



And finally there is no time like the present to get started. Everyone has the same time frame each day to work towards their goals. Others are working today towards their goals, start today on your journey towards reaching yours.


Hopefully I will see you achieve your goals this year at the High School National Finals, the College National Finals, or at the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo.

Kim and Taycie Matthews, currently ranked no. 4 and no. 5 in the IPRA world standings, are mother and daughter qualifiers in the barrel racing. They've had a strong year in the IPRA, with Kim holding steady and Taycie making a lateseason surge as a rookie. Did we mention Taycie was only 14?

The Matthews family, from Wynne, Arkansas, has been involved in barrel racing for many years. Kim's parents trained barrel horses as she was growing up in Caruthersville, Missouri before she went on to college at the University of Tennessee Martin on a rodeo scholarship. After college Kim kept up barrel racing some, but got married in 2000 and quit for eight or nine years to start a business and a family with her husband Terris.

Together they own Matthews Ridgeview Farms, a large sweet potato operation where they supply to many major retailers across the United States.

But when Kim had two young daughters, Jaylie who is 16 and Taycie, who just turned 15 in December, it was practically written in the stars the girls would have horses. Their grandparents were quick to ensure they had ponies as babies and grew up horseback from there.

"They started riding, and that gave me an opportunity to get back in it," Kim explains adding, "we were going to barrel futurities and big open shows, not really going to any rodeos, and three years ago we decided we were going to go to some rodeos. We went to about three or four with Kindyl Scruggs [the IPRA's 2016 world champion barrel racer] and then we went back to the barrel races and barrel futurities," But 2017 would be special Kim describes, "this year Taycie just begged, she said 'I want to try to make the

IFR, so I said 'okay, if I'm going to have to haul you, I'm going to run too. So we just decided to go this year, and we went... a whole lot..." Kim laughs.

All three Matthews women joined the IPRA's 2017 season. And though Jaylie didn't go as hard as Kim and Taycie, she plans to rodeo with them in 2018. Being involved in horses and on the rodeo road together with her daughters has been important to Kim.

"I think it's awesome. It's a lot of bonding time and just keeps us having so many things in common. We got to spend a whole lot of time together this summer."

Taycie echoes that sentiment. "It's fun. It's just built our relationship more together," she says.

Going from the barrel racing and futurity world has been a fun change for the girls in particular.

"You've got more driving, but a lot of it's easier because you get there, and you've got all day to just rest until your run, and you don't have as many horses to take care of because you can only run one horse at the rodeo," Kim says. "We go to



the futurities and the derbies, and we may carry 9-10 horses so that's a whole bunch to take care of," she laughs and adds of rodeo, "It's a whole different life. You've got a whole different set of people, and you have no idea what the ground is going to be like when you get there. You have no idea what the weather is going to be. You just have to adapt or don't run, which I did that ["This year Taycie just begged, she said 'I want to try to make the IFR, so I said 'okay, if I'm going to have to haul you, I'm going to run too."]

a few times this year," she laughs, but adds seriously, "it's all about your horse. You can't do it without your horse so you've got to take care of them first."

Being in the IPRA specifically has afforded the girls the opportunity to travel to rodeos internationally and places different than they were used to.

"Going to Canada was an amazing experience in itself. We went up there three different times and the culture, the scenery, the hospitality, we loved it all, we really enjoyed the trip and not just that, but it changed my whole view of going north," Kim says. "I could not believe the hospitality that we received from so many different people in so many different states. It changed my whole view about northerners, because you kind of hear they have that stigma just like we do as southerners, but we just had an awesome

summer. As far as IPRA it'd been a long time since I'd been back going to IPRA rodeos, and it was really good. There were a lot of places I was amazed at how good the ground was and just how they treated us, and I was very impressed."

For Kim and Terris, giving their children a life with horses has a much bigger impact than the adventures. It teaches accountability, responsibility and confidence Kim says. "I just think it helps you be a well-rounded individual.





It keeps you out of trouble, because it keeps you busy, and it teaches you. You're responsible for a life. It's not a human life, but it's a horse that's as important as a human, because you can't go down the road without it," Kim assures.

And it's clear the year has had an impact on Taycie.

"I've learned how to ride different horses. It taught me how to be more responsible and to be more grateful for what I can do," she says.

The year for Taycie did not start off

strong, and the Matthews' stud horse she was riding got hurt, but Taycie rebounded when Kim let Taycie share her horse Feelin' the Firewater, the newly crowned 2017 IPRA Barrel Racing Horse of the Year. The move to share the horse paid off big time. Taycie broke the arena record at the IPRA's largest regular-season rodeo, the Festival Western de St. Tite in Quebec.

"The beginning of the year was rough. I was getting ready to quit and just go back to barrel races, and it got better in about June, and it's been getting better from then on," Taycie describes, saying of her incredible accomplishment at St. Tite, "I was excited I couldn't really believe it."

That win secured Taycie's qualification to the IFR, and so now mother and daughter will get to share the experience together.

"It means a whole lot to have qualified with my daughter, because she had a slow start to the year. It was just a struggle, because I've never seen as many tough barrel horses and as many people going and continuing up until the end as this year," Kim says adding, "there were a couple of times where she got discouraged, and I almost was discouraged but tried not to let her know it, because things may not have been going her way, and we're thinking 'is she going to make it, is she not going to make it,' and I made the comment, 'if she doesn't make it, I don't want to go. It was just going to be special for both of us to do it."

Now that they both have done it, it will be exciting to watch them compete together in Oklahoma City Jan. 19-21 at the IFR. Then it's full steam ahead for 2018.

The Matthews have been expanding their farm business, and Kim is excited for her studs and breeding operation and to bring along some babies. By the end of the year she'll have some 3-yearold horses ready to start their careers. "That'll be a huge milestone, and I'm very excited about that," Kim says.

And as for her girls, Taycie wants to take up breakaway roping in addition to running barrels, and Jaylie plans to hit the trail hard too, so no telling what will happen for IFR49.

The Matthews want to thank husband/ father Terris for his support of their endeavors, as well as hauling partners in the IPRA; Kindyl Scruggs, Cayla Fielder, Travis Gardner, Kylie Brueggeman and Sherry Rhea for helping with the driving. They also give credit to their sponsors; B Equine Essentials a therapeutic mud and poultice, Oxy-Gen Products and JHA Saddle and Tack.



Back When THEY BUCKED with BUCKED with Butch Stevents

["He's an oldschool, look you in the eye and tell you the truth kind of guy."] Butch Stewart spurred his first bronc in the IPRA — known then as the IRA — in 1966 as a senior in high school. It was the start of a long and wide-ranging career in the association, from winning World Champion Bareback Rider in 1973, to working as an IPRA field representative, and eventually, serving as the executive director for five years. "One of the things I admire and respect about Butch is his integrity," says IPRA General Manager, Dale Yerigan. "He's an old-school, look you in the eye and tell you the truth kind of guy. When he tells you something, you don't have to wonder if he's going to do what he says."

Butch was born into that dependable lifestyle in 1946 on the ranch his dad, Bill, managed in Arkansas. The family later moved to North Carolina, and Butch and his three brothers all rodeoed. His two older brothers, Billy and Jim Bob, competed in timed events, and his younger brother, Ricky, rode bulls. Their dad rodeoed, but he passed away when Butch was 10. "I'd go to the rodeos in my early days, and the bareback riding would be the event I'd watch. Why I don't know, but that's what I wanted to be," Butch recalls. "There were no rodeo schools, but when I was 13 or 14, there was a horse trader in town and my family was good friends with him. He would have something he thought might buck, and I just started getting on them. When I got up into high school, I went to rodeos in North Carolina and South Carolina and Georgia. It took me forever before I won any money, but I never did give up. One night at a rodeo, it just clicked, and from that point on my skills got better and better, but I really had to work on it. I won second at Rock Hill (South Carolina) and won \$57, and I thought there would never be another dry time."

Butch continued practicing on anything that would buck and traveled to rodeos with his older brother or his good friend Charles Malcolm, a bull rider who also helped Butch in the bareback riding. In 1966, Butch bought his IRA card and ventured into Florida for several rodeos, where he met Harry Watt of Meeker, Colorado. "Harry rodeoed for a living, and I told him I was going to graduate from high school and (asked) what would be the chances of me getting in and going to rodeos with him. He's a very plain-spoken person, and he said, 'Just tell me where you want me to pick you up. But I tell you right now, you hold your end up or you can go home." Butch graduated and left the same night on a Greyhound bus to meet Harry. "My mother, Pauline, was standing in the door just bawling. I stayed in contact with her and my oldest brother, and I'd call once a week."

While in the past Butch made it to 15 rodeos a year at most, he and Harry entered 120 rodeos in 1966 throughout the eastern half of the country. Butch would eventually rodeo as far away as California, and even tried bull riding, but he primarily entered on the IRA circuit. He and Harry traveled in the Coloradoan's single-cab pickup and camper, minus air conditioning, with as many as four other cowboys joining them at times. "I loved it! I couldn't get to enough of them," says Butch. "Those first rodeos we went to I

drew some great horses and won first, and everything just clicked. Harry taught me how to get to rodeos, where to go, and how to enter. He's been a great friend and we still talk all the time, and he's the one who really taught me how to rodeo."

Butch had to set his gear bag aside when he was drafted into the Army in 1967, but after serving two years in Germany, he returned to the IRA. By that time, he had a world title on his mind and was runner up to the IRA world bareback riding champion in 1971 and 1972. "I went back home in the fall of '72 and saw a friend of mine, R.D. Thompson. We went to school together and he was a teacher and a coach, and he wanted

I told him I got real close to winning a world title the year before. He said, 'You can win if you want it worse than anybody else,' and that stuck in my mind. That following year I won my world title. Maybe my skills got to a higher level, but it was just the want-to. I set my sights on something and I went after it. It was a great feeling."

Several years before winning the world title, Butch met his future wife, Brenda, at a rodeo in Eunice, Louisiana. They were married in 1971, and Brenda's background in ranching and high school rodeoing fit the newlywed's lifestyle like a hand to a roping glove. She worked




with the IRA on merchandise while Butch worked for the association as a field representative from 1977 to 1983. He traveled often and worked with current stock contractors and recruited new ones, along with staying in touch with the contestants. Once Butch and Brenda's two children, Heath and Carissa, were born, however, he wanted to stay closer to home. Butch took a job managing several large cattle ranches in North Carolina and Oklahoma from 1983 — when he retired from rodeo — until 1999.

The family moved from ranch to ranch sometimes every six or seven years, and the ranching lifestyle and Butch's work in the IPRA proved valuable for his children. Carissa started working in the association in the early '90s as a receptionist and is now in charge of the IPRA rodeo sanctions, results, and standings. Heath started working with Jerry Nelson's Frontier Rodeo Company in the early '90s as well, and is now the rodeo manager of the company. "Dad ran Five R Rodeo Company for a guy, and he always made sure his family was taken care of, and the livestock, before he went on the road," says Heath, who took 18 horses and two bulls to the 2017 WNFR. "He took good care of things and has a good work ethic."

in Davis, Oklahoma, for six years until it was sold. Presently, he works for Jerry Nelson's Frontier Rodeo Company in Freedom, Oklahoma, feeding the livestock and running the ranch when the crew is on the road. "I really love what I'm doing, being around these bucking horses, and Brenda and I are very proud of our two kids and our grandkids." He and Brenda make their home just a few hundred yards from Heath and his wife, Shay, and their children, Jade, Brooke, and Chase, who is on the Northwestern Oklahoma State University rodeo team. Butch is happiest caring for the equine athletes who made his rodeo career possible, but he often travels to the WNFR,

Heath's sister, Carissa, adds, "I'm glad my dad chose to be a rodeo cowboy back in the day. The people you meet in rodeo become your rodeo family, and some of my lifelong friends I met through my dad rodeoing." When Butch returned to work in the IPRA in 1999, Brenda started helping with the IFR, the IPRA convention credentials and check-in, and securing sponsors to cater food for the VIP room.

In 2002, Butch became the executive director. "It was the day-to-day business of running the association, the bills, the IFR, the sponsorships, and the contestants' needs and concerns," says Butch. He and Ronnie Williams, a longtime IPRA member and former executive director, were also instrumental in working with the governor of Oklahoma at the time, Frank Keating, on declaring the third week of January "IFR Week." "I enjoyed seeing the success of the association and the new contestants coming on,



the friends that you meet, the awesome staff, and the people in Oklahoma City that we worked with."

Butch retired from his job as executive director in 2007 and managed a ranch

and he never misses an IFR. "I tell them if there's anything I need to do for them, I'm glad to do that, but I just have a good time, sit back and watch, and visit with old friends."

ipper rounds the corner of the wheelchair ramp and Laine Stewart slides himself into the saddle, straps in and takes off for another day in his favorite place. The 17-year-old from Lucedale, Mississippi, was born with Spina Bifida, never feeling anything from his knees down and has minimal use of his thighs. "I got tired of watching my brother, Jeb, rodeo so I decided I wanted to do it also. The hardest part was figuring out how to stay in the saddle," Laine said. Strapping into a saddle is a mere inconvenience for Laine, one he never saw as an obstacle while chasing his dream of riding a bull.

[A two-second ride was long enough to convince Laine he wanted to get right back on. "I loved it. An adrenaline rush like no other."]

"Laine lives, breathes and YouTubes bull riding," said Bart, his dad. Steven Campbell and Tyler Fowler helped Laine get on one in Wiggins, Ms. "We had no idea Laine was talking to them about this. It took six months of planning to figure out how to hold Laine on without him getting hung up and find a bull that would not buck too hard." A two-second ride was long enough to convince Laine he wanted to get right back on. "I loved it. An adrenaline rush like no other," Laine gushed. Jeb and Brandy, their mom, had a tough time watching. "I get more nervous when Laine makes a run than when I do. I did not want him to get a faster horse because I do not want him to get hurt," said 15-year-old Jeb.

Bart recalls Jeb as a toddler leading Laine around on their "yard pony" as the boys' first introduction to livestock. "I always bought older horses so they would be safe. I can remember when Jeb would fall down the horse would just stop and wait for him to get up," Bart said. An old

hand-me-down rope given to Jeb from an uncle is what started the rodeo bug for the Stewart family. "Jeb took the rope to school and we had to pick him up because he was roping all the girls," Brandy said.

Now that Laine has done the impossible, he wants to learn how to rope so he can one day go to the NFR with Jeb. "The biggest obstacle is learning how to hold both the rope and the reins in one hand," Laine said. He is now tracking the dummy at home on one of Jeb's rope horses. "Jeb has trained all of his own horses for rodeo, even when we first started out," Bart said. Laine rides Badger to rope one, a horse Jeb trained specifically for Laine. "Other people use leg pressure but I cannot. When I got Zipper, my barrel horse, I had to teach him how to listen to me," Laine said.

A magic seat combined with an old car seat belt, keep Laine in the saddle. A whip gets his horse moving and everything else comes from his voice or the reins. "The back of a horse is one of the few places I can just be myself. I am eye-level with everyone and I can move around just like they can," Laine said. He started out with a walker but moved to a wheelchair when he was 12. "I am supposed to be careful but I am not really. I always say it is either going to hurt me and I will heal up or it will put me in a wheelchair."

His great sense of humor often catches people off guard. "Sometimes he will come out of a pole run and tell us he needs to cut off his foot because he hit a pole," Bart said. Growing up, Laine competed in a local junior rodeo and 4-H. "Laine's seat belt and magic seat prevent him from competing on the level he wants to in just about every rodeo association there is and 4-H," Bart said. Laine could only walk the patterns in 4-H and most other associations do not have barrels and poles for boys after a certain age. Regardless, Laine competes in the Great Southern Youth Rodeo Association, winning the boys all-around saddle in 2015 and was reserve all-around to his brother in 2016. "The biggest rodeo I have competed in was the All-American Youth Finals where I placed 10th in the 5D this year," Laine said.

Firm handshakes and eyes full of admiration follow Laine everywhere he goes, especially when he competes. "Laine has yet to realize how much people look up to him and what an inspiration he is," Bart said. Laine took off for his freshman year of college at Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College this past fall. A crane and hand controls in his truck allow Laine to get himself anywhere he needs to. "He does not like to ask for anything, he wants to do things for himself," Jeb said. Independent does not even begin to describe Laine, he accomplishes anything he puts his mind to. "It is a full-time job having animals to care off and both boys take care of them every day on their own," Bart said. The smooth talker of the family, Jeb somehow gets Laine to clean a majority of the stalls each day.

"The boys have a special bond that is for sure." Bart said. If there are two rodeos to attend in one weekend, Laine is quick to give up his rodeo so Jeb can go to his. "Most kids have parents who were in rodeo but that is not the case for us. I do not know how they got it into their blood but ever since they were babies the boys have wanted to do things with horses and cattle," Bart said. The future is uncertain but based on Laine and Jeb's work ethic and determination, the day they get to rope together in front of a crowd might come sooner than anyone expects. "I used to get mad about my situation, but then I realized that I can do anything that anybody else can do," Laine added. 째



Meet the Member Brayden Fillmore

ravden Fillmore of Penrose, Colorado, comes by his love for roping honestly, following in the bootprints of his grandpa, and his dad, Josh Fillmore, who is the 2016 Mountain States Circuit Champion Heeler. Brayden, 13, ropes with his dad at jackpots, and CJRA rodeos in the parent/ child roping, while this is his rookie year in the CJHSRA. "I ended up stopping baseball and basketball because I wanted to spend all my time in rodeo — it's my favorite thing to do," says Brayden, who started rodeoing four years ago. He enters the breakaway and team roping in the CJHSRA, as well as the dally ribbon roping in the CJRA. He and his roping partner, Klavt Staudt, are sitting second in the CJHSRA team roping standings, and Brayden is leading the breakaway roping. He won second in Eagle, Colorado, in the breakaway roping, and won the team roping at one of the performances as well. "I don't care where the rodeo is at or the condition — as long as I get to go, it's fun!

"I definitely like team roping more because my dad and my grandpa have done it, and I've worked harder in that one. I look up to my grandma and grandpa Lance and RoxAnn Fillmore, and my dad really helped me start roping. He inspires me when I get to see him rope and when I see him win." Brayden was watching when his dad won the year-end Mountain States Circuit title in 2016, and the whole family went to Kissimmee, Florida, for the RNCFR and a trip to Disney World. Bravden also wants to check California Rodeo Salinas and the WNFR off his list of rodeos visited, and he's met several professional ropers, including Dustin Bird, Erich Rogers, and Russell Cardoza.

Brayden ropes the dummy every day, and ropes cattle or some of his goats



as often as possible. His 2-year-old sister, Brylee, likes to rope with him, and they have a 4-month-old brother, Briston. Their mom, Jessica, runs barrels and ropes, and Brylee likes to ride with Brayden, who competes on a 9-year-old gelding, Ruben. Brayden rode several different horses over the years before turning Ruben, who was his mom's barrel horse, into a head horse. "My dad's partner, Austin Crist, helped me a bunch with Ruben in breakaway and riding, and he definitely helped me get to where I am." Along with his horse, Brayden brings his Australian Shepherd, Sid, to rodeos, and he's in charge of taking care of his 30 head of roping goats. "Most of them are pretty well behaved, except the small ones try to get out. But it's fun to get them back in because we chase them and rope them," Brayden says with a laugh.

An eighth-grader at Fremont Middle School, Brayden enjoys science and recently studied cells, but his favorite part of the day is being outside. After school, he does chores and spends time with his sister, or ropes the dummy. "I'll put the dummy in the barn in the winter, or I'll scrape out a spot to rope outside. My mom will head a few steers in the pen and my dad heels. I like to rope with him in the harder jackpots because they're high numbered, and that's helped me out."

Brayden also enjoys riding his horses around his family's property or driving their ATV in the snow, and he often goes to rope at his grandparents' house.

"I want to end my season winning both my events," says Brayden, who plans to high school rodeo next fall. "I eventually want to win the NFR, or win the college finals or big ropings."

He initially launched his rodeo career in the NLBRA, qualifying multiple times for their finals and winning four world titles. He also qualified for the NJHFR several times and made his debut at the NHSFR this summer, placing seventh in the first round of tie-down roping. "A motivation is to see yourself improve, challenge yourself, and go to big places like Shawnee or Nationals or Gallup. To feel more confident in your abilities and potentially win something is rewarding, and the rewarding side of the sport definitely keeps me going.

"I'll go calf rope or team rope any day of the week," says Kasen, who is a heeler. He's sitting fifth in the team roping with his sister, Kinlie, who is 12 months younger and leading the breakaway roping in the CSHSRA. "It's tough that she has five other events to practice, but it definitely helps that she's right here and can practice any day of the week." Their parents, Scott and Sheila Brennise, are faithful coaches in the practice pen. Scott and Kasen often rope together, and Sheila videos all of Kasen and Kinlie's runs. "My mom rodeoed and my dad pro rodeoed a lot, so I got rodeo from them. They have always helped me at home when I'm practicing, and I've gone to Josh Peek's house to rope since I was 8. Ricky Green has been a big part of my team roping and my sister's roping, and Jerrad Hofstetter has been a really big help to me in the last year. It's awesome to have those people supporting you, and sending your videos to them and getting feedback. It's a driving force for sure."



The Brennise family has a longstanding ranching background, as well as running their outfitting business for more than 40 years. "We mainly elk hunt, and we do some deer hunting, but mule deer hunting is my favorite. Every weekend I can, I'm up hunting with my dad. I miss as much school as my mom will let me, and I love it up there. I hope someday that can be my job. As far as the ranch goes, we raise a little bit of hay, and we have 30 head of horses we raise." Kasen's calf horse is O, a 17-year-old mare. "I've had her a little over a year, and she's awesome and solid as can be. I have a little blue roan I call Rex who's my heel horse. He's a 12-year-old gelding and always does his job. My dad's best friend, Mitch Walz, trained him and sold him to us."

A senior at Moffat County High School, Kasen enjoys all of his agriculture classes, particularly welding and wildlife management. "Right now we're studying horticulture and soil quality, and in welding we're learning about different kinds of welds and welders, and thicknesses of metal." Kasen also plays basketball for the Moffat County Bulldogs, and he enjoys the short break from his rodeo schedule. somewhere, and I help my dad on the ranch with irrigating or hay. I would like to be able to repeat my state title this year, and I definitely want to go to college. I'd like to be able to rodeo on a scholarship, and study something along the lines of agricultural business or economy that I can use on the ranch or the outfitting business."

odeo mom turned barrel racer, Brenda McMahan took to chasing cans after her two children were grown, and joined the CPRA in 2015. She qualified for the CPRA finals in September of 2017, and though her main horse was injured beforehand, Brenda was still able to compete on another horse and she finished sixth in the barrel racing.

It was her daughter, Megan, who brought horses to the family, petitioning for a horse until Brenda and her husband, Kent, bought her a 20-year-old gelding. "She just loved it, and six months later, we bought another one thinking it would be fun to have two so we could ride together," says Brenda, 54. "My son, Curtis, latched onto that one, and the kids started doing playdays and eventually junior rodeos. When my daughter graduated from high school, I bought a show horse and did that for a year, but it really wasn't my cup of tea—I think I needed more speed! I always liked the barrels, and I went to several clinics and I had watched my kids get lessons. My daughter had a barrel horse named Jack, but he wasn't fast enough for college rodeo, so she had me try him. He taught me a lot, and I gained confidence on him."

Originally from Oklahoma, Brenda and Kent settled in Divide, Colorado, several years ago for his work, and she joined the CPRA. She's also a member of the WPRA, BBR, NBHA, SCBRA, and Mile Hi Barrel Horse Association. "I decided to focus more on the CPRA this last year, and it went good. My biggest hurdle is learning to read the arena. My first year (in the CPRA) I kept running my main horse, Ziggy, in the slack since I thought I wouldn't be as nervous. Eventually, I had to enter a

rodeo performance and she was so excited and did better with the crowd. One of my reasons for concentrating on CPRA rodeos is the shorter distances. It's less stressful and not so hard on the horses when we don't travel quite so far. All the people are great, and a lot of my friends are running in the CPRA. Everybody is always so encouraging and helpful.

"My family and friends have been very supportive of me. My daughter and I always run at the BBR World Finals every year, and all my family and several friends come to watch us. The gentleman I bought Ziggy from, Jeff Varner, helps and encourages me any time I need it, as does Amy Jo Farella, who I bought my newest mare, Fancy, from. I've gone to a Martha Josey clinic and a Sarah Rose MacDonald clinic, as well as a couple Cathi Hadley clinics and one with Jane Melby-I've learned so much from being around these and many other wonderful people. I'm fortunate to have great vets, chiropractors, and massage therapists that help my horses constantly."

Along with her main horse, Ziggy (San Bertalena), who is expected to make a full recovery, Brenda has two other horses: Fancy (Sheza French Charm) and Sierra (El Sierra Bar). "Ziggy and I have just clicked," says Brenda. "I thank God for her each and every day. I'm so blessed to be doing what I love!" Her other horse, Sierra, is recuperating from her hocks being fused, but should be ready to run this winter. "I really want to get with her. We did well in the beginning, but we've had trouble connecting lately. Every horse is different, and you learn something new every day! I know we can do it and make it happen."

Brenda loves spending time with her granddaughters, Autumn, 6, and Ava, 4, and she works one day a week at her husband's CPA firm in Colorado Springs. She's also a member of the First Baptist Church. Brenda and Kent travel to most of her rodeos together, and he videos the runs and does the driving. "I thank God for allowing me to live this dream, and I'm enjoying running barrels against some of the nicest and toughest ladies around!"

Meet the Member **DeLani** Cunningham

eLani Cunningham jumped into the rodeo world as a child, following after her parents, who both rodeoed, and she currently competes in the WHSRA in goat tying, breakaway roping, and team roping as a header. This season, she took her favorite sport to another level when she decided to run for Miss Wyoming High School Rodeo Queen. While the 17 year old from Sheridan, Wyoming, has served on the WHSRA youth board and is currently the youth board president, this was her first time competing in a rodeo queen contest — and she made her decision just three days before the deadline to enter. "I wanted to represent Wyoming in a different way," says DeLani. "I really wanted to showcase Wyoming's talent in the sense that Wyoming is a very competitive state, and I wanted to change the stereotype that rodeo queens are sometimes not very competitive in their events."

With less than a month to prepare for her first competition, DeLani says her mom helped make the undertaking possible. "She helped me find outfits and she helped me practice my speech a lot and get confidence in speaking. Before this, I was scared to speak in public, so this has been a life-changing experience because I'm not scared to speak in public anymore." Along with representing her state, DeLani has also helped influence more young ladies to run for rodeo queen positions in the state, which is a highlight of her year. "I'm glad I did it. It's a lot of work, and it's hard on the pocketbook, but it's a very good experience."

While DeLani doesn't necessarily plan to run for future rodeo queen titles, she does plan to rodeo in college, and she's currently tied for third place in the WHSRA goat tying standings. "I don't think I could ever give rodeo up. It's one of those things I've grown up with, and it's a part of my DNA. Goat tying is my favorite for sure. I like the adrenaline rush I get, and it happens so fast. Some people don't like it because it's hard on your body, but it's a sacrifice I make to do what I love." DeLani also competes in the NLBRA in the same three events as high school, and she practices several times a week through the winter. "I definitely look up to my family, and I went to a breakaway clinic last year and met Bill Reynolds, Bailey Young, and Jerry Means. They're all calf ropers, and they've helped me excel in my abilities. I'm very thankful for them, and I usually go over once a week and rope with them."

DeLani also enjoys practicing with her 15-year-old sister, Bailey, who competes in the WHSRA as well. Their parents, Casey and Jessie, help them in the practice pen, and DeLani ties goats in the garage in the winter. She rides a black gelding named Deuce in the team roping, and trained her goat horse, Harley, before sending her to Bailey Young to train for breakaway roping. "Harley is such a quick learner, and I don't know if I would be where I am without her. Before Harley, I used Bill Reynolds' and Jerry Means' horses for breakaway, and without them letting me borrow their horses, I don't know where I'd be!"

The five years I spent here, competing with the UW Rodeo Team, were some of the best years of my life.

I still remember our first rodeo meeting-George told us "I have an open door policy. If you have a problem- come to me. If you're having trouble with a class; I'll find you a tutor. If you're having trouble with your roommates, I'll listen and try to help you come to a solution. Just come talk to me." He truly meant it. Every morning he was in his office, drinking his coffee and usually chewing Copenhagen. You didn't need to make an appointment, you could just show up. There were very few occasions that his office wasn't full of his athletes.

One of my favorite memories is our team dinners. George and Julie would invite the entire team over for dinner at their house. We had a huge team- so we would be divided up by our birthday month. The first couple of years I came to the dinner on the night of my birthday month, but starting my Junior year I started showing up to every team dinner. George would open the door and say "Oh, Nikki, it's your birthday... again!? How many birthdays are you having this year?" I'm sure I'm not the only one who came to more than their share of team dinners, but George and Julie always welcomed us into their home.

In my time at UW, I was fortunate to be a part of 4 Regional Championship Teams and 2 National Champion Teams. When I think back to those championships, I remember how proud George was of us. However, he was even more proud when we had completed our degrees and graduated. Our time at UW wasn't just about winning championships, it was preparing us for the future. His athletes have gone on to become school teachers, doctors, politicians, lawyers, and everything in between. It was more important to George that we were successful out of the arena than in the arena, and that we left UW prepared for the real world.

I could go on and on with memories about George. Thank you Julie, Chyann, and Brooke for sharing George with all of us, and making our team a part of your family.

[Excellence in performance begins with a vision of where you want to go followed by establishing goals to get there!]

T t is the start of a new year and a great time to develop or review your vision and establish new goals! Opportuni-L ties emerge for those who have done their homework and are ready to take on new challenges. This is where preparation, commitment, patience and passion enter into the equation for success. Much like a cross-country road trip, the journey to successful outcomes requires a well charted map. Only once you identify your final destination and set your long term goals can you begin to map your course. Planning this adventure will require rest stops or short term goals along the way allowing you to recognize the progress you have made. Because your end goal may be just out of sight beyond the horizon it is so crucial that you continue believing in yourself, your vision and your plan.

There will be moments on this journey when you feel discouraged, defeated and deflated. 1. Research clinics available and make it a priority to go.

4. If possible take a friend, parent or hauling partner. They can help apply the information after the clinic is over.

5. Make sure you and your horse are in shape.

7. Be open-minded, students are often surprised when they find out they don't know what they don't know!

8. Take advantage of the entire clinic experience, lessons can be learned watching others.

9. Take notes and don't be afraid to ask questions!

10. If the Clinic was a positive experience, plan to return as often as possible. This creates a personal relationship with the instructor and accelerates your path to success!

Jill Donnelly is the 2017 SDHSRA Barrel Racing Champion. The 17 year old from Elk Point, South Dakota, has come close to the state title the last several years and finally got it done last season astride her mare Hottie. "I've always done pretty well on her, but this year we really stepped it up," says Jill, who went into the SDHSRA finals leading the barrel racing. "This time I didn't let the pressure get to me and I knew what I had to do." At Nationals, Jill placed third in the first round and made it to the shortgo, finishing 10th in the average.

She made her debut at the national level in seventh and eighth grade at the NJHFR, and Jill has also won a state all-around title in 4-H rodeo, where she started rodeoing in multiple events as an 8 year old. "My dad rodeoed when he was in high school and college, and I have three older sisters who all rodeoed throughout high school. Rodeos are something to look forward to during the school year and the summer each weekend, and I'm always excited to go." Along with barrels, Jill competes in pole bending, breakaway roping, team roping as a heeler with her cousin Riley Donnelly, and Jill's favorite event, goat tying. "It seems like it's more of the competitor than it is the horse - you can definitely tell who practices the most and who doesn't in that event." This is Jill's first year roping with someone other than her sisters in high school rodeo, but she and Riley live just a few miles apart and often



get together with their siblings to practice in their barn. "We always practice at the barn together and help each other, and my dad helps me out a lot when I practice and takes me every weekend."

Jill and her parents, Chuck and Lori Donnelly, make their home several miles outside of Elk Point. Her sister Jenna is a pharmacist, and Kylee attends SDSU in Brookings, while their sister Taylor lives in Colorado. They still come over to practice with Jill on occasion. "The barn is right behind my house, so that's really nice. My goat horse, Barbie, I just started, so this past summer I really started taking her a lot and getting her used to everything. For breakaway I borrow my cousin's horse Coco, and I don't have a set horse in poles, but I'm always trying to find one that can be consistent." Jill also rides her gelding, Benji, in the team roping.

Jill finished her senior year at Elk Point-Jefferson's High School in December, where she enjoyed her human anatomy class and took dual credit classes in speech, composition, and government. She also played basketball the last three years in high school, and enjoys baking if she has spare time. "I make chocolate chip cookies, and homemade tortillas that I roll out with a rolling pin. Other than that, I just like hanging out with my friends and family, or I'll go ride a horse or two.

"First, I'd like to figure out where I'm going to college and what my major is — I'm planning on going somewhere I can college rodeo. This coming summer, I definitely want to make it back to Nationals in more than one event — winning the all-around would be cool."

he transition from chute dogging to jumping off a horse to wrestle a steer is incredibly difficult. This is part of the reason why Dru Melvin from Hebron, Nebraska, loves helping with the Spring Vacation Steer Wrestling School started by Paul Cleveland. "Paul ran the school for 26 years and then two years ago handed the reins to Todd Suhn, Garrett Nokes and I," said the two-time NFR qualifying steer wrestler. "Watching the kids improve is my favorite part. It is awesome to see returning students change year after year and ultimately get better." Dru recognizes some kids did not grow up in a rodeo family and enjoys passing on his knowledge to everyone who wants to hear it.

"My dad was a Nebraska state champion in team roping and so as kids that is what my siblings and I did." In sixth grade, Dru began to show more interest in steer wrestling. His dad sent him to Paul Cleveland. "My brother, two sisters and I were around rodeo our whole lives growing up around it while my dad was still competing and then we got into it." Dru headed in high school, making the

national finals twice and snagged a scholarship to rodeo at Pratt Community College before transferring to Southwestern Oklahoma State University. "I met a lot of steer wrestlers in college leading to some success in that. I made the finals twice in those four years."

During his final semester of college, Dru completed an internship while com-

peting in some of the biggest rodeos in the nation in 2005. "I had a lot of success as a young guy, making the NFR in 2006 when I was only 24." Dru made his second appearance at the Thomas and Mack eight years later. "The first time I was there I did not absorb everything because I figured I would be there again. I failed to realize how hard it was to make it." During his second appearance in Vegas in 2014, Dru won a go-round, garnering a coveted buckle to wear back home in Nebraska.

Dru bought his NSRA card in 2001, the same year he met his wife Brittany at SWOSU. "I like getting to see so many familiar faces at rodeos across the state. It is great to see kids compete in the NSRA also. Now that I have a growing family I like to be closer to home while still making money doing what I love. The NSRA is great for that," said the father of four kids: Jaxson. 4, fraternal twins Chase and Raney, 2 and baby daughter Natalie Rose, who was born

Italian Native Nelo Mori Lives "American Dream"

talian native and longtime Nevada resident Nelo Mori has been honored by the Western States Ranch Rodeo Association with the inaugural Nelo Mori Heritage of Ranching Award and has also been selected as the Grand Marshal of the 2017 WSRRA Finals.

"We have honored him with the first Nelo Mori Heritage of Ranching Award. I have never met Nelo, but I heard he has an incredible story. I don't know the Nevada guys real well, but Rick Masterjuan said that Nelo was the guy for the award. Everyone I have talked to said he is an amazing man and I'm looking forward to meeting him," said WSRRA President Marc Page. "This will be our eighth year for the WSRRA National Finals.

We want to give back and make this thing bigger and better. We wanted to give the award to a pioneer and someone who blazed the way for the ranching industry.

The Nelo Mori Heritage of Ranching Award will be awarded annually."

Mori, who is now 93 years old, came to the Unites States by way of Italy in 1938 at the age of 14, already an American citizen when he reached U.S. soil. Mori, along with his brother Pete, took a train from New York to Fernley. The broth-

ers achieved their citizenship due to the fact their grandfather, Pete, had come to the U.S. in 1876, and their father, Sam, made the trip in 1903.

Nelo and his wife, Ida May, purchased the Mori Ranch in March of 1958 and moved to Jack Creek with sons Sam and Pete. Daughter Linda was born in Elko in 1961.



Nelo won the calf roping and the team roping of 1955 NCA/ICA rodeo in Wells and competed in the Silver State Stampede in 1960, entering in the team roping with partner Claude Barkdull.

"I won second in the calf roping in Reno and won second in the open cutting in Reno," Nelo said.

Nelo and Ida May purchased another ranch in 1979, moving to Lovelock, operating the alfalfa fields and feedlot operations ever since.

Coupled with his numerous rodeo achievements, Nelo has also been honored in several facets of the ranching industry as well.

In 1993, he was elected to the Hall of Fame of the Soil Conservation Service and he served on the Nevada Cattlemen's

In November 2013, the Cattlemen's Association presented Nelo with the 100,000-Mile Award for riding more than 100,000 miles in a saddle.

Along with sons Sam and Pete, Nelo qualified for the finals of the branding competition of the Elko County Fair for 14 years in a row – winning the event four times. Nelo's final branding victory came in 1989 at age 65 – roping with sons Sam, Pete and son-in-law Wes Tews.

Three generations of the Mori family have won the branding contest, which was a truly unique competition – three rounds of six yearlings, branding 18 head of cattle with a hot iron. The final all-Mori team to win the contest consisted of Nelo's son Pete, Pete's son Michael and Sam's sons Anthony and Quinn – besting the field in 2008.

"Growing up, Nelo was the man when I was younger and started roping in the branding contest," said Mark Eldridge. "He was a really good roper and a great cowboy."

team roping title in 2015. Quinn Mori won the national team roping championship in 2006, heeling for partner Haylee Turley. Anthony and Michael roped together at the national finals in 2001, and Andrea and Quinn competed in the 2003 national finals.

In 2015, he was named the Grand Marshal of the Silver State Stampede.

Meet the Member Braxten Nielsen

areback riding is a lot like my lifestyle — living on the edge, happy-go-lucky. The electricity and energy behind it is why I loved it," says Braxten Nielsen. The 25-year-old from Roosevelt, Utah, competed in the RMPRA, PRCA, and NIRA for the College of Southern Idaho, and he was sitting high in the standings of all three associations, including sixth in the PRCA Wilderness Circuit and seventh in the PRCA permit standings. "The old bareback career was taking off, but I think God kind of had a different plan for me." In August of 2017, an accident with a bronc in the chutes of the Magic Valley Stampede in Twin Falls, Idaho, broke Braxten's back and paralyzed him from the waist down. He spent 48 days in the University of Utah Hospital. "I fractured my sternum as well, so for three weeks I couldn't lift anything, and then the next four weeks I was doing six hours of rehab a day, which was awesome to have."

Braxten has since returned home and is doing his rehabilitation at Neuroworx, the same place where Briggs Madsen, a fellow RMPRA member, did his rehab after a similar injury. Briggs is riding again, and Braxten is working to do the same. "I truly feel mentally stronger every day. Physically, it's hard to tell what's coming next and what muscles are going to fire. I'm taking the opportunities my body gives me, strengthening those parts, and hoping for the best. I plan on going back to school in the spring, college rodeoing, and doing motivational speaking around here in communities and schools. I'm majoring in equine business, and I'd like to be an Ag. teacher or a rodeo coach. Definitely my plan is to get my feet back underneath me and get back into rodeoing."

Braxten grew up farming and ranching with his family, though his athletics always leaned more toward the basket-

ball court or football field than a rodeo arena. All of his family, including his parents and his siblings, Jazlyn, Gavin, and Chesney, have gone to college on athletic scholarships. "My best friend Joe Frost rides bulls and I got on a few at his house in high school and got tossed off. I thought I'd stick to basketball and football, but two years later, I tried bucking horses and fell in love with it. Lewis Feild always said anyone that's little and stocky should be a bareback rider, and I decided to take that route."

It was the Feild family who ushered Braxten into the rodeo world after he met Shad Feild working in the oil field. Shad introduced Braxten to Kaycee Feild, and they met once Braxten returned from a two-year LDS mission trip to New Jersey. "Kaycee took me underneath his wing and helped me out a lot, not just with rodeo, but in life. I wish every athlete could hang out with him. He helped me a lot with my mental game and how to ride bucking horses the right way, and it took off from there. Once my parents saw I had the LeBron James of rodeo helping me, it eased their minds a little bit that I had a mentor. My mom and dad, Rick and Kathy Nielsen, are my top supporters in everything I do. Mason Clemitts is another bareback rider who's helped me, and my traveling partners BoDell Jessen and Tony Barrington. The rodeo family in general has been awesome in their support."

Braxten rodeoed for Weber State University for two years and qualified for the CNFR in 2016, where he finished eighth in the bareback riding. He transferred to the College of Southern Idaho in 2017 and also competed in enough RMPRA rodeos to qualify for the finals. "Genola was my first RMPRA rodeo in 2015, and I did the Evanston series and ended up winning that. I was supposed to go to the RMPRA finals that year but I broke my arm on a practice horse. But in 2016 I qualified again and ended up fourth overall. I'm very grateful to the association, and Ben German with Circle J Rodeo and Wayne Hampton have helped me a lot. The RMPRA is a launching pad for young and upcoming rodeo stars. I'm very grateful for what they've done, and now it's my turn to give back somehow. I want to face any challenges that come; life is 10% circumstances and 90% attitude."

very weekend Garrett Baldwin is on the rodeo trail, he gets lost in the diverse geography of New Mexico. The 16-year-old lives in Muleshoe, Texas, only ten miles from the border, making it easy to rodeo in the NMHSRA. "I love going all over New Mexico, in some places it is a desert, others are always green, some places are completely flat and then there are only mountains in other places." Good people, tough competition and great destinations keep the Farwell High School junior coming back each year. "My partner, Colter Figg, is from New Mexico and we have been team roping together since the sixth grade," said the long-time heeler.

The duo is no stranger to state titles and trips to nationals. "We have gone to nationals every year in junior high and then this past summer we went also." Garrett's proudest moment in rodeo is a tie between winning the state team roping title in junior high and then again in high school. A third-generation cowboy, Garrett learned from his parents, Coby and Stephanie, and his grandparents. "I started riding a horse named Tamale when I was about four. Roping was just passed down to me and I have been doing it for as long as I can remember." Garrett helped with branding, gathering, doctoring and feeding on the LS Ranch until three years ago when his grandpa retired from it.

Coby is always in the practice pen pushing Garrett and his siblings Rustin, 14, and Makaylee, 10, to get better at their events. "Growing up with a rodeo family is good motivation because I have always tried to be better than my cousins and my siblings, especially my brother." The brothers practice together often enough to know what the other is thinking from across the pen. "We always try and push

USTRC events are Garrett's favorite to rope at, outside of New Mexico high school rodeos of course. "US ropings pay really well and the four-head format is a fun change. Gallup has a neat arena to rope in though, that is where we have state finals." One day Garrett wants to try his hand roping at the BFI and in Cheyenne. "The arenas are bigger, the scores are longer and the steers are faster. And then on top of that I would be roping against the best of the best."

An active member of his high school FFA Chapter, Garrett competes in the chapter conducting in the fall and horse judging in the spring. "In eighth grade my team was tenth at districts and then my sophomore year we actually made it to state." It is no surprise that his favorite class is ag. "If we get everything done early we get to rope the dummy a little bit so I like that but my teacher, Sid Morris, is really good also. He keeps quotes on the white board. My favorite so far is nothing works unless you do."

Following in his grandpa's footsteps, Garrett wants to raise cattle and horses on a farm or ranch after college. "I want to rodeo on a collegiate level and try to win the CNFR. After that, I think I will go pro and make my way to Pendleton, Cheyenne and eventually the NFR." For now, Garrett is focused on winning state again for redemption at nationals. "This year my partner and I did not do so well. Our goal is to place in the top five."

To do this, Garrett refers to his dad's everyday advice: don't overthink it and pay up.

"We used to live by Kory Kuntz and I can remember watching him rope quite a bit. He is definitely my rodeo role model because he never won at it all at the NFR but he kept on trying anyways." Before every run, Garrett reminds himself to stay calm and not to worry about how fast he will be, then he sends up a prayer. "Everything we do, in rodeo and in life, is for the Lord. That's what matters most."

Quincy competed in the NMJHSRA but switched to the AHSRA when he became a freshman. "I compete in cutting, but they took that out of the all-around points in New Mexico, so I switched to Arizona," said 15-year-old Quincy. Switching associations was a tough decision, but he enjoys watching his 13-year-old brother compete. Everett is in eighth grade and competes in tie-down roping, team roping, ribbons and chute dogging in the NMJHSRA.

"Quincy and I rope together almost every day. I know what kind of handle he likes so it is easy to head for him," said Everett. The boys plan to rope together when they are both in high school. Team roping is Everett's favorite event, but Quincy likes tie-down the best. "Not as many people rope calves anymore, but I love the

challenge of the event," Quincy said. He was the New Mexico state champion tiedown roper this past summer. The brothers started competing at a young age since horses were already a part of their lives.

The Douglas, Arizona, cowboys have grown up riding and roping on the family ranches: Price Canyon Ranch and Cain Spire Ranch. Because the boys travel so much, they are both homeschooled by their parents, Kenny and Michelle. "We both like that we can finish school and chores then go to the practice pen every day. And that we don't have any homework of course," Everett said. The boys also rodeo in New Mexico 4-H, AJRA and HYRA. "We both had a very successful season in 4-H rodeo this year," Everett added.

Outside of rodeo, the boys enjoy hunting. "We mostly hunt deer, bears, lions, basically anything we have permits for on the ranch. We also like to go out looking for wild cows," Quincy said. Prowling for mavericks, wild cattle without brands on them, on the family ranch is a favorite past time. "There are some big cattle that elude the branding pen. They are usually wild, so they are fun to catch. We go out and search every chance we get," Quincy said.

Jared Hofstetter, Chance Kelton, Jake Barnes and Junior Nogueira have all been big influences in improving the boys' roping and riding. "All of them work hard at what they do and can break down the sport at our level so that we are successful

wherever we are as ropers. Without all of them, my brother and I would not be the ropers we are today," Everett said. After a tough go for Quincy at nationals last year, he is looking for redemption while Everett is hoping to make his first trip.

One day the boys hope to rope for matching gold buckles at the NFR together in team roping and individually in tie-down. "We would both like to go to Texas Tech University one day and rodeo on their team. I want to be a veterinarian and Everett wants to be a lawyer." Ouincy said. Their mom travels to all parts of the world doing medical missions. She took Quincy with her a few years ago and this year it was Everett's turn. "It is a tradition for us now. We went to Asia and got to ride in a hot-air balloon up to 10,000 feet," Everett said. The boys both agree they owe their success to Jesus Christ and their parents, who support their fees every weekend. They feel blessed for the opportunity to rodeo and ride great horses. 📉


Meet the Member Mike Greenleaf

ike and Patrick Greenleaf's hometown, Greensburg, Kansas was the site of the first Medicine River Rodeo production, Memorial Day weekend of 2006. Since then, the brothers have partnered producing more rodeos every year. Currently they are producing two college rodeos and more than ten KPRA rodeos.

Both boys competed in college rodeos as well as KPRA and CPRA rodeos. They both competed in steer wrestling; Mike also was a team roper. Mike and Patrick both have served on the KPRA board of directors. Patrick is currently the stock contracting representative. Their own competitions as well as their service on the KPRA board of directors, affords them the insight necessary to be successful in the stock contracting business.

In the early years, Medicine River Rodeo company leased all of the stock. Today, the Greenleaf brothers own 100% of the stock, partnering with Pat Packard of Medicine Lodge for the bulls. Mike con-

really like going to rodeos, and I like working with my horse and competing," says Kade Harland. "When I win, it's fun of course, but even when I lose, I think to myself, I'm going to get better and I'm going to keep working at it." The 14 year old from Buffalo, Oklahoma, is currently leading the ribbon roping with his partner Kylie Bryant in the KJHSRA, and he also competes in breakaway roping, goat tying, chute dogging, and team roping with heeler Kacen Smith. "My two favorites are probably roping calves and team roping. There's just something about the harmony of two people roping together and having to work with the horses. For roping calves, you have to depend on your horse a lot, and I really like that."

Kade started his rodeo career when he was 8 on his mom's barrel horse, Annie, who carried KHSRA members Beau Peterson and Kayla Olson to the NHSFR. "I've had a lot of success with Annie. My mom trains barrel horses and qualified for Nationals three times, and my dad ropes," says Kade. "I have two little twin sisters, Olivia and Avvn, and my little brother. Jace, and my mom and dad, Kim and Marc. I love them to death! Olivia competes with me, and we like it when Avyn rides with us. Jace usually runs the chutes — we have a little arena right beside our house with a calf allev, and we're all out there four to five times a week. Mom and Dad coach me as well as they can, and I owe them a lot of thanks. They're what drives this whole operation."

Kade attended a Joe Beaver roping school that came to his area several years ago, while he also looks up to high school seniors Beau Peterson and Logan Wise-





man. "They're really level-headed and can handle themselves in and out of the arena. I also want to thank Dr. Rick Olson, our veterinarian and next door neighbor, who takes special care of us." Kade's hard work in the arena earned him a place at the NJH-FR for the first time in 2017. "I went in the breakaway, and I went to the short round and I was doing pretty good, but I missed my calf. I'm trying this year to go back and win it." Kade also competes in the Young Guns Timed Events winter series, and he won a barrel saddle in the Oklahoma Northwest Junior Rodeo Association. His three all-around saddles were won in the Central Springs Youth Rodeo Association, Heartland Youth Rodeo Association, and a one-day rodeo in Borger, Texas.

Zeva, Kade's 10-year-old breakaway and ribbon roping horse, came from the Peterson family, while he rides Pepper, a 16-year-old gelding, in the team roping and goat tying. "My dad bought him when he was just a colt from Pitzer Ranch, and he's a really special horse, because all the kids in my family have learned to ride off of him. He's really calm and gentle, and a really good all-around horse."

When he's not on the rodeo trail, Kade attends Buffalo Public School. An eighthgrader, he enjoys his math class, along with

playing football, basketball, and baseball. His uncle Tim Harland is the FFA teacher at Kade's school, where Kade has been learning land judging and plant identification. Following school, Kade is off to the barn to saddle horses and ride before dark. He enjoys hanging out with his friends or reading in any spare time that crops up, and he and his family often play games after dinner.

"I plan on qualifying for Nationals again this year in all my five events," says Kade, who also plans to high school rodeo this fall. "I really want to win the allaround, and I feel that I can do it if I work hard enough."

Meet the Member **Coy Arnold**

odeo is Coy Arnold's sole sport, and the 17 year old from Hutchinson, Kansas, is homeschooled so he can travel and practice more often. He takes his school with him anywhere, including the rodeo trail, and his dedication paid off last summer when he won the 2017 KHSRA All-Around Cowboy and Tie-Down Roping Champion titles. "I was leading the calf roping going in to state finals, but I wasn't really paying attention to the all-around. I was just focusing on catching my steer for my partner," says Coy, who team roped with heeler Reed Boos. This was his first state title in high school, and he won state in the breakaway roping as an eighth grader. Coy finished 11th in the nation in the tie-down roping at the NHSFR this summer, while he competed in the IFYR in both his roping events prior to Nationals.

Coy started roping when he was 4 or 5, following after his grandparents and parents, Dusty and Stephanie Arnold, who all competed in rodeo. "My dad helps me a lot, and so do Timber and Trisha Allenbrand," says Coy. "I've stayed with them during the summers, and they've taken me to rodeos and Timber has helped me with my horsemanship. We all rodeo together and do it as a team and help everybody out." While Coy enjoys both his events, he likes the challenge of seeing how fast he can tie his calf every run, and executing what he practices at home every day. He ran the fastest tie-down roping run at the 2016 NHSFR with an 8.4, winning the second round, and he also won Mike Johnson's Junior Calf Roping in 2016.

The Arnold family makes their home outside of Hutchinson, including Cov's parents; his 14-year-old sister, Carlee, who won the all-around, breakaway roping, and ribbon roping titles in the KJH-SRA this year; and their older brother, Zane, who also ropes. They raise quarter horses for their family to ride, though they sell one or two occasionally. Cov's dad rides the colts, and Coy is in charge of the rope horses. The family raised and trained both of Coy's rope horses, Chunky and Cash. Chunky went to his first rodeo two years ago when Coy started tie-down roping, and Cov has turned him into a solid calf horse. The Arnolds also have

roping calves and steers for practice, and Coy practices every day unless it's muddy, in which case, he'll haul to an indoor arena not far away. "Sometimes if my dad can't get off work, my sister will work the chutes for me, but most of the time, my dad does it."

A senior this year, Coy admits he'd rather be riding horses or roping than doing school, but he does find math the easiest of his subjects. If he has free time, he and his family go out to eat, or Coy goes to the lake in the summer. He also likes to keep up with how professional ropers like Tuf Cooper and Tyson Durfey are doing. "I actually was lucky enough to meet them at Mike Johnson's Junior Calf Roping, and they invited me to come rope with them sometime."

Coy's goal for his senior year is to qualify for the NHSFR a third time, and he's switched from heading to heeling with Camden Hoelting. He heeled when he was in junior high and decided to switch back this season. "Hopefully I will get a scholarship to go to school and make the college finals, and after that, I hope I can make the NFR one day."



evon Eakin made a sweep through the AJRA 8 & Under division and won year-end titles in every event and the allaround at the 2017 AJRA finals. Along with his five saddles, the cowboy from Pecos, Texas, who recently turned 9, was awarded the Jimmy Cooper High Point Timed Event All-Around plaque for winning the most points over

all the boys categories. The plaque lists previous AJRA winners who are now notable PRCA cowboys, including Clayton Hass, Caleb Schmidt, Sam Powers, and Randall Carlisle. Devon looks up to many of them, and is thrilled to have his name included with theirs."Devon had consistency, which is really hard for a 7- or 8-year-old kid, and he has a really nice barrel and pole horse, Stevie. It's his second year to ride her, and she's spunky with an incredible heart. They're a perfect match," says Brandi Eakin, Devon's mom. "He's a phenomenal little goat tyer - it's one of his favorite events to practice — and his roping is coming along."

In the four years since he started rodeoing, Devon has won 22 saddles, more than 60 buckles, and a horse trailer. The saddles are shared among his grandparents, while Devon rides several of them and spreads them out around his family's house. "I really like competing with my friends and seeing them," he says. Devon is entering his fourth season in the AJRA this year, and he also competes in the High Plains Junior Rodeo Association, West Texas Junior Rodeo Association, and Region 2 Youth Rodeos. Since he's moved



up to the 9–12 division in the AJRA, Devon is entering the tie-down roping, double mugging, break-

away roping, and ribbon roping. If possible, he practices every day with his parents, Brandi and Monty, who untie calves, work chutes, and keep time. Devon also loves having goat tying competitions with his dad and tying calves at the post with his mom. Brandi competed in breakaway roping in high school and college, and Monty steer wrestles and ropes calves on the PRCA Turquoise Circuit. Devon's Grandpa and Memaw, Roger and Angela Harrison, help him with practicing and getting his goats ready to show in January, and his great-grandparents, Bud and Frances Bush, also help him practice.

The Eakins spend a lot of time in the truck since their closest rodeos are at least three hours away, and Devon passes the time with his Legos, reading, or even doing math. "I like to read a lot about snakes, and I like mystery books." He helps take care of his family's animals, including goats, a sheep, a donkey, dogs, cats, chickens, roping calves and steers, and horses. "I ride Stevie in barrels and poles and I've ridden Daisy in breakaway

and goat tying, and Ruby is my main rope horse for my four roping events."

A third-grader at Austin Elementary, Devon especially enjoys his science, art, and reading classes. "I like drawing, and I try to read about four books a week." Devon also enjoys riding his bike and hover board around his home, and he likes playing football, baseball, soccer, and basketball. "We've been focusing a lot on rodeo the last year or so, but Devon loves playing sports and he loves baseball," says Brandi. "We're trying to work hard at roping, and then work hard at baseball. He's all boy, and it's so much fun watching him. He gives it so much grit, and it's pretty amazing watching these kids rodeo."

Devon's goals for the year include adding to his saddle and buckle collection, and improving his roping skills, especially learning how to dismount and tie calves. He will compete in The American Semi Finals in Fort Worth, Texas, in February, and hopes to throw his hat in the ring for the million dollar prize.

Meet the Member **Camree Slavin**

sually a hand-me down horse comes from a sibling, but Camree Slavin got her favorite barrel horse, Wanda, from her mom Kristol. "We have owned Wanda her whole life, 21 years. My mom used to run barrels on her but now I get to. Wanda has a big heart and we have a special bond," said the 12-year-old. Camree also competes in pole bending, goat tying, breakaway roping and ribbon roping, but barrels is by-far her favorite. "My mom ran barrels on Wanda when she was pregnant with me, so I have been on a horse quite literally my entire life." Ranching has always been a big part of Kristol's family but Rusty, Camree's dad, is the rodeo man of the family.

"The biggest influence on my rodeo career is my dad. He pushes me hard, but he is always willing to help. He says that as long as I make a mistake trying he can help me correct it." Camree gets to compete with her ten-year-old sister, Chaynee. "We are very competitive with each other. When we practice we always make bets against each other, if I have the fastest time then Chaynee has to feed the goats or something like that." Both girls are taught the value of hard work and that nothing happens overnight. "I have learned a lot about patience in the goat tying. It takes a lot of practice to get an eight second run."

Making a quick goat run is a lot easier for Camree after having two eye surgeries. "It used to be that when I got tired I could not control one of my eyes. I had a surgery to fix that but about a year later I was seeing double." Sometimes Camree





would see two barrels, two exit gates and even two goats. "Poles were easy to see but getting off to tie a goat was hard. I could see two goats but only one was real." A few snips to her eye muscles later and Camree can now see perfectly.

Only seeing one barrel helped Camree win the state barrel racing and rookie of the year titles in the OKJHSRA. "I love all of my friends in the association, they make competing a lot more fun. And then the president and vice president are always doing extra things for the competitors. They work hard for both the high school and junior high associations." Camree's proudest moment in rodeo was at nationals this year in the barrels. "I remember coming home from third on my second and final run. The ground was super wet, my horse and I were covered in mud. I was proud just knowing that we made two safe runs and they were the best they could be for the ground conditions." She finished 21st, just shy of the short go.

Camree is in seventh grade at Canadian Middle School where she also plays basketball and is a cheerleader. "Basketball is my favorite, there is less drama. I like playing on a team, but I am also an individualistic person. I like rodeo because I can make all the decisions and I am not responsible for other people's mistakes." Kind-hearted teachers make English and technology her favorite classes at school. "I like to learn all the grammar rules much better than I like math or reading."

Her goal is to make it back to her favorite rodeo of the year: Nationals. "I like that the competitors get to experience so much in one place. I felt like we got to be there for a long time, I spent more than two days with all of my friends." Some people get to go on vacation once a year, but Camree gets to go just about every weekend. "It is neat that rodeo is just one sport, but it is such a big deal to so many people."

ime is of the essence for Weatherford, Oklahoma, cowgirl Aubrey Buckmaster who runs from one activity to the next all year long. An active officer of her junior class, the National Honor Society, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and the student council, Aubrey still finds time to play basketball and rodeo. "I try to balance everything while keeping my grades up and my horses ready for each rodeo. I am not even sure how I manage to get everything done anymore. Rodeo has helped me develop a lot of time management skills that is for sure," said the 16 year old.

A mind for crunching numbers, Aubrey loves taking math classes at Hydro-Eakly High School. "I am actually a pretty big nerd at school. I am also on the academic team." Concurrently enrolled at Southwestern Oklahoma State University, Aubrey is getting a jump start to her aspiring collegiate rodeo career. "I plan to continue down the rodeo road in college but I think I would like to train horses as my career one day." And always rodeo, of course.

Once an all-around competitor, Aubrey now focuses on barrels and poles. "I loved poles the most. I had a horse that taught me everything I know about it. He even took my sister to Nationals. He ignited my passion for poles." Aubrey is the middle child of Chad and Paula, her mom, between her sister, Reece, 18, and brother, Cain, 13. "My family has been in western Oklahoma for what seems like forever. My grandpa raises cattle and horses so

Though supportive, Chad was burnt out from a career in the horse industry allowing the girls' grandpa to lend a hand in their early rodeo days. "Papa is definitely our number one fan. Ever since we were little, he has kept us riding and practicing. My grandpa and dad are very much to thank for where we are today and who I credit my success to." All of their horses come straight off the ranch. "I have never actually ridden a horse that was not raised by own my family. Not many people get to say that." Even fewer get the opportunity to grow up in rodeo.

"I played sports in junior high and high school and there is just nothing that compares to the rodeo community or family. It is out of this world." Aubrey recognizes her unique opportunity to grow up in rodeo and is thankful for it every day. "All athletes put a lot of pressure on themselves to do well, I am exceptionally hard on myself. I am just trying to make the most of my last years in high school by having fun and working hard."

Some of Aubrey's best friends are her fiercest competitors in the OHSRA. "It is a tough group of people but I love that level of competition. Someone is always on their A-game and that lights a fire under me to want to do well also. It has been great growing up around the association that my dad also competed in." Aubrey always enters the arena, practice or competition, with a goal in mind. "I try to keep a positive mindset going into each weekend and Micah 7:8 at the ready: though I have fallen, I will rise."

Win or lose, Aubrey is always proud of the horses she takes home with her. "I might not come away with the best record at the rodeo but it is a win in my book because I was improving in some way." A top 15 finish in poles as a freshman and the same in barrels and poles last year keep Aubrey hunting for a top four finish and a trip to nationals this year. "I am kind of independent in that I like to figure things out for myself when it comes to training my horses." Aubrey's ultimate goal is to qualify for the American one day.

WINNING-ARE YOU IN CONTROL?

[Martha Josey's tips on competition preparation]

winner is someone who prepares prior to the competition and makes the best of what they are given on the day they compete. Rodeo is different than a lot of sports because there are just as many factors that one cannot control as the ones that you can.

The factors a person can control leading up to the competition are conditioning your horse, practicing perfect, a positive mindset and preparation for the event ahead. Going into any competition, I would grade my horse's condition on a scale of 1 to 10. If my horse wasn't ready, then I would not run him. You are in control of your horse's condition and the methods you use to get him there. Strive for perfection at a walk over and over because this will help you build muscle memory. You are not always able to practice your horse in the arena that you will be competing in, but you can find a video online to get an idea of the layout of that arena. By doing this, you can give yourself the chance to practice for that particular pen especially if there is something unique about it. Lastly your positive mind set starts weeks in advance. Everything you do and say about yourself, your ability and your horse should be positive. Picturing you and your horse doing a perfect run during your cool down after every practice and talking your game plan out loud helps to foster that positive attitude. These are actions that will allow you to control your mental game and nerves as you approach the competition.

Learning how to deal with factors one cannot control is an important skill to be successful not only in the arena but also life. You can't control the ground, arena set ups, draw, or your competitors. Ground is a controversial subject among barrel racers. I hosted my first Josev Jr World race back in 1981 and we were the first arena to have more than 1 tractor and drag after every 5 runners! We used 3 tractors. In the early part of my career, the ground was not as consistent as most of today's arenas. My recommendation is to train your horse to stand up in the turns and work off of his hind end. If the ground is not ideal, it's best to keep

your horse collected and not let them get too stretched out. If the ground is deep, then keep your horse in forward motion around the barrel as deep ground can slow him up. Drawing a bad calf or even drawing 12th out on ground is not ideal but dwelling on the fact will not help you. If I happen to be at the bottom of a drag, I ride my horse with the same confidence because I know with his training he will handle it. I've won lots of money being in those bottom holes. I love the fact that many barrel races drag every 5 and some even rake after each run. A true winner always makes their best run and stays positive and competes to win every time.

Learn to evaluate the alleyway and timer placement and plan accordingly. Although you may have previously competed there, it doesn't mean you shouldn't check the set up and ground because circumstances can change. Rodeo is about riding smart, knowing how your horse handles certain types of ground and adjusting your riding in that particular arena on that day. Check the ground and plan accordingly. You can't control if a competitor draws the ideal position and has a great run. Your attitude and preparation should focus on competing at your best and not whether you can outrun a specific competitor. Preparing and executing like a winner, will take you to the winners circle.

NIRAA Recognized



One of the entertainers at the gathering was Ivan Daines, guitarist and singer from, Innisfail, Alberta. Daines was the 1966 NIRA Champion Saddle Bronc Rider and a former NFR contestant. He also accompanied 92 years young Deb Copenhaver, 1955 and 1956 RCA World Champion Saddle Bronc Rider when the crowd was blessed to hear Copenhaver sing an inspiring rendition of "Because He Lives".

Numerous other past champions were in attendance including Cody Custer, 1992 PRCA Champion Bull Rider, PBR cofounder, and 2017 Pro Rodeo Hall of Fame Inductee; Don Johanson, 1978 Canadian Bull Riding Champion, 1986 Canadian Pro Rodeo Cowboy of the year, and 2011 CPRA Hall of Fame Inductee; and Dave Dahl, 1967 NIRA Champion Saddle Bronc Rider and bronc saddle maker. 10 or 11 of the top 15 bronc riders at this year's WNFR were riding saddles made by Dahl.

Meet the Member Kenn Ashton

two-time world record holder as the oldest person alive still riding bulls, Kenn Ashton is at the top of his game at 63 years old. He is carrying on a 44-year and counting rodeo career. The Jacobson, Minnesota, cowboy is possibly the only bull rider who has great grandchildren. "Everybody is always set back by my age. They cannot believe I am still riding and winning." The word behind the chutes is that Kenn can get hurt but he will always be back.

"I am a lifetime cowboy, my aunt had me on a horse when I was still in diapers. I have been riding bucking horses for 55 years already." Kenn knew what he wanted to do when he was just seven years old and that was rodeo. "I did not start out with the intention of riding bulls, I was a bareback rider first. I got hurt there more than I ever have in the bulls." His family used to run pony rides at rodeos. He would slip away to go ride. "We ran three ponys in the ring instead of five and kept our prices low. I have given three generations rides, I walked with people when they were kids and so on. But we no longer operate the pony rides."

February will mark 44 years married to his love, Kathleen. "I was in the army with her cousins. We have three kids: Rebecca, Bobby Jo and Hanklyn." Kenn and Kathleen are first and foremost ranchers, but are also trappers when needed. Kenn dabbles in taxidermy but mainly focuses on teaching people to ride bulls, working with horses and tinkering with new business ventures.

"I am promoting a new vest: impactsensing technology from motorcycle riders. It inflates when it senses impact." Nine



broken ribs, a broken wrist and an overextended knee are the short list of Kenn's injuries in the past two years. "This vest might extend my career. You can hurt the body but you cannot hurt the soul." Kenn preaches about a strong mental game for life and rodeo. "I always tell my students; nobody can tell you that they are not afraid. The key is learning to control that fear and put it to work for you. You can do things you never thought you could." Kenn plans to go back to college next fall, taking one class at a time.

He jokes that he was the bridesmaid everywhere he went, sitting second in the bulls. "This year I broke out of that position. I humbled myself and went down to Oklahoma to train this spring with Terry Don West. I knew most of what I was taught but they helped me dial everything in and focus." Competing in Canada has proved to be pivotal in reaching that number one position. "The U.S. is leading in Canada right now. I am challenging everyone to get fired up because I am coming. tells me I am crazy, but I still think there is room in this world for men and women with guts." In 2016, Kenn made his first trip to the NSPRA-sanctioned High River Rodeo in Canada where he broke the world record for the oldest bull rider alive. He went back in April, breaking his own record again while setting an arena record, winning with a 72-point ride. "If you can still do something, why not do it? I try to inspire people to get out there and make something of themselves."

"The strongest influence in my career has been Bob Blackwood. He has pulled my rigging tight a time or two." He is 12 points ahead in his pursuit of a national championship for 2017. "I have all the confidence in the world that I will win it this year. It does not matter your age or where you come from, it matters who you are. I am a fierce competitor."

ear Members, I hope everyone survived the Holiday season and was able to spend time with family and loved ones.



KORKOW RODEO WINS REMUDA AWARD

South Dakota rodeo company recognized for their bucking horses

he award is given to a rodeo and a stock contractor that provides the best, most consistent pen of bucking horses, creating the best opportunities for contestants to score well. The PRCA rodeo in Kennewick, Wash. won the award for the rodeo category. It was a privilege for Jim Korkow and his family, he said. "It's such an honor to be recognized for a lifetime's work."

The company started with Jim Korkow's dad, Erv, who grew up with five sisters and

impromptu Sunday afternoon saddle bronc ridings at his parents' ranch, so the young guys could visit the girls. Erv, who quit school in the eighth grade to work for a neighbor because of lean times during the Depression, started trading, breaking, and working horses to make extra money. Through his hard work, he helped his parents buy back their ranch and put each of his sisters through a year of college so they could get their teaching certificate and make their own way through life.

Erv put on his first rodeo in 1947, trailing bucking horses fifteen miles from the ranch to Blunt, S.D., picking up more horses along the way. Admission for that rodeo was a dollar per carload, and that was the beginning of Korkow Rodeo.

Erv's son Jim went to his first National Finals Rodeo (NFR) in 1959 in Dallas, when he was eighteen years old, hauling a load of bucking horses there. Since then, Korkow Rodeo has had at least one animal, often more, selected to buck at every NFR. This year, Korkow Rodeo had six bucking horses at the Wrangler NFR.

Jim and his wife Carol have three children: Faith, Misty and T.J., and T.J. has taken over the breeding program for the company. Erv started with a good set of mares and got a remount stallion from Ft. Robinson, Neb. He bred all of his mares and neighbors' mares to the stud. In the early 1950s, Erv bought five mares from Feek Tooke of Ekalaka, Montana. Three stud colts were born from those mares, and those studs were part of the basis of the Korkow breeding program.

Now the Korkows have about 25 stallions at the ranch, and TJ keeps detailed notes on the mares, studs, and their offspring.

The Remuda Award is more than just the horses, TJ said. "It's how you help cowboys out, too. You want everybody to have a chance to (win money) every time they nod their head." TJ weeds out the horses that don't buck regularly. "If I see an animal a couple times, and nobody can win on him, I won't use him anymore."

Winning the award was "outstanding," TJ said. "We're very grateful for it. It's a nice feather in our cap."

Jim said his dad Erv would have been thrilled to know the company he started was recognized for its bucking stock. "My dad was pretty damn tough on the outside, but about half of his body was heart. These kind of deals, he'd have been bawling right out loud."

"It's such a great honor," Jim said. "We're very humbled, and pretty damn happy." **¬**







I believe we are all called to be a light in a dark world. But before I can save the world, I have to start with me. I need to be



ROPER REVIEW: TANNER BROWN

f you start roping the sawhorse at nineteen months old, and enter your first junior rodeo at five years old... that's considered an early start by any standard.

Mississippi Junior High School Association allows contestants in Kindergarten through 8th grade to compete. However, National contestants must be in 6th, 7th, or 8th grade. Now a freshman, and 14 years old, Tanner has a long and impressive resume.

"Dad let me enter my first rodeo in breakaway when I was five," explains Tanner. "But I didn't start team roping off a horse until I was six or seven."

Tanner and his father, Robbie, give much of the credit for his success to their friend and horse trainer, T. D. Ramsey.

"I wanted to give Tanner the very best opportunity to succeed," says Robbie. "All of our calf horses have come from T.D. I've helped Tanner with his heeling, but overall T. D. has been most instrumental in Tanner's rodeo career."

The early start resulted in early wins for Tanner. By the time he was six, he was placing in the top ten in the Breakaway of the MJHSA. Tanner won the state title in the 4th grade, and again in the 6th, 7th, and 8th grade.


In addition to winning the Little Britches National Breakaway title in 2014, Tanner also won his division at Rising Stars calf roping.


In 2016, Tanner won the All Around title for MJHSA. He also qualified for the National Junior High School finals all three years of middle school.

EFFECTIVE AND FUN PRACTICE

eaching people to rope, and improve their roping, is what I do for a living. I enjoy teaching riding and roping and seeing the improvements people make. I think it's important to be ready to rope when you get to your cow, especially with the popularity of the World Series ropings and their barrier.

One of the big conversations I have with parents is about the practice pen. I absolutely believe kids need to make their horses work correctly. They need to prepare their horses for competition by mastering the fundamentals of scoring, running across the line, rating, pulling, and facing.... But it also needs to be fun.

If at all possible, kids need a practice horse in addition to the horse they compete on. Because, when getting your horse ready for competition and working at the fundamentals described above, it's not necessarily helping your roping. The focus is on the horse and what he needs to do. I think kids need to have a horse to ride so they can work on their roping. A horse they can practice on and test their ability without worrying about how their horse is working.

In the practice pen when someone

tells me he can catch 15 in a row without missing, I think that's a guy who's not challenging himself. To truly improve and be prepared, it's important to work at different scenarios... not just make the same runs over and over. Having a good practice horse, that you don't have to train, makes this enjoyable. I believe you have to ride your competition horse differently than your practice horse. The reason a practice horse is so valuable is it allows you to work on what you need to do to be faster.

A great practice horse is one that scores just a little and leaves flat across the line. He may not be the fastest, but you can practice riding, swinging, and roping. The same goes for heel horses. They don't need to be fast, but they do need to stop correctly. Practice horses need to be good enough that kids can work and focus on their roping.

Some parents have a tendency to make their kids do everything correctly in the practice pen and the kids don't really have a chance to enjoy it. I don't disagree that they need to work at their roping, but the fact is, if they don't enjoy it they will find something else to do.

There are many beneficial videos on speedroping.com for kids and adults. If you want to watch some of my daughter's runs with my tips, visit the site and do a search with her name, Hali. Most are free to watch.

WORKING OUT THE KNOTS



hadn't started a colt in a loooong time and I was actually kind of excited about getting to start Strider's first colt. Within 5 rides, we were venturing outside the arena where a whole new world of 'boogers" exist. Seven was doing great and I had a couple of events in AL and MS so it was a great opportunity to haul him along with Strider and get him acclimated to all kinds of new sights, sounds and experiences. I had opportunities to ride him in a few state parks that had horse trails so he could experience more than the inside of an arena. By the time we got back from that trip it was time to up the game.

[Once we quit fighting Him and YIELD....He rewards us with rest.]

Horses are pretty much like us in some ways. When they're young and untested, they will have their imaginary boundaries and if you never push them past those, you will have a horse that will be willing to do so much but no more. He will be a perfect angel as long as you don't mess with his koolaid. But if you start expecting more from him than he thinks he should give, oh brother, the fangs come out! I sometimes call it a "knot." You know, like when a massage therapist finds that tight spot in your neck or shoulders and that's where they immediately camp. Everything feels GOOD until they start attacking those knots!

Well, that's kinda what we have to do when riding those young horses. You find the "knot"....that spot where they say ... "Uh-uh!" "I'm DONE here!" One of the best way I know to bring those knots to the surface is by loping circles. You can walk and trot big, nice circles and all will be fine. But up the speed one notch and start loping and whatever "knots" are in there, will surely work their way to the surface! Course, in all honesty, I can't blame them. I HATE going in circles. In the arena AND in life. The colt has to think...."this makes NO SENSE!" "We're going NO-WHERE!" "My rider must be an idiot!" "I'm DONE with this!" And they grab the bit, or simply just stiffen their neck and

blow off down the pen, hoping to escape the tyranny of it all.

I don't know about you, but I've done the same thing. I have found myself in situations that made NO SENSE to me at all !! I would be going nowhere....just flying a sort of holding pattern. Not going ANY-WHERE but seemingly never landing anyplace in particular either. I've grabbed the bit and tried to make things happen with the hopes of it getting me out from where I was. Every time I did this.....I (just like that colt) had to circle LONGER. Until I would surrender, quit grabbing the bit and instead, YIELD to the pressure that I was under! Once that colt quits fighting and yields to what we're asking, we release the pressure and reward him with REST. That's exactly how God handles us. Once we quit fighting Him and YIELD He rewards us with rest. God is gonna put pressure on our "knots", I can guarantee it! Might as well yield to Him, because it's always about making us a better person and bringing us to a place where He can reward us with greater blessings! When you can't make any sense out of where you are, that's when you need to trust Him most! Let Him work that knot out REST will immediately follow.

COOK SHACK MEXICAN LASAGNA

INGREDIENTS:

- 12 white corn tortillas 1 16 oz. jar spaghetti sauce
- 1 large Spanish or white onion, chopped

1 large can chopped green chiles

DIRECTIONS:

Meat Sauce: In a large cast iron skillet, brown meat and onions. Add taco seasoning mix and spaghetti sauce. Mix well and add minced garlic and chopped green chiles. Stir and cover; simmer on low heat for 2 to 3 hours. Remove from heat and leave covered to cool for 1 hour.

In a 9x13 baking dish, spread 6 corn tortillas on bottom layer (may overlap). Add

meat sauce prepared above. Spread thin layer ricotta cheese and half the Mexican cheese on top. Bake in 400 degree oven 30 to 45 minutes or until cheese is lightly brown on top. Serve with corn jalapeno muffins and a green salad.

INGREDIENTS:

- ¹/₂ cup pimentos
- $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ jalapeno pepper

- $1\frac{1}{2}$ cups grated cheese
- 1 lb. onion, chopped
- 1 cup whole grain corn

odeo has become important to 14-year-old, Allie Frey, from Eunice, Louisiana, not only because she loves it, but because she has seen first-hand the relationships it brings to rodeo family lives. Allie is not the first rodeo competitor in her family, and with a family tree like hers, she doesn't think she will likely be the last. Allie lives with her parents, Winston and Cindy Frey, on a farm that has been in the Frey family for generations. She has grown up watching both of her older sisters compete in rodeo; Millie, a high school freshman, a current LHSRA competitor, and Chloe, a freshman at McNeese State University, traveled up the same LJHSRA and LHSRA roads, that Allie is now on. However, the Frev family rodeo path began many years ago, as Allie's grandfather, Warren Frey, competed in LHSRA, winning a 1956 National High School Rodeo Bareback Riding Champion title in Reno, Nevada. Warren went on

to compete for McNeese College in Lake Charles, Louisiana, as a team MVP, in bareback riding, bull riding and steer wrestling. He was a National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association Bull Riding Champion in 1958. Allie's grandpa returned to his family farm after college, farming rice, cattle, and raising another generation of rodeo competitors with Allie's grandmother Verna, who passed away in 2012. They had five children, that all competed in rodeo growing up, and have went on to raise their children in the same lifestyle. Allie's father Winston, was a PRCA steer wrestling competitor from 1990 to 2000, competing at the WNFR in 1993. Winston came back to the family fam that he and his father both grew up on, and now runs the same operation himself, as he in turn raises another branch of the rodeo family tree.

This year, Allie will complete her third year with the Louisiana Junior High Rodeo Assocation, competing in barrel racing and pole bending, with her sights set on gold buckles at the National Junior High Finals this June. Allie's barrel horse, a palomino mare named Dixie, used to carry her sister Chloe in competition, but has been Allie's main barrel horse for the past three years. In pole bending, Allie runs a blaze-faced, sorrel Quarter Horse gelding named Two Eyed Trey Bar, but he is simply called "T". He is 22 years old, and has brought riders to junior high and high school national finals 17 times, including her sister Chloe, for 5 years. Allie loves that "he is fast, consistent and fun to ride, he really likes his job."

Allie enjoys being in the Honors Program as an 8th grade student at the Academy of the Sacred Heart in Grand Coteau, Louisiana. She likes the challenges in her physical science class, and thinks that becoming a pediatrician could be in her future. Allie takes part in school athletics, playing basketball and volleyball, which is her favorite. After school, Allie spends time with her two border collies, Sister and Vegas, practices in the arena, and helps to take care of all the horses and cattle on the family farm. The family raises Braford cattle, and Brahmas, which Allie used to also show. Allie enjoys helping her mom out at her western store, Frey Outfitters, in Eunice, selling the latest western wear, gifts and accessories.

Allie's dad, whom she calls "poppa," is the 2nd vice president of the LJHSRA, and Allie says she loves that her family is involved, as well as the friendships that the association brings to her life. "It's all about competition, but when you've been in it so long, and have known the people that long, it's not just about the competition, they're your family." She mentioned she loves hearing her poppa's stories about the friends he traveled with while he competed in the PRCA. "Those friends he traveled with became family for life. My poppa always talks to Ote Berry, and he is like an uncle to us." Allie appreciates the support of her sisters and poppa, and all they help her with rodeo, and looks up to her mom with respect for all she has accomplished in her business and life, and for being her biggest fan. 📉

Meet the Member Blake Chauvin

lthough 17-year-old Blake Chauvin, of Raceland, Louisiana had every opportunity to ride and rodeo as a young child, he started out with more interest in playing football. However, things took a serious change of direction when Blake picked up a calf rope in 6th grade, and he has hardly put one down, since. Blake lives on his family's 90-acre farm, with his mother Simone Chauvin, father Jerome Marcell, and step-brother Jacob Marcell, 23. Blake's grandfather, Ridley Chauvin, is 78 years old, also still lives on the farm, where his daughter Simone was raised, and is a very big part of Blake's daily life.

Blake started practicing roping while he was in the 6th and 7th grades, and began competing in LJHSRA in the 8th grade. Blake entered tie-down roping, goat tying and ribbon roping, and his first year out, he was the LJHSRA Tie-down champion, and qualified for the NJHFR in all three of his events. That summer, at the NJHFR in Des Moines, Iowa, he won the 1st round in tie-down roping with a smoking 8.8 second run. Blake is now in the middle of his fourth and final year as a tie-down roper with the LHSRA.

Blake has been surrounded by calf horses and ropes his whole life. His grandfather Ridley competed in the Louisiana Rodeo Association long before Blake was born, winning the LRA Tie-Down Roping Champion title in 1966 and 1968. After competing for close to 20 years, in the LRA, Tri-State Rodeo, and PRCA, he hung up his competitive rope at the age of 55. Blake's mom, Simone, is a breakaway roper and barrel racer, and competed in LHSRA, followed by competing in the

LRA and Tri-State Rodeo Association. Blake credits both his grandpa and mom for having great horses for him to ride, and giving him great advice. "My grandpa is always trying to make me better. He watches me practice every day. He is at every one of my rodeos, every single one."

Blake has four horses that he practices on, but currently relies on two of them the most for competition. "Pedro is a 14-yearold bay quarter horse. He has a lot of run, a lot of stop, and always pulls no matter how loud it gets." Blake practices, every day, at his neighbor, Wesley Arcement's arena, that is just about a mile away from the Chauvin farm. Blake has been competing on a horse named Reno, that he has been borrowing from Wesley. "Reno is a little bay, 10-year-old Quarter Horse, and I actually intend to buy him from Wesley soon, I like him so much. He has a lot of stop, scores good, runs, and he pulls just right every time."

Blake is a senior at Central Lafourche High School in Raceland, Louisiana. After school, he takes care of the cattle herd he purchased last year. Blake has about 40 head of Black Angus right now, including calves, and hopes to grow that herd for his future. After basic farm chores, he and his grandpa head to Wesley's to practice roping. Blake's weekends are filled with rodeos, as he competes not only in LHSRA, but also in the Cajun Rodeo Association, and the Louisiana Rodeo Association. He



is generally competing in 2-3 rodeos every weekend, every weekend of the month. Blake has made the finals for the CRA the past three years, and ended up the reserve champion tie-down roper, while winning the average at the 2016 CRA Finals. "Every spare moment, every second I have I'm either

roping, or doing something pertaining to roping." After Blake turns 18 in March, he plans to start competing in the PRCA Southeastern Region rodeos. When he graduates in June, he will head out with friend, Polo Bacque, who currently competes in the region, and take a shot at making the finals.

Blake tries to follow the advice his grandpa and mom have given him, "Always keep God first and try to stay humble." He looks up to God, his grandpa and Wesley Arcement as wonderful role models to follow. Blake also appreciates his sponsors, Cowboy Cordage and Best Ever Pads.

Meet the Member Sienna Ricciardi

on't tell me the sky is the limit, when there are footprints on the moon," a saying that fuels twelve-year-old Sienna Ricciardi to keep pushing herself towards her rodeo aspirations. The sixth grade, Forsyth Country Day School student, began her rodeo career on a borrowed horse just three years ago, but her tremendous passion for the sport led to her buying her first horse, a tall, 19-year-old palomino quarter horse gelding named "Tex", the next year. "My favorite event to run on Tex is barrel racing. I love his personality, he is all business and always gives all of his heart, but he has a sense of humor too." Although this is only her second vear competing in the Junior Southern Rodeo Association, she competes with a determination that's roots run deep. Sienna was resolved to enter multiple events this year. After focusing her efforts in the practice pen, she now competes in barrel racing, pole bending, goat tying and breakaway roping. Although she was proud to accomplish her goal of starting to breakaway rope this year, goat tying is indeed her favorite event to compete in.

Sienna lives in Clemmons, North Carolina with her parents, Ralph and Chrisann, and older brother, Giovanni. Sienna's parents both work in Winston-Salem, North Carolina; Chrisann as an instructor at Forsyth Technical Community College, and Ralph as the owner of West End Auto Clinic. Their family time is split between supporting 16-year-old Giovanni at practice and his West Forsyth High School football games, and practice and rodeos

for Sienna. "I've definitely been influenced by my brother's work ethic when it comes to football. He inspires me to work harder." Sienna has taken her brother's lead in the training department, and trains on footwork and improving muscle strength, once a week at Momentum Personal Training in Winston Salem. She feels it helps her to be more athletic and quick on her feet as she ties goats. Before rodeo, Sienna was quite involved in basketball, competing in an Amateur Athletic Union girls' basketball league, but had to trade in her basketball to keep up with the rodeo schedule she chose this past year. However, she does plan to play basketball in local games for her middle school this year, in addition to her third season with the JRSRA and her first season with the North Carolina Junior High Rodeo Association.

This past January, Sienna started weekly lessons with Believe to Achieve rodeo coach, Tracy Morris, who specializes in working with youth rodeo athletes. Sienna notes that she observed positive

changes in her ability, and has placed more in her events, since starting her lessons. Besides practicing at the Believe to Achieve arena, in Cleveland, North Carolina, Tracy often accompanies Sienna and other students to rodeos, loaning them horses, and coaching them throughout the rodeo, not only on how to excel in their events, but on how to be tough competitors. "Tracy always gets straight to the point. She is honest, and modest about her own accomplishments. She always makes her students believe that we can achieve whatever we want to."

Time-management is an important skill learned early in the Ricciardi household, and Sienna manages to not only be a great student, practice and train for rodeos, and support her brother at football games; but also works part-time at the Oak Grove Farm and Equestrian Complex, in Lewisville, North Carolina, where her horse, Tex, is stabled. Typically, Sienna assists with cleaning stalls, watering and feeding, as well as turning out horses. When she does have some down-time at home, she likes to watch her favorite football team, the Dallas Cowboys, or watch cooking shows on television, while she cuddles with her favorite chihuahua, Chloe. When looking to the future, Sienna dreams of attending Texas Tech University, and competing on their rodeo team, while studying for a career working with animals in some capacity.

Sienna believes that the JRSRA is unparalleled when it comes to the people running it. "They are always helpful, and I always appreciate everyone's support." Additionally, Sienna is very grateful for the support of her family, Tracy Morris, and her sponsor, the North Point Chrysler, Plymouth, Ram, Jeep Superstore of Winston Salem, North Carolina. 📅

Meet the Member Alexandra Turner

t just ten vears old, Alexandra Turner lived in Ash Flat, Arkansas, and had no idea that rodeo would become such a big part of her life. Alexandra would ride her Quarter Horse, Hippy, around for fun, occasionally pushing cattle down the arena as she watched her dad and brother roping at Morris Hall's roping pen on Sunday afternoons. She began riding Hippy in speed events like barrel racing and pole bending, and found a love for competition with horses. Alexandra's 4-H Leader, Nancy Orr, and her husband Dan, brought her into the world of western pleasure horses. and Alexandra rode the Orr's horses in western pleasure competitions until she was 18 years old. After graduating high school, she attended Ozarka College, followed by the University of Arkansas Community College Batesville, where she graduated with her Associates degree in nursing in 2014. Six years ago, when she began dating a tie-down roper, Travis Turner, a strong interest in roping began. Travis was actively competing in tie-down roping at many rodeos, and his son Blaine was a breakaway roper. With all the time Alexandra Turner - Jessica Vance

she was spending with them roping, she started getting instruction from Travis and began roping also. Alexandra and Travis married in 2015, and now live in Cave City, Arkansas and have a two-yearold son they named Braxton.

In 2016, Alexandra had purchased her Arkansas Cowboy Association card for the second year, and came into the season finals as the number one breakaway roper. She didn't have the finals she hoped for, and ended up in third place at the season's end. This only fueled Alexandra to work harder and set special goals for the 2017 ACA season. Alexandra spent much of 2017 juggling responsibilities and passions, while as a wife and new mother, she worked full-time while continuing to practice and attend most of the ACA season rodeos, with her new young son, Braxton, as her main traveling partner. She competed in breakaway roping on her husband's 21-year-old, sorrel, tie-down horse, Badger. "Badger is one of my favorites, he is really good, he gives me the opportunity to win every time I back into the box." Alexandra also competed in team roping, as a

header, on her big grey gelding that she's owned for three years, known as RB. "My husband called him Ricky Bobby to tease me, because he is really fast, and I started calling him RB for short. I love heading on him because he is really forgiving and honest. He will try his hardest every time, he has no quit." Both horses helped to bring her to the 2017 ACA season finals, where she accomplished her goals of becoming the Champion Breakaway Roper, as well as the Women's All-Around Champion. Badger was also named the 2017 Breakaway Horse of the Year.

Setting goals is of the utmost importance to Alexandra, when rodeoing and in life. "Rodeo is hard, you have to work at it. Some people have more natural talent than others, but either way, you still have to practice to be good. I think the biggest thing is setting goals for what you want to accomplish, and then working hard to reach those goals." Alexandra is considering adding tie-down roping to her list of events in the 2018 ACA season. She currently competes at local rodeos in tie-down roping on her childhood horse Hippy, who is now 19, and loves the challenge the event offers. "You have to think a lot, because there are several steps to it, and you have to think about and execute every step throughout the run."

Alexandra likes the fact that competing in the ACA allows her to compete at a higher level, but still compete close to home. Many scheduled rodeos fall within a 100-mile radius, allowing her to spend the week working, but still make it to most of the rodeos. Because Alexandra travels to rodeos with Braxton, she loves the family atmosphere there is in the ACA. The association has become like an extended family to her, as she knows most of the competitors, and they see each other so often throughout the season, supporting and helping each other along the way.

Meet the Member Gunar Ramsey

roughy, turned timed-event cowboy, 30-year-old, Gunar Ramsey, has entered every event except saddlebronc riding during his lifetime rodeo career. Gunar moved up the typical rodeo ranks, starting out riding calves and steers in junior rodeos near his home in Frierson, Louisiana. He was about 10 years old when a steer riding accident caused his parents to put a hold on his roughstock career and encouraged him to focus on roping. Gunar spent the next several years calf roping and team roping, until as a sophomore in high school, his dad, Shane Ramsey, bet him \$40 to enter the steer wrestling at a local rodeo. This new event began the next chapter in Gunar's life, as he began to rodeo in Texas High School Rodeo Association, Region 5, and qualified for state finals his junior and senior year, in both steer wrestling and team roping, on his horse named Spook.

Gunar learned a lot during his childhood, watching his dad train horses to team rope, calf rope and run barrels. When he was 12, his dad gave him a sorrel, Quarter Horse, yearling colt to train and call his own. He named the horse Spook, because he was so spooky on the ground, watching everything around him. "He was really hard to catch, I used to have to hide in a feed trough and throw my arms around his neck when he came close." Under his dad's guidance, Gunar trained Spook, and he became the allaround horse he used for team roping, calf roping, and steer wrestling through-

out high school and college. "My dad taught me everything I know, and the lessons he taught me about learning the start, keeping my eyes on the livestock and controlling horses in the box have been so important."

Following high school, in 2006, Gunar grabbed hold of his roughstock roots, getting on a bull for the first time, after entering the bull riding at a UPRA rodeo in Texas. After re-igniting the roughstock flame, he went on to ride bulls from 2006 thru 2014. In 2008, Gunar joined the Hill Junior College Rodeo team in Hillsboro, Texas as an all-around cowboy, but it was bull riding that brought him to the NIRA National Finals in 2010. Gunar purchased his PRCA permit, and made the 2010 Texas Circuit Finals as well as the All-American Pro Rodeo finals. After college, in 2011, Gunar left Spook at his dad's, and his sister Emily, now 18, ran barrels

on him; while Gunar spent the next three years focusing on bull riding in multiple associations, including the PBR, Championship Bull Riding Association and Cowboys Professional Rodeo Association. While Gunar was competing at the CBR World Finals in 2012, in Cheyenne, Wyoming, he met his wife Julianne. Although Gunar experienced several minor injuries during his bull riding career, it was an injury early in 2014; when a bull stepped on his abdomen, that blew out the roughstock flame that had been burning.

Gunar married Julianne in 2014, they moved back to her hometown of Falkville, Alabama in 2015, and now have a twoyear-old daughter they named Cheyenne. Gunar brought Spook to Alabama with them, and after being turned out to pasture for many months, and neither of them steer wrestling for close to 5 years, they entered a local rodeo, making a 3.9 second run at the beginning of the 2016 Southeastern Professional Rodeo Association season. This spurred Gunar on to buy his card, focusing only on steer wrestling, and he and Spook made the 2016 SPRA finals, and placed 2nd in a round. Gunar, his wife and daughter, now haul Spook to 2 to 3 rodeos nearly every weekend of the month, and he is a member of multiple rodeo associations. Spook, now 19, is still an all-around horse, working on his next generation of rodeo athletes, as recently, Gunar took Cheyenne to her first junior rodeo on him. Although Gunar missed part of the season, he is feeling good about going into the 2017 SPRA finals in 5th place, and appreciates the convenience the association offers by cosanctioning many rodeos, as well as having finals that are done over two days, and a short trip from home. 째

family tradition that simply does not quit, for the Robertson family from Birch Run, Michigan, that is what rodeo in the MSRA is for them. Travis, Terri and Colby Robertson currently travel within a 100-mile radius from their ranch to compete in MSRA and IPRA events. "My favorite aspect is that the rodeos are close to home. If we were in another association we would have to spend a lot more time in the truck," Terri said. She has competed in the MSRA for almost 30 years now, the same as her husband Travis. "My family has been in rodeo for what seems like forever. I started in 4-H and then bought my MSRA card when I was 16. I was a bull rider but now I team rope and am a pickup man sometimes," Travis said.

He decided to put bull riding behind him when he met Terri and decided he would be spending the rest of his life with her. All three of their daughters, Casey, 22, Carson, 19, and Colby, 16, essentially grew up in rodeo and the MSRA. "I was practically born into the MSRA. I know everyone that we rodeo with so they are just an extension of my family," Colby said. Casey is pursuing her nursing degree at Delta College while Carson is working while launching her career as a musician. "Casey was actually the youngest person in the MSRA to win rookie of the year in 2007 when she was only 12. She still competes today but Carson lost interest when she lost her horse several years ago," Terri said.

Ask anyone, the Robertson's are a close-knit group. "There is no other sport in the world that you get to travel as a family and compete on the level that we do. I like that unique aspect of it," Travis said. The additional support on the sidelines and in the practice pen keeps the Robertsons on the top of their game. A trip to the IFR in 2013 for Terri with several appearances at MSRA finals, is just the short list of what this barrel racer has accomplished. "The year leading up to the IFR was a good one for me, lots of great runs

all while I was fighting off West Nile," Terri said.

The addition of breakaway roping to the MSRA is a huge bonus for Colby. "I like roping calves better than I like running barrels. It is very fast-paced and you have to be on you're a-game every time." Appearances in Canada, Gillete and the Michigan high school finals are small notches in her belt when compared to winning the Bluebonnet Feed Youth Challenge through Rodney Yost Horsemanship. "I made a video for my application and won a two-year-old filly named Pearl to break and train as my own. We picked her up in South Dakota this past April," Colby said.

Travis is the general manager for Custom Components Truss Company but is still a pickup man and flanks horses for Twisted P Rodeo Company on occasion. Named pickup man of the year four times in the MSRA, Travis is the guy you want at your side. "Every time I do well it is a proud moment but I am most proud when watching my family compete and do well for themselves," Travis said.

Situated on over 100 acres with a lake taking up 20 acres of it, the family has plenty of room for all their horses and cattle. "We probably have about 14 horses but sometimes I lose track since we have babies and then buy and sell quite a few," Terri said. On the rare occasion the family is not at a rodeo they spend time out on their lake. "Usually we are gone in our free time or working horses," Terri added. The family's favorite rodeos to attend are at Michigan State University and Cow Camp for the sell-out crowds and because they have been going to them for as long as they can remember. "Rodeoing as a family has been great from the beginning. All of our girls grew up traveling and watching Travis and I compete. The most important thing to me is that we get to all be together doing what we love."

Meet the Member **Troy Musser**

uring AFR 39, Troy Musser was in the stands. One year later, he was backing into the roping box at AFR 40 with Ty Parkinson. The team finished fourth in the average at the finals, while Troy roped his way to the 2017 APRA Team Roping Header Rookie of the Year title. He also competed in the MSRA and finished in the top 12 in the team roping, along with the top 15 in the Cinch Team Roping Challenge at the All American Quarter Horse Congress. When he went to the pay window, his winnings were sealed in an envelope per Troy's specifications, and his season's earnings—\$3,112—were donated to St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

A true rookie in the rodeo world, 52-year-old Troy from Jersey Shore, Pennsylvania, did everything he could to change that when he retired in November of 2016. Though he's wanted to rodeo since childhood, Troy served in the United States Coast Guard for two years after he finished high school, then started working in construction and formed his own construction company. He branched out to buying rental properties, and now owns several hotels and a nursing home. "Rodeo is what I've wanted to do my whole life but couldn't, so I knew I wanted to do this before I got too old," says Troy. "I didn't want to sit in the stands anymore." His search for team roping lessons led him to AFR 39 in Atlantic City, where he made several contacts, but admits he didn't like hearing his progress in roping would likely take years, not months.

Troy eventually contacted roper Tish Luke who put him in touch with Joe Beaver. At the time, Troy didn't know





much about Joe beyond his work as a rodeo announcer, but when he got a call from the eight-time world champion cowboy inviting him to come rope in Okeechobee, Florida, for a few days, Troy was thrilled. A few days turned into four months spent roping with Joe Beaver, Tish Luke, Casey Cox, and Jason Hanchey. Even after Troy broke two ribs when his horse, Spanky (formerly team roper Spunk Sasser's horse) rolled with him, there was no turning aside from his goal. "We kept going and practicing all day long, seven days a week. January 28

was the World Series Roping in Jacksonville, Florida, and Tish Luke said I was entering. I had only 30 days of practice. I turned three out of four steers and about lost my wedding ring finger there, and at that point I knew I was hooked!"

Troy entered his first APRA rodeo in April in Boston riding White Horse, but retired the horse and roped off Short Go throughout the summer. "Short Go took me all the way to the finals in Atlantic City, and the week before, he came up lame, so I got on another horse, Lightbulb, and Ty Parkinson came and practiced with me. He has taken so much time out of his career to help me, and I'm grateful that someone that high up took the time to help a rookie. The whole rodeo community was so good to me; it's been a dream come true. The long nights of driving were the hardest part of the season, but my wife, Kim, drove every night from midnight to seven, and that was huge. I

The Musser family congregates at Troy and Kim's farm often, where Troy runs 45 head of Angus beef cattle, along with roping steers and seven horses. Joe Beaver helped design Troy's arena, while the barn holds the usual farm equipmentand many memories. A wall of the barn has been designated to hold all of the flyers from rodeos Troy entered last season, along with his coats and buckles from the finals. "Montana Silversmiths created a buckle for me that has all the finals on it-APRA, Mid States, and Congress-and we had one made for our granddaughter who was born last year."



Spurred on by his love for the adventure that is life, Troy has also earned his pilot's license, gone deep sea diving in Jamaica, and run in the Hyner View Trail Challenge, running 17.3 miles in just over four hours. Competing in the APRA finals completed his three goals of flying, diving, and rodeoing-competing in the IPRA and PRCA are his goals this year. "Three years in a row of three things I never thought I'd be," says Troy, who is spending the winter in Florida roping. "On my rodeo shirt collars it says "believer"-believe in God and you can do anything. If you start something, finish it, and be the best you can be. It doesn't matter how old you are!" 째

New Rule, Page 100

If a flag judge flags a contestant out and the contestant has a jump or a loop remaining, contestant shall receive a rerun on the same animal. The rerun will be lap and tap with the time recorded when he or she was flagged out or a minimum of 5 seconds added to the time.

Page 113, Rule 9

Add to Rule

A roper after completion of the tie shall not manipulate his rope or make gestures to his horse that may affect the lay of the calf.

Page 104, Rule #4

Add after first sentence....

Failure to do so will result in a five (5) point deduction per side that mark out is missed.

Rule to read.....

The contestant must have both spur rowels touching the animal, one on each side of the animal, anywhere above the break of the shoulders when the animal's front feet touch the arena floor the first time out of the bucking chute. Failure to do so will result in a five (5) point deduction per side that mark out is missed.

Page 107, Rule #4

Add after second sentence.....

Failure to do so will result in a five (5) point deduction per side that mark out is missed.

Rule to read.....

The contestant must have both spur rowels touching the animal, one on each side of the animal, anywhere above the break of the shoulders when the animal's front feet touch the arena floor the first time out of the bucking chute. Failure to do so will result in a five (5) point deduction per side that mark out is missed.



Rule to read....

A leather covered pad MUST be ou the entire underside of the bareback rigging next to the animal and extend a minimum of four (4) inches from the back of the rigging. Pads must be loose, can be attached to rigging or larger than a minimum of fifteen (15) inches and a maximum of twenty-five inches.

Rule to read.... There will be no finger tucks in the bareback riding.







