup man, so I guess that is part of the reason why I have stuck with it for so long." Justin spent two years with Beutler & Son Rodeo Company picking up on the professional circuit before deciding to focus on stock contracting.

"I drive a truck for a living for a family out of Bertrand, Nebraska. They are easy to work with when it comes to my hectic summer schedule with rodeos." Typical-





ly, Justin will pickup 20 rodeos each year. "The best part about the M-SRA is that they are really easy people to work with in the office. Jill

Austin, the M-SRA secretary, has been a tremendous help to us as a new stock contracting company. They are trying to improve and make their finals the best they can be. I think they have been very successful in that." The entire Boots family is involved with rodeo in some capacity.

"We all got started in rodeo because my dad, Ron, was a rodeo judge for years, he just retired at the age of 70. Now my brother Darin is a PRCA judge and raises bucking bulls." Kelsy, Justin's wife, was once a contestant but now works as a rodeo secretary for their company. "If she isn't doing that she takes care of the pickup horses or whatever needs to be done. We have a little girl, Bella Rae, who is almost five and she likes the bucking horses and bulls. That makes it really fun for me." Two years ago, Justin watched a horse he previously owned that was the M-SRA bareback horse of the year buck at the WNFR. "We try to sell the better animals and get them to the professional ranks. I want to try and do more of that. Our goal is not to make the rankest horses and bulls, but to have animals that guys like to get on and will do so repeatedly. We try to get their input to keep our herd where it needs to be." Justin has always been known for supplying some of the top bucking horses and bulls but would like to step up his game for the timed event cattle in the coming year. "Brett and I plan to focus our stock contracting company on the M-SRA this year and we are looking forward to a great 2018."

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
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Meet the Member Natalie Larabee

atalie Larabee's life motto is the little engine that could. The 14-year-old Aztec, New Mexico, cowgirl stands only five foot three, but never lets her size dictate her dreams. "I look up to Stephen Curry, he plays for the Golden State Warriors. He is really little compared to everyone else and was told he couldn't make it but now he is the best shooter in the NBA. I look up to him because I am little also." Natalie is a point guard for her junior high basketball team just like Stephen. "I like that it is physical, that makes it fun. When I finished my junior high season this year I got to start playing with the high school team, which is what I am doing now." Natalie also runs the 100 and 200-meter hurdles, pole vaults and long jumps in track along with running cross country in the fall. "Pole vault is hard, but I like that because it makes me push myself to be better."

Natalie's athleticism comes in handy for her favorite rodeo event: goat tying. "I like that after you get off your horse it is all up to you to make a good run. My proudest moment so far is when I tied a goat in 8.3 seconds last year. That is my fastest time so far." She also runs barrels, poles and breakaway ropes in the NMJHSRA. "I love the competition and getting to meet new people all over New Mexico." Two years ago, Natalie finished tenth in the breakaway roping. She is looking to make her first appearance at nationals this year. "I have a little mare named Fancy, when I bought her everyone told me she would be awful because she had gate issues. I have loved her from the beginning, we just click. She used to only run barrels, but now we run poles, tie goats and breakaway rope together." In 2013, this partnership was tested in Durango, Colorado, when Fancy slipped and drug Natalie across the arena. "My boot got caught in the stirrup and she drug me



back to the gate. She accidently kicked me and broke three of my ribs. I was only out for about two weeks." Despite all this, Fancy is still her favorite horse.

Dan and Chryl, Natalie's parents, are her biggest rodeo fans. "My mom is always there for me and helps me with everything. My dad helps with my mental game and athleticism. Whenever my horses are naughty, he helps me with them." Her three siblings, Emilee, 23, Lindsev, 20, Morgan, 18, also support her rodeo career. "They don't always get to come watch me compete since two of them are in college, but they are still great support. I like watching my brother Lindsey run track at UNK." All of her siblings dabbled in rodeo, but Natalie has pursued it the longest. "Both of my parents rodeoed a little when they were younger, but I have been the most competitive in my family." Rodeo advice comes from Tami Reed, a family friend. "Tami rodeoed her entire life and now her daughters are too so they help me out a lot. Her daughter, Cami, is in high school rodeo and I look up to her." Another NMHSRA competitor, Payton McKinley, has helped shape Natalie's rodeo game. She aspires to go to Texas Tech to rodeo and become a lawyer. "I would also like to put on rodeo clinics one day to help the next generation of rodeo competitors just like I am being helped now."

coach me and tell me how I can get better. I am especially thankful that I get to rope with my brothers quite a bit." Some of Colter's proudest moments are getting to rope at jackpots with his brothers, they love to rope almost as much as he does. Keeping it in the family, Colter's rodeo role model is his 26-year-old cousin Logan Medlin. "I like how he ropes and how he always has time for his family. He approaches everything like a business. He is usually at pro rodeos, so I don't get to rope with him anymore."

The state champion team roper in New Mexico sent Colter to nationals this year. As an eighth grader, Colter was fourth in the nation in ribbon roping. "Competing at nationals has been my favorite rodeo so far. It is always lots of fun." Spending a week roping and watching rodeo is what Colter loves to do. "I won high money at a team roping event in Abilene once and they gave me a four-wheeler. It was a little difficult to get home, but definitely one of the coolest things I have won." The intense competition of the NMHSRA keeps Colter on his toes. "I have a lot of friends in the association, it seems like everyone knows everyone. We are all friends and we all get to hang out together, it is like a big family." Colter mainly team ropes, but also goes for the all around by calf roping just like his dad.

Starting when he was only five years old, Colter competed in every event he could in rodeo. "The most fun I have is when I rodeo, I would not trade it for anything. I get to meet so many people and do lots of different things and it is all because of rodeo." Colter hopes to one day make it to the CNFR and then work towards accomplishing his biggest dream of competing at the WNFR. Sponsorships from Clovis Livestock Auction, Clovis Vet Supply and Custom Welding of Hobbs, Inc. have helped Colter get to where he is today. "I am thankful for everyone who helps get me down the rodeo road, roping is what I am passionate about and what I love to do." 📅

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Meet the Member Sherrick Sanborn

WW illcox, Arizona, native Sherrick Sanborn won both rounds and the GCPRA incentive in the tie-down roping at his first GCPRA finals in November. This is the 17-year-old's first full season competing in the GCPRA, and he loves the opportunity to compete in larger rodeos. "Durango is really cool — it's a big rodeo with a lot of good ropers — and I like Sonoita too. It was the very first Grand Canyon rodeo I went to and I won the incentive there. The finals was a cool experience, and I learned what I need to do to get better."

Sherrick has also competed on the national level at the NHSFR the last two years. He qualified in the tie-down roping and long-rifle shooting his sophomore year, and the shooting again this last summer. "My family's done rodeo forever. My dad did the Grand Canyon rodeos, and I've junior rodeoed ever since I was old enough. This last year I had horse issues, and I was thinking about just playing baseball instead, but I made it to Nationals again in the shooting, and a friend of mine and his dad let me borrow a horse to rope on all summer. That changed my mind and made me realize I really love it and it's something I never want to give up. Having a little success this last summer made me want to keep doing it."

Along with tie-down roping, Sherrick competes in team roping as a header and

steer wrestling in the AHSRA, but tiedown roping is a firm favorite. "It's the first big event I made it to the high school finals in, and it's what my dad did." This year, Sherrick will compete in all three events in the GCPRA as well, and he's working with Joseph Parsons at his roping school. "The list of people who have helped me is big, but I want to thank the Kiblers for allowing me to practice at night under their lights, and Colter Todd for helping me with roping and life in general. Cody Resor has stock for me to rope on, and I thank my Aunt Lisa and my grandparents, Darlene and Jerry Sanborn, for letting me ride their horses. And I want to thank my other grandparents, Mary and Denzil Farbo, for feeding when I'm gone."

While rodeo is a family-wide sport for the Sanborns, Sherrick's parents, Clint "Howdy" and Amy Sanborn, are focused more on getting Sherrick and his brother, Bridger, to their rodeos these days. Clint competes occasionally in the GCPRA and ropes with his sons and Amy competed in the WPRA in breakaway and tie-down roping. Bridger is a freshman in the AHSRA, competing in the same events as Sherrick. Sherrick hauls his horses to the Kiblers' arena to practice, and he competes on Lola, Berry, and Wilma and Fanny, who came from his Aunt Lisa.

A senior at Willcox High School, Sherrick enjoys studying any era of history, and appreciates how his weights class helps him in rodeo, such as flanking calves and dogging steers. He is the current FFA president of his chapter and showed pigs at his fair in September, while he also plays baseball year round through his school and a baseball club. "It was a tough decision to choose between college rodeo and college baseball, but after this summer, I had to choose rodeo," says Sherrick. "Rodeo and baseball are completely different sports, but there's a lot that is the same, like hand-eye coordination and the mental part of it."

Sherrick's focus now is earning college scholarships and leading his baseball team back to state championships. "I'll be in the open in the GCPRA, and I want to make the finals in calf roping, steer wrestling, and hopefully team roping. I'm trying to win a state title in the calf roping for high school rodeo, then I want to go to Nationals and at least place in the top 20, and prepare for college rodeo."

2018 Rule Changes

Page 6 Rule 6 - clarification

6. During the performance and slack, contestants, and contestants' helpers must wear a cowboy hat or helmet, jeans, long-sleeved western tucked in shirt with collar and cuffs, button or snap, and boots in the arena, or any part thereof. Sneaker type "sport shoes" are not acceptable footwear. (Physical injuries exempt). One sleeve may be rolled up on the arm in rough stock events only. Violators of this rule will automatically be fined \$50. Judges have the privilege of waiving the hat rule if weather warrants such action.

Page 12 Rule 10 - clarification

10. The entry of 1 or more contestants/teams shall constitute a contest. If a contest/event is cancelled, the added money for that event will be returned to the rodeo committee or sponsor, provided notification of the cancellation of the said contest/event has been given to contestants entered.

Page 12 Rule 13 – new rule

13. At all 1st approved KPRA sanctioned rodeos there shall be at least 2 (two) bull fighters present during all performances, and slacks if there is bull riding slack.

Page 15 - clarification

The ranch broncs and barebacks will be paid based on the number entries in the payout. 1-3 pays 1 money 100% 4-6 pays 2 monies 50%-30%-20% 7-10 pays 3 monies 50%-30%-20%-10% Pay one more hole with every additional 3 entries. Rule does not apply to the finals. Exception for 1-3 entries and 1st place pays more than \$1200.00 then the payout will be moved to paying 50%-30%-20%. This exception is only for 1-3 entries.

Page 15 - clarification

The saddle broncs will be paid based on the number entries in the payout. 1-5 pays 1 money 100%

- 6-10 pays 2 monies 60% 40%
- 11-15 pays 3 monies 50%-30%-20%
- 16-20 pays 4 monies 40%-30%-20%-10%

Pay one more hole with every additional 5 entries. Rule does not apply to the finals. Exception at a \$1000.00 or more added money rodeo pay at least 3 places, 50%-30%-20%.

Page 15 – new rule

Average placings shall be determined by the highest total score (riding events) or the fastest total time (timed events) for those who received a score or a time, as the case may be, on livestock drawn for each go-round. When enough contestants do not receive a score or time, as the case may be, on all stock drawn for them equal to the number of places to be paid, revert to those contestants not already placing in the average who have competed in every goround and who have the highest total score, or the fastest total time, on one less head of livestock than the number of go-rounds. This process shall be repeated until the number of contestants eligible for the payoff equals the number of average placings. If a contestant competes in all go-rounds but fails to receive a score or time, as the case may be, in one go-round, he shall not be eligible for the payoff in the average, unless no contestant has received a score or time, in which case the money shall be divided among all contestants who competed on all stock drawn for them. This money shall not count for Championship Points but instead will be ground money.

Page 15 Rule 4 - clarification

4. In the event KPRA has received a legitimate complaint against a judge's work, a petition with at least 5 signatures by KPRA members in good standing must be filed at the KPRA office. This could result in an immediate suspension and/or loss of the \$3 contestant fund to be paid to the KPRA General Fund, to be handled by the KPRA. Any judge that is petitioned against will be handled by the board and they will decide if he will be required to attend the next scheduled judges seminar before judging again.

Page 16 Rule15b - clarification

5b. A KPRA judge is required to attend a KPRA board approved judging clinic once every three years, before judging a KPRA rodeo, including clinics and attendance of clinics as of January 1, 2017.

Page 17 Rule 10 and Page 23 Rule 26 - clarification

10. In a multi-go-round rodeo, or rodeos with an average payout, no contestant(team) may compete on the same head of stock more than one time, excluding re-rides.

Page 18 Rule 13 - new rule

13. In the riding events a "fall" will be considered as the following: An animal falling or stumbling to at least the animal's front knees, or slipping in the hind end where the animal's hocks come in contact with the ground. The contestant may take the marking or have the option of taking a re-ride. Excluding Ranch Broncs.

Page 18 Rule 14 - new rule

14. If in the opinion of the judges, a rider makes two honest efforts on a chute-fighting animal and is unable to do so, he may have a re-ride drawn for him.

Page 18 Rule 5 - clarification

or neoprene and shall be at least 8 inches in width at the center, but may be tapered to accommodate cinch "D" rings. Latigos must be of leather only.

5. Cinches on bareback riggings shall be made of mohair

Page 2 1 Rule 6 - clarification

6. "Ride as ride can" meaning rider can use a night latch or a rope through the 8 second whistle. If the rider choses to use a rope, it can only be tied to the saddle the way it would be for everyday use. Rider must leave the chute with a free hand. No re-rides are awarded unless stock falls down.

Page 24 Rule 7 - clarification

7. Any intentional dragging of calf regardless of distance will result in a no time.

Intentional dragging shall be defined as caused by contestant. Excessive dragging of calf will receive a no time. Excessive dragging shall be defined as moving the calf 6 or more feet after the contestant has called for time. However, if in the opinion of the judge, the dragging was caused by something outside of the control of the contestant, the judge may give the contestant his time.

Page 26 Rule 17 - clarification

17. Animals used for this contest should be closely inspected and objection-able ones eliminated. Cattle must have adequate natural horns. Steers horns must be tipped to at least dime size. Contestant will not be required to compete on a crippled steer or a steer with a broken horn. If contestant jumps steer, he accepts him as sound.

Page 32 Rule 4 - clarification

4. To be eligible for the KPRA Finals, you must have competed in at least seven (7) KPRA first approved rodeos, EXCEPT bareback and saddle bronc riders, who are only required to have competed in one (1) KPRA first approved rodeos; ranch bronc and bull riders must have completed at three (3) KPRA first approved rodeos in each event during the current season as a KPRA card holder, or have board approval. A contestant that competes in multiple events must follow the guidelines for each event to qualify for the year-end finals they wish to compete in.

Page 34 Rule 22 - clarification

22. A fee of \$150 per rough stock out will be paid to the stock contractors at the KPRA Year-End Finals.

Page 34 Rule 23 – new rule

23. If during any performance of the KPRA Year End Finals a re-ride is given, the re-ride stock receives the allotted out money not the original stock drawn.

Meet the Member Christa Williams

Barrel racer and pole bender Christa Williams is sitting high in the standings of both her events going into the second half of the KJHSRA season. Persistence and hard work have been key for the 14-year-old from Abbyville, Kansas, who started rodeoing when she was 6. Her dad, Justin Williams, used to ride saddle broncs and team rope, while her older brothers, Tim and Colton, competed in multiple events through junior high and high school, and qualified for Nationals five times. "Christa has a lot to look up to," says her mom, Crystal Williams. "She's pretty serious about what she does."

Christa's favorite KJHSRA rodeo is state finals. "I like how their barn is set up, and it's a good sized pattern and the horses are running on good ground." She and her pole horse made solid runs at state finals, where she was also given the 2017 Tyson Durfey Sportsmanship Award. Christa was utterly surprised by the accomplishment, and says she wears her buckle all the time. She's equally serious about horsemanship, and practices every day, if possible, joined in the practice pen by her parents, or taking lessons from Stephanie Gray. "She's been a huge inspiration for Christa this season, and helped her so much in barrel racing and given her confidence," says Crystal.

Currently, Christa is fourth in the barrel racing, and third in her favorite event of pole bending. "It has more challenges," Christa explains. "I like rodeo because it's fun and I meet new friends." She also uses the rodeos to train and season ponies, a project she started about four years ago. "I train them to ride, so kids that either don't have the money or don't get to ride a big horse yet can compete. I'm working with Coco and Cinch right now."

Christa's own horses, Razor, 20, and Jack, 14, have been with her for several years. "She's been on Jack going on three years now, and they're just starting to click," says Crystal. "She's had to work pretty hard to figure him out. He's a free-running, fast horse!" The Williams also have two dogs, Bella and Cowgirl, two donkeys, five other horses, and cows. All of the family pitches in with chores, and Christa's cousins, Trey and Kaedence Williams, are adopted into the family and enjoy traveling to rodeos and helping during practice.

An eighth-grader, Christa is homeschooled and enjoys science. "My dad and I got to dissect a cow when it froze. It was a little gross, but then I thought it wasn't so bad." She also likes to run, and helps her family at their Stockyard Café in the sale barn in South Hutchinson. Christa helps with everything from washing dishes to serving and running the register. She also passes the time between junior high rodeo season reading horse books — her favorite is Wild Blue: The Story of a Mustang Appaloosa — and competing in the Young Guns Timed Events, B&B Productions, and Barrel Bashes in the area.

"She's starting a new horse right now, Jewel, to try and have something ready for high school. Jewel is a mustang, and we just started hauling her to some barrel races. She's a really awesome horse, and it will be fun to show people that mustangs can do something too."

Meet the Member **Blake Ramsey**

odeo is just a lot of fun, and 66 I don't think people quite understand the connections you make in rodeo, and the friends and family bonds you make," says Blake Ramsey. "It's really a family deal, and it's fun to get all of us hauling down the road in our truck and trailer. It doesn't get much better than that." The 17 year old from Cheraw, Colorado, started her rodeo career as a Little Wrangler in the NLBRA, inspired by her biological dad, Wes Ramsey, who was a professional bull rider. She now competes in the KHSRA and does the NLBRA with her brother, Tel, and sisters, Dray and Jerni. Blake was the 2016 Reserve World Trail Course Champion, while this is her first year of high school rodeo.

Blake enters the KHSRA in pole bending, barrel racing, goat tying, and breakaway roping. She's focusing more on breakaway roping and goat tying these days in anticipation of college rodeo, but pole bending is her favorite. "Me and my horse, Lizzy, just click really well and make some good runs. She just came back from a really big injury, and it makes it that much more special to be running her. She cut her hip really bad on a gate latch and was out all summer." Blake and her sisters share three horses between them, including Lizzy, so they used a ranch horse while Lizzy was out. The mare is extra special to Blake because he came from her late grandpa, Tab Ramsey, who rodeoed and often hauled Blake to her events. "He's my biggest inspiration for rodeo and going hard. I always try to remember what he would tell me, and that keeps me inspired."

Along with Lizzy, Blake rides a 13-hand Appaloosa pony, Applejack, in barrels, and one of her sister's horses, Koda, in

is pretty gritty. Me and my sister both run barrels on him, and my other sister uses him for everything. He will hustle to no end, but I think being so small does help. He can't stride out between barrels like other horses, but he doesn't waste time going around them digging in. Koda is my sister's all-around horse, and she has a lot of heart and will make the same run every time." Blake and her siblings and their parents, Tony and Tina Hall, live in town, so they keep their horses several miles away on their farm, which has an arena. Their dad runs cattle in New Mexico, and they often help work cattle. "My dad does a lot

to get us down the road, and

without him, this wouldn't be

possible," says Blake. She is a senior at Cheraw High School, where physics is her favorite class. "We've been learning about velocity and gravity, and the mathematics behind that really intrigues me." She also plays volleyball in the spring, and basketball on her school's team, the Cheraw Wolverines. "We work a lot on having fast feet and being in shape, and I think that helps a lot with rodeo, especially in goat tying and being able to coordinate events with your horse." Following school, Blake takes care of chores and spends time with her family, including her baby sister, Kraigan. Since it's too dark to practice after school, Blake studies barrel racing videos. "I study technique and learn all I can. My Aunt Leah works a lot with (barrel racer) Manchie Hughes, and they are really good to talk to and get advice from.

"I definitely want to college rodeo and go somewhere with a good rodeo program, and I want to go into pre-medicine.

Meet the Member Sharon Mendell

rowing up on the back of a horse is the typical rodeo path, for Sharon Mendell from Talala, Oklahoma, the announcers stand was and is her playground. "I grew up in rodeo because my parents did but they had a stock contracting business for 49 years. That is all I ever really knew," Sharon said. From 1955 to 2004, Willie and Minnie, her parents, ran the Mendell Rodeo Company full time. "When they first started, both of my parents also had jobs in town. But the last 20 years of the business they made a living doing it." Sharon and her brothers, Curt and Paul, spent a lot of time with their grandparents until they were old enough to go to the rodeos and help their parents.

Sharon never really competed but Curt steer wrestled and Paul roped calves. "My dad used to ride bulls but quit when he started the company since it would be odd to ride at your own rodeo. People thought my brother competing in our rodeo meant he got a leg up but it probably was more of the opposite really." Sharon grew up helping her mom time and keep the books for their rodeos, something she has yet to quit doing.

"I am just a secretary and timer with an ACRA card. I periodically work for five different contractors on the weekends." As a secretary the work begins long before pulling into the arena. "My phone rings constantly the week leading up to a rodeo. I hand write everything still but I do have a computer program that helps me figure out the payout once I have everyone entered and draws made." Sharon has worked at the local electrical coop for the past 24 years, and continues to

use most of her vacation time to attend two or three rodeos each month. But she would not have it any other way. "This is something I was born into like most other rodeo people. It got into my blood and has never left."

As a contractor, Willie owned all of his livestock, including: roping calves and steers, bucking horses and bulls. He even raised some of his own bulls. "I have always had something outside to feed, without those livestock I think I would be lost. I can remember loading everything up and getting to the rodeo a day early so the animals would be well taken care of. We had, and still do, a lot of pride in our animals."

Sharon now has 10 bucking bulls of her own, ranging from yearlings to five and six years old. "I live in the house where I grew up so I am trying to progressively fix everything as it deteriorates so it looks like I always remembered it growing up." Sharon takes some of her bulls to futuri-



ties. "There is a lot of competition out there. It is fun to enter a bull but if you do you better have something pretty good to keep up with the competition." Her brother also keeps some bulls on hand but he takes them to buck in the PBR.

The ACRA finals rodeo secretary once before, Sharon is honored that she got to go back this year for it. "The ACRA is great because they are not too small but also not too big. Since the rodeos are more centrally located in my area, I don't have to travel as far either." Week after week, Sharon sees the same contestants making her extended family in rodeo continusly grow. "I grew up with a lot of the contestants' parents riding and roping in the ACRA, now their kids are competing. It is neat to see some people who are my age still competing, it is like spending every weekend with my family."

ade Williams from Haskell, Oklahoma, was bound to become a roper. Jana, his mom, set the fast time record in the breakaway roping at IFR 42 that stood until just last year. "My parents always had friends over to rope while I was growing up. I would rope with them and try to do some of the things they did. Basically, I grew up in a roping arena," said the 13 year old. KaCee, his dad, is also a roper, so learning how to rope was a team effort from his parents. Naturally, his favorite place to be is in a roping arena and his favorite event is tie-down roping. "I have been doing it the longest and it is the most fun for me. It takes a lot of athletic ability to rope the calf around the neck, dismount and then handle it." Kade also ribbon ropes, breakaway ropes, ties goats and is a chute dogger.

He first started riding when he was three and began to rodeo in the NJRA at the age of six. The next year he started to rope in the OJRA. "My dad used to rope a few steers and I need another event for high school so I am thinking of learning how to head next year." Kade was blessed to finish his seventh-grade season as the OKJHSRA state champion boys breakaway roper before heading to nationals. He finished in third place in the short-go and also took third in the average for breakaway roping. The last several months have been good to Kade, he won the Chris Neal's Future Stars Calf Roping in May and Rising Stars Roping last November. "Those were really fun to win. When I was eight, I won the first Future Stars youngest roper saddle." For six years, Kade has captured the OJRA all-

around cowboy title, including this year.

His second favorite place to be is on a baseball diamond, where he spends part of his summer playing first base or pitching for the Coweta Tigers Junior High team. "I have played my whole life. You have to be smart and play to your position." Kade is a fan of the Texas Rangers baseball team and follows both the Warriors and Thunder during basketball season, but rodeo is his year-round sport. "Summer is when I try to get better. We rope just about everyday early in the morning before it gets too hot." An eighth grader at Cowetta Junior High School, Kade enjoys seeing all his friends. "We live on a small ranch out of town so I do not see my friends much outside of school." The challenge of math is appealing to Kade, making it his favorite subject. He is an honor student and enrolls in advanced classes while making straight As. He aspires to become a mechanical engineer in the future.

Kade's little sister, Jacee, is 9 and runs barrels, poles, goat ties and breakaway ropes. "It is fun to rodeo with her. I try to help her in practice when I can, but she does not always listen to me." KaCee is a pharmacist and Jana is a principle in Bixby, working hard to keep their kids mounted and to their various activities. Kade appreciates the support from his parents, grandparents and their long-time family friends, Gary and Cindy Updyke, who let him ride a couple of their horses, Jody and Yella. He credits them for improving his roping in the last 18 months.

"My parents and Trevor Brazile are definitely my role models. Trevor works hard and keeps a good attitude in the arena. He acts the same when he wins and loses." Kade always tries to emulate Trevor by keeping a good attitude inside and out of the arena. He is most proud of being a Christian, regarding it as one of his favorite things. "Every year I try to set goals for the upcoming year and beyond. I would like to make nationals in the tie-down roping, goat tying and chute dogging next year. In high school, I want to focus on tie-down and eventually go to the NFR in it." His favorite part of rodeo is working hard and seeing that pay off. "I like to rodeo with my friends in the OKJHSRA and I like how tough it is. You have to work hard all year to make it to nationals. It is a really humbling sport, but, mostly, I just like being a cowboy."

FUNDAMENTALS

hen you do well at a rodeo does it happen on purpose or by accident? Do you place in a lot of rodeos or do you place at very few? Those who are able to place at the most rodeos are doing it on purpose. Those who place just a few times a year are doing it on accident.

Most students I work with or visit with cannot answer that question the first time they are asked. They cannot explain if their success was an accident or if it was on purpose. Many will say they were just lucky. Did you get lucky on purpose or was it an accident? Many will say they worked for their win? Was that on purpose or an accident?

When you do well by accident you are not able to make consistent runs or rides at the rodeo. Most of the time that also means that you are not able to make multiple successful runs or rides in the practice pen. Those who win by accident have not or will not put in the work to be successful on purpose.

What separates the "On Purpose" and the "On Accident" groups?

I believe that results that happen by accident or purpose come down to one set of basic elements.

Fundamentals.

Those who are successful on purpose can replicate their success. Their performance is not left to chance, it is happening on purpose. Most of the time it is because of the execution of the event they are competing in. They can do the many small things well in order to make themselves successful. They are able to perform the fundamentals each and every time they compete. Fundamentals aren't flashy, most of the time they are boring, but they are the key to winning consistently.

Competitors who win on purpose are the people that have spent enough time in the practice pen so that they possess the fundamentals of their sport. They can execute these skills at a high level. When they draw well they can execute the fun-



damental skills on purpose and win. When they don't draw well they can execute the fundamental skills and have a chance to place. When they are in a slump their fundamental skills can help them get through difficult times. When they are winning, they are executing the fundamentals at a high level, there are very few accidents when someone posstrong set of fundamentals.

sesses a strong set of fundamentals.

If you want to be successful in the long term make sure that you spend the needed time developing the fundamental skills of your event. Watch those who are winning, they eliminate mistakes by executing the fundamentals better than their competitors.

Don't try to win on by accident, do the work and develop you fundamentals skills so that you can win on purpose.

It is true in any sport, especially rodeo. If you want to be successful on purpose you must be able to execute the fundamental skills of your event. Don't be afraid to spend time mastering the fundamentals if you want to be successful on purpose.

hey say to go for gold, that is exactly what Rio Flaharty did at the 2016 AQHYA World Show. The El Dorado, Kansas, barrel racer is used to running against stiff competition. This past February the 15-year-old was the 2017 Patriot Young Guns Champion, qualifying her for The American semi-finals in 2018. "The American is my dream rodeo to compete in, so I am looking forward to running in the semifinals in 2018. I also went to the Junior NFR in Vegas this year." Rio was winning the barrels going into the short round and ended up seventh overall. "It was the toughest youth event I have competed against most of those girls before though. It was neat to go watch the NFR for the first time after competing," said the OHSRA competitor.

The Flaharty family lived in Oklahoma for ten years before moving to Kansas in 2014. "I learned how to ride and compete against the girls in Oklahoma. I could not quit competing down there because all my friends were there." Rio says Oklahoma has some of the toughest barrel racers and "you are only as good as your competition."

Rio admires Sherry Cervi's riding style mostly because she is a quiet rider. But her mom, Colette, is her biggest role model in barrel racing. "My mom used to run barrels and she trained my current horse. She teaches me how to get better." Rodeo is a family sport as her dad Troy was a calf roper and bulldogger. "I was born into it. My parents put me on old horses when my mom was at a barrel race or pro rodeo. Eventually they put me on barrel horses and let me





go as fast as I wanted. It has taken off from there." Her aunts, uncles and grandparents mostly team rope or ride cutting and reining horses. Her half-brother Tehl, 22, did not catch the rodeo bug like Rio did.

"I just love how fast I get to go and being able to do that on my horse. I used to goat tie and pole bend, but barrel racing is what I am good at and truly enjoy." If Rio had a pole horse, she would love to pole bend. As a freshman, Rio was second in barrels at the IFYR. "I was young compared to everyone I was competing against. It was my first time there, so I was proud that I did so well against some of the toughest girls in the world." Rio is working towards an IFYR championship title and a national title this year. "I have been to nationals the past two years. I was reserve champion in eighth grade and then I made the short go as a freshman."

The El Dorado High School sophomore aspires to be a professional barrel racer one day. "Going pro is my biggest dream but I have also thought about becoming a physical therapist." Rio used to be involved in cheerleading and gymnastics but decided to fully pursue rodeo. She is a self-proclaimed chatty Cathy. "I love talking to people and getting to know them as best as I can. Basically, I am good at making friends." One of her good friends is her geometry teacher. "I do not like the subject itself, but I like my teacher. She makes it a lot easier to learn."

Nerves used to overcome Rio when she was about to run, she has worked through this to focus on piloting her horse, The Wonder Bug. "My mom always tells me to keep going and not to stop even when I am doing bad, to always keep moving forward." or the first 13 years of her life, Alondra Castaneda rode stick horses, had names for every horse she saw pastured around South Texas, read all of the Black Stallion books and breathlessly knew there were horses in her future. At 13, she got her first horse and life really began.

Ten years later, she'd faithfully attended 4H, competed in every timed event ever invented, traded horses, started some, got herself onto a ranch rodeo team and did what every true addict has done since horses and man first started communicating; she wanted more.

"Six months ago, I saw a Texas Bronc Rider's Association post on Facebook looking for women who wanted to ride bucking horses," said Castaneda. "When I called Daryl McElroy he asked if I had any experience with ranch bronc riding. I told him no and he said 'well, come on anyway."

She showed up in Gatesville, set her saddle on a practice horse on Friday night then paid her fees for Saturday. She was there when the whistle blew.

"I didn't remember much of the ride. It was all just like a roar in my mind, but I remember how I felt afterwards. I believed I could. I believed I could do it better and I wanted more," Castaneda said.

About 5 months after that night, she was at her very first formal horseback riding lesson. It came at Smith ProRodeo's annual Thanksgiving weekend bronc riding school. Among the students were those getting on for their first time and the cream of PRCA's crop

teaching and tuning up for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo.

"It was eye opening, inspiring and scary," said Castaneda. "I mean, I'd always felt like the Daryl and the TBRA contractors had hand picked some pretty solid, but easier horses for us girls. The Smith horses were stronger, mostly younger and rank. Being among the only women there in that kind of company was kind of intimidating at first, though we're kind of used to that. We don't have haters, necessarily, but we sure have doubters everywhere we go. It's OK, we learned to ignore that, stay focused on our horses, our chute procedure and the real challenges in front of us. Doubters are just a good way to Presented By:

want to improve and prove that we're here for the same reasons every bronc rider enters up."

With the help of Bradley Harter, Cody and Heith DeMoss, Sterling Crawley and Stace Smith's top horseman, Terry Autry, she'd nod for a handful of horses over the two-day school. She'd make 8 on a few and ate dirt off of several others. The one thing she did consistently is come back for more and she'll continue to do that over the next year on TBRA and RIDE TV's ladies ranch bronc riding tours.

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WILBUR PLAUGHER

March 13, 1922 - Jan. 2, 2018

[Remembering Those We Lost]



ilbur Plaugher, one of rodeo's most unique characters and a ProRodeo Hall of Famer, passed away Jan. 2 in Sanger, Calif. He was 95.

Plaugher turned to rodeo to make more money as a young adult and that trail eventually led to his induction into friend Slim Pickens, who joined Plaugher in the ProRodeo Hall of Fame in 2005.

"Slim wanted to be a clown and I said, "Why do you want to do a stupid thing like that?" Plaugher said with a laugh. "When I started doing the bullfighting just to help save the guys, they wanted me to be a clown, too.

"I put the makeup on and thought of some funny things to do. I couldn't believe people were laughing at me. I guess that bug bit me right there. From then on, it was all I could think about. I did everything from playing Liberace to Michael Jackson, all of 'em. I had trained goats, chimpanzees, dogs, roosters, mules. I loved every bit of it."



the ProRodeo Hall of Fame in 1990. It was a long road to that honor, as he excelled as both a contestant and clown. He also co-founded the Fellowship of Christian Cowboys.

"It's been a great life, and I still have a great life," he said in a May 9, 2016, issue of the ProRodeo Sports News. "Life on this Earth is short, and it all went by too quickly. I've just now gotten the hang of stuff, and I'd like to stick around another 30 years."

Plaugher first made his name in rodeo in 1946 when he was crowned all-around champion at the prestigious Madison Square Garden rodeo in New York City. He finished fourth in the steer wrestling world standings that year and experienced a life-changing moment when he filled in as a bullfighter at a rodeo.

That led to him also becoming a rodeo clown, like his fellow bronc rider and



He did it so well that in 1982, at the age of 60, he was named PRCA Clown of the Year.

As a contestant, Plaugher finished second in the world standings in 1958 - \$420 behind gold buckle winner Jim Bynum despite going to fewer rodeos than his fellow bulldoggers.

"I could only work one rodeo a week,

wherever I was clowning, while most of those guys were going to two or three a week," Plaugher said. "I made money competing and I had a contract for being a clown; that's how I got ahead."

He was seventh in the world standings in 1953, fourth in '55, third in '57 and ninth in '59.

Plaugher was born March 13, 1922, in Lima, Ohio, but his family moved to California when he was 4.

With the money he earned at Madison Square Garden in 1946, Plaugher went back to California and bought a ranch.

"That rodeo lasted a month, and I made enough money at Madison Square Garden that year to come home and pay for over half of my 550-acre ranch," he said in the PSN article. "Of course, land was a lot cheaper back then. Everything I've got today came from rodeo."

Plaugher's life intersected with many famous people. He worked for ProRodeo Hall of Famer Harry Rowell and for world champion roper Vern Castro. He enlisted in the Air Force during World War II and worked in the shipyards. On weekends, he'd wear his uniform and hitchhike to rodeos to compete.

He met television actor Fess Parker at a rodeo and became friends. He appeared with Parker, the star of Daniel Boone, in several episodes. **⊼**

Meet the Member Sassy Wilson



Willin, Texas, native Sassy Wilson is leading the goat tying in the AJRA 13-15 age division. The 15-year-old also competes in barrel racing and pole bending, but goat tying is unquestionably her favorite. "Whatever you put in to it, you get out of it," says Sassy, who is the second generation of her family to compete in the AJRA. Her dad, Will Wilson, competed in the AJRA growing up and went on to ride bulls and rope calves, and her mom, Mary Hamilton, was a professional barrel racer and trained barrel horses.

Sassy knew rodeo was for her by the time she was 3. She's starting on her fourth season in the AJRA, and also competes in the CTYRA and THSRA Region 10. Her motivation is the thrill of competing — and 20 horses depending on her for exercise and care. "I don't really do anything else in life. It just keeps me going all the time. I always have something to do, and I'm never bored! I wake up in the morning, feed and unblanket horses, do some homework, and ride about seven horses a day." Her 20-year-old barrel horse, Buddy, recently returned to competing after recovering from a broken cannon bone. He worked around the injury so well that Sassy didn't even know something was wrong until just a few weeks before the 2017 AJRA finals. She had to forego barrel racing at the finals, but Buddy is sound again and running hard. "One goat horse I'm riding now, Boogie, is a 6-year-old little cow horse,

and my other goat horse I made Nationals on. Paint is a 13-hand crazy little Paint pony I bought off a trick rider and turned into a goat horse. I run poles on a little black mare that we call Noche. I won reserve champion on her at the junior rodeos in Region 10."

Sassy and her family live outside of town, where she has several arenas and a track to ride her horses on, or pastures when they need a change of scenery. Her 18-year-old brother, Vegas, is going to college in Sweetwater, but he comes to watch Sassy's rodeos when she's in West Texas. A freshman, Sassy is homeschooled through Ogburn School, doing her courses online. She enjoys science, and was able to take her Christmas break early to go to Las Vegas for the WNFR with her best friend Rainey Skelton and her family. "We went to the NFR for four rounds and the Cinch Boyd Gaming Chute-Out, and we went shopping," says Sassy. "We had a lot of fun, and we were there when two arena records were set in the barrel racing." Sassy and Rainey met through rodeo many years ago, and Sassy also looks up to Rainey's dad, eight-time world champion Rich Skelton. "He's my hero, because he never stops working, and he helps me out."

When she's not with her horses, Sassy trades her boots for roller skates and meets friends at a roller rink in town on weekends when she doesn't have rodeos. One of her goals for this rodeo season is making it to state in all of her events, particularly goat tying. She competed at the NJHFR her eighth-grade year and placed in the top 20 the first round. "I have a nice colt coming up, and I really want to push myself to make sure she turns out to be a really nice barrel horse. And I want to win the 13-15 goat tying in the AJRA," Sassy finishes. "I want to thank my grandpa (Larry Hada) and grandma (Cassandra Hamilton) for taking me everywhere. I couldn't do this without all of them." ⊼





PEOPLE TRAINING

e were at a dinner party the other evening, sitting across from some people that I barely knew. The man said, "So you are a retired rodeo clown?" I answered, "Yes I am. Clowning was good to me. My family and I got to travel a good bit and we even made a little money at it." He then asked me what my strongest asset was as a rodeo clown. I explained to him that it was a progression. At the beginning of my career my strength was my athletic ability. Of course timing (as in timing of telling a joke) was a skill that I used in every performance throughout my career. But the skill that took me the furthest was that of an animal trainer. I wrote my own

acts and then trained the animal that I worked in those acts. Animals like pigs, chickens, a brahma steer, a mule, a ram sheep and of course a number of horses. This man went on to question me about animal training. I summed it up by telling him that the secret was to make the right things comfortable and the wrong activities uncomfortable. Of course this conversation led me into some stories.

When I lived in California we had a neighbor lady that lived about a mile away. This lady fancied herself as a horse trainer. One day this lady brought a mare over and asked me if I could help her. She said, "This mare is just evil. She will rear up, kick out and even buck when she gets mad. I need help." I agreed to try to help her. I put this mare in the round corral and worked her a bit. She was a little cranky but after a while she smoothed out and rode along just fine. About a month went by and again this lady showed up with another mare that she said was just evil. I went through the

same procedure in the round corral and then rode her and this mare smoothed out as well. At that point, my deduction was that we had a people problem rather than a horse problem.

Sure enough, one day as I was driving by this lady's house she was working a horse out in a big field. I pulled my pickup over to the side of the road and watched for a while. As best that I could figure, this lady was trying to get this horse to turn to the right. The first four or five times this horse turned to the right everything looked fine but the rider kept jerking and spurring the horse to get it to do it better and faster I guess. In a short time, the horse got tired of the abuse and threw a wild horse fit. I mean, she reared up, walked on her hind legs, stuck the ground and shook her head violently. At that

point, the rider must have figured this horse had enough for the day so she quit training and walked her horse back to the barn. Now I understood the problem with this lady's horses, she was training them in reverse. She would make the action of turning or stopping uncomfortable to her horses and then when they got mad and threw a fit she quit and rode back to the barn, that's like a reward. No wonder her horses were evil acting. Whenever she would ask them to do something and they got a little tired of it they knew how to get relief. All they had to do was throw a fit. This practice of training in reverse happens more times than you might think. I don't know how many times I have seen young headers at a team roping come out of the box and try to reach with their head loop. They miss because their head horse reads them and quits running or widens to the left. So instead of accelerating their horse back over to the steer that they missed they just lope in a circle to the left and go back and sit with their buddies. That my friends, is training in reverse.

I use the same principle with my roping steers, if they drag I don't reward them by letting them go free, I fix it and teach them to move around the head horse to get free. If they run the rope we dally and stop them before they go free. It's always a good practice when working with animals to remember to reward the desireable actions and make the undesirable activities uncomfortable.

raig Branham, 58, grew up, the eldest of three boys, in Tombstone, Arizona. When he was six, his mom, Sue, married Jack Branham, and the family moved to Oakdale, California. Jack was a roper and Reserve World Champion to Ken Luman, in 1966, before Heading and Heeling were recognized as two events.

Craig and his brothers, Chris and Daryl, started roping the dummy and the entire family would go rodeos and ropings. The boys would find a kid and pay him .25 to be their "steer" so they would have something to rope.

"My mom loves to tell the story of finding us at a rodeo eating snow cones with our pockets full of candy," laughs Branham. "When she asked where we got it, we told her we won it."


An avid athlete, Craig was a four event state champion in track and field; and a first team all state basketball player his junior and senior year. Craig received a scholarship and played basketball for Eastern Arizona College before transferring to Pima where he excelled in track.

In the spring semester he was second in the nation in the Decathlon and fifth in the Triple Jump. The following year Branham won the National Decathlon and set a national record. After graduating from Pima, Craig received a full ride at the University of Arizona.

There, he met modeling agent, Pam Grissom, who talked him into going to New York City for a modeling convention. After winning the male model competition, Branham found himself in demand by modeling agencies.

"At the time I was living with my grandparents in Tucson," recalls Craig. "I went home and told them I was going back to New York to model. They weren't too happy about that."

Branham signed with Legends agency and quickly received a contract in Milan, Italy. Soon after, he was booked for a spread with GQ magazine and also worked with the Italian version of men's Vogue. A flourishing modeling career



found Branham living in Milan, Paris, Manhattan, and Dallas, TX.

While in Dallas, Craig booked some acting jobs where he realized what he wanted to do with his life. At 25 he bought his first home in Dallas, which he leased the following year before moving to Hollywood.

Soon after relocating, Craig was enjoying steady work with jobs on shows like "Cheers," and "Murder She Wrote." He was able to study with renown acting coaches and started booking national commercials, in addition to his modeling.

After seeing the television show, American Gladiators, Craig tried out for the second season and ultimately won the 1990-1991 American Gladiators Grand Championship. Craig recalls this as "one of the most fun things I've ever done."

Shortly after the win, People magazine included Branham in their "50 Most Beautiful People" issue. Branham also got married that year and celebrated the birth of his daughter, Sarah, in July.



"At some point I started roping again," says Craig. "I hadn't roped in a long time and though I was originally a header, I wanted to heel. I worked hard at it and eventually got to where I though I could rodeo."

"In 1998, I got to rope with David Motes and ended up finishing 20th in the world on my permit. In 1999, I bought my card and won the PRCA Heeling Rookie of the Year. I was 40 years old and am still the oldest Heeling Rookie ever."

Branham came close to qualifying for the NFR several times with year-end finishes in 20th, 22nd, and 25th place.

Not long after returning home from rodeo, Craig was contacted by his friend and stunt coordinator, Charlie Croughwell, about a stunt job. Craig got the job to double for Josh Lucas, on the show the "Hulk." This was the beginning of a successful career as a stunt man.

"I quickly realized this is what I need to be doing. It's a fun job that I really enjoy. I've gotten to double Robert Redford. In 2005 I got to double Pierce Brosnan for three months on a movie call "Seraphim Falls."

"About ten years ago, I met Robert Patrick on a show where I doubled him and I've been his stunt double ever since. I've been working with him on the show "Scorpion" for four years now. I also got to play the Headless Horseman on "Sleepy Hollow" for four years and that show just ended last January."

Branham lives with his wife of three years, Nathalie, in Canyon Country, California. Craig strives for a balance between work and team roping. As a #8, Craig often competes at the World Series ropings and won \$26,000 in the #15 with Andy Holcomb at the 2016 WSTR Finals in Las Vegas.

COWBOY **Q&A**

Who were your roping (rodeo) heroes? My dad and probably Jake and Clay.

Who do you respect most in the world? My mom.

Who has been the biggest influence in your life?

My grandfather, Roscoe Christopher. I still think of so many things he taught me.

If you had a day off what would you like to do?

I'd love to work on my place and plan my next build. I'm studying an architectural program now. I really love that.

How would you describe yourself in three words?

Friendly and outgoing, compassionate, understanding.

What makes you happy? My wife. I'm a happy person overall. I wake up happy.

What makes you angry? Bad or aggressive drivers.

If you were given I million dollars, how would you spend it?

I would try and find a cause, probably to do with the heroin epidemic and try and support an organization that could put those kids in the western way of life. I would travel.

What is your best quality – your worst? My best quality is a good heart. My worst is sometimes I feel I may be selfish, by doing what I want when I want.



"My mare, Penny developed VS in September of 2015. She was one of the unlucky ones where it wound up in her right foot. Dr. Stricklin suggested I put her on his hoof supplement. After a year my farrier Dean Geesen came out and was impressed with her growth. He said he'd seen a similar case in a gelding and that it had been the same amount of time and the hoof hadn't grown out."

SAFETY FIRST

ne of the most important things I learned watching my father teach people to rope was to help keep them safe. He would let headers start out with just one coil in their hands and the tail of their rope hanging down by their stirrup. There's

no option, when you throw your rope, you have to kick and keep riding your horse – or lose your rope.

Hali, my daughter, roped until June or July of this year with just one coil in her hand. She was a 4+ header, winning money and saddles, still using one coil. My theory is her hands are more valuable than any roping she could ever win. If the steers stops or drags, there are so many things than can happen to your kids, or any beginner, that can get them in trouble.

I highly recommend this for anyone who is learning, whether it's kids or beginners. Let them build the loop the size they want, with the amount between their

hands, then cut their rope off where the tail is hanging down by their stirrup.

I advise starting on a Hot Heels or mechanical dummy with their horse sitting still. They need to be able to sit on their horse, rope, pull their slack and then dally without the horse moving at all. They need to master these fundamentals at a stand still before attempting to rope a moving dummy.

The next step is to cover the same fundamentals at a slow walk. Rope, pull slack, and dally without letting the horse turn. By mastering basic fundamentals at this pace, the odds of staying in control at a faster pace are much greater. It's very easy to get excited once things start moving. I once had a school in Oklahoma where the head guy was notorious for ducking. Everyone at the school was related to him somehow. I told him before we started I could fix it, but I wanted to see how bad it was first. I let him run two steers, and it was pretty wild. The first steer wasn't too bad, but the second was out of control. I rode up to him, grabbed his rope and cut it off where he only had a coil and no tail hanging.

Everyone was amazed when he wasn't ducking anymore. He would rope, ride up and handle the steer. At lunch he said, "I had to ride, because I didn't have any rope."

It's amazing how much better your mind works to engage your legs if you know you don't have the luxury of going left and getting a dally. I have a simple rule at my schools – you get to lose your rope once. After that, I will make sure you don't have enough rope to duck.

I recommend starting all youngsters and beginners out this way. It's no more than a learning tool to help teach someone to ride their horse. I can't begin to tell you how many young kids I've seen who are missing fingers and thumbs. It scares me to see kids rope with a long rope. It's so important for them to learn to ride after they throw and stay in control.

Currently I'm working with Hali to help her learn how to reach. As a 5+ she will have to learn this to be competitive. I am working on a series of videos of drills including ground work. These are available to view at speedroping.com.


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SURROUND YOURSELF

e've all encountered someone at a roping that is always negative. They are constantly picking apart everyones runs, what they did wrong, what they should have done faster, slower, etc. They are the ones who after each run approach you to tell you what you should have done differently. If you miss for them they are already giving you commentary as you ride back up the arena. And you know they'll cut you from their list because they've kept track of how many you've missed, or how poorly you handled your last steer for them.

Then there are the other ropers. They are constantly encouraging you and even if you didn't have a flawless run they can pick out what was good and talk about that. When you miss they ride back with you staying positive that, 'we'll get the next one'. They give you positive reinforcement, but also know how to politely make a suggestion that will help you on your next steer. On a bad day or a good day they will remain neutral because they know we all go through peaks and valleys.

There are certain ropers that when I back into the box and look across at who I am roping with I have this peace because I know they believe in me. I know they know I will try hard and I will give it everything I have to help us win the roping. And it mentally affects me, I want to try harder I want to swing faster, I want to handle my steer perfectly because I know that heeler knows I can. I'll never forget roping with a gentleman when I first started roping and it was my first jackpot. I missed all of my cattle I was so nervous. After I missed the fourth one, he approached me and with no sincerity said 'maybe you should stay home a bit longer before you waste my money and yours'. I always think about that when I enter a draw and look over at who is in the heeling box, hoping it's not him.

With that being said I realize in this roping deal, you have to have a thick skin. It's

not for the weak hearted and I mean that in every aspect of it. There is constructive criticism which I can appreciate it, but there are also the bully ropers, the guys that sit on the fence and make fun of the other guys. I've seen it, I've heard it, and I've been the one to be laughed at many times. As I've gotten older, I've decided it's not worth putting yourself in those situations. I try to surround myself with those that believe in me, encourage me, and most of all know that I just want to better my roping.

eam roper Nelson Wyatt won the 2017 PRCA Resistol Rookie of the Year titles in the heading and all-around, with more than \$30,000 separating him from second place in the heading. The 24-year-old from Clanton, Alabama, and his roping partner, Trace Porter, decided to rodeo in the western half of the U.S. last summer, and Nelson attributes much of his success to his main head horse, a sorrel gelding he calls Nemo. "I bought him from a buddy of mine probably three years ago, and I've ridden him almost everywhere this year. He's 12, and he's real honest and a good horse. I have a younger horse I started hauling last year, Teddy Bear. I trained him, and I rode him at a few places this last summer, but I've mostly ridden my sorrel horse."

When Nelson and Trace left home in June to rodeo in the West, they planned to stay out rodeoing through the Fourth of July. "We had a decent Fourth, and I knew if we could keep doing good, we could make it into Salt Lake and the Cowboy Games," says Nelson. "We did some good there and stayed a little longer, and started to feel like we had a chance to make the NFR, so we came up here (the Northwest) and we just tried to stay focused and take it steer by steer. Trace and I practiced before we left, but we'd never roped together before then. We've been blessed for sure." Nelson, who also competes in tie-down roping and steer wrestling, originally started his roping career as a heeler. He competed in junior rodeos, and high school rodeoed for Alabama before college rodeoing for Troy University three years. He completed his senior year at University of West Alabama in 2015 while majoring in physical education, then won the NIRA Ozark Region that same year in the heeling. "I started heading about three years ago, but I still primarily heel at ropings," Nelson explains. "Where I'm from, there were a lot of good heelers needing partners, so I decided to start heading at rodeos, and I have been ever since. It definitely wasn't an easy switch at first. Probably one of the biggest challenges for me was learning how to score. I'd always roped calves, but you have to let the steer out farther in the team roping, so it was kind of tough for me at first to learn how to score and be patient."

Another challenge Nelson discovered was the longer barriers at the rodeos he entered this last summer. "The barriers are pretty short back where I come from and pretty fast. Some places are like that out West, but at some the barrier is pretty long, and you have to use your horse more so than you would back home. The coolest thing rodeoing out there was how many friends I made. I felt like everybody was nice and welcoming." Nelson and Trace went several months without going home, which was a first for both of them, but they were able to stay with a friend in Washington state while rodeoing in the Northwest until they headed home. "If we ever got a day off, we usually practiced, or played golf. We're not very good at it, but we like to play, and we have a set of golf clubs in our mid tack that we haul around."

Nelson has a friend video his rodeos as often as he can to study his runs, and he sends them to his family to watch, including his parents, Allen and Aleta; and his younger brother and sister, Evan and Avery. "I look up to my dad. He got me into team roping and always made sure I had good horses to ride growing up," says Nelson. "This last year while we were pro rodeoing, Trace and I didn't know how to enter at first, so our friend Kevin Daniel helped us enter. There's a few guys back home, like Brad Culpepper, that I've roped with, and if I ever miss, I'll call him and he'll straighten me back up."

Nelson and Brad team roped together at their PRCA Southeastern Circuit rodeos last winter, and in December of 2016, Nelson heeled for Cody Warren at the World Series Finale, where they finished ninth. Nelson also competed in the 2016 PRCA Permit Finals in the team roping and won a round. "This year, Trace and I are starting fresh. We've both qualified to go to the winter rodeos, so hopefully we'll make the 2018 finals," Nelson finishes. "This is what I've always wanted to do. It's work, but it's not like work for us. It's fun to get to travel and rope and do what you love. I'd like to rodeo for a few years, and ideally, my dream when I get older is to be a rodeo coach."

Last year, Cade made it to the short round in breakaway roping at the LJH-SRA finals. Cade has made it to the Little Britches national finals twice. In 2014, he made the short go at the finals and ended up in 6th place in goat tying. He is working hard to make the junior high national finals this year. However, in high school his friends, including NFR-qualifier Jason Thomas, were heavily involved in rodeo, and Casey felt a pull to join in. Casey has been a steer wrestling cowboy ever since. Back in his high school days, Casey was blessed to have the Thomas family take him under their wing, letting him practice on steers, teaching him all they could about steer wrestling, and loaning him a babysitter of a mare named Molly to learn on. Casey's parents were extremely supportive of their son's newfound passion, and helped him purchase his first horse. Batman. "Batman was a small black horse that had a lot more ability than he looked like he should have," and he carried Casey in competition through college rodeo. In high school, Casey competed in the AH-SRA, and finished in the Top 20 at the national finals in 2006.

A rodeo scholarship brought Casey to the University of Arkansas Monticello, where he made the college national finals his junior year, and met his wife Lana, also known as Tootie. Tootie competed as a goat-tier and breakaway roper, while Casey competed in steer wrestling, and team roping. They both graduated in 2010, Casey with an Animal Science degree, and Tootie with a degree in Agriculture Business. The well-matched pair was married in August of 2010, and now have a three-year-old daughter, Quinn, and two-year-old son, Collin, that travel with them to rodeos. "They love to go to rodeos, it's all they pretend to play and all they talk about."

Blue is one of the only horses he knows of that has won a Horse of the Year title in both hazing and steer wrestling. Now, for a haze horse Casey hauls Bud Bogan's horse, JJ, and likes him because the 13-year-old chestnut is really broke, so he is easy for anyone to ride, as Casey doesn't always know who will be available to haze for him at a rodeo.

One of the special parts of rodeo is the friends made along the way, and Casey

appreciates the brotherhood he has with his hauling partners, John Barnett, Zack Oliver and Seth Caldwell. They are typically together at practice, hauling to rodeos, and dinners and special occasions in between. "I travel with the greatest group of guys. Sometimes our wives get jealous of how much time we spend together," Casey said laughingly.

Another cowboy Casey credits for being a wonderful mentor, is Richard Ramsey. "Richard was a retired bulldogger, but he always kept good horses for me to ride, I practiced with him a lot and I have so much respect for him."

Casey earned the Arkansas Cowboy Association Steer Wrestling Champion title in both 2016 and 2017, as well as winning the same awards in the Arkansas Rodeo Association those same years. He believes some of his success has come from working on his mental attitude. "This is a sport where there are no cheerleaders or coaches, you are on your own to make yourself believe you can accomplish your goals. Having a winning attitude is extremely important to achieving success." Casev is a member of several associations, but he especially enjoys being a part of the ACA because the competitors are such a closeknit group. "Everyone looks forward to going and cheering on their peers, everybody is there for everybody."

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BALANCED RIDERS CREATE BALANCED HORSES

hen your shoulders, hips and seat are balanced over your feet you have much more control of your leg, seat and hands to deliver effective consistent cues to your horse . Riding balanced builds the horses confidence and helps develop seamless transitions when making fast runs.



How balanced are you and does your saddle allow you to ride a balanced position?



Begin by taking a look at your equipment. For maximizing performance your saddle must be in a balanced position on your horse's back. There should be about a hands width behind the horse's elbow and the girth. At clinics we often find students with their saddles positioned too far forward causing pressure on the horse's shoulders, interfering with the horses freedom of movement and causing the rider to be out of balance.

Next, stand back and analyze if the fender hangs directly under the seat pocket. Over time we find that fenders push forward on the bars of the saddle tree. If the fenders are too forward, pull the stirrup leathers down on the bars, then pull the fenders down and back. Finally, pull the fenders back up on the bars and pull the fender down again so that it is under the seat pocket. This simple adjustment will allow your stirrups to hang directly under your hip allowing you to ride balanced.

Check your stirrup length. Position your foot in the stirrup with your foot parallel to your horse's side as opposed to riding with heel in and toe pointed out. This position allows the rider to cue and use the entire leg as well as sit square with open hips and a soft pelvis. Now, stand up in the stirrups with a flat foot and a slight bend to your knees. You should be able to get two or three fingers between the inseam of your jeans and the saddle seat. Sit straight down with your feet directly under you and be sure your jean pockets are not shoved against the back of the seat which creates stiffness in your legs and pelvis.

It's amazing how much more balanced you can ride when your feet are under you with well adjusted stirrup length. Try experimenting too, for example when riding a hard running aggressive horse a slightly shorter stirrup can provide for more strength and balance in your leg and core. Unsteady hands and excess movement in upper body position more than likely stem from foot position. Next issue we will focus in on specifics of stirrup choices!

Small changes can make a significant difference!

Meet the Member **Bo Brown**

oping roots run deep for Wellington, Alabama cowboy, Bo Brown, and riding and living in the roping arena is as natural to him as walking and talking. Some of his fondest memories include family enjoying roping together, as Bo was born and raised in Calhoun County, Alabama, with his brother Dustin, and parents, Dale and Theresa Brown. "My brother is 8 years older than me, and not long after I was born, he and my dad really got involved in team roping. My dad built a nice covered arena and produced some of the first US-TRC ropings in the area." It was during these years that Bo remembers that arena being the place to be for weekly practices and roping events. His dad handled the cattle and running the ropings, while his mom was a secretary extraordinaire, very involved in running the books, keeping rules straight and being a big part of the events running successfully. Bo's dad has cowboyed his whole life, and back then would travel to Mexico every 90 days to bring back a fresh load of Mexican roping cattle to sell, and to supply his ropings. When Bo was 5-years-old, he remembers his dad bringing back 12 to 15 horses from Mexico, when he had picked up only a half-load of cattle, and in that trailer his dad had chosen a special one to be his first full-sized horse to learn on. It was a paint horse they simply called "Old Paint", and Bo's beginnings of tracking cattle and swinging his rope, were on his back. Bo

rode the forgiving and faithful paint horse until he was about 10 years old, and took his new skills on to new horses. Growing up in a roping family gave Bo a leg up, as everything he needed to be a successful team roper was available to him. It also put Bo at many ropings, and his first buckle he ever won was at a USTRC dummy roping in Gulfport, Mississippi when he was just 6 years old.

Bo competed in the Alabama Junior High and High School Rodeo Associations, and in his junior and senior years he competed in the Georgia High School Rodeo Association, due to living closer to most of their season rodeos. After high school he went to Frank Phillips Community College in Borger, Texas on a rodeo scholarship, before coming back to Alabama. In these associations, he dabbled in several timed events, such as team roping, breakaway roping, chute dogging, tie-down roping and steer wrestling. He has predominantly been a header in team roping, but has often heeled over the years as well. One of the highlights of his rodeo career came during a family USTRC roping weekend in Perry, Georgia, where as he headed for his brother Dustin, they won two separate ropings together, and he won 3rd in another jackpot, taking home two saddles, buckles and over \$11,000.

Today, Bo still spends many hours in the arena with his two main mentors, his dad and brother, as they own a stock contracting company, providing timed event cattle for the Oubre Rodeo Company, Double Creek Rodeo Company, and Southern Rodeo Company. At these rodeos, that are either SPRA, IPRA, or co-sanctioned events, Bo is also a pick-up man, while his dad and brother are judges. He and Dustin still team rope together regularly, and outside of their rodeo endeavors, the two brothers own and operate a fencing company.

Bo has been a SPRA member since its inception in 2011, and looks forward to the 2017 SPRA Finals, where he has qualified as a header and steer wrestler. In addition to rodeo in 2018, Bo and his girlfriend, Lacy Malone, plan to marry next fall, and build a home on a tract of land they purchased recently. He plans to help Lacy work on her roping skills so that she can join the family fun in the future. "Rodeo connects you with the rest of the world. So, when you get into some weird spot and need something, you have someone to call all over the world, that has the same lifestyle as you. There is a comradery in rodeo that is amazing." 🚮

Help from fellow MSRA and IPRA competitor, Tammye MacKenzie, when Nicole was growing up inspires her everyday to help others as much as she can. "I met her when I was 12 and I could always go to her for my random questions and she never turned me down. We have grown to become friends as I have gotten older. Now my kids call her grandma Tammye." With a lending hand always extended in rodeo, Nicole knows no strangers. "I always try to help people because I know the help I got from almost complete strangers was instrumental to me when I was young. It is neat to talk to people who have grown up in rodeo and can be mentors for me even though there is nothing in it for them." Nicole is always looking for ways to improve her barrel racing. "Something I would tell my younger self would be to learn everything I possible could. There were a few years where I felt like I was stuck until I went to a clinic or read a new book and the light bulb went off. That is something I want to always strive for in rodeo: to never stop learning."

Meet the Member **Tyler Zebrovious**

he 2017 season was Tyler Zebrovious's first as an APRA cardholder, but he entered their rodeos locally before that and started competing as early as 7 or 8. The 17-year-old from Mercer, Pennsylvania, enters the tie-down roping and team roping, equally comfortable with heading or heeling. He often ropes with Kyle Smith in the APRA, and ropes with his dad, Dave Zebrovious, at home. "I prefer the calf roping — it's just you and your horse, and you don't have to worry about anything else," says Tyler, whose dad and grandfather both rodeoed. "Rodeo is something I was born doing, and not doing it just doesn't feel right."

Inspiration comes from many people in Tyler's life, especially from tie-down and team roper Trent Turner. Tyler met Trent several years ago when he and a friend were invited to his home in Teague, Texas, to rope. "I kept a horse down there two years ago and was flying down to rope with Trent throughout the winter, and in 2016 I lived down there for the summer. He's taught me how to rodeo, knowing the starts and what you've got to do on different cattle, and he's helped me a lot with my horsemanship."

Tyler's family has an indoor arena he practices in, along with calves he can tie in the barn, though most of his afternoons are spent at wrestling practice. This is at least his 12th year of wrestling, which goes from November through March. "It's kind of like calf roping — there's nobody else. It's just you and your opponent, and you've got to be stronger and more physical to win. We lift and run every day for wrestling, so I try to keep that going throughout



the summer for my roping."

Once wrestling is over, Tyler jumps right into high school rodeo in the Ohio High School Rodeo Association. He's qualified for the NHSFR and made the 28-hour journey to Wyoming the last three years after winning state in the tiedown roping twice and reserve champion last year. Presently, he's sitting first in the standings. Tyler's goal is for Cletus, a 5-year-old gelding the family trained, to be the next horse that takes him to Nationals. "I just started hauling him the beginning of August, and I've ridden him everywhere since then to rope calves on. We started him when he was 2 or 3 and trained him ourselves. This is the first vear I've seasoned him and he's been very good. The horse I've been hauling in the team roping, Corndog, is 17. My dad started him when I was born, and I went to roping on him about 5 years ago. If I'm hauling with my mom (Shelly Zebrovious) I'll usually take my dog with me." Tyler's 16-year-old brother, Wyatt, enjoys hauling with him to high school rodeos.

A senior at Lakeview High School, Tyler spends much of his time in the wood shop. "We've been building some wooden cowboy toys, and I'm going to start on a little cowboy toy table. I'll make extras and give them away for Christmas or birthdays. I have some plastic dummies at the house I can rope in my room, and I'm making some small ones out of wood." After school, Tyler heads home to practice and spend time with family. He also enjoys deer and squirrel hunting with his grandfather Jack Yeager and other relatives.

Qualifying for the APRA finals is Tyler's goal this year, and he plans on college rodeoing and even adding steer wrestling to his résumé. "I made it to state last year in wrestling and I'd like to podium down there this year. If I do end up making it back to (high school rodeo) Nationals, I would like to make it to the short-go."

NATIONAL **JUNIOR HIGH FINALS** [Making the move to Huron]

ompetitors at this year's National Junior High School Finals Rodeo will be headed to a different part of the nation this year. Huron, South Dakota has been selected to host the National Junior High Finals in 2018 and 2019. Held on June 24-30 at the S.D. State Fair Park, the people of Huron and South Dakota have been hard at work, preparing for the Finals. The fairgrounds has the facilities needed for an event with nearly 1,000 rodeo athletes, plus their families and the fans. One of the newer additions to the fairgrounds is Nordby Hall. It opened in 2016 and will be the site for the trade show. The main grandstand will be divided into two arenas, and the City of Huron and Beadle County are working on the dirt, gathering, screening and stockpiling it, in preparation to put it in the arena.

Other projects are in the works or have already been completed for the rodeo this June, said Peggy Besch, director of the S.D. State Fair Park. The grandstand underwent renovation, and bathhouses (with showers, toilets and sinks) were added or renovated, bringing the total count of bathhouses at the park to nine.

One of the biggest needs for the junior high finals is camping sites. With about 1,000

hook-ups needed, the fairgrounds just finished adding water to them before winter set in. The fair park now boasts 1,050 campsites with water hook-ups at the park.

The announcers stand at the state fair park is also being redone. With competition in two arenas going on at the same time, two sets of timers, two secretaries, two announcers, and all the technology needed for sound and statistics requires a stand that is "almost a small house on stilts," said Bob Glanzer, long-time Huron resident, former manager of the state fair, and chairman of a group of volunteers helping with the finals. It will accommodate between fifteen and eighteen people and will be air conditioned, with windows on three sides.

This isn't the first time the fairgrounds has hosted a championship event. They were the home of the South Dakota State High School Finals Rodeo in 2005-2006, and in 1978, hosted the National High School Finals Rodeo and a year later, the National Little Britches Rodeo Finals.

Glanzer, a retired banker, co-chaired the committee that put on the 1978 National High School Finals in Huron. Things are different now than they were



forty years ago. In 1978, "we were responsible for everything," he said. Now, the National High School Rodeo Association provides the bucking chutes and portable panels for pens and stalls, and has control over other parts of the event, including concessions and sponsors.

Another part of the Finals that is important is volunteers. Glanzer said that getting enough volunteers is crucial, and with a town population of 12,000, they will have to come from not only Huron but the surrounding towns. Schedules for volunteers have already been set up: Glanzer estimates that they need 250 volunteers just for check-in, which starts at 12 noon on June 21 and runs around the clock till 7 am on June 24. Volunteers will man the welcome booth, which will direct people to tourist attractions, help guests with problems they may have, and act as "good will" for the city. And about 45 volunteers will be needed for taking tickets, with two performances a day. Glanzer guesses that local businesses will allow their employees to spend several hours during the work day helping with the event, while keeping them on the time clock.

For many of the contestants and their families, it will be their first time to visit South Dakota, and they may do some sightseeing while there. Glanzer said that during the 1978 National High School Finals, families would take a day or two and visit Mt. Rushmore between go-rounds, and he guesses they may do that again. Huron has a water park, and the tentative plan is that each rodeo athlete will be given free admittance to it. A Cabela's store is in Mitchell, fifty miles to the east, which isn't very far away, said Blaine Carey, a former rodeo coach, father of former high school rodeo athletes, and a committee member in Huron. Fifty miles "seems far away but in South Dakota we measure distance in time, not miles. It doesn't take long to get there," he joked. The Izaak Walton Club will host the shooting sports, and Huron is a good place to host the Finals. "It's a nice welcoming town and there's a lot of room for everybody," Carey said. "A lot of people in South Dakota have ties to rodeo, so they're excited for it to come, and they want to be a part of it."

Huron as a host city is a big deal, Carey said. "I think it will be huge. It will bring

people and money to town, and to the state. It's a great rodeo and it brings in the right kind of people, rodeo people. It's a good thing to have come to town."

There are plenty of things to do yet, and Besch is keeping track of them. "Believe me, I have lists," she said. But she's looking forward to it. "We are extremely excited about it, and we've been making plans for the last couple years.

"It's a tremendous opportunity for the fairgrounds to showcase our facility, and the community of Huron, and the entire state of South Dakota."

"I can incorporate my knowledge of horses, imagine getting a wedding photographer who doesn't know anything about horses. You'll have these beautiful portraits of your wedding day, but then the ones with your horse, they look like a donkey with ears pinned back or not standing square," she laughs and adds, "just little things that non-horse people don't pick up on, I feel like I can excel there."

And where Emily is truly in her element is at a rodeo arena.

"I love rodeo, because there are so many events in a short time span. I like that rodeo is a little unpredictable. There are a lot of changes. Things go in short spurts. It's a difficult sport to capture. You have to work to get that perfect picture."

"I am really fortunate to be able to go and take pictures in these places, and that rodeo has given me the opportunity to travel. I would've never gone to so many of the places that I've been or known half the people that I do without it," she enthuses.

Ultimately, for the benefits that rodeo has given Emily, she's intent to give back to the sport through her photos.

"Rodeo is not like hockey or baseball or any other major league sport where the fan base is huge. So I like being able to create these pictures that people see, and

they're like 'oh my God, that's so wild,' It's different, and with photography I feel like I'm able to promote the sport just from capturing it and sharing it. The exposure of it that I'm able to offer."

And she can also offer the fans a look



"I'm put in a really interesting position where I get to show people that side of everything and that there's so much more work than just those eight seconds or that three second steer wrestling run. There's so much more that goes into competing than just what people see in the arena."

Clearly that dedication extends beyond contestants to rodeo's personnel as well...

Meet the committee Leamington Rodeo

ohn Pavao looked at his backyard and decided he wanted to put on his own rodeo right there. "It was so random, he came home one day and told us, we all laughed at him. My sisters and I were still in high school in 2001 when dad had this idea," said Jennifer Chevalier, John's daughter. Sixteen years ago, John started with a committee from the community to build the Sun Parlour Rodeo in Learnington, Ontario. "Our goal from the beginning was to provide something fun for the community, which also allows us to give back. We have not raised our ticket prices in the past ten years because we want it to be a family event that people can afford." The Pavao family, along with family friend Nelson Carvalho now orchestrate the early-August event each year. This includes Rina Pavao, John's wife, along with their daughters and son-in-laws: Stephanie and Tyler Clark, Vanessa and Adam Cervini and Jennifer and Nick Chevalier.

"It legitimately takes place in our backyard. We had horses back there most of the year and then at rodeo time dad moved them." A hill situated on the north side of the arena is the coveted spot for rodeo spectators. "Hundreds of people come early every year to get the best spot on the hill. Over the years we have been able to get donations to add bleachers on the other side for additional seating. Cars sprinkle the property during the two-day event. More than 5,000 spectators watch the IPRA-sanctioned event every year. "I don't believe anyone else can say that their rodeo is in their backyard. We are one of the only rodeos in our area that has continued annually."

For the last 16 years, all of the money generated from the rodeo has been invested back into local charities. "The first few years we donated to Erie Shores Healthcare to buy some much needed equipment. Then we donated to a local children's charity and hospice care. Through the years we have also tried to help community members in need." The Pavao family has raised more than \$400,000 for various charities since the rodeo began. "It is a wonderful, small town community event that really believes in giving back and providing good family entertainment. It is something different to do." Surrounded by the Learnington community of 30,000, many spectators have attended every year.

Two years ago, the girls decided it was time to let someone else handle the food stands for the weekend. "We have a variety of food vendors and a few retail vendors as well. We set up a children's inflatable area as well as pony rides." In years past, a mechanical bull has been brought in. One of the highlights for kids at the rodeo is the calf scramble and mutton busting. "A staple element to our rodeo are the Canadian Cowgirls, trick riders, a clown of course and back this year: bull poker." Held during the Canadian Civic Holiday, the rodeo typically takes place the first weekend of August, but sometimes falls on the last weekend of July.

With added money for the more than 200 contestants that compete each year. "We have contracted with Rawhide Rodeo Company since the very beginning. They have always been great to work with and provided the best stock we could possibly ask for year after year." Contestants generally keep their horses right next to their trailers in Pavao's backyard. Without the community sponsors for the event the Pavao family could not keep the event going. "We continue to get great sponsors from the community who believe in what our rodeo stands for. We are forever grateful for their support and from the spectators and competitors."



DIRECTIONS:

Place baking sheet on rack in center of oven. Preheat oven to 425 degrees. In bowl, with fork, stir 2 tsp water in 1 1/2 c. pie crust mix until dough forms, shape into dish. On floured surface, roll out dough into 12" round. Fit into 9" pie pan; trim and flute edge.

In large bowl, stir together pie filling and almond extract; spread in pie shell. Place on hot baking sheet in oven; bake 20 minutes. Meanwhile, stir together remaining pie crust mix with flour, brown sugar, almonds, coconut, butter and vanilla extract until crumbs form.

Remove pie from oven. Reduce the oven temperature to 375 degrees. Sprinkle crumbs over pie; bake 35-40 minutes or until crumbs are lightly browned and pie is bubbly. Cool completely on rack. If desired, sprinkle with sugar just before serving. Store leftovers, covered, in refrigerator.

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
