MOURNING AND LOSS

Our community suffered a substantial blow. A talented young 18 yrs. old left this earth this week. As his mother screamed in unbelief his father faced the task of caring for her and taking care of business during his own unimaginable mourning.

Our church and this town rallied around this family quickly over the next few days. As a community member, friend, human and Pastor I was proud of this group. The sadness came down like a West Coast fog on the town and has not fully dissipated yet. The funeral was packed.

I wondered how many times I have taught on loss and knew I had done it recently. Sure enough, the last time was February of this year. In reviewing my notes, I realized they had a sort-of stale feeling. There were some good illustrations, and I was probably able to give an engaging talk about it but reading it now it feels academic and flat in the face of this sadness.

Here's my revised version.

There is a time to let the hurt simply hurt. Although the pain may feel like it is going to kill us it won't. In some ways like childbirth or a broken leg, we need to keep breathing and hunker down for the ride.

There is a time to let the hurt out and send the loss into the universe with screams and cries. I imagine I will want to punch something and physically exhaust myself as I attempt to mark the cosmos with my screams. Everyone will do this differently.

There is a time to rest and recover. Not check-out of life but to allow ourselves enough margin and space to regroup. To sleep. To let our broken hearts settle. To find ourselves.

There is a time to let safe others into the pain with us. Those with pat answers and familiar cliché's are not the ones. The safe ones are the few who not afraid of our pain, tears and can sit quietly in the loss with us.

There is a time to name the core loss. Not the obvious names but the ones behind the obvious. Things like loss of meaning, security, importance, hope, reason, motivation or even a lifestyle change.

There is a time to start again. Re-enter

and begin to re-engage life. Maybe in different ways with different people and different places.

There is a time to set a new course or at least a fresh old one. This is in no way to forsake "what was" but to honor "what was" by creating a strong "what is." History needs to honor the future and visa-versa.

There is a time to stand up and walk. As Samuel was mourning the loss of Saul, God told him to "fill his horn" and act. To move in a redemptive way. The pain is there. The loss hasn't changed. But, when the time is right, we must stand up and move like the invalid at the well.

There is a time to reach out. To serve. Jesus did this after the news of John the Baptist death. In his mourning and loss of a cousin, Jesus interrupts his heart-break to feed the five thousand. There is something healing in serving during mourning. I have witnessed many grieving families comfort grieving guests at the funeral. Service may be the antidote to mourning. Not to cover, numb or deny the pain as some might do, but to

move by faith in the midst of the pain. A counter-intuitive effect takes place inside of us.

There is a time to reflect. To learn about ourselves. To learn lessons about others and about life itself. To gain wisdom and put words to feelings and ideas so we can pass them on. Thoughts and feelings that don't have words attached cannot be transferred into a wisdom we can pass on. The ideas stay nebulous and swarm randomly around in our heads. Reflecting is when we see ourselves clearer and get the chance to grow.

Loss and mourning is the gritty and raw razor sharp edges of being human. The cuts and hurts are real. Our humanness is directly in our face and doesn't blink. We all must face the monster of heart ache.

For those who are hurting this month, I am thinking of you as I write. For those who are not, be aware that many are and that we all get our day.

Susie and I are going to be at Southpoint Casino doing Cowboy Church December 5th at 10:30am. Come see us. 📍

CHOICES AND CIRCUMSTANCES

This October marks the second anniversary of the diagnosis for my youngest son, Waylon. On October 16th, 2019, my husband and I were celebrating our 4th wedding anniversary with the gender reveal ultrasound for our youngest child.

The doctor came into the room, told us that we were having another boy, but said he has a condition called Spina Bifida. He went on to say that most parents terminate the pregnancy, but that we should take some time to think, and get back with them on what we wanted to do.

I remember being scared and numb, but frustrated more than anything because this doctor was talking like an abortion wasn't a big deal. My child wasn't perfect so we should just abandon ship... He acted like taking the life of a child just because of a few imperfections was ok. We had a choice to make, but it wasn't to terminate, it was about finding options that were available to HELP our baby boy.

There is a lot of misinformation about Spina Bifida, and so much of the material is outdated.

There are 5 things people should know about Spina Bifida. 1.) It is a neural tube defect which means the spine doesn't form correctly while in the mother's womb thus affecting the brain, spine, and an individual's mobility. 2.) It is known as the snowflake defect because each child diagnosed has different ailments... There are three levels, and Myelomeningocele is the most severe. This is what our son has which

means his mobility capabilities are on the extremely limited side but that's just what they say. I think Waylon is going to surprise us with what he can do. 3.) Spina Bifida babies often have equal to or greater IQ's than their siblings. 4.) Spina Bifida babies are some of the happiest babies. They don't know any different, and are just so excited to share life with you. 5.) 66% of babies diagnosed with Spina Bifida are terminated.

There are options out there like in-utero surgery that my son and I did.. he was only 22 weeks and a few centimeters in length when we had the surgery.

During this surgery, they open the mother just like a c-section, expose the back of the baby in order to seal the lesion or exposed spine, and then put the baby back inside to wait another few months for the due date..

The young ones that endure this surgery literally are born twice. I have never felt such excruciating pain as healing from that surgery with a baby still growing inside, but it was so worth it.

Too many people blame the circumstances in their life for the way they are or why they aren't more successful or whatever the case may be. But circumstances don't shape a person, choices do. Circumstances are like the green colt or the old solid ranch horse. There are wild and crazy, bad circumstances, and there are some really good circumstances, unbelievable blessings, and beautiful, calm moments.

It's how you choose to train that colt and use that good ol' ranch horse. That's where the shaping takes place, and that's by choice.

If you don't train yourself well or take care of yourself, and make the right choices then you'll just keep going off track. Focus, see your capabilities, and work

hard to be the best version of yourself that you can be every day, and choose wisely.

One of my favorite quotes from my childhood was from Dumbledore in the Harry Potter series. He told Harry, "It is not our abilities that show what we truly are. It is our choices."

Choose to work hard and not take the easy way out, choose to take chances, choose to keep the faith and keep fighting. Choose to make the right choices. And if you go down a wrong path, it's ok, just have the willingness to correct your mistakes and move forward. Don't lose hope.

A recent article I read said, "Unwise choices do not stop God from loving us, forgiving us, redeeming our mess, and continuing to use us in the Kingdom of God. If you have fallen into a pattern of sin and are living in the reality of tough consequences. God gives us a way out of temptation and new mercies each morning."

"No temptation has overtaken you that is not common to man. God is faithful, and he will not let you be tempted beyond your ability, but with the temptation he will also provide the way of escape, that you may be able to endure it." 1 Corinthians 10:13 ESV

Choose to do the right thing even when others are not. Choose to grow and change for the better when you know it's what's best for you and the ones you love. We are so glad we chose life for our Waylon; he is a true blessing.

October is Spina Bifida Awareness month, and we love our Spina Bifida boy! 🍌

On the Trail WITH TYLOR TODD

[Although you won't find a horse and rider tracking a cow down the fence at a professional event, it's a common occurrence in high school rodeo. That's what kept Tylor Todd competing in the Kansas High School Rodeo Association after she relinquished her dreams of being an accomplished breakaway roper.]

If it wasn't for Tylor Todd's older sister, Taylor, the now 18-year-old may have never gotten into her one true love: reined cow horse. Both girls were predisposed to becoming equestrians if they chose to, and they had the freedom to decide what discipline to pursue.

"My dad tripped steers in the PRCA and his side of the family was always involved in rodeo, so I've been riding my whole life," said the 2021 Manhattan Virtual Academy high school graduate from Rexford, Kansas. "We started getting into the reined cow horse stuff with my sister because she really liked reining. And there was a reined cow horse trainer just down the road."

When Tylor first started riding, on a miniature pony named Sonny who still roams the Todd pasture today, she wanted to be a barrel racer. For several years, Tylor rode the clover leaf pattern and hundreds of cow-checking miles on Sonny. He was the first horse that any of the Todd siblings rode, including Taylor and Tylor's 12-year-old brother, Tannor.

Since Tylor was attending every KHSRA event in the state with her sister, she decided she might as well pick up an event and compete also. In the sixth grade, she started breakaway roping in the KJHSRA. She calls this her "roper phase" and it would last until eighth grade when she started competing more seriously in





the reined cow horse event through the National Reined Cow Horse Association (NRCHA).

"I think I probably would've stuck with something else if my sister hadn't started in the reined cow horse," Tylor said. "That really sparked my love for it so I'm thankful she picked [reined] cow horse."

KHSRA

At just 8 years old, Tylor first broke into the reined cow horse event aboard a gelding named Dr. Pepper. The pair struggled for the first year before they started seeing some success in the arena.

"I was always overspinning and lost my cow at every show for the whole first

year," Tylor said. "I'm a really competitive person and I finally got fed up with my sister always beating me, so I started really concentrating on the event and spending more time with the trainer."

She first found success in the boxing as a young equestrian but has followed that up with world and national championships in the NHSRA, NRCHA and the American Quarter Horse Association (AQHA). One of her first accomplishments on a national stage came in 2018 as a freshman in high school.

"I didn't even know rookie all-around was an award [at the NHSFR] until my name was announced," Tylor admitted. "That really made my freshman year a lot

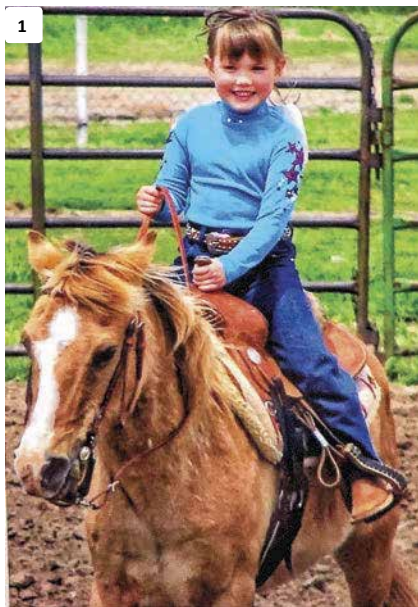
of fun."

The all-around title wouldn't have been possible without the addition of girls cutting to Tylor's high school event lineup. Since Tylor was already at the rodeo, she figured she might as well be cutting too.

She took up the event in the eighth grade and has continued competing in it for the last four years.

"Cutting has definitely helped me as a horsewoman with the reined cow horse and vice versa," she said. "I really like how cutting traps a cow in the middle and allows my horse to get down and be really cowy."

Cutting might not be Tylor's premiere event, but she's certainly proved she's got grit in a pen full of tough competitors. As a junior at the NHSFR, Tylor finished third overall in the reined cow horse and took seventh in the girls cutting.

BEST FOR LAST

Tylor was finally able to put her breakaway roping skills to good use when she competed in the NRCHA's Youth World's Greatest Horseman back in February during the NRCHA Celebration of Champions. It was a unique opportunity for Tylor to combine her two worlds: horse showing and rodeo.

Also during the event, Tylor claimed two world championships – Novice Non Pro Bridal and Intermediate Non Pro Bridal – aboard her favorite mount, Mr Stylish Cat. Fondly known as Boyd around the barn, Tylor openly admits to being completely infatuated with her gelding.

"He's the funnest horse I've ever had and I just love him so much," she said. "He's stellar down the fence and can read a cow really well. Even though he's really good at reining, he's not easy to show in it, which has made me a better showman."

Boyd and Tylor clicked from the very first ride, which isn't always how it goes for this horsewoman when she's figuring out a new horse. Usually, it takes time to get with a horse, but not Boyd. These two teamed up in March 2020 and rarely spend time apart.

"Last year during quarantine I spent

time with Boyd every day," Tylor said. "We have a very special bond and I feel like our personalities are the exact same.

We just get each other."

That special bond, and success early in the year, propelled Tylor and Boyd into the 2021 KHSRA state finals. The dynamic duo won the reined horse cow, and their success transcended into the girls cutting where Tylor steered Patarey – our more fondly known as Chubbs – to the state championship. The trio headed to nationals in Lincoln, Nebraska, with all the confidence the state of Kansas could supply them.

"Every round I tried to show what my horse gave me and work the cow that I had, rather than overshadowing and trying to make the run happen," Tylor said about her runs in both cutting and reined cow horse at nationals. "I was just trying to let it all happen and it all came together this year."

After placing third in the reined cow horse and fourth in the girls cutting, Tylor won the all-around cowgirl title by almost 400 points. Team Kansas has only seen a few individuals earn the coveted all-around title, with Tylor being one of them.





But the Todd family has now brought multiple all-around titles home from nationals. Back in 2013 Tylor's cousin – Kathryn Todd from Oklahoma – won the NJHSRA all-around cowboy title.

SMALL-TOWN GIRL

Hailing from a town of only 250 people, it was almost inevitable that Tylor would spend most of her time at the barn. Simply, she didn't really want to be doing anything else anyways.

"I've always been super goal oriented, so I just wanted to ride and work towards those goals," Tylor said. "I've never really had any other hobbies."

When Tylor was attending Rexford Public Schools, she did dabble in basketball and dance. But by sophomore year, she knew it was time to focus solely on riding and never looked back after switching to online school.

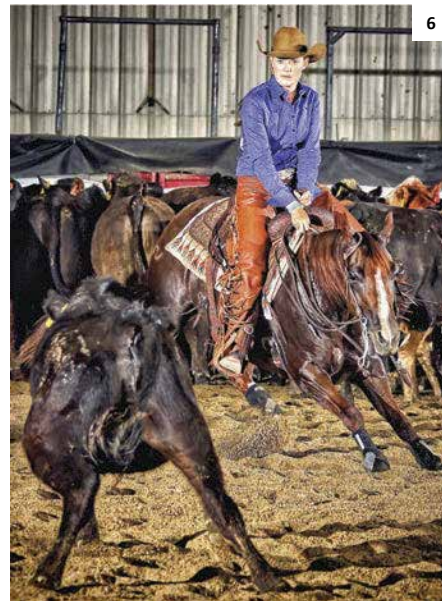
Now that she's graduated, Tylor's embracing her self-proclaimed gypsy soul and hitting the road with her horse trailer. She's already completed almost an

entire year's worth of general education classes online. While she's showing until her heart's content, Tylor will continue completing online until she runs out of general education classes.

Professionally, Tylor aspires to be a chiropractor but inside the arena she keeps her goals within the non pro realm.

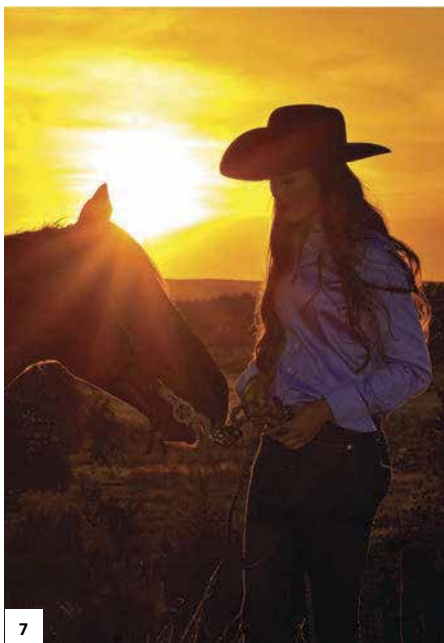
"I'd really like to win the NRCHA Non Pro Snaffle Bit Futurity one year, that'd be a really neat goal to accomplish," Tylor said. "And since I have one more year of youth eligibility, I'll be competing in the NRCHA's Youth World's Greatest Horseman again next spring."

In between setting lofty goals for

Bob Click, a 25 year photographer in the PRCA, passed away Sept 7th in Camas, WA. He was 84.

Bob was born and raised in St Helens, OR on a family owned farm. His father was a horse trainer and he loved growing up around the horses and cattle.

The same year he graduated from high school he joined the navy in the submarine division. It started a lifetime love of the mysteries of the deep ocean. Bob was a scuba diver throughout his adult life and would take the family on weekends to the Puget Sound and the Hood Canal. He would explore the area and catch various creatures for the aquariums in that region. He started exploring underwater photog-

raphy and has albums of beautiful pictures featuring fellow divers and many of the underwater creatures he would encounter.

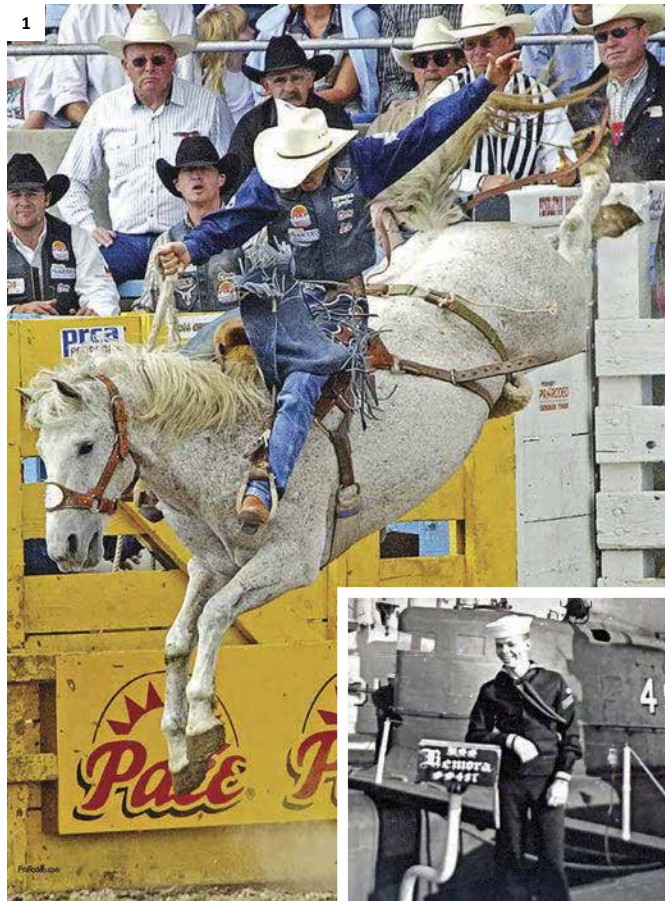
Bob worked for the phone company from the early 60's until he retired. Due to the rapid changing technology he attended many continuing education schools over the years....and was a manager for years until he retired.

Once he retired he turned his attention to his first love....rodeos. As a young man he was a bull rider and bareback rider until he was in a car accident that broke his back and landed him in the hospital for 6 weeks. He decided with a young family it was time to stop taking risks. But now with more time on his hands he picked up his cameras once again and started shooting in the Columbia River Circuit. He also attended the Redding, Red Bluff and Las Vegas rodeos. He loved being back in the arena and cherished the deep friendships he grew there.

He is survived by his daughters, Patti and Shelly and his brother Dick, as well as four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren who were the light of his life. He was preceded in death by a daughter, son, parents and his beloved grandparents.

It was Bob's specific wishes that there would no be a service or memorial. He just asked that when friends or family that cared for him gathered together they would have a toast and remember him fondly. 🍷

BOBBY GREEN

*June 14, 1939 -

Bobby Green, age 82, passed away peacefully at home in Godley, Texas on August 28. He sustained severe injuries from a car wreck July 26, 2018 and never completely recovered. His rodeo clown/bullfighter career with the IPRA, Central Rodeo Association and South Texas Rodeo Association lasted seventeen years, 1962 to 1979. Although he was not very tall he was known for jumping a bull from the front and walking down his back. His favorite toughest bulls were P-55 called Widowmaker, P-1 Butter Bean and the famous V-61, who appeared on the cover

of Life Magazine.

Bobby married Maureen Bruce in 1958. He was a member of the Vaquero Rodeo Team of the University of Texas at Arlington in 1960. Later he produced rodeos by the C.W.T. Rodeo Company and raised bucking bulls and broncs. The bronc 'LB', CRA Bareback Horse of the Year he raised from a bottle, and later sent five of his bulls to the IPRA Finals. Bobby was inducted in 2018 to the All Cowboy & Arena Champions Hall of Fame. He was extremely proud of his grandson, Travis, who became a bullfighter, and he advised him along the way.

He was a member of the Rodeo Cowboy Alumni; Godley United Methodist Church, Godley Lions Club, and the Godley Volunteer Fire Department and actively supported each of these organizations. He and Maureen never missed a Rodeo Clown Reunion until their accident.

His funeral will be held September 17th at 2 PM at the Crosier-Pearson Funeral Home, at 512 N. Ridgeway, Cleburne, TX 76033. He is survived by his wife, Maureen of 63 years, his three children: Douglas Ray and wife Misty, Gary David

Shirley Lucas Jauregui

On August 23rd, 2021 Shirley Lucas Jauregui was set free of the bonds of this world, to go to heaven. She was 97, born in 1924. She had lived on a ranch in Penn Valley, California, the last 53 years.

Shirley and her younger sister, Sharon, had a dream to become trick riders. Shortly after they lost their dad, their mother moved the girls from Oklahoma to California and with work ethics that wouldn't quit it wasn't long before they were trick riding at the Cow Palace, the

Los Angeles Coliseum as well as Salinas and Denver, just to name a few. They were the Lucas Sisters, trick riders that traveled the rodeo road stunning their audiences with their ingenious tricks.

In addition to their rodeo performances a side job opened doors for them to become movie doubles for top Hollywood stars. Shirley doubled for Lucille Ball in an episode of "I Love Lucy", she did all the horse stunts for Betty Hutton in the movie "Annie Get Your Gun" and worked with John Wayne in "Blood Alley", just to name a few.

Shirley and Sharon were the first Lady Wranglers and were poster girls for Wrangler. In 2011 Shirley published her book about her life, "It Takes A Good Horse".

Shirley was given the Tad Lucas Memorial Award at the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum in 2008, given to women who spent their life representing the values of rodeo. In 2015 she was inducted in to the National Cowgirl Hall of Fame in Fort Worth.

She married Robert Jauregui, a Basque rancher and rodeo cowboy, a brother to Andy Jauregui, an early day rodeo producer. They had two children, Michele and Dan.

She was preceded in death by her father, Allison and mother, Karman Lucas, her sister, Sharon Lucas, and her husband, Robert Jauregui. She is survived by her son Dan Jauregui, and daughter, Michele Azevedo and husband, Manuel, plus grand children and great grandchildren.

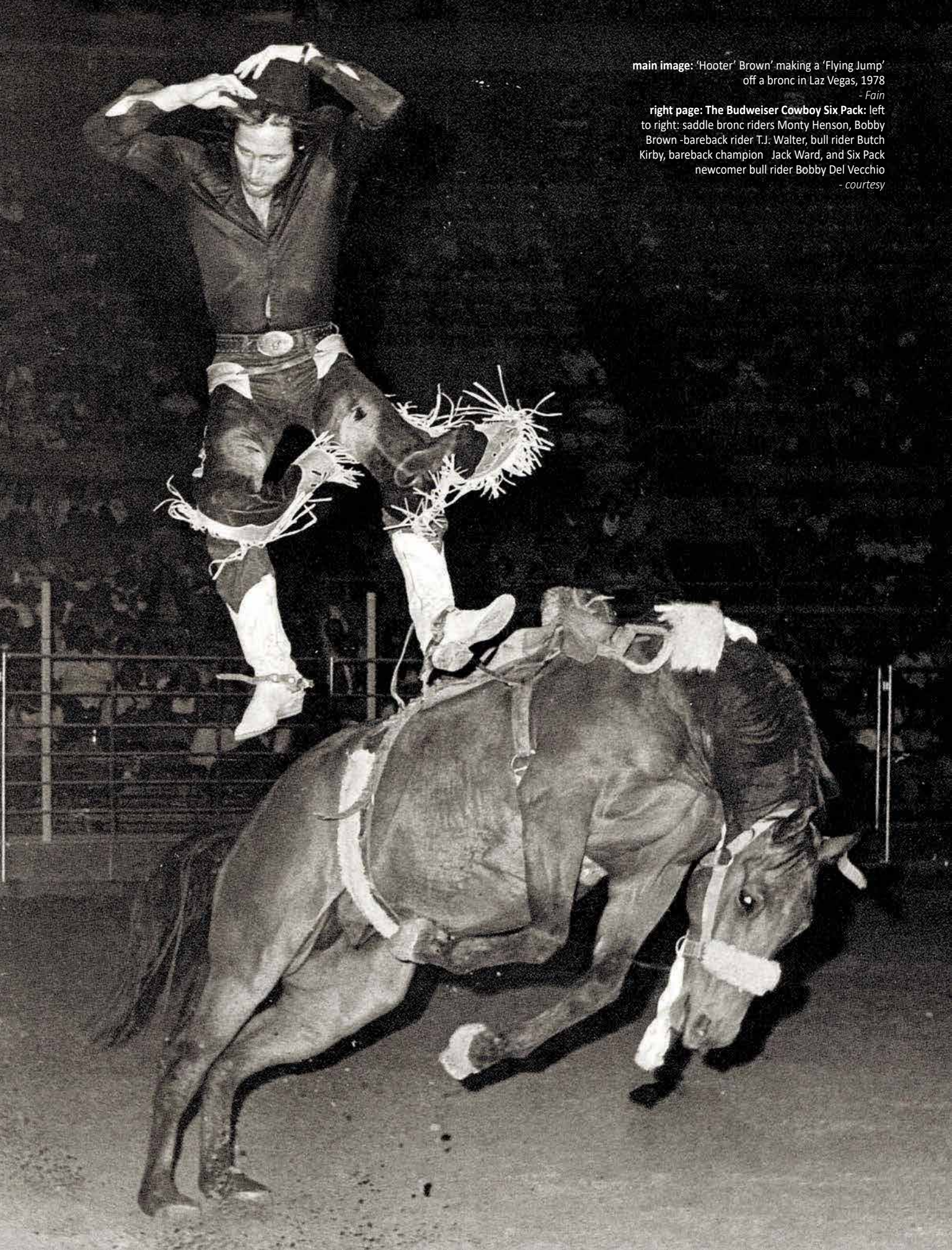

BACK WHEN THEY BUCKED WITH BOBBY 'HOOTER' BROWN

[“Just a little shy of fifty-five years Bobby Brown has been “flying high” either on the back of a bronc or piloting an airplane.”]

Bobby knew he wanted to be a rodeo cowboy by the time he was 8 or 9 years old. For 21 years he competed in the PRCA arena. At the age of 14 a West Texas crop duster taught him to fly an airplane. These two events in his young life directed him to what he has done for the last sixty years.

Bobby was born on January 1st, 1952 to Earl and Catherine Brown. Earl worked on the Matador Ranch and the Maston Ranch, near Adrian, and trained calf roping horses. Even at a young age Bobby would buy unbroke horses at the Clovis, New Mexico, sale barn, take them home, break them to be saddle horses, then take them back and sell them at a profit. At first Bobby learned to rope calves, but in a short time he burnt out on roping. “It wasn’t exciting enough,” he admitted. Then he switched to the roughstock events and steer wrestling.

He wanted to be just like Larry Mahan, Shawn Davis and Marty Wood. He joined the PRCA in 1970 and entered Bareback and Bull events but didn’t win much. When Marty Wood started giving him pointers on Saddle Broncs he switched and began winning. In fact, in

1974 at Cheyenne Frontier Days he was marked 87 points on Beutler Bros. & Cervi’s saddle bronc ‘Spring Jim’, which was a record that lasted 29 years before his Cheyenne record was broken in 2003 by Glenn O’Neill. He also won the saddle bronc event the first year Calgary Stam-

pede gave a \$50,000 bonus to the winner of each event, 1982. Bobby won the Texas Circuit Saddle Bronc Championship twice and was picked to attend and compete in the Presidential Command Performance

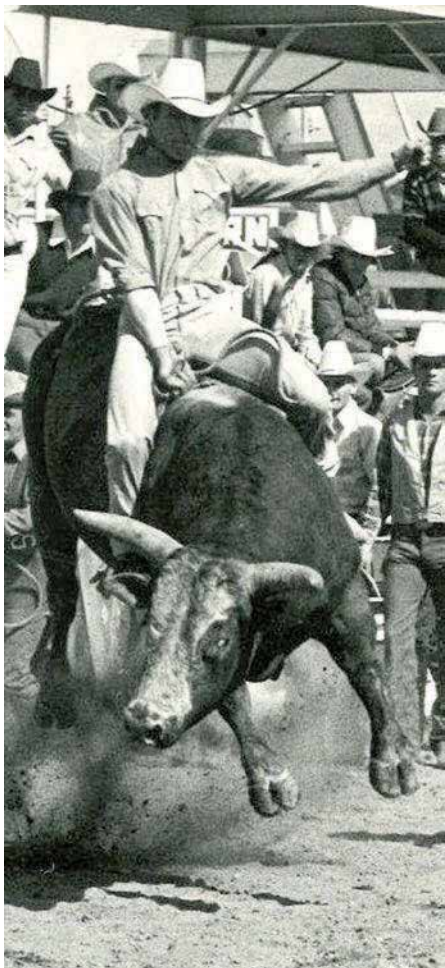

in 1983 for President Reagan.

It was not unusual for Bobby to get involved in the administrative end of rodeo. He was the President of the Texas Circuit, and also became the PRCA Saddle Bronc Director in 1977 through 1979 and again in 1984, the year PRCA made the decision to move the National Finals to Las Vegas in 1985. It was a tough year for the Directors as the organization was divided as to whether it was a good move or not. Previously the National Finals had been held in

Oklahoma City since 1965.

Bobby qualified for the PRCA National Finals ten times between 1972 and 1984. In 1976 through 1978 the PRCA had a three year experiment, the World Champion of the top fifteen in each event was picked strictly from what he won at that year's Finals. It was never done again. By the 10th round, in 1977, Bobby, Shawn Davis and J. C. Bonine were the only three

in contention for the saddle bronc win. In the 10th round Shawn scored a 70, Bobby bucked off Calgary Stampede's bronc 'Action Cat' and finished fourth, and J. C. Bonine got 77 and was declared the Champ. In 1981 Bobby was the Reserve World Champion, and 3rd in the Average earning \$8,000 at the Finals and \$57,085 for the year. The following year, 1982, he was 3rd in the World and second in the Average winning \$16,667 at the Finals and \$54,278 for the year.

During the rodeo season he traveled with Joe Alexander, Marty Wood, as well as flying with Larry Mahan, and John McBeth. Including 1974, the year McBeth won the Saddle Bronc World Championship.

When corporations started to get involved in rodeo as sponsors Bobby was responsible for getting Budweiser to consent to have the 'Budweiser Six Pack'. It included Bobby plus T. J. Walter, Butch Kirby, Jack Ward, Monty Henson, and Bobby DeVecchio, all roughstock competitors. Bobby also started the "flying dismount" from a saddle bronc, which he did by throwing his hat in the air jumping off and land-



ing on his feet. The ‘flying dismount’ has been copied numerous times by bronc riders ever since.

When asked how he got the nickname “Hooter” he laughingly said, “Pete Gay gave me that nickname”. Bobby went on to tell that a bunch of cowboy friends were at the famous Cowboy Downhill Ski Challenge that was held in Steamboat Springs, Colorado, after the National Western Stock Show & Rodeo, Denver, was over. The guys were playing ‘Pitch’, a popular card game late one night and imbibing in a little beer, when Pete slapped that monicker on him. Bobby also did some stunt work in Hollywood, and modeled for some television ads.

Bobby knew how to fly and since other rodeo competitors had been also using planes to get from one rodeo to the next he knew that it would improve his rodeo career. Time spent on the road traveling from one rodeo to the next takes a toll on cowboys. But he didn’t own a plane. Bobby finally figured out he would buy

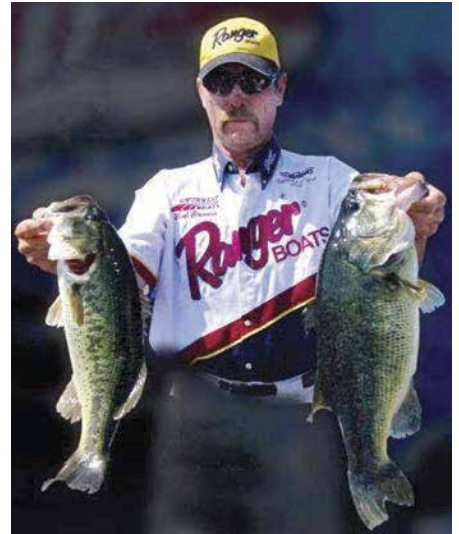
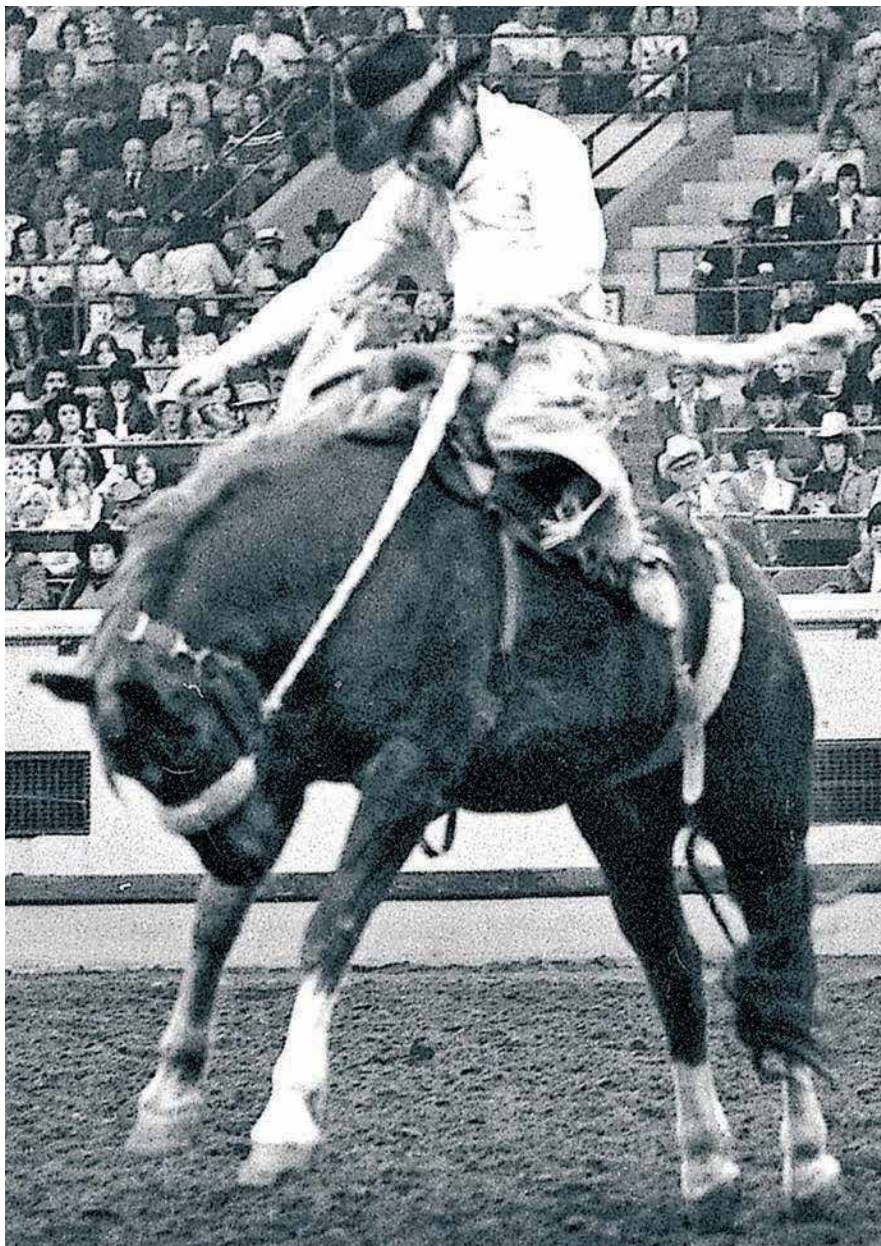

a plane, improve it, sell it for a profit, then buy another. Eventually he and Monty Henson owned a plane for three years. Cody Lambert, Bobby Berger and numerous other cowboys traveled with them and split the cost of fuel. Bobby met Roy Lamoreaux, of Ponca City, through a friend. He discovered Lamoreaux had 30,000 hours as a pilot with United Airlines, hauling freight. Lamoreaux made sure Bobby got all the right ratings and qualifications for flying multiple jet engine airplanes.

When Bobby ended his rodeo career



he spent a few years in the construction business, as a structural steel sub-contractor in Las Vegas. He finally de-

cided he should utilize his ability to pilot planes. He moved to Oklahoma and began flying for Organ Donor Flights out of Oklahoma City with teams of surgeons and nurses. He flew in all kinds of weather and generally in the middle of the night to destinations where organs were harvested from deceased organ donors. Sometimes it would take many hours. Then he would continue to fly the medical team to another hospital location to some happy relieved person desperately in need of a donated organ. He has flown over 300 trips for this organization. Bobby finally resigned. "It was impossible to plan anything because I never knew when I would get a call. I could have been in the middle of something important in my life and would have to head to the airport. But my time there was truly rewarding."

Today Bobby's life is less hectic. He lives in Newcastle, Oklahoma, and is strictly working as a corporate pilot flying airplanes for a variety of companies, or private individuals who own planes, and hire qualified pilots. Presently he is rated in ten different planes. He now has more time to spend with his long-time partner, Gina, his family and friends. But Bobby is still 'flying high'. 🛩

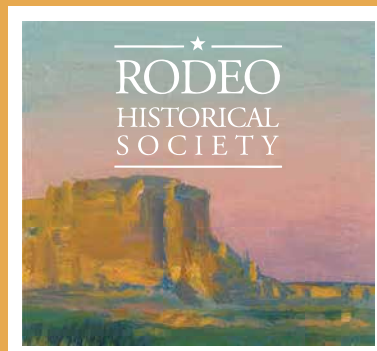

NAVIGATING GOALS

Every year in a team meeting we have all of our rodeo students sit down and come up with their goals for the season, with one kicker, begin your process with the end in mind. It changes the way you look at your goals when you reverse engineer them.

I always use the analogy for setting your goals comparing it to traveling. If I ask you to travel from your home town to Kamiah, Idaho (Go Kubs!) there are two ways to get to Kamiah. One way is to get in your truck and just start driving, there is a chance that you will eventually end up there. The second is to use a map, your phone or some sort of navigation device. With both methods you can find a way to arrive at your final destination. However, by using a navigation device (your goals) you can reach your destination efficiently and usually on a much quicker timeline.

To reach our goals we need to use a navigation device. Everyone knows where they want to end up, not many know how to get there. There are plenty of resources to help you reach your goals you just have to be willing to seek them out.

In the world of rodeo there are many people willing to help you reach your goals. You can always find rodeo schools/camps taught by World Champions or former WNFR qualifiers. I have had the opportunity to work with some amazing instructors at many different clinics and schools over the years; the opportunity to learn is there if you are willing to take advantage of it.

College rodeo has been a game changer for many students that I know of. College rodeo offers many students access to some of the best

coaches in the country and allows them to improve the game under these coaches. Around the country there are many coaches that specialize in certain events and have a proven track record of helping students excel in their craft. If you have the opportunity to work with one of these coaches, take advantage of the opportunity and work your butt off in your time there. It may only be two or four years but the experience can help you reach your final goal in a hurry if you take advantage of it.

Finally find others that are on the same journey that you are on. It is much easier to reach your goals when you have an amazing support group around you. The best groups of students that I have ever coached pushed each other every day in practice. In many cases their greatest individual accomplishments came when they were part of a group that pushed them daily. When you find a group that pushes you and holds you accountable don't shy away from them. Together you can achieve more.

Your goals are your road map to where you are going, make sure you have the end in mind when you set them. Without goals you are just burning time and energy on a road that may or may not lead you to where you want to go. 📌



Meet the Member Wylee Mitchell

If there was one word to describe Wylee Mitchell it would be homegrown. From the shirts on her back to the tack on her horses, most of Wylee's needs are met by her mom, Rita, and stepdad, Shane Cheeney. "I couldn't do anything without my parents. My stepdad works full time and then comes home and he's our farrier, puts up hay, builds our tack; he has so many side jobs to allow my mom and I to live this dream," said the 17-year-old from Pioche, Nevada. "I'm so thankful for him and my mom and all the support they've always given me in all this." Wylee's dad and stepmom, Chaz and Erin Mitchell, own and operate a custom hat shop, which means even her hats are homegrown.

In August, Wylee qualified for her fifth junior world finals on Smoky Gold Jack at the Southwest Desert Classic in the senior barrels. Sticking with the theme of homegrown, it's not surprising that Jack was purchased as a yearling and trained by Wylee and her mom on the cloverleaf pattern. "It was a really fun weekend. We were consistent on all three runs. Jack was super smooth, which is when he runs his best." Even though last year was the first time Wylee didn't make it to the short round at the finals, she did pull out the round one win. She's headed to Vegas in December determined to win the short round. "Qualifying is one thing, but if you're going to compete, then you might as well aim high."

As a third-generation rodeo competitor, Wylee was on her first horse as early as two. She got started in the lead line classes and moved up the ranks. "When my stepsister graduated, I got her old barrel and pole horse. That helped me step up and that's when I learned to be competitive." Wylee started tying goats, break-away and team roping through another junior rodeo association before getting started in Little Britches. "That's where I really grew my confidence. We went up to Utah for those and they're a really competitive state. If I wanted to be at the top, I

had to be fast and aggressive. My favorite part about rodeo is how competitive it is and knowing that I have to do my best if I want to place."

Now a senior competitor in the Nevada High School Rodeo Association, Wylee serves on the board as the public relations officer. It's a great transition into next fall when Wylee plans to be studying agricultural communications at Kansas State University. "Most of my job has to do with running our social media and transporting the banners. We have all of our sponsor banners that I take to each rodeo and put up in the arena. And then on social media I'm trying to be more interactive than we've been in the past." Wylee took up cutting last February and managed to place third at state, which sent her to nationals. She competes in every event the NHSRA offers except for reined cow horse. Wylee's now in her third year of online school with Nevada Connections Academy which she will graduate from next spring. "I don't miss public school at all. I like the flexibility of online school and they have a good curriculum, so I feel like I'm getting a lot out of it."

The family motto has always loosely been: "why go buy something if we can do it ourselves?" Wylee fully embraced this idea when she started her own t-shirt printing business in 2018. "My mom and I think we're pretty witty, and always thought it would be fun to make our own shirts. We had a vinyl cutter and heat press that we were using to make shirts, but after I won a chunk of change at the Extreme Million Barrel Race in 2020, we were able to upgrade our equipment and start doing more custom orders." Wylee has started a suicide awareness movement and is using the t-shirt business to propel it forward. Check out Wylee's business, Y Brand USA, at ybrandusa.com.

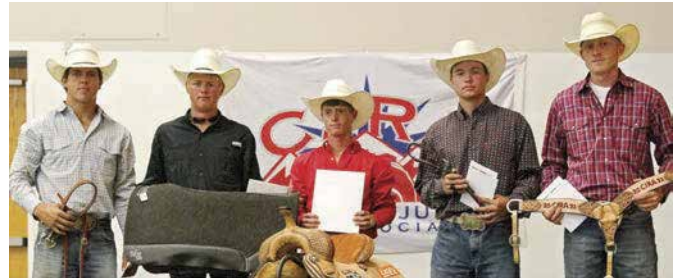

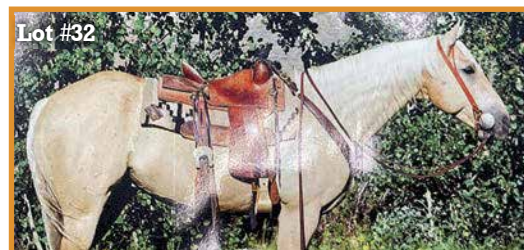

They say animals take on the characteristics of their owners, and for Ava Dole, that's true.

The Colorado Junior High School Rodeo Association member is kind, easy to get along with, isn't lazy, and gives her all when she attempts something, just like her bay mare, Christine.

She rides Christine for all her events: goat tying, barrel racing, pole bending, breakaway roping, and team roping (heeling for Ryan Pankey).

Christine is even the same age as Ava: 13, and was bred for cutting. The family got the bay a year ago, and she is "super good at all that she does," her rider reported. "She always tries her hardest and she'll give you the best she can. She won't act lazy, and she's really calm in the alley and in the box."

Ava has a second horse, an eighteen-year-old bay roan named ATM. He's an older rope horse who she used last spring for breakaway. But he got a puncture wound over the summer and is on the injury list this fall. He's as sweet as Christine, and even though she's calm in the box, he's "super, super, super duper calm," Ava said. "And he always gets you right there, every time, no matter how bad the calf is."

Ava, who is in the eighth grade, is homeschooled. She loves reading, with her favorite genre being mysteries. She's read several of the Nancy Drew books and is currently reading *The Scarlet Pimpernel*, a story about the French Revolution.

Living on a ranch near Mesa, Colo., she likes to hunt, and last year was a big year for her: she got a mule deer, elk and an antelope. She enjoys hunting in the family's "secret spot" in the Rocky Mountains where they found Ava's elk.

Ava has participated in 4-H for the past

four years. She's shown her dog, Casey, and horses. This year, she rode Christine for the trail course, western pleasure, reining, ranch riding, cow work, and the mare even did a bit of English jumping, which took some practice. The jumping surprised the mare, Ava said. "When we started to lope and go over the log, Christine was like, 'what are we doing?' She was confused, but she learned it really fast." Ava earned a reserve champion ribbon in the horse show at this year's county fair.

Along with her sisters, Ava does her share of the ranch and housework. She drives the pickup while her mom forks off hay in the winter; her dad works at the fire department. She helps with meals, too, preparing two breakfasts and two dinners per week.

The older kids in the Dole household take turns preparing weekly meals; that night's cook decides what they're making, makes sure the ingredients are on hand, prepares the meal, and cleans up.

As the family lives 45 minutes from the nearest grocery store, Ava has to choose her meals carefully, depending on what's in the pantry. If they are missing an ingredient, "we have to make do with what we have,

which is also a life skill," her mom said.

Ava's go-to meals are crock-pot meals and casseroles. She likes making chili and soup.

When she grows up, she'd like to be a rancher and a horse trainer.

Her mom says Ava "has a real heart for being kind and compassionate to other people, and being helpful to the family. She has so much energy and is a really fun kid."

She has an older sister, Madison, who is a college student, and two younger sisters: Ellie, who is nine years old, and Hazel, who is six.

They are the daughters of Burton and Sarah Dole. 📷

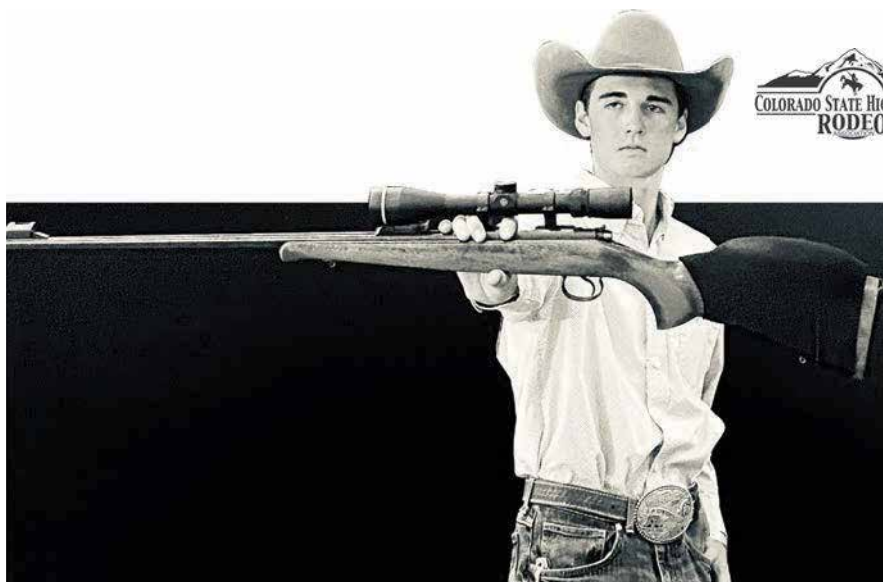

Meet the Member Leo Veatch

Leo Veatch won the light rifle shooting short go at the National High School Finals, and ended up fifth in the world in that event. He shot trap as well, but didn't make the short go. He also competes in calf roping and team roping as a heeler.

The 17-year-old from Agate, Colorado, has just started his junior year, attending Agate High School for concurrent college classes in Algebra, English composition, and a computer class. The rest of his studies are done at home. His plan is to attend college and compete on a rifle team. "After that, I'd like to go to Concordia Seminary and become a pastor. Once you graduate from seminary, they send you

to a congregation. I feel that has always been a calling in my life," he said of his desire to pastor a church.

Leo got his start in rodeo from his family. "Roping and rodeo is a generational family thing – both my grandparents rope and they, along with my parents (Carrie and Casey), have always helped me for as long as I can remember." Leo has a little sister, Dot, going into sixth grade and beginning junior high rodeo. She competes in pole bending, breakaway, and light rifle shooting.

"I've always shot and hunted; it was something I did with my grandpa. It was natural for me to start there and that introduced me to competitive shooting. I'm grateful to the high school rodeo for having shooting events." Along with High School Rodeo, Leo also competes in the International 10 meter air rifle.

"The targets we shoot at are the size of a quarter and the bullseye is the size of George Washington's eye, or a period in 12 point font." Last year, Leo was reserve Light Rifle Champion, qualified for the junior Olympics and was a silver medalist in the 2020 Olympic Trials Part 2 for his age division.

Leo heads to Colorado Springs two times a week to shoot with the National Training Center team, a round trip time of more than three hours. "I think any shooting is relaxing," he said. "I never get tired of it." He divides his time between practicing shooting and practicing his rodeo events. "We rope at night when it's cool and shoot in the morning. My sister shoots with me most of the time."

The Veatches live on a cattle ranch, where Leo helps his grandpa with his cow/calf operation. "We just finished the second round of vaccines for the calves and this time of year we check water and make sure the cows are doing well." Leo enjoys riding on the ranch, along with practicing on BamBam, his tie down roping horse and his 21-year-old heel horse, Babe. "We're out in the country quite a ways, and I can hunt and shoot and rodeo. I really like it." Duck and goose hunting are part of Leo's love of the rural lifestyle, and he says the game is best cooked wrapped in bacon and cream cheese.

"I will always be part of the rural ranching lifestyle that has taught me so much. I'm part of a seven generation family ranch in Agate and will continue the family legacy for as long as I am able." 🐾

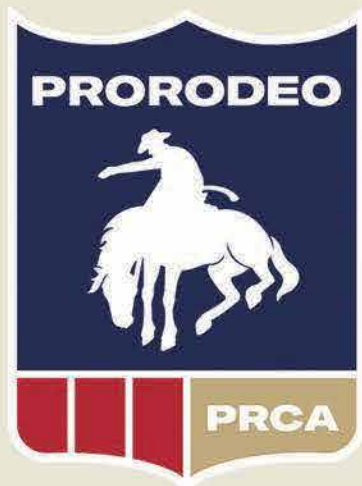

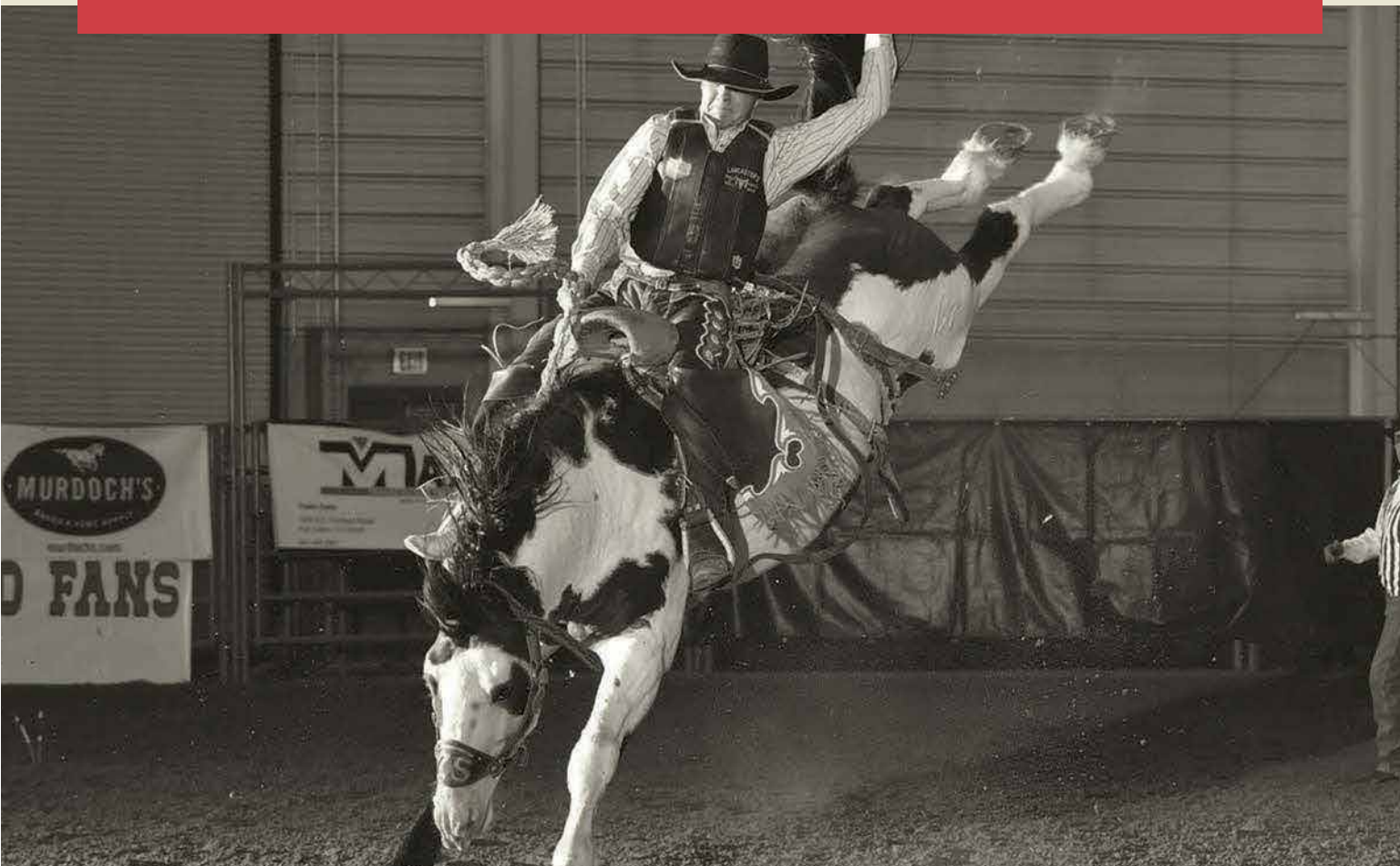

33rd Don King Days is a Huge Success!

One year after a winter storm pressured Don King Days committee to stop after the first day of activities, the 2021 Event was a phenomenal success. Some organizers called it the greatest crowd ever for polo, bronc riding and the finals for the Wyoming Steer Ropers Assn.

In the Steer roping 32 ropers qualified for the four-head finals. After Sundays first two rounds only 8 men had times on 2 steers. Troy Hubbard led after one day and had placed in each round. But despite his lead he couldn't be blamed for looking over his shoulder at the two time defending champion Will McBride of Nebraska just 1/10th of a second back in



2nd place. TK Tillard won the first round in 14.9 seconds. McBride took the 2nd in 13.0 seconds flat. The record is 10.5 seconds set by Will Yoakum in 2003.

Both days were sunny and hot with temperatures in the 90s prevalent. The second day was not kind to contenders as 5 of the 8 men who had times on two head Saturday, took no-time on their third. Chris Glover moved into contention with a 14.5 second run to win the round. And the final round was suspenseful with McBride holding a less than 7 second advantage over Colt Bruegman. Miles Williams was standing by in case either or both fal-

tered. But in the end only one roper prevailed. Will McBride was 21.4 to finish with 69.4 on 4 head, the only man to tie all his steers down. He had a good possibility of beating Glen Barlows' four-head record of 62.8 set in 1996, but finished in 69.9 seconds with the win, still the fastest time since Reo Lohse in 2013.

Just four years ago McBride told me that he felt he would become known as "that good steer roper who never won

Don King Days". Now he basks in the glory of three in a row.

Barlow, arguably one of the best ropers in Wyoming history, won 5 times at Don King Days but never back-to-back. Only two

other ropers won back to back titles; Hank Taton in 1994-95 and Gib Bell in 2007-08.

TK Tillard was 2nd with 3 steers caught in 45.4 seconds, "The King of Colorado" Chris Glover was 3rd in 46.3 and Michael Mader was 48.1 for 4th place in the average. Winning two rounds in 2021 TK Tillard now has 9 go-round victories in his career to tie Mike Lohof for the top spot.

The bronc riding was won by South Dakota Travis Nelson scoring 167 points on two head to beat five other competitors.

Committee members include Cecile Pattison, Vicki Kane, Micah Olson, Marc Gilkerson, and Sheila Blackburn.

Jim Thompson was the steer roping announcer for the 29th time. Dalton Beasley returned to announce the bronc match. Timers were Dee Dee Dickinson and Tera Anderson. Melanie Jones was secretary. Ted Thompson was the field flag judge .. Dean Finerty and Irv Bard handled the line. 🏆

Additional honorees at the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association Alumni, Inc. (NIRAA) Reunion held in June were Brad Gjermundson, Dean Wang, Jesse Bail, Jordan Ann Thurston-Miller, and Tucker Chytka. They were introduced in the arena during the Friday performance of the College National Finals Rodeo (CNFR) where top contestants of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA) competed for the 2021 Championships.

Rancher Brad Gjermundson won the NIRA Saddle Bronc Riding Championship in 1980 after placing 5th in the nation in 1978 and 2nd in 1979. After joining the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association (PRCA) in 1980, he promptly earned the 'Rookie of the Year' award. Gjermundson qualified for his first National Finals Rodeo (NFR) in 1981 and competed there every year through 1988. He's a four time PRCA World Champion Saddle Bronc Rider, winning in 1981, 1983, 1984 and 1985. Gjermundson qualified again in 1994 where he entered in 13th place and earned \$81,000 in 10 days, more than any other contestant that year at the finals. He also earned the PRCA Badlands Circuit Saddle Bronc Championship six times between 1983 and 1995. Gjermundson married Jackie Brown in June of 1984. They live on a ranch near Marshall, North Dakota with their three children.

Dean Wang, a fourth generation Montana cowboy, won the NIRA Steer wrestling in 1990. Dean became two time Montana High School Rodeo Steer Wrestling Champion before he graduated from high school in 1985. He attended the University of Montana at Missoula on a football scholarship and switched to rodeo after the Mytty family took him in and he began rodeoing with the late Bob Schall. Bob taught him about rodeo travel and conducting himself. The Carpenter family at Kalispell, and especially Jeanne, influenced him to go to California Polytechnic

State University in San Luis Obispo. College rodeo opened many doors for Dean and gave him numerous great friends over the years. Dean said the highlights of his rodeo career were winning the NIRA Steer Wrestling Championship and qualifying for the NFR. College rodeo took him to California and on to the PRCA and provided a lot of opportunities and to make friends all over the country. Dean and his wife Karen have four children and ranch near Baker, Montana where he is president of the Bank of Baker.

2000 College National Finals Rodeo all-around champion and the NIRA all-around champion, Jesse Bail was National High School Finals Rodeo Saddle Bronc Riding Champion in 1998 and runner-up in 1997. Jesse started riding bulls at age 12 and saddle broncs at 13. He has over \$2 million in PRCA career earnings and is the only South Dakotan to win the Bill Linderman award. He has a long history of professional highlights from 2000 to the present. Bail traveled far and wide during his heyday, reaching the National Finals Rodeo six times as a bull rider and six times in saddle bronc riding. He said in recent years his activities have been confined mainly to the Badlands Circuit while ranching near Camp Crook, South Dakota with his wife Kim and three children.

Jordan Thurston-Miller is the youngest member of the NIRAA Board of Directors. Jordan was the College National Goat Tying Champion in 2010 as a freshman at Gillette College and again in 2013

as a senior. Born in Lance Creek, Wyoming, Jordan attended Niobrara County High School. In Wyoming State High School Rodeo, she competed all four years, winning championships in goat tying each year and an All Around title as a freshman. She qualified for the CNFR all four years at Gillette College. She credits her parents John and Tiffany Miller Thurston of Lance Creek, for much of her success. Tiffany's father went to college with the help of a rodeo scholarship, as did Tiffany and her siblings, and now Jordan and her brothers. "I remember how helpful rodeo scholarships were for me and my family and I want to help support and enlarge that tradition." Jordan and her husband live in Moorcroft, Wyoming.

Tucker Chytka was the 2020 NIRA President and dealt with the Covid 19 Pandemic and its effect on College Rodeo. He helped Roger Walters, NIRA Commissioner, and the NIRA make the tough decision to cancel the 2020 CNFR. Tucker played football for his high school team at Belle Fourche, South Dakota and competed in the South Dakota All Star Football game in 2016. He competed in team roping and steer wrestling at Black Hills State University in Spearfish, South Dakota. Tucker credits his dad, sculptor Tony Chytka, with advice that has served him well in life. Tucker said his dad told him, "Every time you time you leave past those fence posts is a new day and a new attitude and when you come home leave the negatives outside the fence posts." 📷

Meet the Member Michaela McCormick

For Michaela McCormick, rodeo went from one of many sports out there to the sport—and lifestyle—for her in a matter of moments. The 16-year-old from Salem, South Dakota, experienced rodeo from an early age while tagging along with her dad, Matt McCormick, to team ropings and SDRA rodeos. By age eight, she decided it was time to forge her own path on the rodeo trail. Michaela entered junior rodeos and eventually cinched her first state title at the junior high finals in 2019 when she won the goat tying. She entered the ranks of high school rodeo in 2020 and was the reserve state champion in goat tying, and qualified for the NHSFR again in 2021 in her favorite event. “It’s definitely the event I’ve put a lot of work into and seen a lot of successes in,” says Michaela, who also won the goat tying at the 2020 4-H State Finals. She enjoys breakaway roping and team roping as a header in the SDHSRA as well.

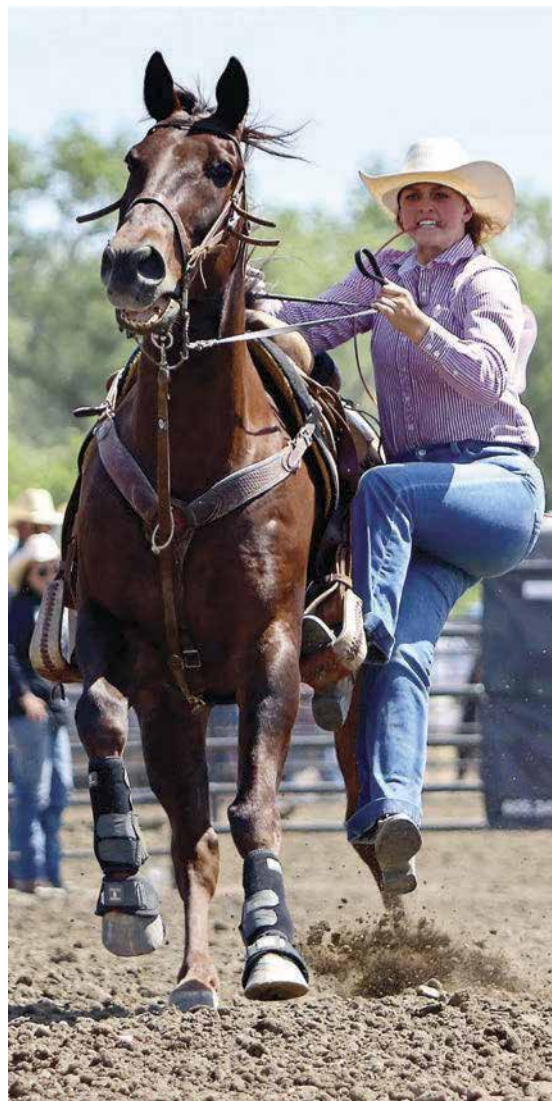
Her motivation for the sport is trifold. “It’s the family you build from it and seeing all your hard work pay off. It’s just so much fun,” Michaela explains. But the time rodeo gives her with family is even more valuable than her accolades. “My parents put in so much time to get me where I am today. My dad is with me all the time and my mom, Lori, is with me most of the time. Sometimes we go different ways on weekends since my brothers play baseball.” Michaela and her dad load up horses several times a week and drive to a nearby arena to practice roping, while she can tie goats every day in her backyard. Her parents also video her runs

so she can go back and critique her work.

Michaela’s three horses are another part of the team. “Riley is my main goat horse—he’ll be 17 this year. We really clicked in the goats and it all came along.” Ziggy, also 17, has lived with the McCormicks all his life. Michaela says she was struggling with breakaway roping and decided to try Ziggy, who made a great difference in her roping. His brother, Sonic, 9, is Michaela’s team roping and backup goat horse.

A junior at McCook Central, Michaela particularly enjoys playing basketball and volleyball. Her basketball team went to state in 2020. “I definitely think the mental game with rodeo has helped me with sports,” says Michaela. She and her brothers, Zane, 14, Burke, 11, and Coy, 8, like to play basketball at home, and she goes to watch their baseball games. In turn, they travel with Michaela to many of her rodeos. “I take naps when we drive. It’s sometimes hard to sleep when you have three boys sitting next to you,” she says with a laugh. “State finals is my favorite rodeo because it’s all of us together and I get to see my friends from every other region.” Michaela and the other members of the 2021 Cinch Team also put on a special needs rodeo at state finals this year. Competing in the NHSFR in Lincoln, Nebraska, was a highlight of her summer, where Michaela tied for 16th in the second round of the goat tying. She further enjoyed playing volleyball with her friends and doing several team potlucks throughout the week.

“I would like to keep pushing and make Nationals all four years of high school,

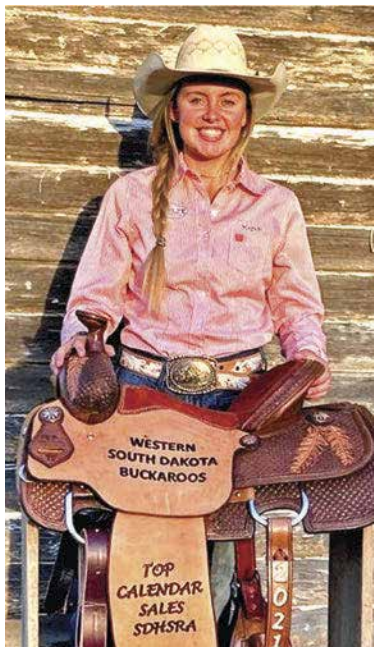

Clint Johnson Named 2021 Legend of ProRodeo

ProRodeo Hall of Fame saddle bronc rider Clint Johnson has been named the 2021 Legend of ProRodeo.

Johnson will be honored at the 14th annual Wrangler Gold Buckle Gala on Nov. 29 at 6 p.m. (PT) at the South Point Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas.

"I just found this news out, and it is pretty exciting," said Johnson, 65. "I absolutely did not think this was an option for me. This is quite an honor. There's been a list of prominent people who have received this honor, and I'm quite excited to be among them. I would like to thank the selection committee for choosing me, and I'm looking forward to a fun event."

Johnson began his rodeo career at age 10, and his smooth, consistent style of riding saddle bronc horses led to 11 consecutive qualifications for the National Finals Rodeo from 1979-89. In those 11 career NFR trips he won four world championships (1980, 1987-89) and finished no worse than sixth in the world standings. He also won the NFR average in 1989.

"When you think of legends, you think of greatness. When you think of legends in rodeo, you think of those that accomplished greatness both inside and outside the rodeo arena," said Kent Sturman, Director of the ProRodeo Hall of Fame. "Clint Johnson is a four-time world champion and achieved an overwhelming amount of greatness in the rodeo arena throughout his career, starting in 4-H rodeo, continuing through high school and college rodeo and during his tenure in professional rodeo. And Clint is one of those cowboys who has demonstrated greatness outside of the arena, continually giving back to a sport that he loves by serving on boards, conducting schools and clinics, and providing his expertise to many programs and events throughout rodeo. He was an obvious choice as this year's Legend of ProRodeo."

Johnson was inducted into the ProRodeo Hall of Fame in 1992 in Colorado Springs, Colo.

"None of these honors, like the Legend of ProRodeo and being in the ProRodeo Hall of Fame, are expected," Johnson said. "Going through my career I tried to stay under the radar, but the Legend of ProRodeo is a great honor to be recognized by members of the organization and my peers."

Johnson, who spent four years on the PRCA Board of Directors serving as vice chairman, was born in Spearfish, S.D. Johnson lived there until moving to the Amarillo, Texas, area where he has lived since 1988.

"Rodeo is the No. 1 sport in South Dakota," Johnson said. "It was the thing to do when I was growing up. We all wanted to be cowboys, and we all wanted to be bronc riders. I was lucky enough to live that dream. I kept my goals pretty simple and tried to make the best ride I could every time. I wasn't worried about winning rodeos. I was lucky enough to have a real fortunate career and I have received honors no one could dream of."

Johnson also won his share of prestigious rodeos, including taking home the Calgary Stampede Rodeo's \$50,000 bonus three times.

Johnson also won in Cheyenne, Wyo., Salinas, Calif., Reno, Nev., San Antonio, Fort Worth, Texas, Ellensburg, Wash., Red Bluff, Calif., Greeley, Colo., San Francisco, Spanish Fork, Utah, and Prescott, Ariz.

Since Johnson stopped rodeoing, he's been in the ranching business.

"I have a small ranch operation and run a few cows," he said.

Johnson is the 16th man to be honored as a Legend of ProRodeo, following Jake Barnes, Jim Shoulders, Clem McSpadden, Harry Vold, Larry Mahan, Shawn Davis, Dean Oliver, Donnie Gay, Benny Binion, Mel Potter, Neal Gay, Michael Gaughan, Keith Martin, Cotton Rosser and Bob Tallman. 🐾

Meet the Member Kasten Ruether

Kasten Ruether is the reigning Nebraska Junior High School Rodeo Association saddle bronc steer rider.

The Beaver Crossing cowboy, who is thirteen, also placed second in the average in the team roping at state finals last summer.

Now he's in the eighth grade, and competes not only in the saddle broncs, but in the bareback steer riding, breakaway roping, team roping (heading for Logan Lindsley), goat tying, and bull riding.

For the timed events, he rides a twelve-year-old palomino gelding named Gunner who is faster than his previous horse, Sassy. (Sassy has been advanced to his younger brother.) Gunner is a new acquisition by the family, is super broke, Kasten reports, and does what is asked of him.

Kasten is an eighth grade student at St. Paul Lutheran School in Utica, where he enjoys learning about American wars and likes P.E. class. He participates in football, wrestling, track and baseball.

For the cowboy, wrestling and rodeo are his two favorites. In wrestling, he qualified for the state junior high tournament, held in Grand Island, in the 95 lb. division.

For fun, he likes to rope with his dad in their arena, rope the dummy, and hang out with his friends. He and his friends can be found at the Utica swimming pool in the summer, or, during the school year, playing football and attending school sports events.

Earlier this fall, Kasten sold a three-year-old horse, Nip, at the Pitzer Ranch Sale, held in Ericson. He started Nip, who, at first, wanted to run off and wasn't nice to ride, but who, by sale date, "was

coming along." He'll save his money for his dream truck: a Chevy 2020 or a Dodge 3500 dually, gray or white.

When he grows up, he would like to be a PRCA team roper or saddle bronc rider, and own a cattle ranch in the Nebraska Sandhills.

At state finals, he not only finished as co-champion this past summer, but ended up second in the team roping. As for the saddle bronc steer riding, Nationals didn't go as he planned. In the first round, he didn't mark his steer out, and in the second round, the steer took three hops and launched Kasten over his head. But he has the right attitude: "I'm still learning," he said.

At Nationals, he had fun with his friends, running around on a golf cart decorated with LED lights and a Husker flag. Nationals "was the funnest thing I did the entire summer."

Kasten has two sisters: Samara, age sixteen, and Aislyn, seven, and a brother, Leyton, who is eight. The family also has a pet dachshund, Augie.

He is the son of Jason and Stephanie Ruether. 📷

Meet the Member Jasper Neal

The whole world knows when Jasper Neal is driving by.

That's because the cowboy, a member of the Nebraska High School Rodeo Association, has one of the loudest trucks in the county, loud even by his standards.

The eighteen-year-old, a resident of Amherst, Neb., is a team roper, heading for Dawson Doggett.

His rope horse is a gray horse, purchased from his grandfather, Tom Knott, as a four-year-old. Jasper has been roping on the gray for the past three years. Baldie, a gelding, started as a tie-down horse but Jasper switched him to a head horse.

Baldie loves his job. "He likes to rope," Jasper said. "He loves the sport. You can pasture ride him all day, and when you get him to an arena, he's loving it. He just likes to go. He has a big motor and he really likes it."

Jasper is a senior at Amherst School with an easy schedule this year: English, history, marketing and personal finance. He leaves school at 1:45 pm each day, for work release, working at a mechanic shop near Kearney, which was also his summer job. In the summer, he works on motors and engines. In the winter, he helps haul loads of dirt and manure to and from a local feedlot.

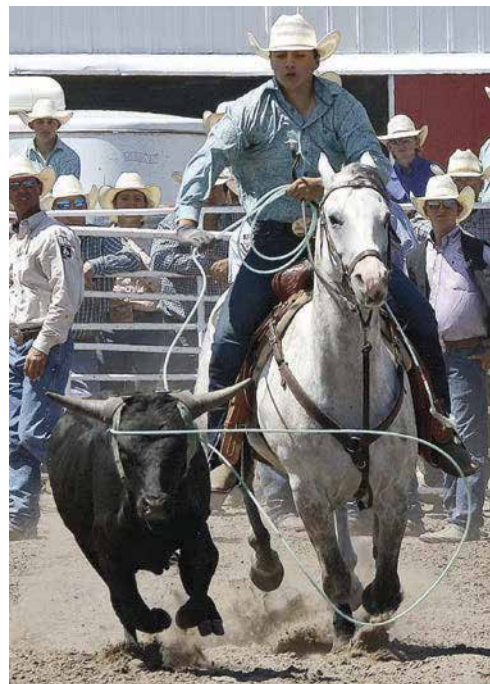
He's budgeted his earnings, half towards roping and the other half for spending. Much of the spending goes towards his 2001 F150, which is bright red. "You can't miss it," he said, of his truck. It's a super-cab four door, his pride and joy. "I put a lot of my hard-earned money into it," he said.

He's made several modifications to it, including cutting off the muffler, and then cutting it off even higher, when it wasn't loud enough. "Now it's almost too loud," he admitted. Jasper makes sure it's shiny and polished. He's owned the truck since the eighth grade.

One of his role models is his grandpa Tom. Before Tom retired from his job with a public power company, he'd saddle a horse every day and check cows before and after work. Grandpa Tom gave Jasper the "family discount" when he bought the gray horse. Jasper's grandma (and Tom's wife) is Karla. Grandpa Tom comes to Jasper's place at least once a week in the summer to practice with him. In the winter, Jasper drives to Broken Bow, the closet indoor arena he has access to, to practice. His uncle Andy Knott has also helped him become a better roper.

His other grandpa is Tim Neal of Thedford. Grandma Dee Neal passed away a few years ago.

After high school graduation, Jasper will attend WyoTech in Laramie, for their diesel tech program. The program is nine

months in length, and he plans on starting in October of next year.

Jasper is a member of his school's FFA program and is on the honorable mention honor roll.

He and Sage Dieter finished fifth in the state after Nebraska state finals last June, one hole out of qualifying for Nationals.

He has an older brother, Colton, who is 20, and a younger brother, Cooper, who is in the seventh grade.

He is the son of Dan and Lisa Neal.

Meet the Member Lacey Camp

“I’m just happy to be here and I’ve really had a lot of fun this summer,” said Lacey Camp after a three-year hiatus from the summer rodeo run. “For the last three years I was working in Arizona, and they don’t have many amateur rodeos through the summer months because it gets so hot there.” Lacey moved to southwest Nebraska a year ago to be closer to family and friends. And rodeoing through the summer again? That was just a fringe benefit. As the M-SRA season ends, Lacey is leading the race for rookie of the year thanks to her roping skills with both steers and calves.

Originally from ranching country in Montana, Lacey’s family knew everything there was to about riding, roping and ranching. After her parents – Jason and Jodi Camp – broke into team roping, they added rodeo to that list. “I first picked up a rope in the fifth grade and started competing in junior rodeos the next year. Team roping was the first thing that I ever did because that’s what my parents first learned.” For the first few years, Lacey wasn’t what she would call serious about the sport. During her first trip to junior high nationals in 2009, Lacey experienced a mind shift when it came to rodeo.

“I finally realized that I could do big things in rodeo when I was at nationals and decided I wanted to be more serious about it from then.” The mental change was evidently the boost Lacey needed as she went to several more national final events in both junior high and high school. She continued that successful trajectory while competing for Casper Community College in Wyoming. She made the CNFR three out of four years in both of her events

and even won a round as a senior in 2017. “The college finals is probably one of my favorite rodeos of all time. But I also really enjoyed the Northern Rodeo Association Finals in Montana.”

As Lacey is in her first year competing in the M-SRA, she’s been impressed by how many rodeos she can go to in one weekend. “All the rodeos I’ve been to have been really good and the payouts have been great as well. Not to mention there are lots of contestants that enter each one.” Even though this is Lacey’s first year, she already knows which events she wants to compete in next year. Although she made it to Sutherland, she missed the rest of Cowboy Christmas because of work. “Hopefully I won’t have to work over the fourth next year because I would really like to make it to Gothenburg.”

As a radiologic technologist at Ogalala Community Hospital, Lacey oversees mammograms, cat scans and all things x-rays. “I can definitely say my boss here and my whole department are really good about making things work with everyone.

We work four 10-hour shifts, so I’ve been able to take quite a few Fridays off so I can make it to rodeos.” As Lacey’s advanced in her career, she’s had to get quite a few extra certifications. She’s proud of how far she’s come and hopes to continue this upward trajectory. “Coming into the summer, I just wanted to make the finals, but it looks like I might have a shot at rookie of the year.”

Roping in both breakaway and on the heading side has helped Lacey in the rookie race. Of course, practicing at home in Arthur has also been a contributing factor to Lacey’s success. “With work it can be really hard to practice because I don’t usually get home until 6:30. So I have to thank my boyfriend because he’s really good about having the arena ready and calves up. Sometimes he’ll even have the horses saddled.” Lacey makes every run count by “practicing with a purpose.” Since her main mount is 17, she doesn’t need to do a lot of runs on him. Most of her time spent practicing is on her up-and-coming rope horses. 🐾

Meet the Member Whitley Sharp

A phone call in December 2020 changed Whitley Sharp and her husband's lives.

The Idaho Cowboys Association barrel racer called the Rice family in Texas about breeding to their stud, Chiquita Cat.

One phone conversation later, Whitley and her husband, Jared, owned the stud.

So the horse came to Idaho, and the Sharps became part owners of Outback Stallion Station this year.

But Whitley's story starts as a youngster in Boardman, Oregon, where she was on a horse "pretty much from the time I could walk," she recalled. Her family roped and ran barrels, so she grew up in the sport.

She competed in Oregon High School Rodeo with parents who "always went the extra mile to put me on a good horse," she said. "In high school rodeo, I learned how to win and lose. It was a good experience."

After high school graduation in 2011, she attended Oregon State University, where she met her husband. They graduated in 2015, she with an ag science degree and Jared with a doctor of veterinary medicine degree.

They moved to Mansfield, Texas in 2016 for Jared's work, but missed family and friends, so, in December of 2017, they moved back to the Northwest, to Parma, Idaho.

Whitley became familiar with Chiquita Cat when she purchased a bay gelding, Yoda Cat, out of the stud. Yoda was raised by Tag and Natalie Rice, who are known for their cutting horse program in Texas. The gelding was first a cutter, then later

became a successful barrel horse, winning with some of the best trainers and against the most elite horses in the futurity world.

She loved what she saw in Yoda, using him as her primary barrel horse and placing on him at several rodeos.

"I just basically fell in love with him, his personality, and how he works," she said. "We liked him so much we wanted to breed to his dad." So Whitley called the family in Texas that owned him, the Rices, and asked to buy a couple of breeding contracts to him.

"Somehow, in the midst of the conversation, we ended up purchasing Chiquita Cat himself," she chuckled. "We were on vacation and we were like, 'I guess we just bought a stud horse.'"

Whitley said it was the best decision they ever made. "He's produced some amazing horses, and he's made some phenomenal cutters, rope horses and barrel horses. We were fortunate enough to experience what he produces on the barrel horse end."

Whitley spends her days as the manager at Outback Stallion Station; she and Jared are part owners of the station, while Jared is a veterinarian at the Idaho Equine Hospital.

"I never would have thought this is where I'd end up," she said, "but it's grown to be a huge passion of mine. It's been really fun to see a successful business through and do something I love every day."

Yoda Cat "is just an amazing animal. He's a big-boned cow horse who is very stocky and extremely athletic. Most people would see him and think he would make a phenomenal calf horse or head horse. He has a lot of muscle to him."

He has a lot of try, too, Whitley said. "He's just the kindest horse, and one of those horses that is tough. He will try his heart out, no matter what the conditions

are. He gives it his all every time you go through the gate."

Whitley became an ICA member in 2018 and usually goes to more barrel races and futurities than rodeos because of the ease of taking multiple head for a weekend. She loves the rodeo atmosphere, though. "It's a goal of mine, to rodeo consistently enough to make the ICA finals and prove (her horses) can hold their own at rodeos."

She loves listening to podcasts, enjoying a variety of them, including The Money Barrel, the Gauge by Chance Conrado, and Ed Mylett's podcasts.

"I'm one of those people who is constantly trying to learn and improve. Everyone gives me a hard time, because when I'm working or out doing things, I have a podcast on."

Podcasts are great, she said. "It's awesome to have knowledge right at the tips of your fingers. It's nice to do things, be productive, and still be learning at the same time."

In addition to the ICA, Whitley is a WPRA member and also competes in the Southern Idaho Barrel Racing Association. 📺

The PRCA Donita Barnes Lifetime Achievement Award honors contract personnel such as announcers, bullfighters, clowns, specialty acts, secretaries and timers who have been PRCA members for at least 15 years and have committed their lives to the rodeo industry, yet received little recognition for their commitment and contributions.

The posthumous recipient of the inaugural Contract Lifetime Achievement Award was long-time PRCA secretary Donita Barnes, wife of ProRodeo Hall of Fame inductee and PRCA stock contractor Bob Barnes and mentor to thousands of contestants and others involved with Barnes rodeos. The PRCA named the award in her honor in 2012.

The 2021 Nominees Are:

- Andrea Moon, a secretary and timer from Iron River, Mich., who has been with the PRCA since 1978. She served as the National Finals Rodeo's secretary in 1990 and was a timer at the 1983 NFR.

- Irene Singer, a secretary and timer from Calhan, Colo., who has been with

the PRCA since 1970. She served as the NFR secretary in 2004 and was a timer at the 1996 NFR. Singer also served as the secretary for the National Finals Steer Roping in 2009 and the National Circuit Finals Rodeo in 1999. She was the assistant secretary at the 1998 NCFR, too. Singer also was one of the timers at the NCFR in 1990 and 2012.

- The Harris Family. Grant Harris' grandfather started producing rodeos in 1930, and in 1955 Grant's father, Howard, started a weekly rodeo in New Jersey that continues to this day. Grant and Betsy Harris bought Cowtown Rodeo in 1978 and run the weekly rodeo that's held in Woodstown-Pilesgrove, N.J. Grant has been with the PRCA since 1973, having competed in bull riding, team roping and saddle bronc riding. He was the First Frontier Circuit's saddle bronc riding champion in 1975 and 1977-78. Betsy joined the PRCA in the late 1970s and served as assistant secretary for the 1994 NCFR and was the secretary for the 1995 NCFR. She was also a timer at the 1989 NCFR.

- Jennifer Nicholson, of the Riata Ranch Cowboy Girls, has been with the PRCA since 1990 and lives in Three Rivers, Calif. The Riata Ranch Cowboy Girls have been nominated for Specialty Act of

- Kay Gay is a secretary and timer from Terrell, Texas, who has been with the PRCA since 1964.

Meet the Member Caleb Delk

At the 2021 National High School Finals Rodeo, the trap shooting contest quite literally came down to the wire. NMHSRA member Caleb Delk went into his first national finals knowing it would be a tough competition, but evidently his preparation paid huge dividends. "When I looked back at the scores from last year's national competition, the winner didn't miss a single shot. The scores were tough and that made me a little nervous," admitted the high school junior from Las Cruces, New Mexico. "I went out to nationals a couple days early to practice and get the feel for things. That helped me get more comfortable." Caleb was in the third flight of shooters, and he missed one early on. He managed to regroup and finished the day hitting 99 of 100 targets.

"I finished my flight in first, but there were still more shooters to go. I ended up in a tie, so we had a shoot off." Each shooter was moved four feet back from the regular line of competition and they had 10 birds to hit. Caleb didn't miss any and it sealed the national title for him as his competition only hit 9. "When I joined the NMHSRA, I didn't think I would have a chance at winning. I just wanted to go to more shoots and hang out with rodeo people." Caleb quickly proved he was a force to be reckoned with as he consistently won the average at regular season rodeos and then won the event at the NMHSRA state finals. But it was in New Mexico 4-H that Caleb first found success as a competitive shooter.

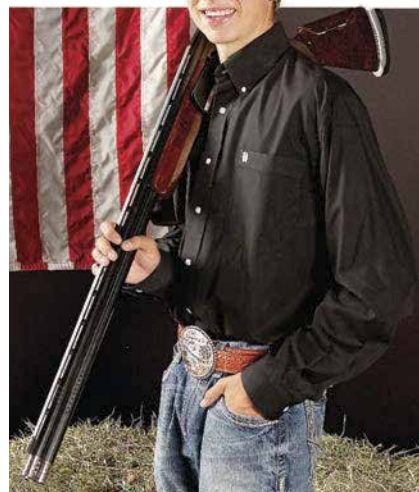
"When I was 8, I joined 4-H and discovered they had shooting sports. From the start I've always liked shotgun more than anything else." Now 16, Caleb has been shooting competitively both with 4-H and other organizations for the last four years. With lots of friends and family involved in the NMHSRA, it was almost eminent that Caleb would eventually join the associa-



tion. "I've really enjoyed the people and the atmosphere. It's a bunch of like-minded people and everyone is there to have a good time." He's also partial to being around and watching rodeos. Not one to sit on the sidelines, Caleb is hoping he'll be ready to start entering the team roping later this season.

"My cousin, Weslynn Reno, lives just a few miles from me and she was actually reserve champion in the team roping at nationals this year. She has an extra horse that I am going to use for team roping and she helped me practice heading this summer." Although Caleb's been around horses and ranching his entire life, this will be his first time rodeoing competitively. He's looking forward to roping at the end of the fall season and then all spring. As a high school junior at Mayfield High School, Caleb also keeps himself busy by serving as a chapter officer, judging forestry and livestock and showing his dairy heifers through FFA. But shooting is always at the forefront of his mind.

"Shooting can be really hard to grasp. Lots of people use a shotgun and love it, but that doesn't necessarily mean it comes naturally to them. You really need to have some natural ability to be a good shooter because you're aiming at a moving target." Although soft skills and natural ability are the foundation of any good shooter, it's the mental game that pushed Caleb to the national level. "When I shot at nationals, I hit 99 out of

100. I missed on the third bird out. I just regrouped and didn't miss from there. Once you get to where you know you can hit the targets and have the ability, it becomes a mental game. That's been the biggest struggle for me. This has probably been my best year mentally for not getting upset or distracted while I'm trying to shoot." 📺

LEAP OF FAITH

What does it mean to take a leap of faith? Why is it important to take the leap? Putting our trust and faith in God keeps us believing when it takes longer than expected. It keeps us hoping when we don't see it happening. It keeps us trying when our mind and body gets tired. Putting our hope and faith in God here in the natural, allows him to do the supernatural.

But, as I pointed out earlier, faith by itself is dead and useless. Without action,

faith is not enough. You can have faith that you will lose fifty pounds, but if you keep sitting on the couch, watching tv and eating potato chips it probably won't happen right? You can have faith that you will get that promotion, but if you keep showing up late, arguing with your coworkers, and slacking on your job tasks, it probably won't happen. You can have faith that you'll get that financial breakthrough, but without budgeting, money saving, and saying no to unnecessary purchases, it probably won't happen. I can have faith that I will walk again, but without rehabbing, meditating, working out, trying to move my legs every day, never giving it up, and God's divine miracle it probably won't happen right? God can perform miracles. He is able to change our situation in the blink of an eye but he wants us to take a leap of faith so he can perform them for his glory.

When we put action to our faith, it allows God to intervene and bless us. When you pray that God will help you shed those fifty pounds, start eating healthier and exercising, the weight comes off. When you pray for that promotion, start putting in more effort at your work, God sees that and will bless you for it. When you pray for a financial breakthrough, get a job, start saving your money, living within your means, and letting God direct your spending habits, you will have money in your bank account. When I pray to walk again, keep working out, keep rehabbing, keep trying to move my legs, and never give up, I will walk again.

Joshua 3 tells us the story of the Israelites crossing the Jordan River. Moses had led them out of Egypt towards the land that God had promised them. They had been wandering through the wilderness for forty years. Just imagine it, a guy tells them he is going to lead them out of slavery to a land filled with "milk and honey", and forty years later they haven't reached it yet. I'm sure there was plenty of doubt among the group. I'm sure they were physically tired and mentally exhausted. I'm sure there were plenty of them that thought the whole thing was a hoax and that they were just on a life long scenic journey. Then, he dies, and the next guy takes over and tells them the same thing. I'm sure plenty of them said "yea right". I'm sure plenty thought "This guy is a whack job just like the last. Why are we still following along?" But, because of good leadership, faith in God, and taking a step of faith, they cross the Jordan River into the promised land.

In verse 7 and 8 we read, "The Lord told Joshua," Today I will begin to make you a great leader in the eyes of all the Israelites. They will know that I am with you, just as I was with Moses. Give this command to the priests who carry the Ark of the Covenant: 'When you reach the banks of the Jordan River, take a few steps into the river and stop there.'"

Verse 13 tells us *"The priests will carry the Ark of the Lord, the Lord of all the earth. As soon as their feet touch the water, the flow of water will be cut off upstream, and the river will stand up like a wall."*

Verse 15-17 says *"It was the harvest season, and the Jordan was overflowing its banks. But as soon as the feet of the priests who were carrying the Ark touched the water at the river's edge, the water above that point began backing up a great distance away at a town called Adam, which is near Zarethan. And the water below that point flowed on to the Dead Sea until the riverbed was dry. Then all the people crossed over near the town of Jericho. Meanwhile, the priests who were carrying the Ark of the Lord's Covenant stood on dry ground in the middle of the riverbed as the people passed by. They waited there until the whole nation of Israel had crossed the Jordan on dry ground."*

This act of courage, leadership and faith allowed over a million people to cross the river on dry ground. It allowed them to reach the promise God had for their lives. Their leap of faith allowed them into the promised land. We see the people react to God calling them to take a step of faith. To take a few steps into the river and stop there. When God lays something on your heart, he's calling you to action and to be patient. He's calling you to act and let him do his work. Maybe he has a plan to affect more people than just you. Don't get in a hurry. Don't rush it. Take the step and wait on him.

Then, we see that when we take the step, he has a plan and will do the supernatural. When we get our feet wet, he can perform his miracles. Even when the river is flooding. Even when it looks like there is no way. Even when it seems humanly crazy, when we take that step and remain patient, God will do what only he can do. First, we must have the courage to believe and have faith. Then, we must take the leap of faith and put our faith into action. Trust in God's timing. Trust in God's plan. Have faith and get your feet wet! 🐾

Quick to credit her success to her family, Merrick knows she wouldn't be where she's at without their support. "My parents

Merrick's 14-year-old brother, Mattox, is also instrumental in taking his sister to the next level of competition. As a team roper himself, Mattox is helping Merrick learn the team event. "Sometimes Mattox will help me exercise horses since I have so many to ride. It's good to have him around to help out, it makes everything more of a team effort when he's there."

Family friends Tamra and Taylor Algrim gave Merrick the opportunity to compete on her current pole mount, Tootsie. They knew the mare needed to be used and Merrick was the perfect jockey for the quick-footed sorrel. Naturally, Tootsie is one of Merrick's favorite mounts. Her other favorite is Lola who Merrick runs barrels on. "I like both of those mares because I use them for my favorite events. They are both really smooth and I like their style of running. And, of course, they make it a lot of fun." Merrick shares her team roping and goat tying horse with her brother and then borrows her breakaway mount, Si, from another family

friend. Just keeping everyone legged up is a tall order in itself, but add in schoolwork and event practice on top of it and it's clear that Merrick has her hands full.

As a seventh grader, Merrick is now homeschooled through Epic Charter Schools. "We missed a lot of school last year and it was easy to get behind. We can do our schoolwork while we're on the road now. I'm going to miss my friends at school, but I'm looking forward to the new opportunities homeschooling will open up." When Merrick's family does find free time in the summer, they're usually on the lake surfing and wakeboarding. And in the winter, they're on the ski slopes of Angel Fire or Breckenridge. Those hobbies come in between junior high and high school rodeo of course. 📺

Meet the Member Chizm Kuykendall

In the three years Chizm Kuykendall competed in the ribbon roping in the OKJHSRA, he never had the same partner two years in a row. He did, however, find quite a bit of success in the event for three consecutive years. "Last year I would've gone to nationals in all of my events – ribbons, goats, and tie-down roping – but they canceled it," said the 14-year-old from Carnegie, Oklahoma. Chizm made up for lost time from last year by qualifying yet again in all three of his events. Thanks to the fast feet of his partner, Kennedee Biggerstaff, Chizm walked away from state finals as both the champion ribbon roper and goat tier. He took reserve in the calf roping.

"It was fun to be up there [at nationals] for a week and meet all kinds of new people. Of course, I wanted to win nationals, but I also just had to take things one step at a time and see how everything went." In round one, Chizm's goat got up and he blew his spoke on his tie-down run, but he shook all that off to clock a long 8 in the ribbons. He followed that up with another 8-second run in round two for ribbons and came back to the short round as the second high call back. "I didn't have a whole lot of time to think about our ribbon run, because I just got done with my tie-down calf before we were up. I roped the calf really fast and Kennedee did a good job getting the ribbon on her first try and we were a 6.7. We beat the reserve champion by about two seconds in the aggregate."

Clearly Chizm exited his junior high rodeo career on a high note, and he's looking forward to replicating that in the OHSRA. This freshman will be downsizing his event roster as he shifts his focus exclusively to calf roping. "I'm going to miss doing three

events like I did in junior high. It might be kind of boring to go to a rodeo and only have one event to worry about." Chizm isn't sure that he will only rope calves for his entire high school career. He could see himself venturing into team roping at some point also. As long as it involves a rope, Chizm is likely interested in it.

Of course, Chizm won't have a lot of time to miss competing in his other rodeo events because he'll be occupied with both baseball and football practice. "Rodeo obviously comes first, but I still don't get home from school and practice until about 5. And our arena doesn't have lights so roping practice can be limited sometimes." Luckily, Chizm has plenty of friends in the area with indoor arenas that he can use to stay sharp through the darker winter months. Even though Chizm will only get to practice 2 to 3 times a week, he's going to have make them each count. "I'm going to use my younger horse – Copper – at the start of the season and see how it goes. If all else fails, I'll use my 12-year-old mare who I took to na-

tionals." In true cowboy fashion, Chizm calls this horse simply Dun Mare.

Finding quite a bit of success outside of junior high rodeo, Chizm's been competing in Vegas at the Junior World Finals since 2019. Now that he's moving up into high school, he has a few other big-time events that he's looking forward to entering. One of those is the IFYR in Shawnee as well as the Best of the Best in Gallup, New Mexico. "I finally hit a growth spurt last spring. As I've gotten bigger and more stout, I've been able to flank a lot better. I've been able to win quite a bit more because I no longer have to nose the calves down." With a lot to look forward to in the coming year, Chizm is just thankful for another year of rodeo.

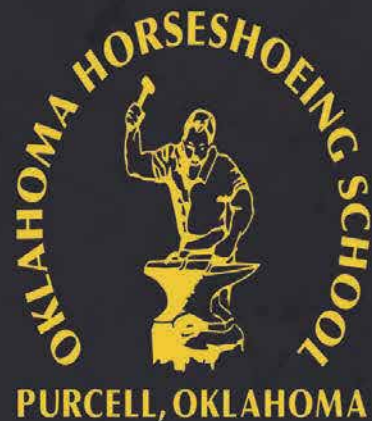

A cowboy who is exceedingly active on both sides of the arena, allow me the honor of introducing you to Lane Reed. Seeing my Dad's pictures of him riding bulls when he competed in rodeo is what made me want to pursue my career in the arena. My parents' names are Kevin and Judi Reed and rodeo has been in my family for a long time. My grandpa and my dad both rode bulls and my mom ran barrels and tied goats. Rodeo is something that helps us with many things throughout life, because it helps us to understand that you win some and you lose some."

Being a part of a culture rich with interesting heritage and life lessons, leads to a broader understanding of high minded principles. "Some values that are important to me are many lessons taught by my parents, because they are the ones who always provide moral wisdom and it is them who allow me to do what I love to be a part of rodeo. Meet the Member Quinter Weatherred

Quinter Weatherred can remember the first buckle he won just two years ago at a Little Britches rodeo in Hugo, Colorado. He had only recently decided to focus more on rodeo than school sports. This mind shift came with an intense desire to improve in each of his events and winning a buckle was definitely a strong indicator of that success. "I was actually really surprised by that win, but I was happy that the hard work I had been putting into it was paying off," said the 13-year-old from Lakin, Kansas. "At first I really wasn't doing all that well. I was getting help from different people and attending camps to improve, but it wasn't until Hugo that I finally saw that pay off."

That was about four years ago, but Quinter and his sister have been around horses for as long as they can remember thanks to their grandparents, Rick and Kathy Weatherred, who first put them on horses before they could walk. "All of my grandparents (Rick and Kathy, and Danny and Debbie Smith) have helped us get what we needed and really egged us on to get better." Both sets of grandparents attend as many rodeos as they can, but also continue the support from the home front.

Quinter's mom, Jessica, was around horses growing up but never really got into riding or competing on them. His dad, Cory, roped and rodeoed as a kid but never

She gets up and rides with me and also practices with me, so she's really helpful."

As Quinter heads into his final season in the KJHSRA, he's adding a few new events to his already daunting lineup. In the past few years, he's competed in ribbons, team roping, and goat tying. This fall he'll also appear in the tie-down roping and chute dogging. Even though heeling hasn't always been one of his favorite events, now that's he started seeing some success it's quickly risen to the top. It's almost equal to tie down roping for Quinter. "I've always watched the pros tie-down rope and wanted to do it too. I thought it was an interesting event and that it would probably be a lot of fun."

It was just last winter, while competing in the Young Guns, that Quinter realized

he could and should finally give tie-down roping a shot. He started working with his horse on it at home before realizing he would be ready to start entering this fall. As Quinter is looking forward to the upcoming season, he's working hard to continuously improve in his events and enjoy the ones he won't be able to compete in next year. He's also looking forward to leveling up next year when he gets into the KHSRA. Until then, he's riding a high from the Little Britches this past summer. "Flags isn't really my favorite event, but my horse sure likes it. We worked really hard at home and managed to win it this summer. It was pretty cool to win a saddle like that." That saddle was almost as sweet as his first buckle, but not quite. Quinter hopes to collect more of both as he continues his rodeo career. 🐾

Meet the Member Bryce Eck

I just like getting on buckin' horses and that's what I crave to do," said Bryce Eck who's both a bareback and saddlebronc rider in the KHSRA. "I know that I have to work hard all week to make sure I've got my skills down and have confidence in those to get on during the weekend." Following in the footsteps of his dad, Andy, who was a bareback rider, Bryce was introduced to the suitcase handle as a young kid. "We got on a few bucking ponies every once in a while, but then took a break before getting back into it just before my freshman year of high school." It was around this time that Bryce realized he wanted to give saddlebronc riding a try as well. He's been honing his skills in both events ever since.

More than just introducing him to the sport, Bryce's dad is his built-in coach at home. "My dad helps me on the spur board a bunch. We probably do that just about every day." Coach Chad Cross at Fort Scott Community College and the athletes under his direction have proven pivotal to Bryce's rodeo career. "I've been practicing with the team as much as I can since I was a freshman. They've helped me really get my technique down and I probably wouldn't be as far along without them." Now a senior at Union Town High School, Bryce plans to rodeo for Fort Scott next fall. Until then, he has two KHSRA state titles to defend in the coming season.

Even though Bryce has qualified for and competed at nationals for the last three years in both events, but he's never done so as the state champion. He managed to win both bareback and saddlebronc this past summer. A few setbacks in his rides kept Bryce out of the short round at nationals, but he enjoyed the opportunity to compete against the best riders in the nation again. "It's always nice going to nationals knowing that I have to show up to compete if I want a chance at winning." At the 2020 event, Bryce won the first performance of the bareback before making it back to the short round. It's easily the best he's done at nationals so far, but he has another year to prove himself. He was also crowned the state all-around champion this year, which he intends to repeat in 2022.



Even though he has lofty goals, Bryce keeps everything in perspective to stay focused on each ride. "I just want to ride my very best every time I run my hand in a riggin' or put my feet in the stirrups. I try to work out every day so I can keep my body prepared and I work on the

spur board to continue improving my technique and timing." Bryce always keeps his equipment in tip top shape simply because he never knows when he might get on next, and he isn't one to turn down the opportunity for a ride. His hunger for the sport is only comparable to his work ethic for both his sport and way of life on the ranch.

"We ride a bunch of colts here on the ranch, so that's a good way to work on some things for my events. But whenever I have free time, all I want to do is get on more buckin' horses." Training colts and working cattle at home helped Bryce learn what it means to both work hard and play hard. He's continued to develop this mental toughness through wrestling at school. "Wrestling is a tough sport. There are a lot of long, hard practices and that really carries over into riding buckin' horses for me. You need a tough mind for both when it comes to practice and competing." This past winter Bryce was the state champion in the 152-weight class. And this summer he continued to prove that he's got grit when he won the bareback riding at the inaugural World Championship Junior Rodeo held at the Lazy E Arena in Guthrie. As Bryce finishes his senior season, he'll also make appearances in the CePRA, URA, ACRA and Super Series. He's really looking forward to riding on his PRCA permit next summer. 🐾

Sage Dierks

It's not often that a roughstock rider is also handy with a loop, but that's exactly the case for Sage Dierks from Douglas, Kansas. He first learned how to head from his dad, Jason, while helping with ranch work. And he's been roping with his twin brother, Luke, ever since. But Sage also discovered that his time spent in the saddle on the ranch gave him a sticky seat. "When I was growing up there was a junior ranch rodeo association in Kansas and Oklahoma. I started going to those and competing in the ranch bronc riding when I was 13. It got to the point where I was free handing them all and so I transitioned to saddle broncs when I was probably 16 and it's just gone from there," said the Kansas State University agribusiness junior.

Putting in long, hard days in the saddle on the ranch helped Sage develop a work ethic that's served him in both rodeo and life. "I think through the time I spent in the saddle and working hard I've learned how to enjoy rodeo so even when I don't have a lot of success I can still look forward to the next one." Competing in back-to-back events in the typical rodeo lineup can be a daunting task for Sage at times. Luckily, he gets to cover his bronc before heading for Luke. "I'm not sure if it's more or less pressure because I'm roping with family, but we've been practicing together our entire lives, so I almost know how a run is going to go before we make it." Even though the duo naturally butt

heads sometimes, Sage still enjoys each run he makes with Luke.

"I enjoy it because when one of us has success then we both do. I've never really heeled, I've always been the header. I think I like getting to lead the ship in a way and I would guess Luke likes finishing up our run. People talk about how the mentality between a header and a heeler is different and I think we both fit our roles really well." Although Sage enjoys both of his events equally, his time on a bronc is, of course, a very different experience. "One thing I do enjoy about bronc riding is when I put in a good ride. It just feels like I'm riding a rocking chair." He's been finding that rocking chair feeling more and more as of lately. Last year in the KPRA, Sage was the year-end saddle bronc riding champion and he's hoping to replicate that again in 2021.

"When I first joined the KPRA, I got to rodeo with Brett Olive and Luke Rush who helped me quite a bit with my bronc riding. They got to see a lot of different rides of mine and help me from

there." To get the most out of bronc riding practice as a college student, Sage has spent quite a bit of time at Fort Scott Community College. He rides under the direction of coach Chad Cross who has also helped improve Sage's bronc riding. In the last two years, Sage has finished in the top ten in the Central Plains Region. He's been within striking distance of qualifying for the CNFR, and he's determined to make it finally happen this year. "I know I'm riding better right now than I have the first two years of college and I hope I can carry that through the year and make the trip to Casper next summer."

After a strong summer in both team roping and bronc riding, Sage is looking forward to another college rodeo season. He's also set his sights on buying his PRCA permit next summer and intends to make one of the circuit finals. Sage will continue competing in the KPRA simply because it's become like family for him in the last four years that he's held a card. 📷

SHELLEY MORGAN

The number two WPRA barrel racer in the world standings is a 5 Star Equine team member.

Shelley Morgan and her two main mounts, Kiss and Phoebe, love the 5 Star products and use them faithfully.

The Eustace, Texas cowgirl especially uses the saddle pads and the sports boots.

She uses the barrel racer style pad and has several reasons to use it. "I've had pads before that felt like I was sitting on the top of my horse. With the 5 Star pads, it feels like they conform to my horses. They protect them like they need to, but at the same time, they allow my saddle to fit like it needs to. They allow my horse the freedom to move, they don't hinder her in any way, and they protect her from pressure from the saddle."

Shelley noted that any thickness can be purchased, according to a horse's conformation or saddle needs, but she prefers the 7/8 inch. "I feel like it's not too thick and allows my saddle to fit, yet it's not too thin and allows plenty of protection."

She appreciates the ability to customize the colors of the pads. "They sure are pretty. They serve their purpose under my saddle and look really nice at the same time."

She also uses 5 Star Equine's sports boots. "I really like them as well," she

said. "They fit to my horses' legs really nice. They're easy to put on, and my horses' legs are still cool when I take them off."

After her second trip to the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo last year, Shelley is on track for her third qualification this year.

She was aboard her horse Kinda Heavenly, "Phoebe," much of the spring, saving her main horse HR Fameskissandtell, "Kiss" for the bigger shows. The seven-year-old mare carried Shelley to a win at the RAM National Circuit Finals in April, winning more than \$10,000 and giving her some flexibility for the summer.

Her win at the National Circuit Finals "allowed me to change my plans, as far as how many rodeos I entered, and where I entered."

Kiss, a sorrel with a flaxen mane and tail, is a "diva," Shelley said. "She loves attention and she loves people, when she's in a quiet setting." When it's not a rodeo atmosphere, Kiss will put her head down and let people pet on her.

But once she's in a rodeo setting, close to the arena, it's all business. She can be-

come a little more intense, Shelley said.

Kiss is a typical mare, too. "She's head strong, and as far as other horses go, she's the boss. If she wants to be your friend, she will be. If she doesn't want to be your friend, she'll tell you."

Shelley is quick to give credit to her husband, Rex, for his role in her success.

Married 28 years, he "pretty much does everything except ride the horse," she quipped. Rex does the entering, the driving, and "takes care of me and my horses. He enjoys it, too. He enjoys seeing us win."

He does a lot for Shelley and her equine partners. "He makes my job super easy. All I have to do is feed and care for my horses and run them. Other than that, he takes care of every other aspect you can think of. I know how much stress he takes off me."

Because of her early winnings, Shelley and Rex were able to enter fewer rodeos. They spent more time playing tourist on the road, and the horses have had a break. "The fewer runs you can put on them, the longer they'll probably last."

Barrel racing, when it's going well, is fun, Shelley said.

"It's a fun game. It's even more fun when you win at it." 🐾

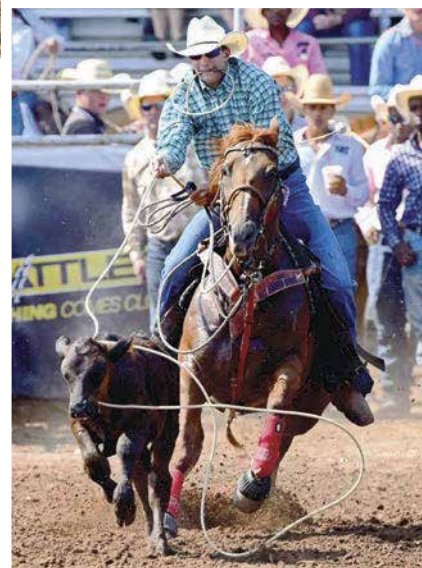
After graduation, Kase plans to get a

He's got three mounts – one for each event. "Titus is my tie roping horse and he just puts me in the right spot every time and works no matter what." His team roping horse is Spider Man – that name was already given to the horse. "He scores like a rock and makes it easy for me to go win." He has two other horses that are practice horses. Other than that, she visits other rodeos. “I try to focus on one thing at a time if I can.” Along with competing for the queen title, Laney made it Nationals in cutting – her first year of competing.”

After this year, she is eligible to run for the state title again or move on to

another title. “I’d like to stay in the queening world if possible. “It’s a great industry to be in – queens are a very important part of rodeo – they are communicators for the world of rodeo and we really need them.”

She belongs to the Vernaeon Parish Rodeo Club and their arena is 20 minutes away. “We live in a small town with not much to do, I like to try new things, I like to travel – so we’ll go to Lake Charles which is an hour south – they have a mall, a movie theatre, and more restaurants. I am also into crafts, sewing, baking, and cooking. Please see next page for recipe for her famous bread pudding.

Laney is a homeschooled junior and loves it. “I like the freedom it gives me – I still do all the work, but I get more time to rodeo and try my hand at extra things.” She knows she wants to go to college and rodeo; I know that I want to do something in the Western Industry – I have a lot of ideas in mind. I’ve thought about a law degree, I’ve even played with the idea of veterinary medicine, especially rehabilitation. I don’t think my stomach can handle to surgery part, but nursing animals back to health would be very interesting. Texas A&M would have the vet and law interests I have but I’m keeping my options open. You never know what’s going to happen.”

Bread Pudding

INGREDIENTS:

10 cups dry bread pieces cut into ¾-inch chunks
1 cup granulated sugar
9 large egg yolks
1 tablespoon pure vanilla extract
1 tablespoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon salt
2½ cups heavy cream
2½ cups whole milk
2 tablespoons butter, melted
Vanilla ice cream, for serving

DIRECTIONS:

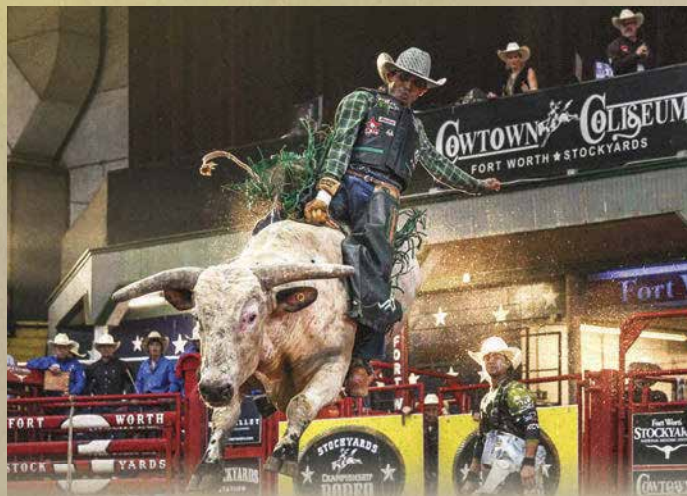
Preheat oven to 325°F.
Spread bread chunks in single layer on a rimmed baking sheet.
Bake, tossing occasionally, until dry but not browned, about 15 min. Cool bread chunks about 15 minutes; Whisk sugar, egg yolks, vanilla, cinnamon and salt together in large bowl. In a slow thin stream, whisk in cream, then milk, until combined.
Fold in cooled bread chunks. Transfer mixture

to a baking dish and let stand until soggy, about 30 minutes.
Place bread pudding on rimmed baking sheet and bake until custard has just set and is not easily jiggled when shaken, about 50 minutes.

Transfer to wire rack and cool until pudding is set and just warm (not piping hot), about 45 minutes.
Serve with vanilla ice cream.

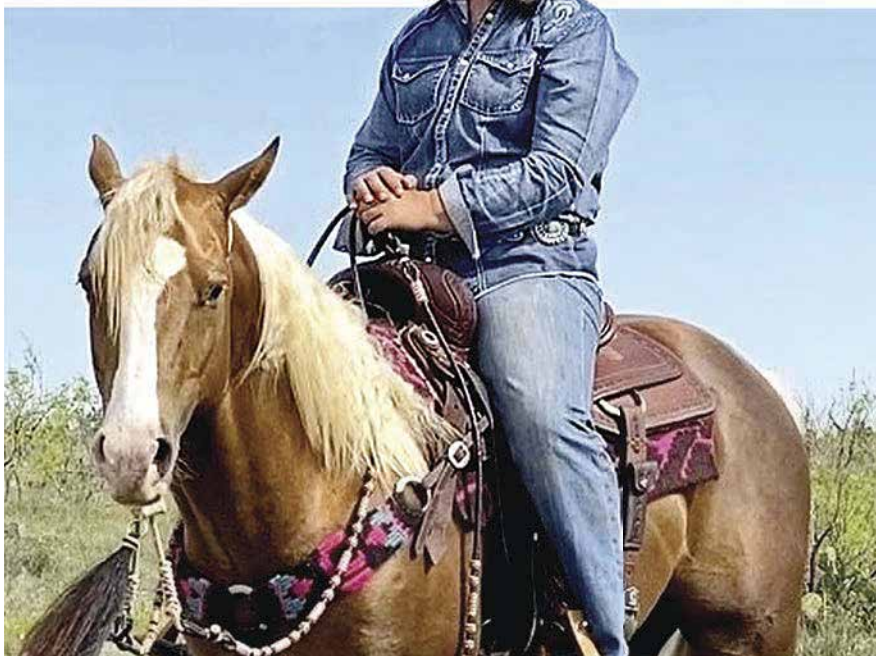
Meet the Member Kim Coleman

“I’ve always said ranching and rodeo is all I’ve ever known,” said Kim Coleman from Ackerly, Texas. “I’ve worked on the family ranch my whole life. That and training barrel horses has made up my whole life.” With a lifetime spent in the saddle already, Kim has never felt like she rides too much. It’s her entire life. “My mom (JoAnne Coleman) was hauling to rodeos before I was born. So, when I arrived, she took me with her, and my options were to get a horse and join her or sit in the truck.” At age 14, Kim joined the WPRA and just two years later she started training her own futurity horses. She’s been winning on self-made mounts ever since.

“When I was younger, I was riding 7 or 8 horses every day but now I usually get on 3 or 4 every day of the week. I’ve never had a ‘real job,’ I’ve always been on the ranch. It’s been a fun life.” A true gypsy soul, Kim can only spend a week or two at home before she gets the itch to hit the rodeo trail again. As it turns out, she really doesn’t know how to take a trip without a trailer following behind her. “A lot of my friends go to rodeos and that’s about the only time I get to see them. When we go to a rodeo, we do a lot of socializing and some sight seeing when there’s time.” JoAnne is Kim’s constant companion both at home on the ranch and on the road.

“I have to give my mom all the credit because she makes every mile with me. She helps me drive and take care of the horses. As she’s gotten older, she’s taken up ranch sorting and we get to do that together some, but we’re also gone a lot at rodeos.” When they’re destined for mountain country, Kim and JoAnne take their trail horses along for the ride. They’ll spend days at a time camping out and riding trails together. “People always ask why I want to ride more when that’s all I

really do every day. But we get to see a lot of stuff that you can’t see in cars. We just really enjoy it.” Both Arizona and Colorado are favorite rodeo destinations that also have great trail riding. Estes Park is one of Kim’s favorite NSPRA events to enter each year.

It was just three years ago that Kim first joined the Texas Senior Rodeo Association. She was quickly introduced to the NSPRA and bought her card right away. She’s spent her life surrounded by rodeo competitors of all levels as well as barrel jackpots and futurities, but Kim has probably enjoyed her time in the NSPRA the most. “I’ve met so many great people and gotten to be good with friends with a lot of them. Out of all the groups of people I’ve been around, these [NSPRA] people are the friendliest and nicest.” The fact that the association tries to schedule several rodeos close together is also a draw for Kim. She doesn’t have to drive hundreds of miles just to make two NSPRA rodeos.

“I also really enjoy the NSPRA because it caters to the 40 and over competitor. I never thought I would say that, but as

we get older our reactions are slower. It gives me somewhere to run and compete that won’t be against these 18-year-olds that are riding really aggressively.” On the road, Kim is the trail boss and in the last few years she’s also become ranch manager as her mom has handed over the reins. Kim runs the operation almost entirely on her own. “I have one good dog and then my son (Colten, 24) that can help me when I need it. And my mom still helps out and drives the feed truck and all that. Mainly my son and I take care of most of it.” Kim’s step dad, Mike, keeps the ranch running and the horses fed while everyone is away at a rodeo. After a dry start to the summer, Kim had to reduce her Brahman and F1 cow herd to 150 head. Keeping her herd mostly intake proved beneficial when the rain finally came and Kim heads into the winter months looking to replenish her cow herd when the market prices drop back down again. 🐾

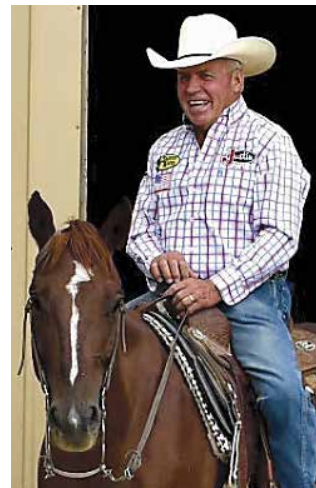
HOW OFTEN DO YOU PRACTICE

Recently I was watching a hunting show on TV. These two guys were going deer hunting with bows. Once they got their camp setup, they were doing a little target practice on a soft target. They were both getting their arrows in about a six-inch pattern from forty yards back. One of the guys turned to the other and asked him how many arrows he shoots per day to practice. His casual answer was one hundred. He said, "If you want to be a good bow hunter, you need to practice a lot." That statement reminded me of team roping. I like to practice. I enjoy practicing and I think if we say we want to get better at roping and riding we need to do a lot of it. But it's not always easy to get people to practice with.

I feel blessed that I have a passion for riding my horses and team roping. I know lots of people who never have figured what they are passionate about. I feel sorry for those people, I truly do. But that still does not solve the problem of getting people to practice with. I mean, I have heard every excuse in the world. It's too hot, too cold, too windy, I'm too tired or I've got to get my horse shod.

While my wife and I were in Arizona this winter one evening I made a decision for the next day. I said, "I'm not going to try and set up a practice session for tomorrow. I will let someone call me. There are three different arenas where I have been practicing, surely one of them will call and invite me to come practice tomorrow." About two o'clock in the afternoon the next day and no phone call to practice, it hit me. There is a major difference in the way most people practice and the way I practice. Most

people go about their day and if they feel like it, they might practice. My method is that I set my practice session up the night before, time and place and I work my day around that practice session.

To me, roping is like exercising. It's easy to get up each morning and get it done. But it's just as easy to skip it and the more you skip it, the easier it gets to just quit doing it all together. The problem here is that everybody wants to rope good on the day of the roping. The ones that are successful are the ones that want it just as bad on Monday as they did on Sunday, so they go out and practice, even when it's too hot, too cold or they are tired.

When two thirty in the afternoon rolled around, I couldn't take it anymore. I broke down and called one of my practice spots. I said, "What's the chances that we get to practice today?" He said, "I don't know, but I will call you back." I said, "Good, because I've got my horse saddled." Three thirty I got the call; we are roping at four thirty. Thank God and with a little phone networking I got to rope one more time. 🐾

Meet the Member Paxton Rodriguez

Over 240,000 people have seen Paxton Rodriguez's work.

That's because his Tik Tok account, Boy_With_Rope, has that many followers.

The Midstates Rodeo Association member, a resident of Clayton, Mich., is a trick roper, along with being a tie-down roper, team roper, and steer wrestler.

At 21 years old, he's the fourth generation of his family to be involved in rodeo, the third generation in the MidStates. His parents, Raul and Polly, are still active members, competing in the team roping and breakaway, respectively, and Raul's dad, Roy, was a member. Raul's granddad (and Paxton's great-granddad), Juan "John" Rodriguez, was a Midwest Cowboy Association member. Roy won the MidStates tie-down roping titles in 1978 and 1983.

A student at Adrian (Mich.) College, Paxton is working towards a degree in physics. He's not sure which direction he'll take with his degree. "I like the mechanical engineering side of it," he said, "maybe something in the auto industry. Right now, it's pretty broad. I didn't want to get anything too specific."

He's taken some tough classes for the physics degree, including Calculus 1, 2 and 3, classical mechanics and quantum mechanics. Calculus 3 was tough, he said. "There's a lot more letters than there are numbers, and it gets confusing, to say the least."

He compares quantum mechanics to the formulas and equations that Sheldon from The Big Bang Theory does on the show, and he's noticed the similarity between equations on the show and equations he's worked. "I never thought when I watched that show, that I'd be doing what Sheldon did."

In addition to competition, Paxton is a trick roper. When he was a kid, he saw a

roping he does around the house.

His Tik Tok handle came about from a rodeo where he was performing. Once, at a bull riding where he was the specialty act, he saw the production sheet, and instead of listing him as "specialty act" or "trick roper," they called him "boy with rope." The announcer used it as his nickname, and the name stuck.

Paxton chose to not rodeo collegiately but does the Midstates instead. "To me, it wasn't the best financial decision" to compete in college. "I'd have to drive farther, being in Michigan."

He's considering getting his PRCA membership as a specialty act and trick roping after he graduates from college, in May of next year.

The Midstates finals are the first weekend in October, and he's qualified in the tie-down in first place and in second place in the steer wrestling. He and his dad, his header, are one hole out of a trip to the finals in the team roping. This is his second Midstates finals; he competed there in 2019, and also competes in the International Pro Rodeo Association.

He has a younger brother, Preston, who is fourteen years old. 🐾

trick roper at a rodeo and asked his dad to teach him. His dad taught him two simple tricks, and Paxton added more tricks. He's grateful to pro trick ropers Rider Kiesner and Anthony Lucia for answering his questions and helping him out.

He's performed at a variety of rodeos, beginning at the age of fifteen. The first couple of events, he had some stage fright, but he got tips from his uncle, Ryan Rodriguez, a PRCA rodeo clown, including some good advice for working an indoor arena with a dark house and a spotlight. "My uncle Ryan said, when you go out there, whatever you do, don't look at the light. After a minute or two, I glanced at it, and I said, 'oh, yeah, I see why now,'" he laughed.

In fact, it was his trick roping that got him a couple hundred thousand followers on Tik Tok.

A friend convinced him to post a few of his roping videos on the platform. Paxton didn't think they would take off, but they did. He posts videos of him at rodeos or

PROFILE: **GARRETT YERIGAN**

YERIGAN FOUND HIS TRUE CALLING - NO JOB HAS EVER BEEN TOO BIG FOR CHEYENNE FRONTIER DAYS ANNOUNCER

Five days before the opening performance of the 2021 Cheyenne (Wyoming) Frontier Days Rodeo, Garrett Yerigan took an inspiring walk around Frontier Park.

He paid particular attention to the details, the angles, the lines ... the history of America's most recognized rodeo. He eventually found himself on the announcer's platform, overlooking the storied arena from the place that would be his home for all nine performances of the 125th year of Cheyenne's rodeo.

"I wholeheartedly believe this is what God put me on Earth to do," Yerigan said of his announcing career. "When He gives you opportunities, like Cheyenne Frontier Days, for example, it removes any doubt in your mind. I'm 26 years old, and I just did 'The Daddy of 'Em All.'"

His maturity supersedes his youth, but that's always been the case for Yerigan, the son of two rodeo contestants who grew up in the game. His father, Dale, is an 11-time steer wrestling world champion in the International Professional Rodeo Association and is now the association's general manager.

His mother, Kathy, qualified numerous times for the International Finals Rodeo, the IPRA's annual championship; she also is the office manager for the physical therapy department for Hillcrest Hospital in Pryor, Oklahoma, the family's hometown.

Garrett Yerigan cut his teeth in the business at the same time that he was cutting his own teeth. He was just 2 weeks old when made his first rodeo; both his parents were in the competition. He was about 6 or 7 years old when he started announcing slack. He was doing jackpots – both bulldogging and barrel racing – that his family was already going to.

"It just snowballed from there," he said.

By age 12, he was announcing a once-a-month barrel racing, and within short

time, he was announcing the Oklahoma High School Finals Rodeo and handling the sound for the 101 Wild West Rodeo in Ponca City, Oklahoma; that was before sound directors had PRCA cards, and since he wasn't 18 yet, it worked out fine.

By the time he turned 18 and purchased his announcer's card, he was bidding rodeos and developing his future. His parents may have hoped they'd bred a contestant, but they raised a true hand when it comes to calling the action.

"I tried a little bit of everything," he said. "I tried sliding the steer saver at home. I tried roping steers at home. I tried riding steers at home. Nothing grabbed me. In going to all these rodeos and play-

ing around with announcing slack, it became more of the announcer's stand as the cool place to be. It was a safer occupation and an automatic paycheck, and you're still involved with rodeo.

"I almost feel bad for the contestants, because they're in town and out of town so fast that they don't get to enjoy it. I get to enjoy the town and work the rodeo. Every place I go, it feels like a family reunion every year."

That's the nice part of his job, whether it's in Sonora, Texas, or Cheyenne. Oh, and then there was this little thing called the National Finals Rodeo. Yerigan was part of the crew that worked the inaugural National Finals Breakaway Roping, which took place over three mornings in conjunction with the NFR last December in its one-time home of Arlington, Texas.

"I'm very thankful I got up on the path as early as I did," he said. "Even at my age, I've spent time in four Canadian provinces, two Australian states and 20-



plus states in the U.S. When I look back at it like that, there are so many things to be thankful for.

"The buckle I put on every day is from the National Finals Breakaway Roping. It was those contestants' NFR. If it never happens again, Randy Corley, Brad Narducci and I can say we were at the first one. This says more that this is what my calling was in rodeo, and I'm proud to bring it to audiences all over the world."

He's busy at it, too. For 2021, he was projected to work 161 performances and will be gone from his home for better than 250 days.

Of course, those two weeks in Cheyenne stand on their own as a particularly interesting opportunity. Most of the biggest names in the game were expected to be there. It was televised daily on The Cowboy Channel, and he – along with announcing partner Kyle Shobe – was one of the faces and voices of the 125th Frontier Days celebration.

The downfall: his friend and fellow Cinch endorsee, Andy Stewart, was losing the job that Yerigan had just gained. The two talked on the phone, and Stewart provided Yerigan the motivation to push ahead and make it happen. Stewart also called before the rodeo's start to offer in-

sights and advice for the young protégé.

"At the time, I was more worried about my friend losing a rodeo than I was about getting the Cheyenne Frontier Days," Yerigan said.

That's a testament to who he is and what he's about. It's also a good sign for the future of professional rodeo, and it's the lessons he gained from Dale and Kathy Yerigan that continue to percolate today.

"I would say I learned a great deal from my parents, both in and out of the arena," he said. "Dad won 11 world championships in the steer wrestling in the IPRA, so he was obviously doing something right. He taught me the fundamentals even though I didn't pursue it. I can take you through a run, but it doesn't mean I want to do it and jump off a horse."

He laughed a little at the thought. His father had done so thousands of times, but it just wasn't in the cards. He knows what is.

"As an announcer or as a fan, you have to be a student of the game, but it all stems from the things that Mom and Dad taught me," Yerigan said. "They taught me a lot about treating people. If you treat people poorly, you're not going to last long in this business. That's one of the most valuable

things they taught me."

As the evolution of Yerigan continues, he considers no rodeo nor task unimportant. They can all be tools used later on, whether it's driving a bulldozer through a swampy parking lot in Claremore, Oklahoma, to pull rodeo rigs out of a muddy mess or feeding livestock or sorting animals at the Fort Worth Stock Show and Rodeo.


"I've done a little bit of everything in the trenches," he said.

It's led to his new title, which, in essence, is the event's producer, working alongside all other contract personnel to make each performance be as flawless as possible. He's a man of many talents and many accolades, and he's a few years from turning 30. It's an attribute to his life and his lifestyle for 26 years.

"When I was growing up, I was in a trailer full of steer wrestlers," Yerigan said. "I didn't grow up around kids my age. I went to public school for all 13 years, but as far as the summers, I was around adults. When you're in a trailer with big, hairy-legged bulldoggers, you have to learn to hold your own."

Garrett Yerigan is still holding his own, and audiences all across the world have heard it. 📺


